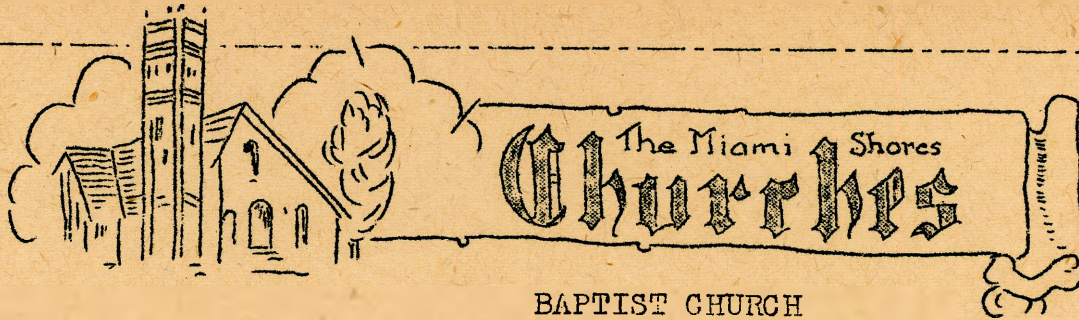
Sure this world is full of trouble -

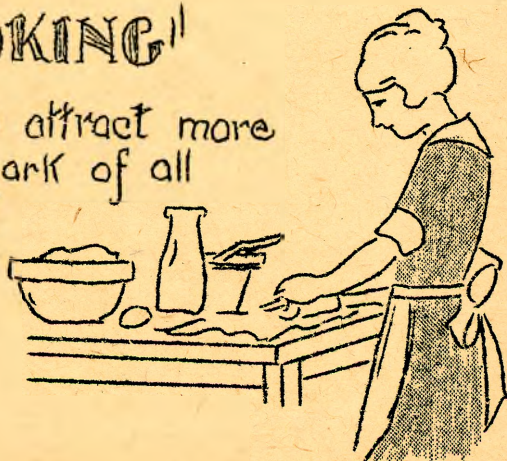

THE TOWN NAME DEBATE

Asheville, N.C., July 14, 1927.

Editor, Miami Shores Bulletin,
Miami Shores, Florida.

Dear Editor:

Beg to hand you herewith a copy of letter written to Farson, Son & Company, Broadway, New York City, dated July 9th, requesting an impartial opinion as to the effect of proposed change of name as regards financing.

This same letter was written to Spitzer, Borick & Co., Toledo, Ohio; Prudden & Company; Stranahan, Harris & Oaties of Toledo, Ohio.

Gentlemen:

Have just held a conference with Mr. W.H. Parsons, Jr. of Tampa, Florida in reference to some financing on county paving in Kimberly Heights, suburb of Asheville, and also in reference to some paving in Biscayne Park, part of which is located in the City of Miami, and a part in the Town of Miami Shores.

At his suggestion I am writing to ask your opinion on the Proposed change of name from the Town of Miami Shores to North Miami, which will be decided by referendum vote on July 26th.

Our Town Council authorized this change of name and sent a representative to the legislature who effected the passage of an act by legislature and which was signed by the Governor, changing the name of our Town to North Miami with Referendum clause.

It was believed by members of the Town Council and other interested parties that such a change was very desirable and that there would be no opposition. However, it has developed that there is a great deal of opposition to this change.

It is our idea that financing could be done to better advantage under a new name, and as you are thoroughly familiar with matters of this kind we would appreciate a little advice.

Dear Sir:-

Referring to your letter of July 9th, the great majority of Municipal Bond buyers react unfavourably to the bonds of a (Over)

community which is located on the ocean. This is a natural reaction and is due, of course, to severe storms and consequent heavy damages which have been suffered by East Coast communities, such as, Galveston Texas, and some of the cities in Florida.

When the name of a community indicates that it is located on the ocean, this reaction immediately develops. For example - Vero Beach, Florida, although it is a substantial community and well protected from the ocean, would find a very much better market for its bonds if the word 'Beach' was not used in the community.

We can readily understand the position of some of the local people in wanting to change the name of Miami Shores to North Miami because their bonds would be more favorably received in the market, in our opinion, if the name of this community was changed to that of North Miami.

