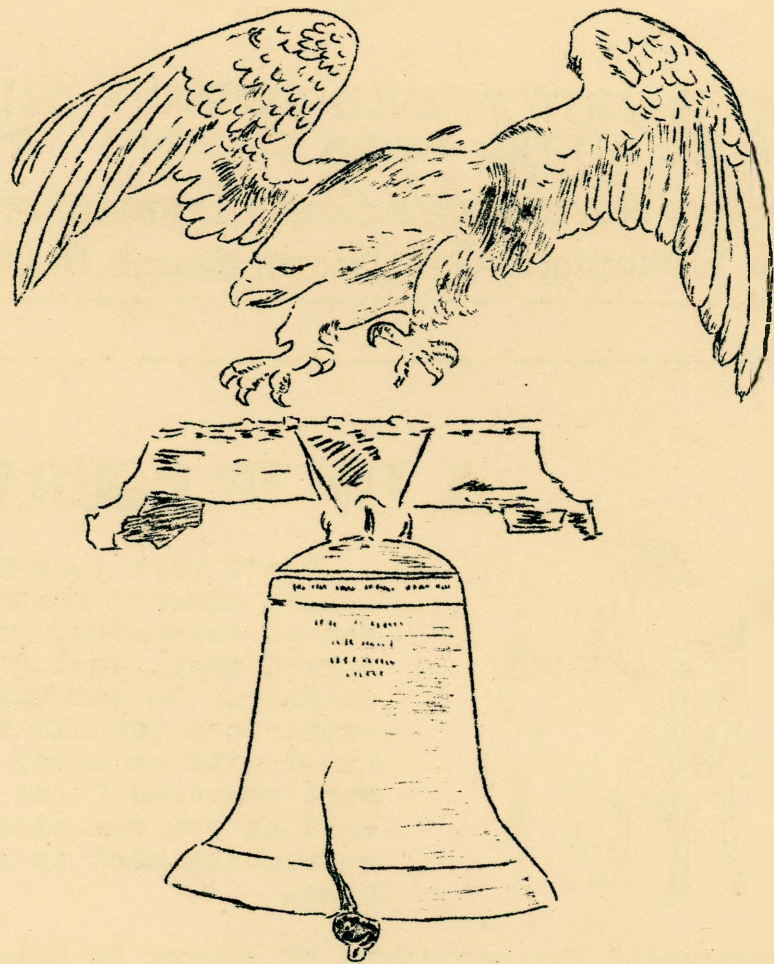

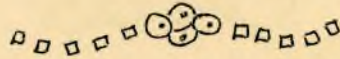

# At The Town Hall

## REPORT OF COUNCIL MEETING, JUNE 27TH.

Some opposition to the proposed street improvement program was expressed at the public hearing before the Town Council, at its regular meeting last Monday. Mrs. E. Freeman, Mr. G. E. Lindsley and Mr. McElwee were of the opinion that the present time is inopportune to embark on such an improvement program. Messrs. D. F. Baker, J. B. Eberling and others spoke in favor of the proposed work.

Mr. H. H. Roberts, Town Engineer, explained the method of constructing the streets under the various plans suggested and outlined the cost of each plan.

In view of the opposition expressed at the meeting, the Council decided to take no action upon the petitions filed, until further information should be presented, from which the Mayor and Council may determine more exactly the wishes of the property owners affected. The Council directed the Engineers to prepare revised estimates. As soon as these are available, separate petitions will be circulated for each of the plans proposed. Signers of the petitions will be required to indicate the number of front feet, as well as the lot and block numbers, of property owned by them, which would be assessable for the cost of the improvement.

Property owners opposing this street improvement program will be given an opportunity to sign a petition of protest.

As soon as sufficient time has elapsed to allow these petitions to circulate freely, the Mayor and Council will give the matter further study, it was announced by J. B. Jeffries, President pro-tem.

It is believed that the improvement will be authorized, if favored by a substantial majority of the property owners.

