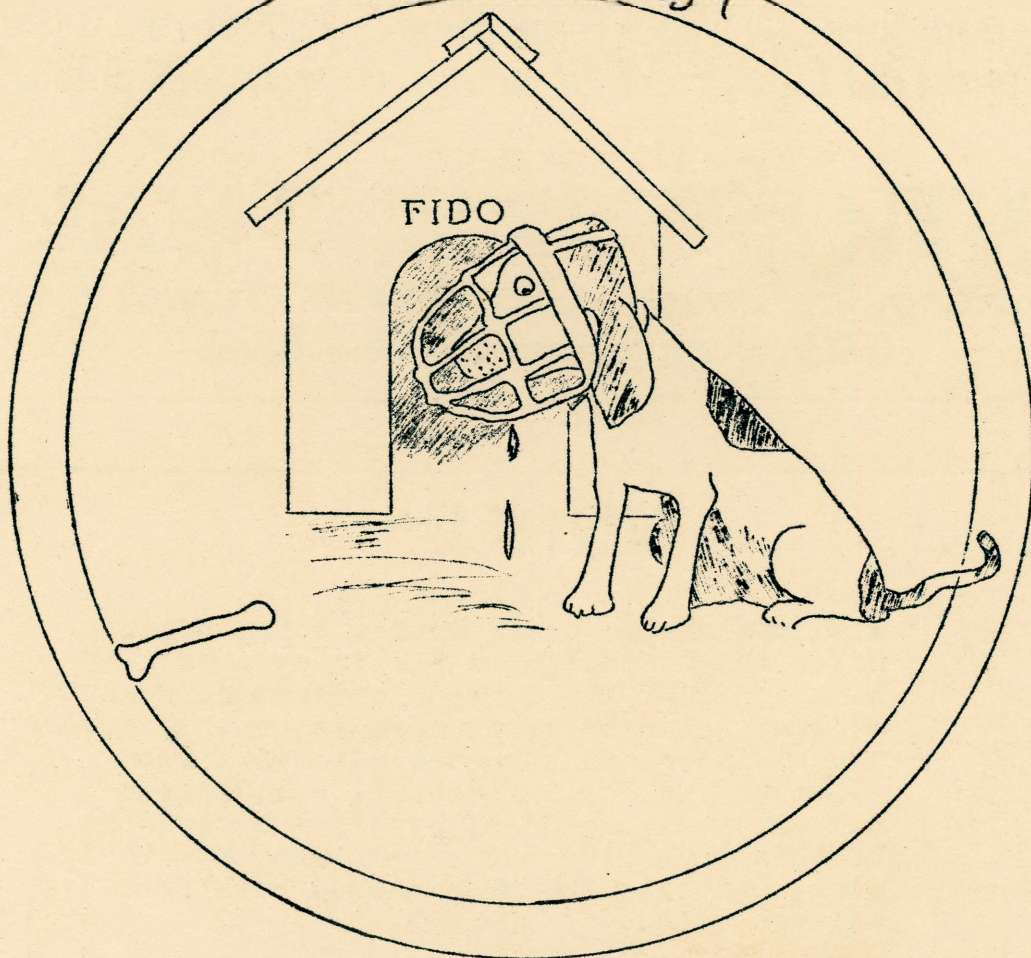

EDITORIAL COMMENT

At a recent meeting of the Advertising Club in Miami, we are informed the principal speaker was a man of nation wide prominence in the business world. He surveyed the conditions in Florida in a keen and searching manner, and then gave some wholesome advice to the whole State. He stated that if we hope to arise from our present financial distress we must learn to patronize our own home products! We must purchase, in so far as it is possible, everything we need from home town merchants, and use only those products that are produced locally when we find such in competition with "shipped in stuff." We have been informed that in the neighborhood of one-half the money spent in Miami for clothing is sent to mail order houses in the North, and other items in proportion. Even groceries are being shipped in by express in large quantities from mail order firms. The speaker mentioned above emphasized over and over again that WE MUST SPEND OUR MONEY AT HOME.

It is gratifying to note that our new Town Hall is to be built by local labor, and that the carefully estimated cost of the building under the revised plans and the system of local construction work will keep the total cost within the figure of the bond issue. Mayor Brion states that on only the plumbing, electrical, and possibly roofing contracts will outside labor be used. This was done to conserve the money of the bond issue and thus avoid the serious matter of a second bonding to care for excessive expense. We sincerely believe that the Council acted with the wishes of the majority of the townspeople behind them. We are very sorry indeed that it was found impossible to award all of the work to local people, but this was felt to be impossible without danger of running over the amount of the bond issue.