Dear Sir:

We acknowledge receipt of yours of the 9th. We would say by all means use every effort to carry the election, changing the name of the town from Miami Shores to North Miami. On account of the receivership of the corporation of Miami Shores, this is very bad for the name of the Town, whereas North Miami is a much better name.

We would suggest that you and other interested people in Miami Shores look into the matter of the town's finances, and get after the tax collections, as we understand they are very slow and unless you can effect collections, you may have trouble in meeting the maturing principal and interest on your bonded indebtedness, and this would be a blow from which the town would probably never recover. 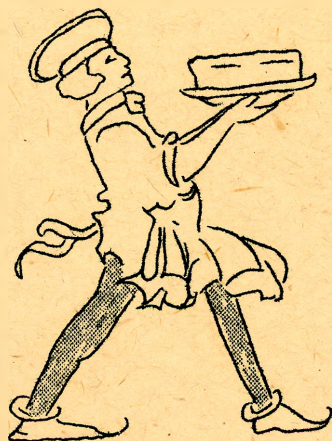

Any registered voter whose name does not appear on the above list, but who has paid poll tax in time at the County Court House, should produce the receipts at the Town Hall before Election Day, so that his name may be certified to the Election Board. If the original receipts have been lost, duplicates may be obtained at the County Court House.

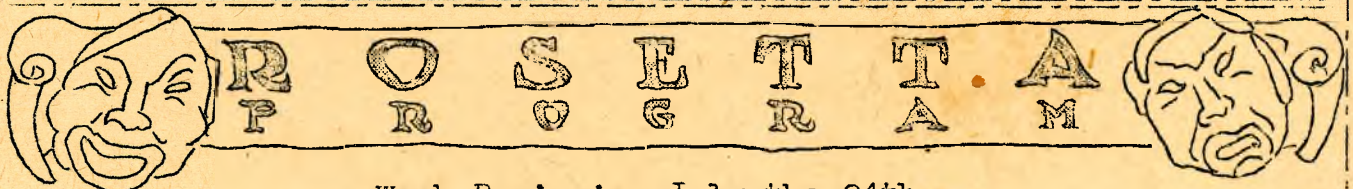
It is known, however, that many persons whose names appear on the above list, are not qualified to vote in the Town of Miami Shores because they no longer reside within the corporate limits. Any person who knowingly casts an illegal vote is subject to fine and imprisonment upon conviction in the Municipal Court, under the provisions of Ordinance No. 68, approved by the Mayor October 30, 1926. ELECTION REGULATIONS

The following election regulations were made public yesterday by Mayor Brion, at the Town Hall:

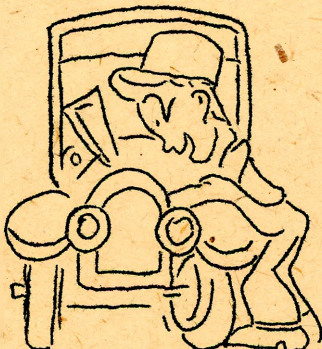
The polling place will be in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, Potts Building.

Polls will be open from eight o'clock A.M. until sundown, Tuesday, July 26th, 1927.

Each voter upon entering the polling place, will be given one ballot by the inspectors. The voter must then retire alone to one of the booths and prepare his ballot by making a cross-mark in the appropriate place. If he favors the proposed change in the name of the Town, he should make a cross-mark (X) in front of the word "Yes". If he is against the change, he should make a cross-mark (X) in front of the word "NO".

A voter must not sign his name on the ballot nor make any kind of a mark thereon, except in front of the word "Yes" or the word "No."

After preparing his ballot, the voter must fold the same so as to conceal the face thereof, and show the numbered stub thereto attached, with the initials of the Inspector, and hand it to the Receiving Inspector, who will detach the stub therefrom and return the ballot to the voter who shall deposit the ballot in the ballot box in the presence of the Inspectors. The voter must then leave the polling place

Any voter who, by accident or mistake, spoils a ballot, may return it to the Inspectors who will immediately detach the stub and destroy without examining the ballot so returned, and shall give to the voter another ballot.

