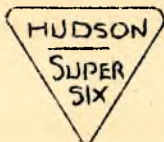

## OUR EDITORIAL COMMENT

On another page you will find a most interesting letter from Mr. Dougherty, our efficient Town Clerk, who drafted the Bill, presented to the Legislature last week, making it possible to change the name of our Town to "North Miami." You will recall that our editorial comment last Friday had to do with the seeming injustice to the Town in passing the resolution thru the Council without the people having an opportunity to express their opinions. The Council did not understand, or at least, did not mention the fact that there was to be a referendum clause attached to the Bill. We are sincere in our belief that it was the desire of the majority of the Councilmen, if not all, to give the citizens an opportunity to vote on the proposed change, but they did not make specific provision for it. We are to congratulate ourselves that our Town Clerk looked after our interests to the extent that he took it upon himself to attach this clause. Our praise, based on the contents of the above mentioned letter, is absolutely sincere and we wish to thank him for giving the Bill to the Legislature in that form.

Now that the people are to have a chance to express themselves on the change in name the Editor desires to publish reasons for and against it during the time that precedes the election. Let us have the matter thoroughly discussed so that all the people may understand it.

We think the name as at present is a very beautiful one, and one that will mean much to us from an advertising point of view within a comparatively short time. Our neighbors who produced the name will not remain in litigation forever, and then we will be proud to own it! BUT, whatever the name, we like our Town, and the folks in it, and the natural beauty here, and the man made beauty of its buildings and developments; like it all enough that no matter what we call the place, we will still enthuse about it, write North about it, and be proud to call it HOME!

To change the subject a bit, it is an interesting co-incidence that the opening day of the Lions International Convention in Miami is National Flag Day. Miami will wave many a flag Tuesday, for the Lions will inaugurate Miami's entry into the BIG CONVENTION CLASS of Cities. 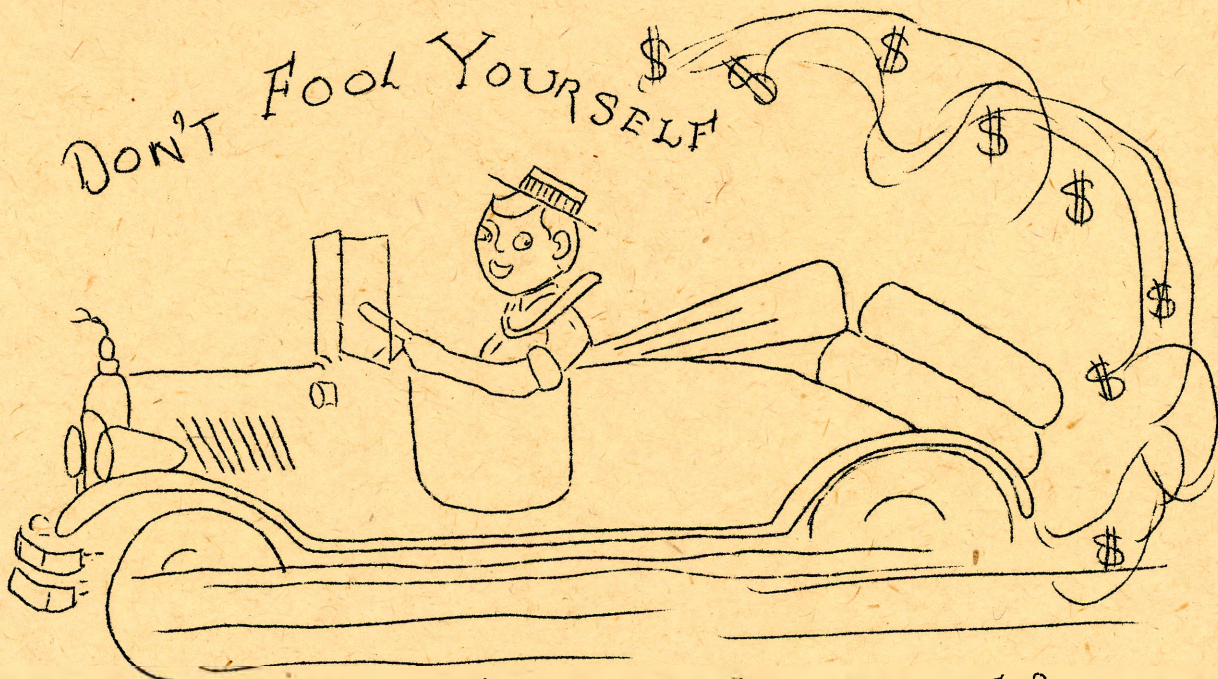

