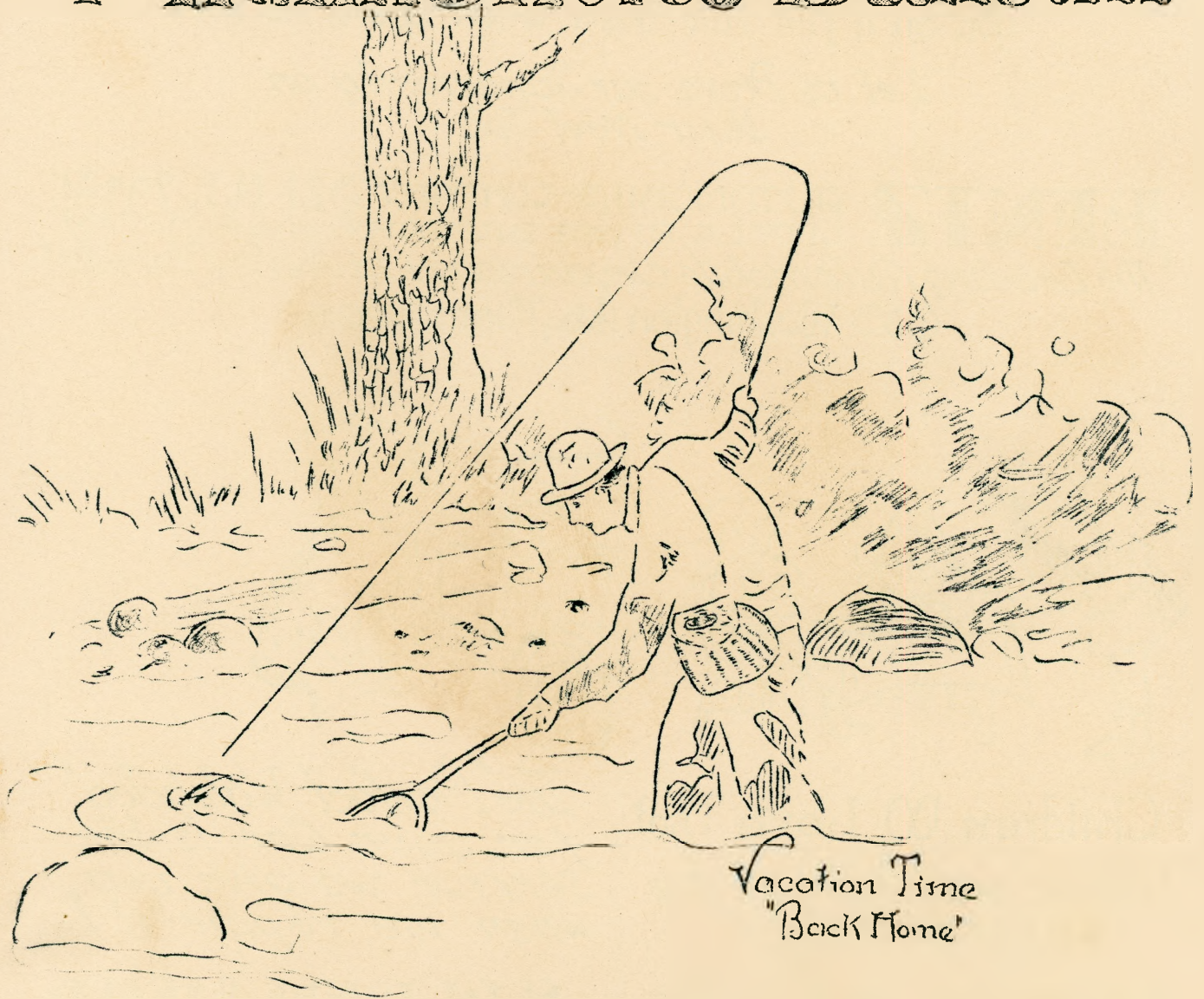

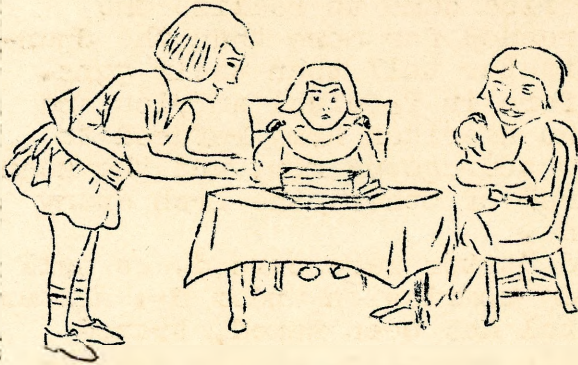

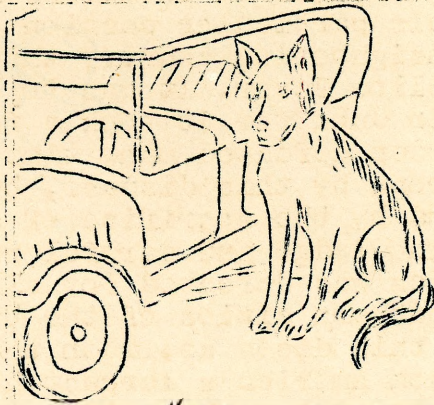

A FORGOTTEN VICTORY

Of all our wars and victories deserving of commemoration few are more stirring to the imagination than the victory, won by a devoted handful of American officers and men, which freed the world of the horrible scourge of Yellow Fever. John R. Kissinger, one veteran of that obscure, but dangerous service has recently entered the news columns again in a modest way. He was found to be living in desperately straitened circumstances, his health permanently shattered by the sacrifice he made a quarter of a century ago in the cause of human welfare.