The Morgan-Hill Paving Company is pushing the work of laying the sidewalks as rapidly as possible. A small army of workmen are making it possible. Officers of the company state that in so far as they could obtain them local men were employed for the work. Owing to the fact that the greater part of the work consists of common labor negroes are largely employed, and every local negro asking for work has been given it. A number of white men from the town are also employed.

Homestead has been hit rather hard in recent months but down there they are carrying signs on their cars reading: "If you think you are having a tough time remember what happened to Jonah!"

At The Town Hall

OUR LOCAL LABOR TO BUILD TOWN HALL PEOPLE OF TOWN TO RECEIVE EMPLOYMENT

The new Town Hall will be built by local labor employed directly by the Town, it was decided at an adjourned regular meeting of the Town Council, held last Tuesday. No contract for the construction of the building will be awarded, the members of the Council believing that citizens of the Town of Miami Shores should be given employment on this work.

Sealed bids for the construction of the building were received by the Town Council on May 30th. Only one local bidder submitted a proposal, and he failed to enclose with his bid a certified check, as required by the published conditions, and the council was therefore unable to consider his proposal. It was also pointed out that seven other general contractors submitted bids lower than that of the local man.

Ever since the opening of the bids, the members of the Town Council have been urged continually by citizens of the Town, to authorize the construction by the Town itself, without the awarding of any contract. Public sentiment finally crystallized to such an extent in favor of this plan, that the Town Council, on Tuesday voted for it unanimously.

Meanwhile, a revision of the plans for the structure has been made for the purpose of reducing its cost. It is believed that the building, under the plans now approved, can be constructed for less than \$43,000.



TOWN HALL NEWS - CONTINUED

Mayor W.P.Brion was selected by the Council as Superintendent of Construction.

No opposition to the construction of the Hall by day labor was voiced at the Council meeting, except by one of the contractors bidding on the work, who expressed himself as being strongly opposed to the plan adopted.

The Council voted to accept the lowest bids for the plumbing and electrical work and materials, conditioned upon the contracts being signed and proper bond furnished. J.S.Monahan was the lowest bidder on the plumbing, his price being \$2,998.00, while G.A.Raymond was low, with a price of \$1,900, on the electrical work and materials.

WAGE SCALE ANNOUNCED

Mayor, W.P.Brion, Superintendent of Construction of the new Town Hall, announced yesterday that the scale of wages to be paid on the job would be as follows:

Carpenters	50¢ to 80¢ per hour
Stone Masons	60¢ to 90¢ " "
Plasterers	75¢ to \$1.10 per hour
Common labor - white -	35¢ to 40¢ per hour
Colored labor	30¢ to 35¢ " "

Mayor Brion yesterday again called attention to the fact that Monday, June 27th., is the last day for filing petitions for street and side walk improvements to be included in this year's program. All petitions now pending will then be considered by the Council. If any are approved preliminary steps will then be taken leading toward the authorization of a bond issue for such improvements.

All persons believing that more sidewalks should be laid or streets paved, should bring signed petitions to the Council meeting on Monday night, said the Mayor. Local improvements requested after that time may not be acted upon until after January 1st., 1928, according to Mr. Brion. The advertising costs in connection with bond issues are such that it is believed the Council will authorize not more than one issue each six months. Assessments are made against the property benefited by such improvements on a front foot basis, so that the entire cost of work is borne by the owners of abutting property. The amount of the assessment is payable 1/10th. each year, with interest, over a period of ten years.

The Town engineers report of cost of street improvements is to be found on the following page, at the request of interested tax payers.

ENGINEER'S REPORT

Messrs. Huff and Roberts, Town Engineers, have filed the following preliminary report on the scarifying and oiling of the streets covered by Resolution No. 143:

Honourable Mayor and Town Council,
Miami Shores, Florida.

Gentlemen: REPORT ON SCARIFYING AND OILING STREETS

As directed in your resolution, we have prepared an estimate of the cost of scarifying and oiling certain streets and also of surfacing these streets with asphalt, which estimate is enclosed -

Scarifying and Oiling:- On account of the lack of bonding qualities in the existing road, it would be impractical to simply scarify and oil these roads. We have, therefore, included in our estimate three inches of pit rock to furnish a surface suitable for oiling and have added the term "resurfacing". The widths of these roads now vary from 8 to 26 feet. In our estimate we have adopted a uniform width of 18 feet for single roadways (except Tenth Street) and 12 feet for each road of double driveways. The cost of bringing these roads to this uniform width is very little more than for resurfacing and oiling them over their present irregular width.