STILL MORE BOND MONEY RECEIVED

\$44,636.83 has been received and deposited within the past week as the proceeds of the sale of \$25,000 General Improvement Bonds and \$24,000 Sidewalk Bonds, according to a statement issued by Mayor W.P.Brion. The entire issue of \$74,000 Sidewalk Improvement Bonds has now been taken up and paid for, it was said, while \$100,000 par value General Improvement Bonds have also been delivered to the purchasers, and payment made. Seventy-five \$1,000 bonds of this issue remain in New York in the vaults of the United States Mortgage and Trust Company.

"THE TRAIL"



I think very much that the trail that is pictured in the Bulletin is a Muskrat. In its appearance and habits the muskrat is a small and humble understudy of a Beaver, but it does not belong to the Beaver's race, but is of the race of rats and mice. The tail of the muskrat is different from the Beaver because it is flat the opposite way from the Beaver. The use and value of the fur of this animal has been very great. One of the habits of the Muskrat is when in the marshland it builds dome shaped houses, but in streams it burrows in the banks. It is not a bark lover or woodcutter, it feeds on softer food. In parks it is very destructive to earth dams and canal embankments. Its fur is dark brown, and its tail is flattened and carried on the edge."

frauds. AN ORDINANCE, Prescribing the punishment for election

SHORES: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI

Section 1. Whoever, knowing that he is not a qualified elector, wilfully votes at any election of the Town of Miami Shores, shall on conviction thereof be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or imprisoned for not more than sixty (60) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 2. Whoever, by bribery, menace, threat, or other corrupt means or device whatsoever, either directly or indirectly, attempts to influence any elector of the Town of Miami Shores in giving his vote or ballot, or to deter him from giving same, or disturbs or injures him in the free exercise of the right of suffrage at any election of the Town of Miami Shores, shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding sixty (60) days, or by fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3. Whoever is guilty of wilful and corrupt false swearing or affirming when interrogated as to his qualifications as an elector, or whoever wilfully and corruptly produces another person to swear or affirm falsely as aforesaid, shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding sixty (60) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 4. Whoever casts knowingly an illegal vote at any election of the Town of Miami Shores, shall on conviction thereof be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or imprisoned for not more than sixty days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. Whoever casts more than one ballot at the same election of the Town of Miami Shores shall on conviction thereof be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or imprisoned for not more than sixty days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

ORDINANCE NO.92

AN ORDINANCE, Providing for a Special Referendum Election to be held on July 26th, A.D. 1927, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town".

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That a Special Referendum Election shall be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores, the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami"?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th, A.D.1927.

Section 2. Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores shall be open each day at the Town Hall to an including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.

Section 3. That notice of said election shall be published once a week for the period of four (4) weeks in the "MIAMI SHORES BULLETIN" and in the "MIAMI HERALD", in form substantially as follows:

"TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES
NOTICE OF SPECIAL REFERENDUM ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special referendum election will be held on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1927, from eight o'clock A.M. to sundown, at the Town Hall in the Potts Building, Miami Shores, Florida, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Miami Shores the following question:

Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to "Town of North Miami"?

in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled "An Act, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores, in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami and providing that this Act shall take effect upon its ratification by the qualified electors of said Town", approved by the Governor June 6th., A.D. 1927.

Registration books of the Town of Miami Shores will be open each day at the Town Hall to and including the twentieth day of July, A.D. 1927.

WHY THE NAME OF MIAMI SHORES SHOULD NOT BE CHANGED:

1. The statement has been made that the sub-division known as Miami Shores has cast a bad light on the Town of Miami Shores because of its legal difficulties. If this is the case, why change the name now? The legal troubles of the subdivision are largely over, according to statements in the daily papers. We are informed that in a comparatively short time work will begin again on the unfinished projects, and that Miami Shores Subdivision will again occupy its just place as the second largest and finest development in Florida. If we change the name now, will we not regret it within a few months?

2. Our only alternative is "NORTH MIAMI"; if we change it must be to that name. Ask anyone who has been in Miami several years what significance the name has. Do we want the evil associations of the past of that name to fasten themselves on our fair community?

In national advertising, postal marks, and correspondence, which would have the most effect - Miami Beach or East Miami? Does not this apply to us as well?

7. Are we going to change the name of our community to please a few who no longer have a vital interest in the Town, and who do not live here but a small portion of the year, or are we, the permanent residents of the Town going to rule what our home town shall be known as thruout the world?