A committee of eminent citizens have cleared his home of debt and obtained from the United States Government a pension of \$100. a month to reward him for the noble work he did twenty-seven years ago.

His name was famous enough then, but it has now faded from the public mind, yet it should be remembered with gratitude by the people of this particular section of America. It was during the war in our neighboring country that America came to realize the horror of Yellow Fever. It was to be dreaded far more than the Spanish forces in Cuba for it took a far greater toll than their guns. Armies had been defeated many times before in Tropical America and Southern Europe by this disease, but the American Army refused to surrender and by the sacrifice of a few courageous men, and the keen scientific knowledge and careful research of others the arch enemy of the Tropics was defeated for all time.

The southern cities of the United States were cursed, as well as Cuba, by this disease. Then the army commission under Dr. Walter Reed, for whom America's largest hospital has been named, traced the carrying of the germ to the stegomyia mosquito, and by experimenting on themselves and gallant volunteers from the army ranks, the means of combatting it was finally evolved. Private Kissinger was one of the men who volunteered. He allowed himself to be bitten and was taken seriously ill. Upon his recovery he refused compensation or reward, saying that it was a part of his duty to his country, but the years proved that the disease had left its mark upon him, and he has paid for his heroism ever since that day.

Dr. Lazear of the commission died, and Dr. Carroll altho apparently recovered died later from the effects of the experiment. Various other volunteers, some of them now living, offered themselves, took equal risks, and went their way unheard and unsung. As we, of Tropical America, enjoy the glorious healthfulness of this climate it is well for us to remember these heroes who rid it of horrors of Yellow Fever.

PETITIONS FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT CIRCULATED

Petitions for the street improvement program discussed in the public hearing at the last meeting of the Town Council are now in circulation. Copies of these petitions, as well as of the Petition of Protest, are printed in other pages of this issue of the "Bulletin", and citizens who have not signed, are urged to tear out and sign the page containing the plan which they favor, or the Petition of Protest and to mail in an envelope addressed: "Town Council, Miami Shores, Florida."

Signers should be careful to state the number of front feet of property owned by them, affected by the proposed improvement, and also to give the lot and block number of such property. Failure to do this may result in the signature receiving no consideration by the Town Council.

FIRE DEPARTMENT HAS THREE CALLS

The Fire Department answered three calls for fire over the week end. Last Sunday evening an alarm was sent in for a brush and grass fire at the corner of Avenue "E" and 13th. Street. The chemicals were used but were not sufficient to put out the blaze, so the engine was hooked up to the fire well located at that corner and put the fire out in a few minutes. On Monday afternoon, the Fourth of July, the department answered the alarm for a small grass fire on 11th. St. near Ex-Mayor Baker's residence. The chemicals were used on this fire which was put out very quickly. Late Monday afternoon an alarm was sent in for a brush fire in Oleta Terrace, in the North Limits of the Town, just south of the electric Transformer Station of the Florida Power and Light Company on Fulford Boulevard. A heavy rainstorm reached the fire while the department was making the long run and had smothered the fire when they reached the place.