Asphalt:- We would not advise the surfacing of existing roadways with asphalt without the use of pit rock for bonding the base. Although as good a bond is not necessary for such a base as for surfacing with oil, the present road surface is so poor in bonding qualities that we are afraid it might shift under traffic. For a thin asphalt surface we would recommend asphaltic concrete which should be at least one and a half inches, and better, two inches thick. Our estimate is for two inches of asphaltic concrete.

Tenth Street:- Tenth Street from the Dixie Highway to Hibiscus Court has not been included in the enclosed estimate. This street is 77 feet from sidewalk to sidewalk, now serving as curb lines. The estimated cost of scarifying, resurfacing and oiling this street over this width is \$4.30 per front foot and we would like to make some additional study and submit a special report on this street. For Tenth Street, from Hibiscus Court to Griffing Boulevard, a width of 24 feet, which is about its present width, was adopted in the estimate. The cost per front foot would be the same as for double driveways.

ENGINEER'S REPORT - CONTINUED
\$60,780.78, involving an assessment per front foot on a single 18 foot road of approximately \$1.00; and on a double 12 foot road of approximately \$1.35 per front foot.

The estimate of the cost of scarifying, resurfacing, and the application of two inches of asphaltic concrete is \$147,807.72, which would mean as assessment per front foot on a single 18 foot road of approximately \$2.30; and on a double 12 foot road of approximately \$3.05 per front foot.

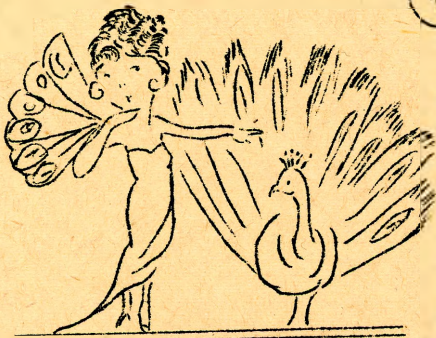
ICE CREAM SOCIAL A SUCCESS

AN ORDINANCE, Providing for a Special Referendum Election to be held on July 26th., A.D. 1927, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That a Special Referendum Election shall be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores, Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores, the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami" ?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th, A.D. 1927.

Section 2. Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores shall be open each day at the Town Hall to and including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.

Section 3. That notice of said election shall be published once a week for the period of four (4) weeks in the "MIAMI SHORES BULLETIN" and in the "MIAMI HERALD", in form substantially as follows:

NOTICE OF SPECIAL REFERENDUM ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special referendum election will be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores, Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores the following question:

Section 5. If any person named in Section 4 hereof, as Inspector or Clerk shall fail to act as such, the Mayor may appoint a suitable person to act as Inspector or Clerk in place of the person so failing to act.

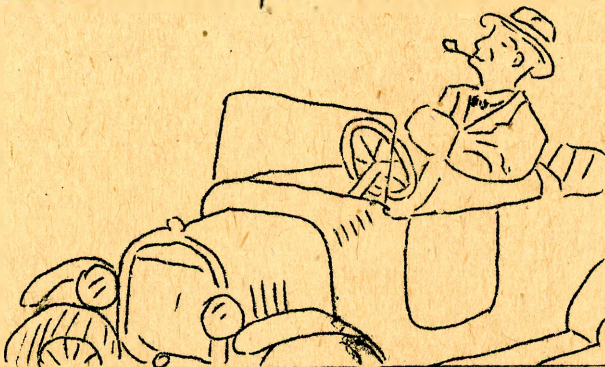

POLL TAX NOTICE

In order to qualify for the Special Referendum Election on the proposed change of the name of the Town of Miami Shores, voters must pay, on or before Saturday, July 2nd., their poll taxes for the years 1925 and 1926.

