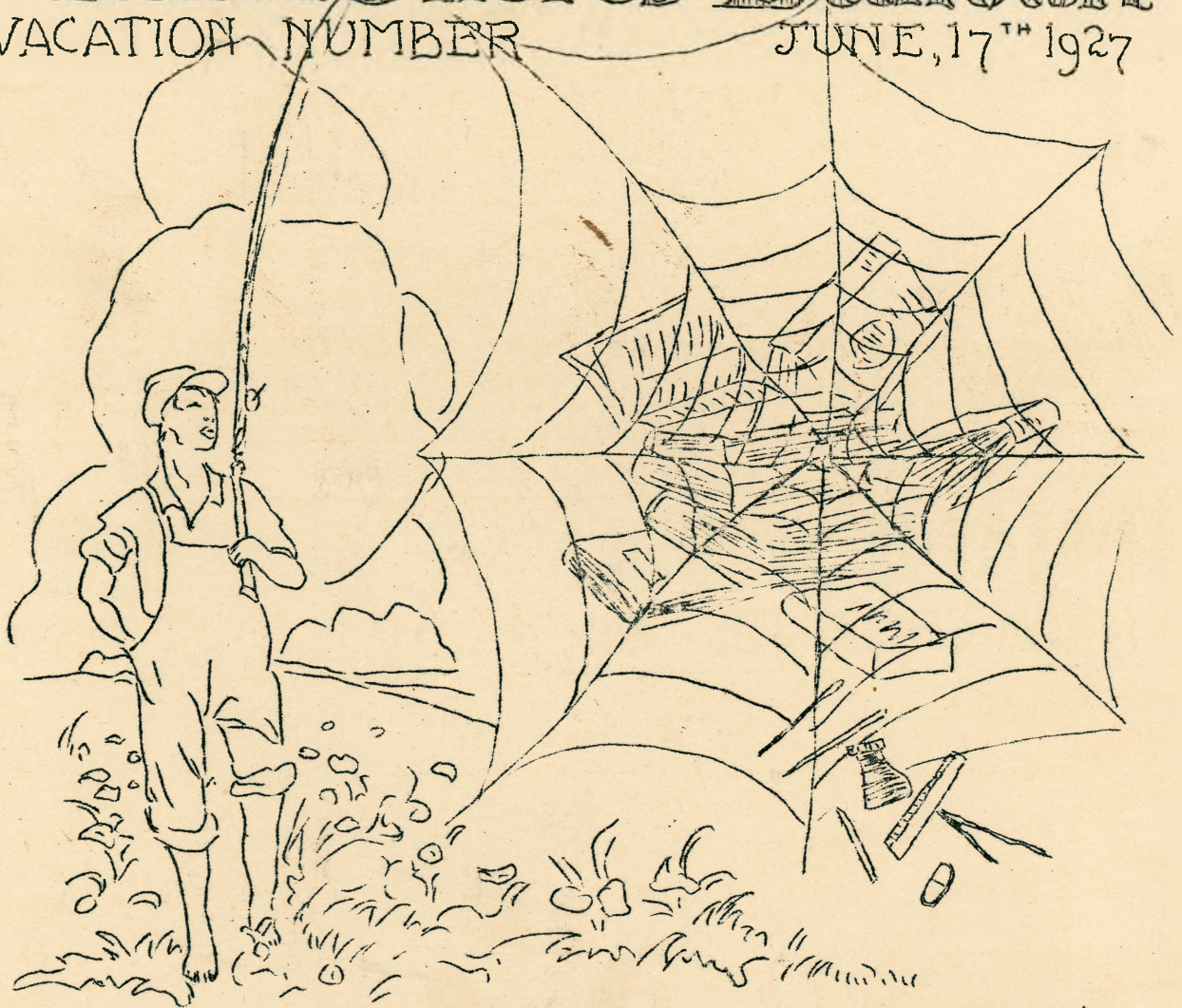

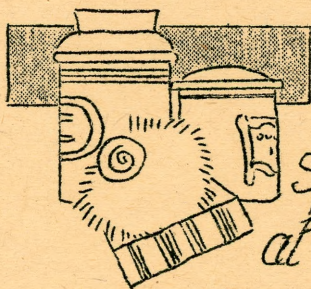

DAUGHTERS OF AMERICA ELECT STAFF

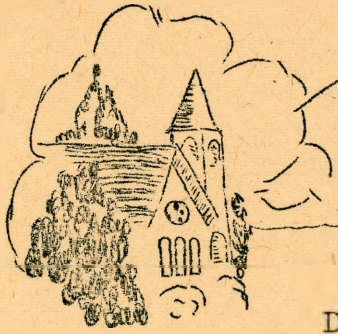

# At The Town Hall

## REGISTRATION FOR SPECIAL ELECTION

Persons whose names now appear on the the registration books of the Town of Miami Shores are not required to register again for the Special Referendum Election to be held on July 26th., 1927, it was announced by Mayor W.P. Brion yesterday at the Town Hall. The registration books, however, are open, and all persons now eligible who did not register for the election last November are urged to register now at the Town Hall.

