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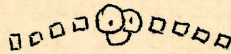

## ARE THE PEOPLE TO BE GIVEN A CHANCE TO EXPRESS THEIR DESIRES ?

A proposal was laid before the Town Council last Monday night to change the name of our Town to North Miami; after one ballot had been taken on which only two councilmen voted, it was unanimously passed, and the Town Clerk was sent to Tallahassee to arrange its appearance before the legislature which closes today. It will require the approval of both House and Senate and the signature of Governor Martin to make it effective. At the time of going to press it had not completed this entire route and therefore we cannot make a definite statement as to the outcome, and for that reason two entire pages of matter prepared for publication in this issue of the "BULLETIN" are withheld until next week. These contained statements from parties vitally interested, letters from large numbers of citizens, a cartoon or two, and an "eye-witness" description of the entire history of the matter.

The Editor of the BULLETIN wishes to take a definite stand in this matter, prompted by a sense of justice to the community as a whole, and by the multitudes of protests received from citizens and tax-payers.

This matter has been discussed for some four or five months in a general fashion, but every attempt to place it before the Council has met defeat up to the present moment. In the last week of the Legislature the resolution was placed before the Council with no warning to the members, except at the executive session immediately preceding its session, and rushed thru on the platform of help to one or more real estate developers needing financial assistance obtainable only by the change in name to satisfy the banking houses.

No warning that this matter was to be presented was given the tax payers and citizens of the Town, and no word of it was announced as coming up in the earlier part of the meeting, with the result that after the bids on the Town Hall were disposed of the greater part of the people went home to awake the next morning amazed at the action of the Council in changing the name of the Town.

To make the matter worse The Miami Herald published an article on Wednesday morning stating that the matter was decided at a meeting of citizens presided over by Mayor Brion. Either the Miami Herald rather badly misunderstood their informant or he was deliberately misleading them.

We sincerely believe that the people of the Town do not want to change the name of this community with all of the resultant confusion and loss of individuality, and if we did we would seriously regret it in a comparatively short time. BUT IF THE NAME OF THE TOWN IS TO BE CHANGED THE TAX PAYERS AND CITIZENS SHOULD DO THE CHANGING NOT ONE OR TWO MEN INFLUENCING THE BALANCE OF THE TOWN COUNCIL. We believe the State Legislature will see the matter this way and require a vote of the people upon the matter. Let us have majority rule in Miami Shores.

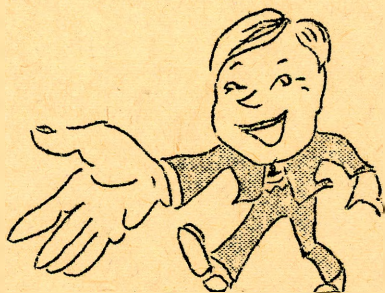
## RESOLUTION ADOPTED TO CHANGE NAME OF TOWN TO "NORTH MIAMI"

After the bids were disposed of Councilman Griffin presented a resolution to change the name of Miami Shores to that of North Miami. He spoke at some length upon the matter giving as his reason the fact that financial houses here and in the North are reluctant to loan money, or handle bonds for either the Town or property owners within it as long as the name remains as at present. On the first ballot only two councilmen voted, both voting in the affirmative. Upon the second ballot the resolution was unanimously passed. Town Clerk Dougherty was dispatched on the midnight train to Tallahassee to have the matter presented to the Legislature before its adjournment Friday. If it is not ratified or passed by the legislature it will not become effective, and cannot be presented again for two years as the legislature will not re-convene until then. Naturally, the bill will also have to have Governor Martin's signature to become law. When questioned at the Chamber of Commerce meeting on Tuesday night Mr. Griffing stated that the name of the Town was at present holding up financing for Biscayne Park Estates amounting to approximately \$250,000.00

At the time the "Bulletin" went to press the action of the State Legislature had not been completed.