The first annual installment of the assessment for the improvement if the program is approved, will be due about September 1st of next year, it was stated yesterday at the Town Hall by Mayor W. P. Brion. This installment will be for one tenth of the total assessment, plus interest at eight per centum per annum on the remaining nine installments. However, property owners will be given the opportunity to pay the entire assessment against their lots for the street improvement, within thirty days after the special assessment roll is confirmed by the Council, which will probably take place about the first of September, 1927, it was explained. Any property owner taking advantage of this plan will have no interest to pay, it is said.

Mayor Brion also explained that the people of the Town need not expect this street work to start immediately, even if it should be decided to act favorably upon the petitions filed. Not before December, can the work actually start, according to the Mayor, as about five months will be required for the completion of necessary legal proceedings and the validation and sale of a special bond issue for this purpose.

DRIVING ACROSS SIDEWALKS MADE UNLAWFUL

Driving a vehicle across a sidewalk is unlawful, if it causes damage to the sidewalk, according to an ordinance passed by the Council last Monday night, and approved by the Mayor. Driving a vehicle across a sidewalk within ten days after the construction of the sidewalk is also prohibited, it being presumed that this will damage the pavement. The Ordinance, however, does not apply to a person driving a vehicle across a sidewalk on property owned or leased by such person.

TAX PAYMENT TIME EXTENDED

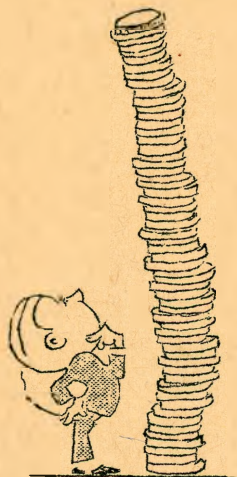

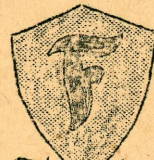
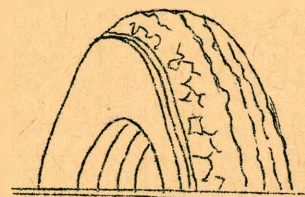

The type of pavement to be used for certain streets in Miami Shores was the topic of discussion of last Monday's Council meeting; the public being invited to the meeting for the purpose of such a discussion.

A petition had been presented to the Town Council requesting the scarifying and oiling of these streets, which was turned over to the Town Engineers for preparation of an estimate of cost. The Engineers in their report stated that it would be impractical to simply scarify and oil the roads in their present condition on account of the lack of bonding qualities in canal bank rock of which the roads now consist, but that three inches of rock would be required on the present surface and made the estimate to cover this modification of the petition. A copy of this estimate was published in the June 24th. issue of this Bulletin.

The Engineers were first asked to present their views on the subject. They responded that the resurfacing and oiling of the roads, an estimate of the cost of which had been submitted, would furnish a very good road surface but advised that instead of this, new pit rock roads with asphaltic oil surface be constructed to established grade, stating that this would cost approximately fifty percent more than the resurfacing and oiling. More comfortable driving, better drainage, neater appearance, ability to use rock in future reconstruction and consequent economy were enumerated as some of the advantages. A typical cross-section of the proposed graded street is shown elsewhere in this Bulletin. The plan is to have the water drain from the road and lots into the depressed parkways. It was pointed out that if the resurfacing and oiling were followed at the time rebuilding became necessary, roads to proper grade would undoubtedly be desired, necessitating the removal of existing roads. On the other hand if new roads were now built to the proper grade the Engineers stated that when the time came to rebuild them it would only be necessary to scarify and add a small quantity of rock in order to have a new base suitable for oiling or topping with asphalt. They stated that a new oil rock road built to grade should last from five to ten years dependant on traffic and maintainance.

The sentiment was strongly in favor of building to grade if roads were to be built. Some of those present favored an asphalt road. Upon being questioned as to the life of an asphalt road, the Engineers stated that they did not believe that the additional life over the oiled rock road would be in proportion to the additional cost.