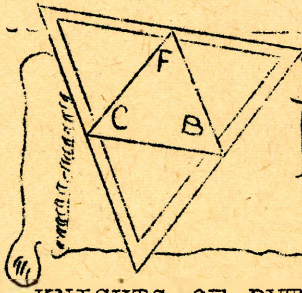

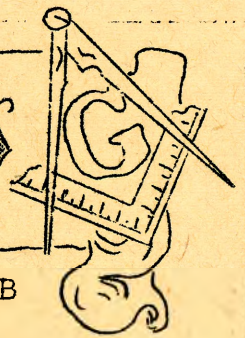

LAMBSKIN CLUB TO MEET TUESDAY

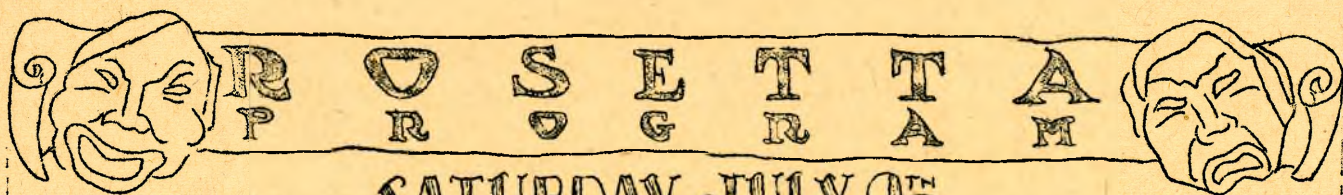

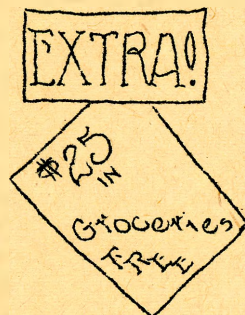

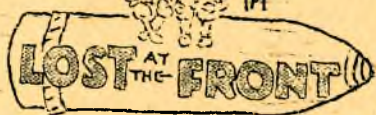

LEGAL NOTICE - TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES

RESOLUTION NO. 160

At a regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores, held on the 27th. day of June, 1927, Present Messrs. J.B.Jeffries, R.L.Gribble, F.D.Snow and W.F.Hamilton Absent Messrs. Earle Morgan, V.Earl Irons, and Arthur M. Griffing, Councilman Snow moved the adoption, and Councilman Hamilton seconded the following resolution, which was unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 160

A Resolution, approving plans and specifications, and estimate cost of paving certain streets in Fulford Highlands Sub-division in the Town of Miami Shores; determining to make said improvements, and providing that all expense thereof shall be paid by special assessments against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvements; directing the preparation of a special assessment roll, and prescribing the method of such assessment.

WHEREAS, there has been filed with the Town Clerk, plans and specifications together with the estimate of the cost of certain street improvements hereinafter described, which plans and specifications are now open to the public.

BE IT RESOLVED By the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores that said plans and specifications and estimates be, and the same are hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores hereby determines to make said improvements by paving the following streets to a width of eighteen (18) feet with one application of asphaltic oil; Nash Avenue, Blocks one (1) and two (2); Lodge Avenue, Blocks three (3) and four (4); Beary Avenue, from Avenue "E" to Cardinal Road; Highland Boulevard, from Sturdevant Avenue to Fulford Boulevard.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the total estimated cost of said improvements is Nine thousand, eight hundred twenty dollars and eighty cents (\$9,820.80),

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all expense of said improvements be paid by special assessments against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous, or bounding and abutting upon such improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That interest accruing while said improvements are under construction, and for six months thereafter, all engineering and inspection costs, including a proper proportion of the compensation, salaries and expenses of the Town's engineering staff, properly chargeable to said improvement, and all costs and estimated costs, including attorney's fees in the issuance of the bonds to be hereafter issued against said special assessments, shall be included in the cost of the improvements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That said special assessments shall be made in proportion to the peculiar benefit to be derived from the said improvements by each lot or parcel of land subject to assessment, and shall not exceed the amount of such benefit, and shall be determined and pro-rated on all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting on such improvements, a separate assessment to be made against each separate lot or parcel according to the cost of each street and according to the front

footage of the respective properties on such street specially benefited by said improvements.

IT IS HEREBY DECLARED AND DETERMINED, That all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting on any street or section thereof and of the same width, are equally and uniformly benefited by the improvement on any such street or section of same in proportion to the front footage of such lots or lands on that particular street or section thereof. A special assessment roll shall be prepared and completed and filed, which said roll shall show the amount of the assessment against such lot or parcel of land in accordance with the method of assessment provided herein and the number of annual installments into which the assessments are divided, such assessment roll to be hereafter published as required by law, together with the notice of the time and place where complaints will be heard with reference to the said assessments and when said assessments shall be finally approved, confirmed and equalized by the Town Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That said assessments shall be payable in ten (10) equal yearly installments, with accrued interest on all deferred payments, at the rate of eight per centum per annum, unless paid within thirty (30) days after said assessments shall have been approved and confirmed. All accrued interest on the deferred payments shall be payable annually at the time when the yearly installment is payable. Said assessments shall, until paid, be and remain liens upon the respective lots and parcels of land assessed superior in dignity to all other liens, except liens for taxes from the date of the assessments. Upon the failure of any property owner to pay any annual installment when due or any part thereof or any annual interest upon deferred payment when due, the whole of the assessment with interest thereon shall immediately become due and payable and payment thereof shall be enforced according to law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Resolution shall be published once a week for a period of two (2) weeks in "The Miami Herald", a newspaper published in Dade County, and of general circulation in the Town of Miami Shores, and in the "Miami Shores Bulletin".

ORDINANCE NO.92

AN ORDINANCE, Providing for a Special Referendum Election to be held on July 26th, A.D. 1927, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town".

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That a Special Referendum Election shall be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores, the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami"?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th, A.D.1927.

Section 2. Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores shall be open each day at the Town Hall to and including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.

Section 3. That notice of said election shall be published once a week for the period of four (4) weeks in the "MIAMI SHORES BULLETIN" and in the "MIAMI HERALD", in form substantially as follows:

"TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES
NOTICE OF SPECIAL REFERENDUM ELECTION