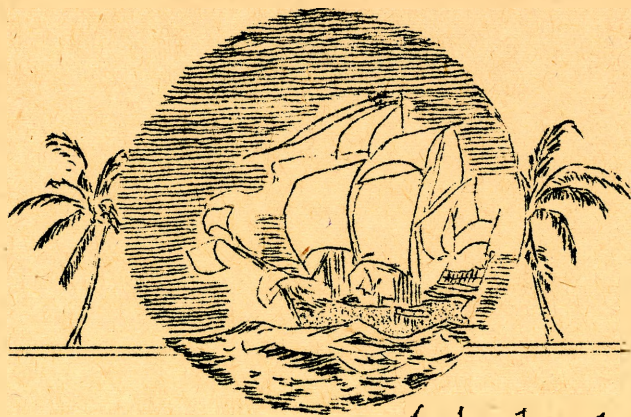

Over the Everglades.

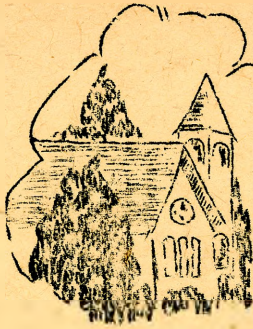
But one little shaft of sunlight

### CLEANING AND TAILORING SHOP CHANGES HANDS



# OPEN LETTERS

The following letter was received from Mr. Edward Dougherty, Town Clerk, soon after his return from the State Capitol. We wish to congratulate Mr. Dougherty on his stand, for the letter indicates that he is of the same mind as the greater part of the people in Miami Shores, as well as the "BULLETIN".

"With reference to your editorial in this week's "Bulletin", concerning the proposed change of the name of the Town, the following information is furnished:

Pursuant to instructions from the Town Council, I left for Tallahassee on the midnight train last Monday, for the purpose of securing the passage of a legislative act, authorizing a change in the name of the Town. While on the train, the next morning, I drafted the measure to be presented to the Legislature and prepared the following clause as the last section of the Bill:

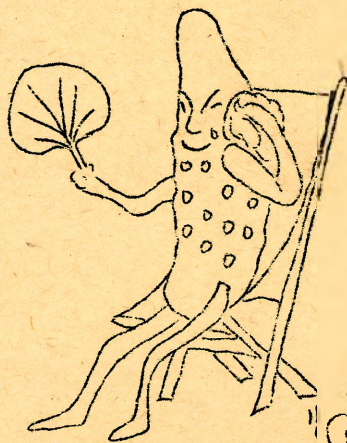
"This Act shall take effect upon its ratification by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the said Town, actually voting at an election which shall be held after such notice and under such rules as shall be prescribed by Ordinance of said Town."

At the first train-stop, the full text of the Bill was wired to Messrs. Caldwell and Raymond, our bond attorneys in New York and their approving opinion was telegraphed to Jacksonville.

While no mention was made of a referendum in the discussion Monday night at the Council meeting, I felt that I had authority to insert such a clause in the Act in view of the Council Resolution authorizing me to prepare the Bill and to secure its enactment.

I believed that no change of such great importance to this municipality ought to be made unless the people of the Town should first express their approval at an election, regularly called and held after due time and opportunity for discussion and deliberation.

Accordingly on Tuesday morning, I inserted the foregoing clause in the Bill, feeling certain that neither the Mayor nor any member of the Town Council would disapprove of such action, for they have always been responsive to public opinion and never take final action on important matter unless they have ascertained the wishes of the people (continued)

of the Town.

Upon arriving at Tallahassee, I was informed that it was impossible to secure the enactment of the Bill in view of the fact that the Session was to end only two days later and under the rules of the Senate and the House of Representatives, it was too late for the introduction of any new Bills. However, I succeeded in getting the rules waived and within three hours from the time of my arrival at the Capitol, the Bill was finally passed by the Senate by a vote of 38 to 0, after having received its third reading. The Bill was ordered to be certified to the House of Representatives, and on the following day, was finally passed by that body on its third reading.

No change or ammendment of any kind was made either in the House or the Senate, but the Bill as finally presented to the Governor for signature was in the exact form prepared by me on the train Tuesday morning.

Was later informed by Senator Watson that he had received a long telegram opposing the Bill but that the telegram did not arrive until after its final passage. This was the first intimation I received that there was any opposition to the measure.

The full text of the Bill had already been wired to the Mayor and to the President pro tem of the Council. Receiving no reply from either of them, nor any wire of protest from any citizen of the Town, I took it for granted that there was no opposition to the Bill, and used my best efforts to secure its passage.

I am sure that the Town Council will allow a sufficient time to elapse before the holding of the election, in order that there may be opportunity for thorough discussion of the proposed change and so that those opposed to, and those favoring the change, may present their arguments to the citizens of the Town.

The referendum election will probably be held not earlier than five weeks from this date.