In reply to questions in regard to grade the Engineers stated that there was a misunderstanding as to the elevation of Miami Shores, that it was from six to twelve feet above mean low tide and compared favorably with the City of Miami. They stated that some pockets existed, however, which the grading of the streets as proposed would not

relieve entirely of water in extremely heavy rains, altho it would help a great deal, the only complete remedy being the construction of storm sewers.

Upon conclusion of the public hearing the Town Council directed the Engineers to prepare two separate petitions to be circulated among the property owners in order to ascertain their desires; one of these petitions to be for a new pit rock base with oil surface, and the other for a new pit rock base with an asphalt surface and concrete holders on each side, both types to be constructed to established grade. They were also directed to show in these petitions the general specifications of each type together with an estimate of cost per front foot for different width roadways. The estimated costs have been completed and are as follows: For 6 inch Pit Rock base constructed to established engineer's grade with asphaltic oil surface.

18 ft. single roadway \$2.00 per front foot. 20 ft. single r'way 2.20  
 24 " " " 2.55 " " "

Two 12 ft. roadways \$2.55 per front foot.

For 8 inch Pit Rock base constructed to established engineer's grade with a 2 inch asphaltic concrete surface:

18 ft single roadway \$3.70 per front ft. 20 ft single r'way \$4.00  
 24 " " " \$4.70 " " "

Two 12 ft. roadways \$5.05 per front foot

The Engineers state, in explanation of the difference in cost of the oiled macadam road as shown above and as stated at the meeting, that in view of the fact that sentiment was so strongly in favor of the very best type of road, the estimate was revised so as to allow the construction of an oil and slag surface which is the very best type of oiled road. The estimate also includes parkway grading. The diagrams may be found on the following page.

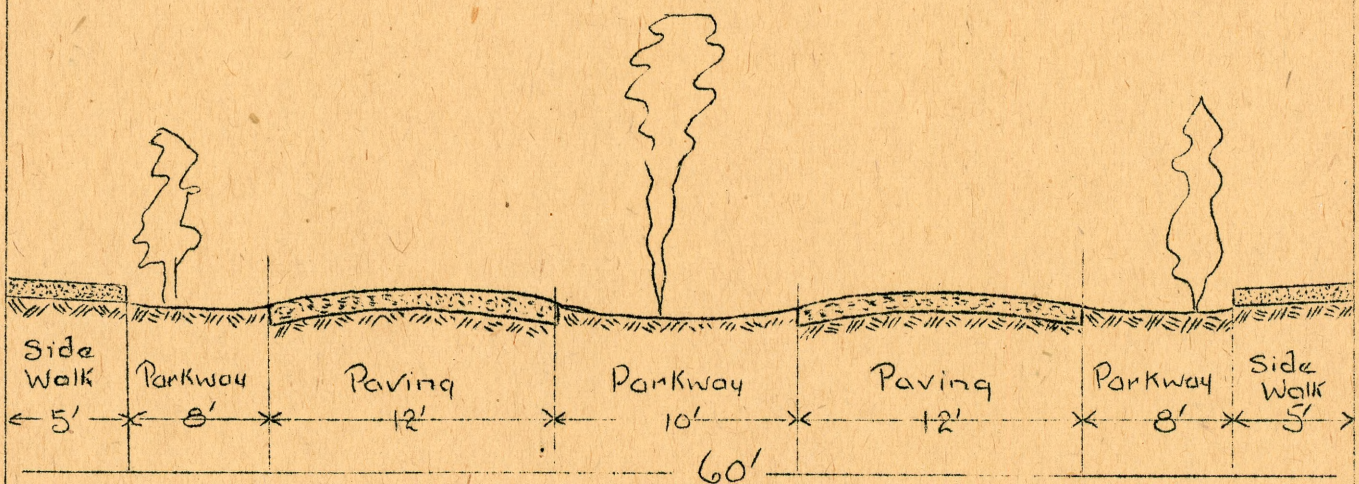
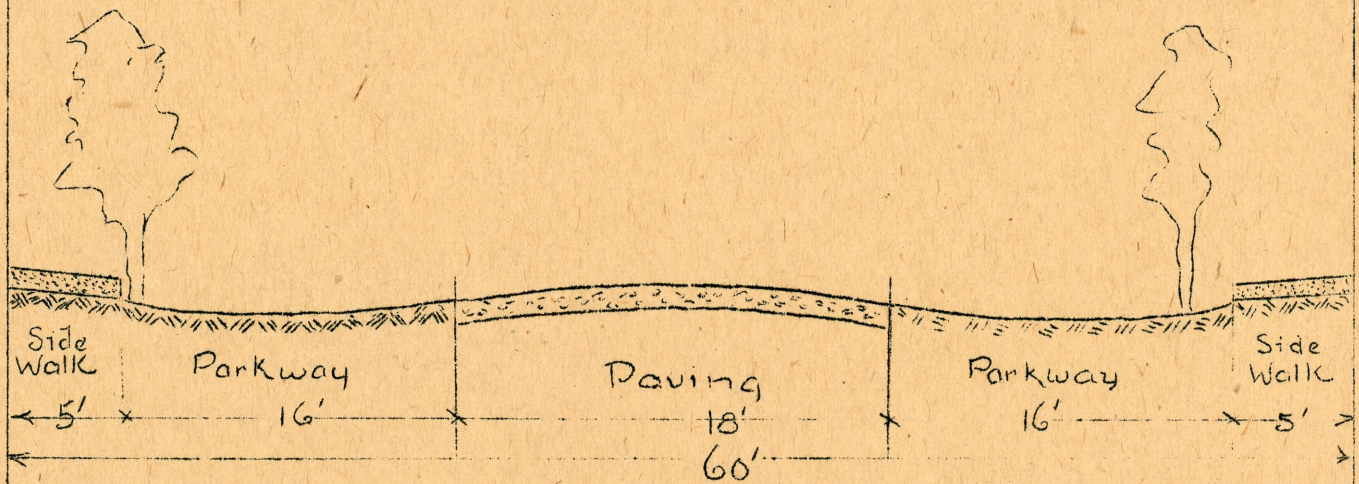