Those who have resided in the State of Florida for twelve months, and in the Town of Miami Shores for six months may register.

Ownership of real estate is not required as a qualification for voting at this election, said Mayor Brion.

All voters should immediately pay their poll tax for the year 1926, it was further stated, as this must be done not later than Saturday, July 2nd., 1927, to qualify for the Special Election. The poll tax for 1925 should also be paid by any persons who have not done so.

It is believed that very few of the citizens of the Town have already paid such a tax for 1926, as at the last election, payment of poll tax only for the years 1924 and 1925 was required.

Poll tax may be paid either at the office of John A. Mahood, Town Tax Collector, or at the office of Bob Simpson, Collector of Taxes for Dade County, at the County Court House in Miami.

Town taxes upon real estate will become delinquent on the first Monday in July, according to an announcement made by Mr. John A. Mahood, Tax Collector. All property upon which the taxes of the Town of Miami Shores are not paid, will be advertised and sold for taxes, said Mr. Mahood.

All citizens and property owners of the Town who desire street or sidewalk improvements are urged by Mayor Brion to present petitions requesting such improvements to the Town Council at its next regular meeting on Monday, June 27th. At that time the Council is to give consideration to the petitions recently signed by the people of Biscayne Park, who are asking that their streets be scarified and oiled. The pending petitions for stree t work in Fulford Highlands will also be taken up.

If these petitions should be approved by the Council, it is desirable, said Mayor Brion, that all similar improvements requested by the people and approved by the Council should be included in the same bond issue.

The entire cost of sidewalk and street paving is assessed against the property benefited, on a front foot basis, it was explained by the Mayor. The assessments are payable in equal annual installments over a period of ten years.

The official name of the Federal Highway within the Town of Miami Shores is "Biscayne Boulevard", under a Resolution adopted by the Town Council recently.

## TOWN STREETS RE-NAMED - REPORT OF ENGINEERS APPROVED BY COUNCIL

Messrs. Huff and Roberts, Town Engineers, recently presented to the Town Council, a report recommending the re-naming of the streets and avenues of the Town so as to conform to the system in effect in the City of Miami. The Council voted to adopt the engineers' recommendations and the measure met with the approval of the Mayor.

The Southern boundary of the Town, formerly known as Eighth Street in Biscayne Park now has the name of "N.E.121st.St." The old west Dixie Highway, from the famous "Six Highway Point" to the Florida East Coast Station is now N.E.125th. St., according to the Council Resolution. 13th. Street in Biscayne Park has been changed to N.E.131st.St.

It is feared that until the new system is better known, some confusion may exist in Irons Manor. An attempt was originally made in Irons Manor to adopt the Miami numbering system, but for some reason, the numbers selected have proven to be incorrect. For instance, Tenth Terrace, was named on some Irons Manor plats as 124th.St.; the correct number, however, is 126th. St., and the latter has been officially adopted by the Council.

Bouganvillea Court is now N.E.Third Ave.; Avenue "F" is now N.E. Fourth Ave.; Hibiscus Court, Gardenia Court, and Oleander Court are now N.E.Fifth Ave.; Avenue "E" is now N.E. Sixth Ave.; Eucalyptus Court is now N.E.Seventh Ave.; Avenue "D" is now N.E.Eighth Ave.; Coconut Ave. is now N.E. Ninth Ave.; Dixieanna Ave. and Galloway Ave. are now N.E.10th Avenue.; and Bennett Ave. and Lanier Ave. are now N.E. Twelfth Ave.

In Fulford Highlands, Fulford Boulevard is now N.E. 167th. St.; White Court is now N.E.163rd.St.; Fulfordale Road is now N.E.Third Ave.; Cardinal Road is now N.E.Fourth Ave.; and Highland Boulevard is now N.E. Fifth Ave.

The house numbering system of the City of Miami was also adopted for the Town of Miami Shores in accordance with the recommendations of Messrs. Huff and Roberts. The system is as follows:

The south and west side of streets, avenues, etc., shall take even numbers, and the north and east sides of streets, avenues, etc., shall take odd numbers.

The last two digits of each house number shall be determined by the distance of the house from the corner of the preceding street or avenue, one number being allotted to each twelve and one half (12½) feet of frontage, and the other digit or digits being determined by said preceding street or avenue. Thus, each fifty (50) foot lot shall four (4) consecutive, even or odd numbers, any one or all of which may be used, depending upon the position or number of houses on the lot.