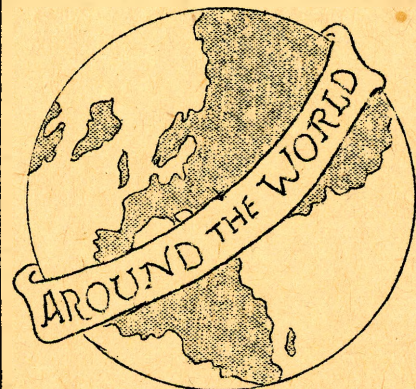

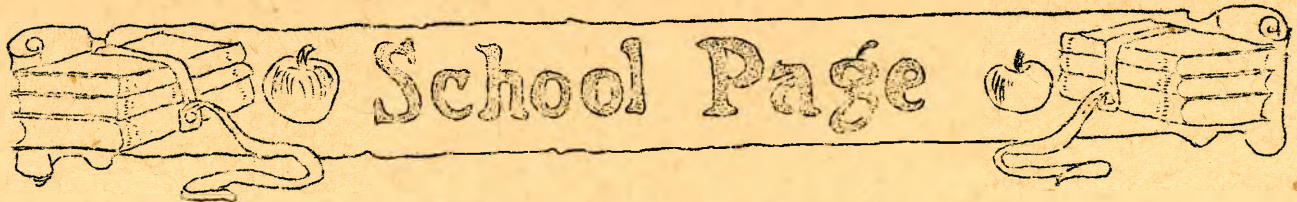

#### 4H GIRL WINNERS LEAVE FOR TALLAHASSEE

On Thursday morning three happy girls left our community for a twelve day trip to Tallahassee ----- happy because they won a free scholarship to a short course for the Junior Home Demonstration Club, and doubly happy because they won high honors for their school and community. The girls are Dorothy Leaton, county winner in Health; Estelle Medlin, winner in third year work; and Gretchen May Donaldson, winner in second year work. There were over five hundred contestants from 42 Dade County Clubs. Eighteen girls won the honors, making the percentage for Miami Shores very high. The work is not only very interesting for young girls but it also builds for more efficient home making.

Upon their return from Tallahassee Miss Pansy Norton, the county leader, will hold summer camp for all club girls who won their pins. After camp, a summer class will be conducted under adult leadership.

It will be of interest to her many friends to learn that Anne Turner, formerly of this community, is also a second year winner of a scholarship.

#### SCHOOL SCORES HIGH IN SIGHT READING

One of the most constructive pieces of work accomplished at the school this year has been the improvement in sight reading. It is estimated that well over 90% of the reading done by all of us is done silently, therefore the greater emphasis in training should fall upon this type of reading. The object of the special work that has been given in all grades this year has been to teach the pupils to comprehend the contents of a page, rather than to silently and laboriously pronounce mentally every word on it. Cards containing a given number of words are held before the pupil for a specified length of time and then withdrawn, and the test of their comprehension made. Every grade has made marked advancement in this line of work the past year, and Supervisor McCarthy on a recent visit stated that Miami Shores average was far above that of the County, and complimented teachers and pupils highly on the progress made. As an illustration of the advancement made Professor Wagner has given us two typical grades, the sixth and the third.

The average for the sixth grade at the opening of the school term was 9.8 on comprehension and a rate of 141 words a minute; November 17 test showed comprehension 11.0 and the rate 168 words per minute. At mid-terms the average was again raised, comprehension 12.0 words p.m. 181. The final test showed the comprehension raised to 14 and 224 words per minute. The third grade showed the greatest improvement of the year, and also the highest average for its class: opening of school year the comprehension was 2.0, rate 36; at mid-terms comprehension 4, rate 90, and the final test raised their comprehension percentage to 7 and their rate of words per minute to 150. The standard average is 3.8 and 81, which shows the youngsters of our third grade almost twice as efficient in this regard as expected of them.

The lower grades of school closed Wednesday and a hilariously happy bunch of children poured out for a summer of play. The last week has been filled with displays of work for the benefit of pupils and parents alike. Of particular interest were the writing displays, showing a marked improvement over the work of the early part of the term. A specimen of each week's lesson for every pupil is kept thruout the year and bound in pamphlet form, in order to better compare the work and study the progress made by them.