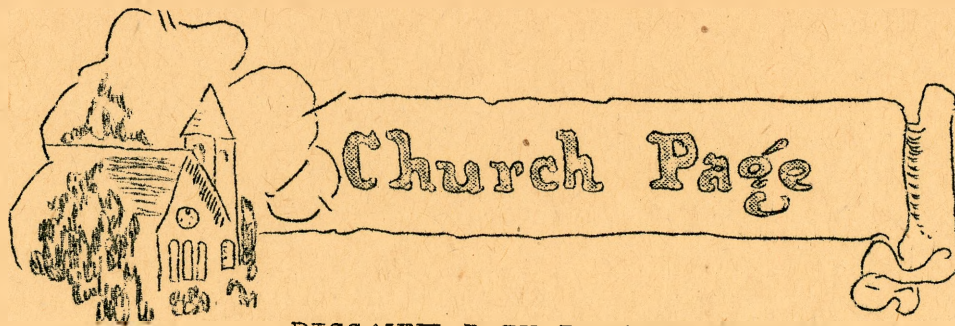


CROSS SECTIONS

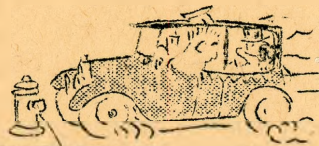

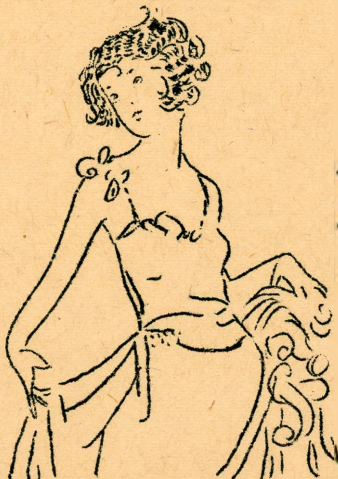
Mrs. J. Tobin left Wednesday evening for Fort Thomas, Kentucky, where her mother is seriously ill.