In the event that more numbers than are provided for a lot are required, such as stairways in business blocks, etc., additional numbers may be selected by suffixing a letter of the alphabet, as "A", "B", etc.

EXAMPLE:- A house slightly west of the center of the second fifty foot (50) lot east of N.E. Tenth Avenue on 129th. St. The lot would have the following number 1010, 1012, 1014, and 1016, and the address of the house would be 1012 N.E. 129th. Street.

A garage apartment in the rear of the lot would take any of the remaining number depending on its position on the lot.

Any citizen of the Town in doubt as to the proper number for his house may obtain such number from either Mr. Van E. Huff or Mr. H.H. Roberts.

THE FIRE WELLS PAID FOR

The thirteen fire wells recently drilled and equipped have been accepted and approved by the Town Council and a check in the amount of \$6,966.12 has been drawn in favor of the Kiser Drilling Company.

The location and depths of the wells are as follows:

Potts Building 142 ft.; Ficus Court and Ninth St. 118 ft.; Eucalyptus Court and ninth St. 132 ft.; 11th. St. and Dixie Highway 129 ft.; 13th. St. and Ave. E 62 ft. 6 in.; 12th. St and Ave. F 151 ft.; Dixieanna Ave. and 11th. Terrace 51 ft. 6 in.; Dixieanna Ave. and 14th. St. 86 ft.; School Well 43 ft. 6 in.; East Dixie North of Station 125 ft.; At Lumber Company 73 ft. 6 in.; White Court and Fulfordale Road 70 ft.; Sunkist Grove 59 ft. 6 inches.

All sidewalks hereafter constructed in the Town of Miami Shores must be laid to an engineer's grade and according to approved specifications, under the provisions of an ordinance adopted by the Town Council at the last meeting.

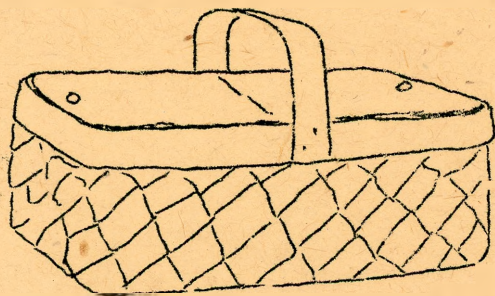

The certificate of H. Clay Crawford, Secretary of State, recites that the Act was approved by the Governor on June 6th, 1927.

Extract from "JOURNAL OF THE SENATE" of the State of Florida, Wednesday June 1st., 1927.

By Senator Watson-

Senate Bill No. 904:

A Bill to be entitled An Act changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores, in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that the act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town.

Which was read the first time by its title.

Mr. Watson moved that the rules be waived and that Senate Bill No. 904 be read the second time by its title only.

Which was agreed to by a two - thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 904, with title above stated, was read the second time by its title only.

Mr. Watson moved that the rules be waived and that Senate Bill No. 904 be read the third time in full and put upon its passage.

Which was agreed to by a two - thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 904, with title above stated, was read the third time in full.

Upon call of the roll on the passage of the Bill the vote was: YEAS - 38. NAYS - None. (We omit list of Senators names as it was carried by a unanimous vote of those voting).

So the bill passed, title as stated.

And the same ordered to be certified to the House of Representatives under the rule.

Extract from "JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES" of the State of Florida, Thursday, June 2nd., 1927.

Senate Bill No. 904:

A bill to be entitled An Act changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that the Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said town.

MOONSHINERS CONVICTED

PRISONERS SENTENCED BY THE MAYOR  
Two moonshiners were apprehended  
in Fulford Highlands by Town Mar-  
shall MacDonald last Saturday  
morning. Their trial was held in  
Municipal Court on Monday after-  
noon and the Mayor sentenced each  
of the defendants to a fine of

imprisonment, and they are now  
confined in the Town Jail. The  
plant had been installed but a  
few days before its discovery by  
the Town Marshall.