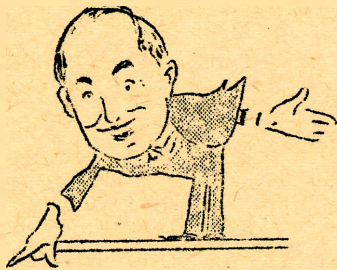

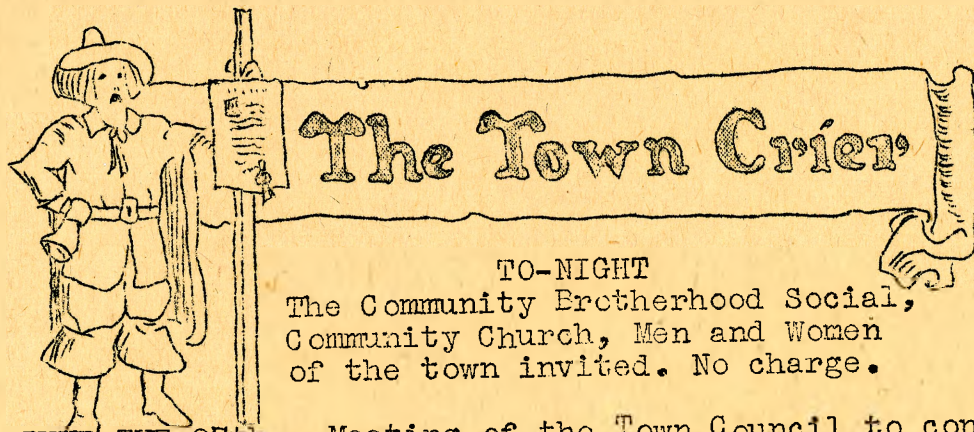

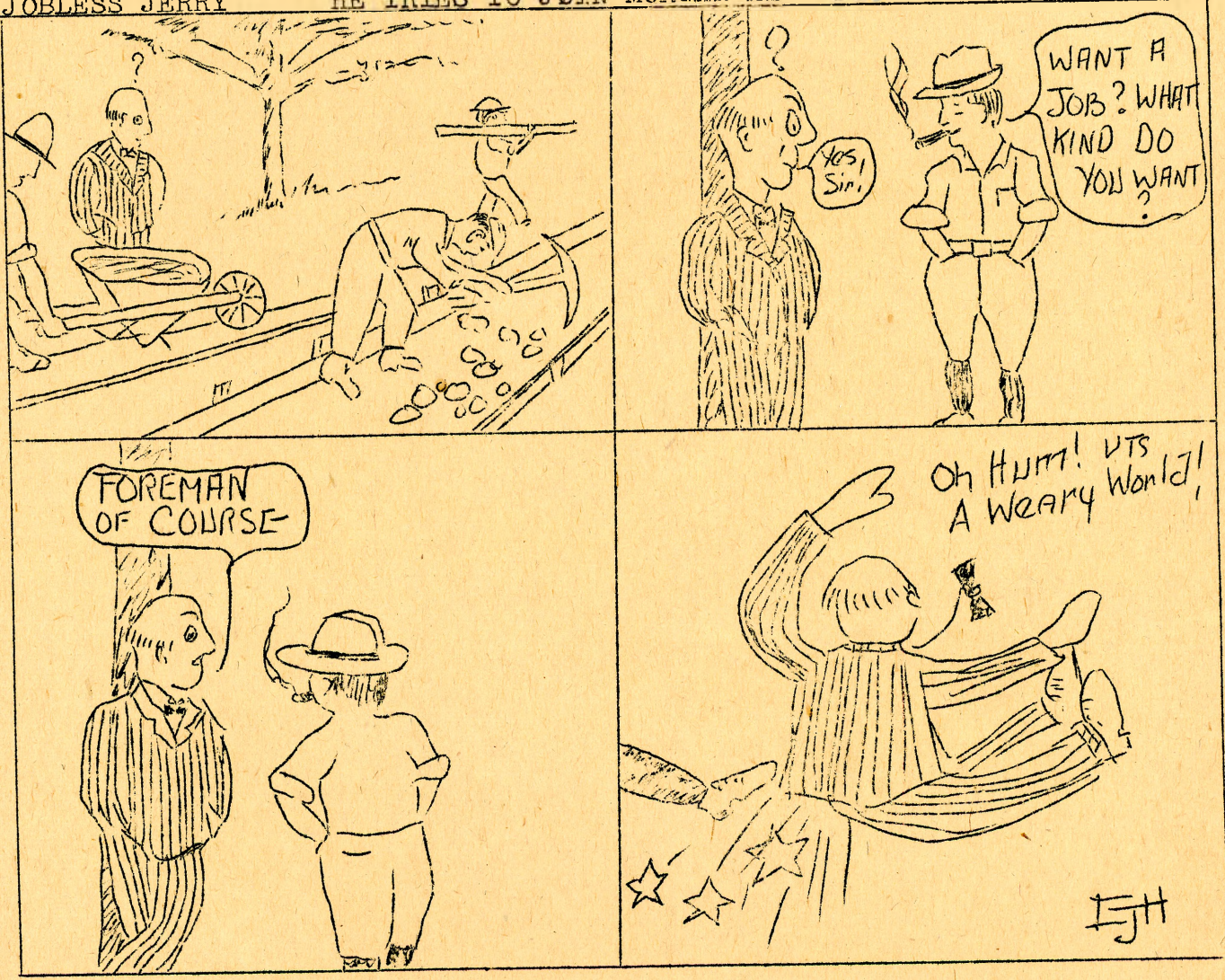