# OPEN LETTERS

We are pleased to print below the following letter received from Mr. Arthur M. Griffing, member of the Town Council and developer of the Biscayne Park Estates of Miami Shores and Kimberly Heights at Asheville, N.C. In conformity to the stand we took upon the change in name of our Town when first placed before the Legislature we wish to print the opinions of all who care to express them, whether in favor of the change or opposed to it. Editor.

Dear Editor:

A prominent citizen has expressed his preference for Biscayne Park as a new name for our town.

If no interests were to be considered beyond the promoters and lot owners in Biscayne Park Estates, the suggestion might be worthy of full consideration, but, as many interests are affected by the town name, it would only prove another failure to rename the town after a subdivision. Again there is only about half of Biscayne Park located in our town, the other half, south of 8th. Street, being in the City of Miami, and the existing confusion as to "where we belong" would not be entirely eliminated.

The Council and the Mayor have given the subject sincere thought for several months, and discussion has been general among tax payers.

It is freely admitted that Biscayne Park interests are most vitally affected at the present time, as outside collections have been curtailed by affects of the unfortunate predicament of Miami Shores subdivision and as to new financing, our existing handicap is a matter of history, thousands having already been sacrificed on bond sales, and it is extremely doubtful if private bonds can be sold at all with the name of Miami Shores printed thereon.

The following letter from one of our purchasers, is only a sample of what we have been receiving for months, and should convince anyone that tough sledding is ahead for many years, unless we save our fair town from the blighting affects of a name that is thought to be bankrupt wherever the name Miami Shores is known.

"Bad news travels fast", but good news is not spectacular or unusual, and seldom reaches the ears of millions who have been poisoned by Associated Press dispatches of Miami Shores, which have been printed under big headlines by hundreds of the leading dailies everywhere. The prominence of the litigants involved, and the fact that many newspapers are still quite willing to magnify our Florida difficulties is partly responsible for the depreciating sentiments surrounding the Miami Shores name.

Aside from these facts, it is universally admitted that the existing confusion as to locations, will only increase as time passes.

The only developed part of Miami Shores Subdivision is a mile or more from the town of its name, and being well within the limits of the City of Miami is a source of great confusion.

The proposed name of North Miami places the entire town exactly where it belongs, geographically, and in the minds of the general public will be regarded as a part of Miami, which we expect to be, in fact.

If we are to progress we must have the ability to finance. Can we expect to get anywhere next winter with our theatre being flat on the ground and many other improvements lagging for want of capital to tide us over the depression?

North Miami is the front door and cannot be regarded as something tacked on an out-of-the-way place.

The Northern approach to Miami should be made the most beautiful part of Greater Miami, and, as soon as we can recover from the staggering blows of the Boom and Hurricane, the writer shall favor a system of municipal landscaping that will attract the admiration of the world.

This change of name should be viewed in a common sense, businesslike way, which was the sole attitude of the Council and Mayor on this question.

The referendum is the logical, legal and proper way to decide on its adoption or rejection, and the writer does not feel that in the light of existing conditions, and the fact that both Council and Legis-

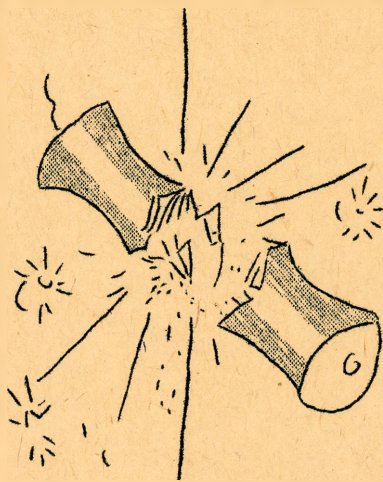
Officer Potts has been confined to his home for the last few days with an infected foot. He expects to be back on the job again by next Saturday.