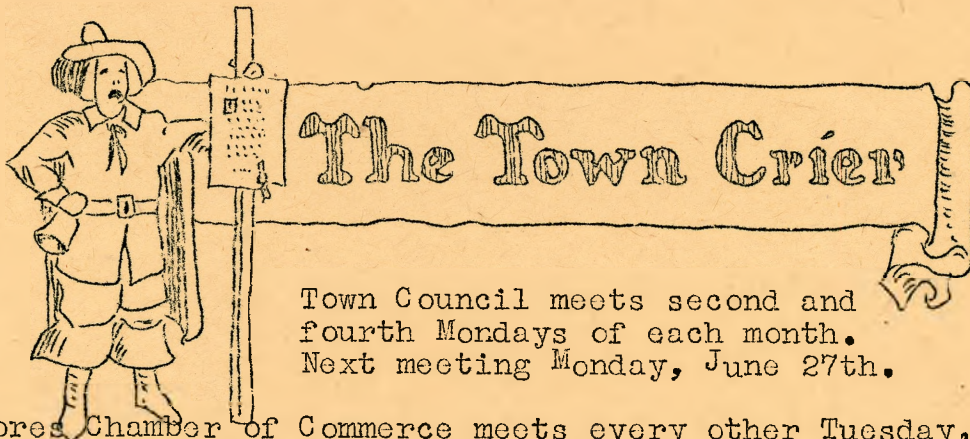
On Tuesday evening, June 21st.,

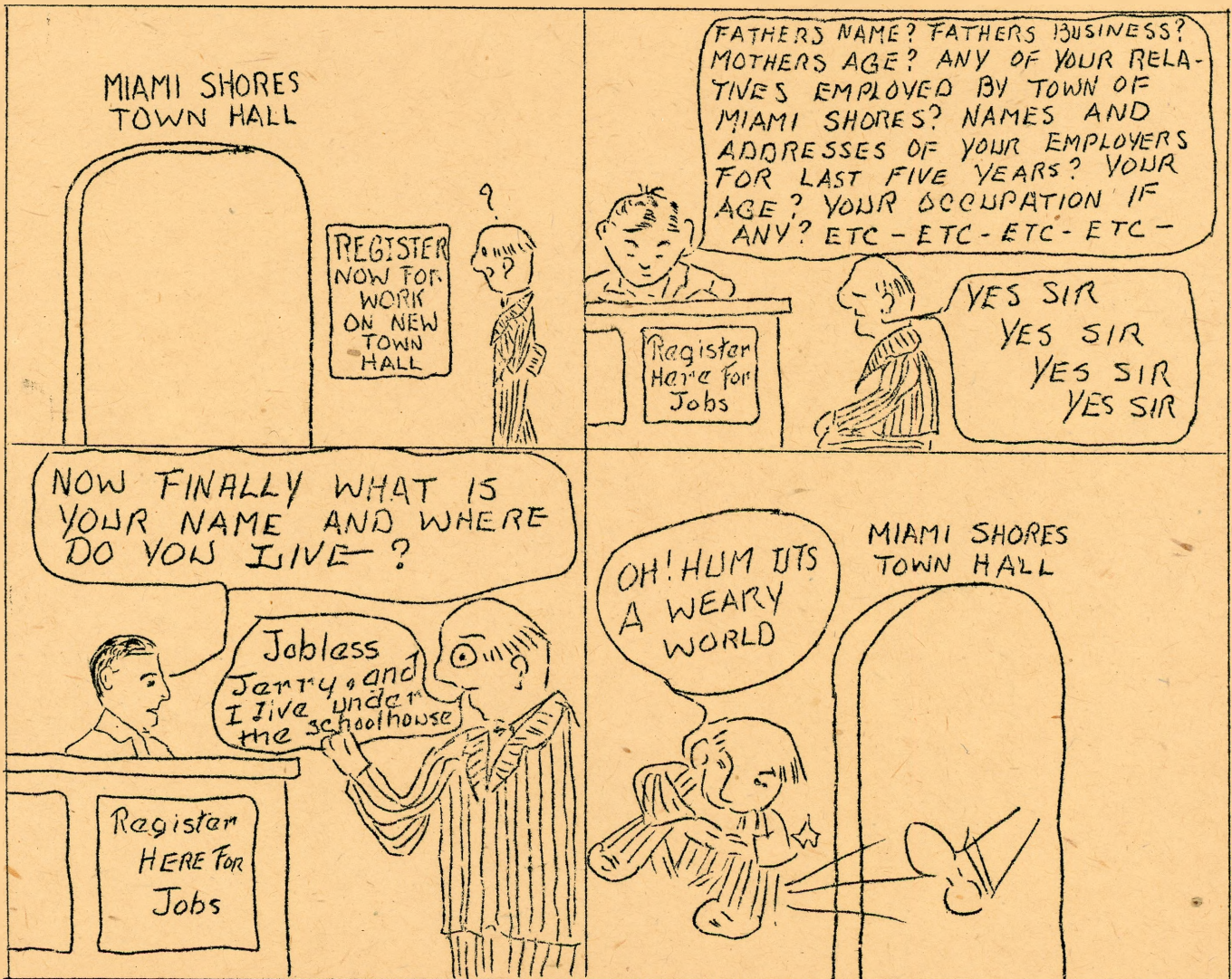