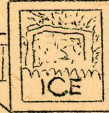


The picture shows the tremendous evolution of artificial light from the flickering tallow candle that burned only for a short time to the Mazda lamp that burns night and day, year in and year out.

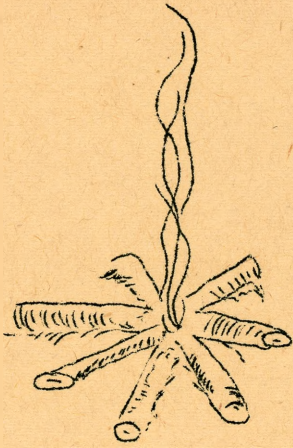

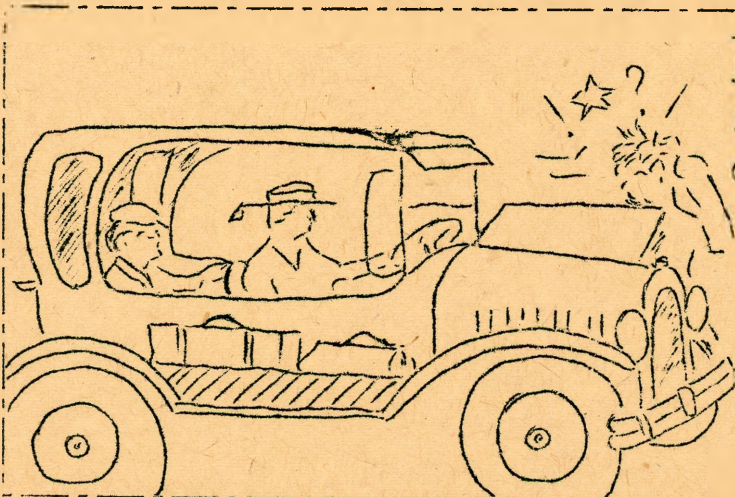


## TROOP 42 PLANS FOR CAMP

LEGAL NOTICE - TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES

RESOLUTION NO. 160

At an adjourned regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores, held on the 27th. day of June, 1927, Present Messrs. J.E.Jeffries, R.L.Gribble, F.D.Snow and W.F.Hamilton Absent Messrs. Earle Morgan, V.Earl Irons, and Arthur M. Griffing, Councilman Snow moved the adoption, and Councilman Hamilton seconded the following resolution, which was unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 160

A Resolution, approving plans and specifications, and estimate cost of paving certain streets in Fulford Highlands Sub-division in the Town of Miami Shores; determining to make said improvements, and providing that all expense thereof shall be paid by special assessments against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvements; directing the preparation of a special assessment roll, and prescribing the method of such assessment.

WHEREAS, there has been filed with the Town Clerk, plans and specifications together with the estimate of the cost of certain street improvements hereinafter described, which plans and specifications are now open to the public.

BE IT RESOLVED By the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores that said plans and specifications and estimates be, and the same are hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores hereby determines to make said improvements by paving the following streets to a width of eighteen (18) feet with one application of asphaltic oil; Nash Avenue, Blocks one (1) and two (2); Lodge Avenue, Blocks three (3) and four (4); Beary Avenue, from Avenue "E" to Cardinal Road; Highland Boulevard, from Sturdevant Avenue to Fulford Boulevard.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the total estimated cost of said improvements is Nine thousand, eight hundred twenty dollars and eighty cents (\$9,820.80).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all expense of said improvements be paid by special assessments against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous, or bounding and abutting upon such improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That interest accruing while said improvements are under construction, and for six months thereafter, all engineering and inspection costs, including a proper proportion of the compensation, salaries and expenses of the Town's engineering staff, properly chargeable to said improvement, and all costs and estimated costs, including attorney's fees in the issuance of the bonds to be hereafter issued against said special assessments, shall be included in the cost of the improvements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That said special assessments shall be made in proportion to the peculiar benefit to be derived from the said improvements by each lot or parcel of land subject to assessment, and shall not exceed the amount of such benefit, and shall be determined and pro-rated on all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting on such improvements, a separate assessment to be made against each separate lot or parcel according to the cost of each street and according to the front



footage of the respective properties on such street specially benefited by said improvements.

IT IS HEREBY DECLARED AND DETERMINED, That all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting on any street or section thereof and of the same width, are equally and uniformly benefited by the improvement on any such street or section of same in proportion to the front footage of such lots or lands on that particular street or section thereof. A special assessment roll shall be prepared and completed and filed, which said roll shall show the amount of the assessment against such lot or parcel of land in accordance with the method of assessment provided herein and the number of annual installments into which the assessments are divided, such assessment roll to be hereafter published as required by law, together with the notice of the time and place where complaints will be heard with reference to the said assessments and when said assessments shall be finally approved, confirmed and equalized by the Town Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That said assessments shall be payable in ten (10) equal yearly installments, with accrued interest on all deferred payments, at the rate of eight per centum per annum, unless paid within thirty (30) days after said assessments shall have been approved and confirmed. All accrued interest on the deferred payments shall be payable annually at the time when the yearly installment is payable. Said assessments shall, until paid, be and remain liens upon the respective lots and parcels of land assessed superior in dignity to all other liens, except liens for taxes from the date of the assessments. Upon the failure of any property owner to pay any annual installment when due or any part thereof or any annual interest upon deferred payment when due, the whole of the assessment with interest thereon shall immediately become due and payable and payment thereof shall be enforced according to law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Resolution shall be published once a week for a period of two (2) weeks in "The Miami Herald", a newspaper published in Dade County, and of general circulation in the Town of Miami Shores, and in the "Miami Shores Bulletin".

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That a Special Referendum Election shall be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores, the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami"?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th, A.D.1927.

Section 2. Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores shall be open each day at the Town Hall to an including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.

Section 3. That notice of said election shall be published once a week for the period of four (4) weeks in the "MIAMI SHORES BULLETIN" and in the "MIAMI HERALD", in form substantially as follows:

NOTICE OF SPECIAL REFERENDUM ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special referendum election will be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores, Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami"?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores, in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th., A.D. 1927.

Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores will be open each day at the Town Hall to and including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.



In order to qualify for the Special Referendum Election on the proposed change of the name of the Town of Miami Shores, voters must pay, on or before Saturday, July 2nd, their poll taxes for the years 1925 and 1926.

Poll tax may be paid either at the office of the undersigned in the Bennett Block, on the West Dixie Highway, west of Avenue "E", or at the office of Bob Simpson, Collector of Taxes for Dade County, at the Court House in Miami, Florida.

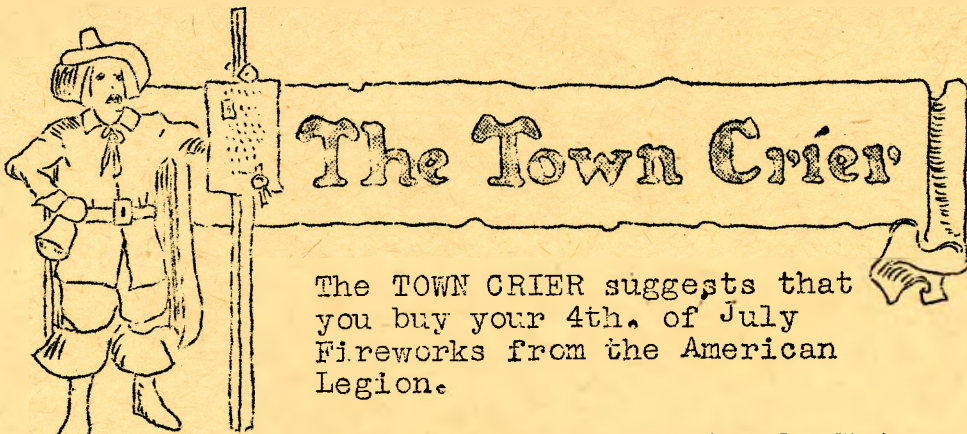

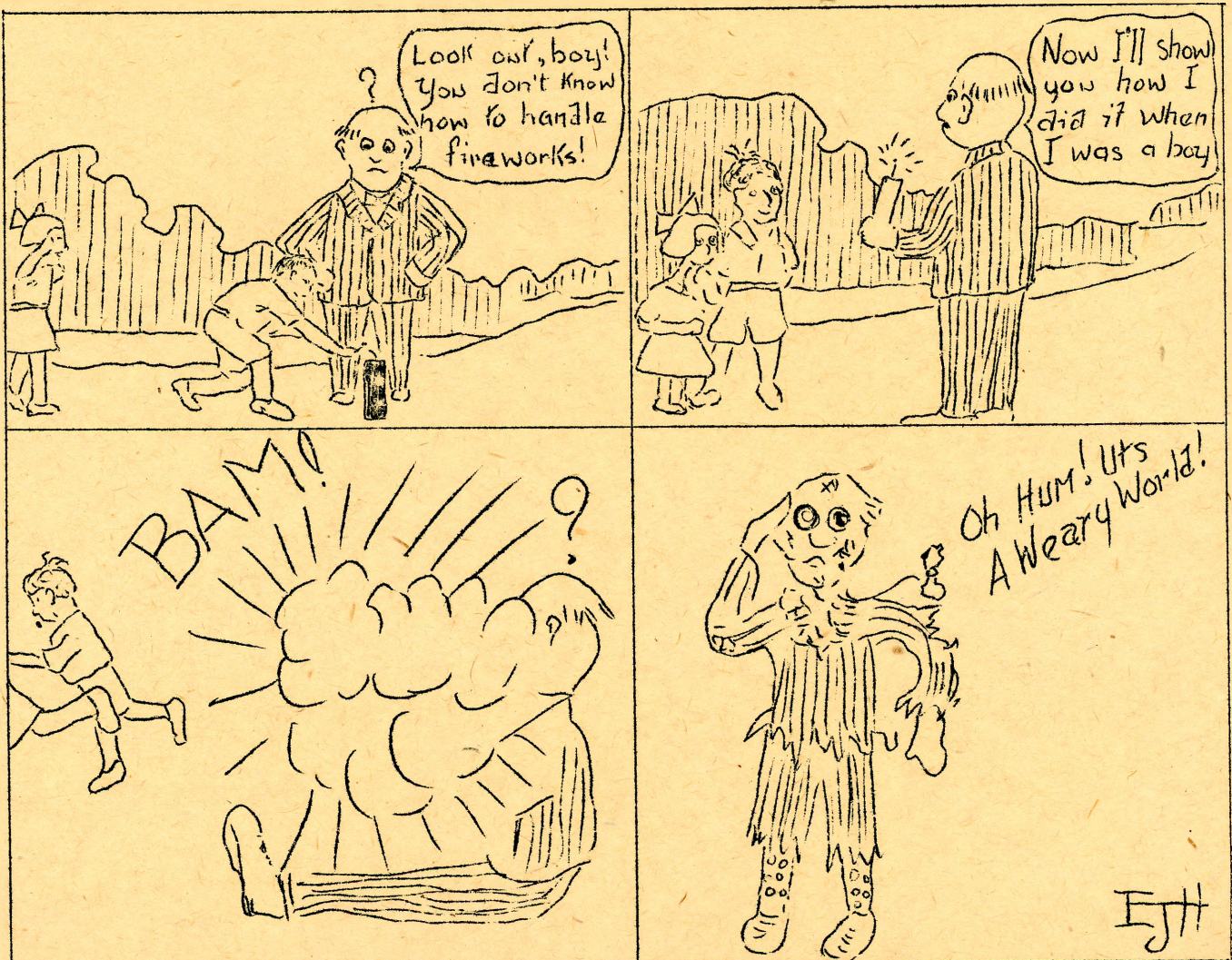
