EDITORIAL ODDS AND ENDS, ---

At last the Town name debate is over, and we will not have to get a new heading for the Bulletin.

Miami Shores is to have a Boy Chorus. Wherever such an organization is perfected a great amount of publicity follows, for there can be no sweeter music than that rendered by boys from eight to thirteen years of age assembled in a great chorus, and trained by someone who not only is accomplished in music, but has also a heap of "boy love" in his heart. We feel sure that this organization, if properly backed by the parents and boys, will be not only a source of local pride and satisfaction, but also a means of creating great interest in Miami Shores, as we send them to other communities to entertain and inspire. Let's all help make this new organization a success.

Letters arriving daily from the North indicate a keen interest in Miami Shores. Those folks who are away for the summer are eager to return, having found no place equal to this; those who come to us just for the winter are looking forward to joys of next winter here, free from snow bank, coal pile, and heavy clothing!

With the many public improvements now under way in Town it is well for us to remember the first thing that impressed us about the Southern part of Florida when first we saw it --- its marvelous tropical foliage, and think on the fact that this same thing will likewise impress the first time visitor next winter. Let us enhance the beauty of our community, and the improvements underway, by greater attention to the plants and trees about town. Unfortunately the Town itself has not the funds available to do this much needed work, hence the property owners must do it themselves. If anyone in the Town has an idea as to how this may be accomplished on the Town property and on vacant lots, without expense to the Town, we will be glad to help put the campaign over.

The "Clean Up, Paint Up" Campaign in Miami accomplished many good things. After looking over Miami and Miami Shores rather thoroughly we are convinced that our Town does not need such a campaign nearly as much as Miami, altho there could be much accomplished out here to beautify the Town, without prohibitive cost to the property owners.

In an early issue we expect to publish a detailed account of the progress being made on the public improvements in Miami Shores with sketches and diagrams of the same, for the benefit of the large number of citizens who are sojourning in the North, who receive the Bulletin each week.

APPOINTMENTS AND RESIGNATION

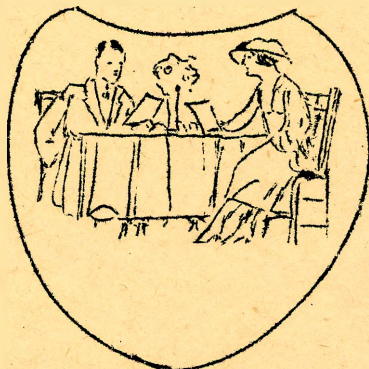
At the Council meeting last Tuesday, Edward C. Dougherty submitted his resignation as Town Clerk. Mrs. Mary A. Brasher was appointed by Mayor W.P. Brion to fill the vacancy thus caused for the term ending February fifth next, and the appointment was confirmed by the Council. Mr. Dougherty's appointment as Town Attorney as well.

The salary of Mrs. Brasher was increased from the rate of \$1,300 to \$1,800 per year. No additional expense to the taxpayer is involved, however, in the rearrangement made by the Mayor and Council as the salary of Dougherty as Town Attorney, Assessor and Treasurer was, at his own request, reduced from \$4,000 to \$3,500 for the three offices.

Mrs. Brasher has been employed at the Town Hall since March 16th, 1927 when she was appointed stenographer to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. A.L. Fauss. The selection of Mrs. Brasher was made as a result of a Civil Service Examination, open to all citizens of the Town of Miami Shores. Six weeks later she was named Deputy Town Clerk by the Mayor and Town Council. Mrs. Brasher formerly resided in Passaic, New Jersey, and was employed in New York City by the Hanover National Bank and the Bankers Trust Company, and in law offices. She is said to be an expert legal stenographer.

The appointment of Dougherty as Town Attorney was made shortly after the receipt of official notice that he had passed the Florida State Bar Examination. Mr. Dougherty is twenty-nine years of age, and has been an attorney for six years, having been admitted to practise before the Supreme Judicial Court of Massachusetts in October, 1920. On March 19th, 1923, he was admitted to practise before the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, and carried on the practise of law in Philadelphia from that time until August 1925, when he came to Miami. Dougherty has received the degree of A.B. from Harvard University, and the degree of LL.B. from Northeastern University, after having also studied law at St. Louis Law School, Georgetown Law School and the Inns of Court (London, England).

Dougherty announced some time ago that he would not be a candidate for any municipal office at the November election. After the expiration of his term of office as Town Assessor and Treasurer on February fifth he will devote his entire time to his law practise.

Upon recommendation made by Fire Chief MacDonald, the Town Council voted Tuesday night to sink a fire well in the Fulford Highlands section of the Town. The well will be located about twenty-five feet south of Fulford Boulevard, on the West side of Highland Boulevard.

TAX EXTENSION GRANTED

COLLECTIONS GREATLY IMPROVED

Another month's extension of time in which to pay town real estate taxes was granted by the Council at its meeting Tuesday. The tax will not become due until September 1st., under the Council's decision.

Tax collections have improved greatly during the past few weeks said Mr. Mahood, when interviewed yesterday, the total amount collected to date being \$16,515.88.

One of the causes of the improvement is believed to be the recent abandonment by the Beach interests of their threatened attempt to resist the collection of the tax.

ELECTION RETURNS CANVASSED

The Town Council canvassed the returns made by the Election Board. It was found that twenty electors voted in favor of the proposed change of name, while ninety-seven voters cast their votes against such change. The Council thereupon declared that the voters had failed to ratify the recent Act of the Legislature and declared that the name of the Town shall remain "THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES."

ARRESTS

Another defendant failed to appear Monday and his bond of \$25 posted for speed violation was declared forfeited.

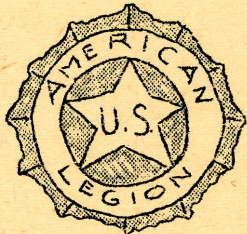

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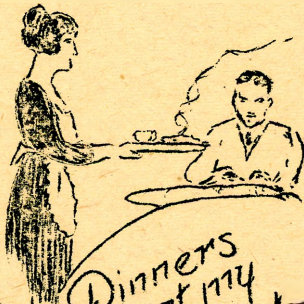
Miami Shores 67

MIAMI SHORES IT IS TO BE!

By action of the voters of the Town of Miami Shores we are to remain "Miami Shores". At the referendum election held Tuesday 117 ballots were cast (approximately two-thirds of the eligible voters) 97 of which were cast in the negative on the proposition of changing the name. It is readily seen that this decisive margin of 97 to 20 has settled the question definitely. Had all the remaining eligible voters cast their ballots in the affirmative it would not have altered the decision. The people have spoken, may every citizen heartily co-operate now to make the name Miami Shores honored thruout the entire nation.

Thruout the day of voting the townspeople entered the poles cast their ballots without hesitation, and returned to their various activities with scarcely a comment. It was evident they knew what they wanted.

When the poles closed, and the ballots counted, the question universally asked was not "How did it go?" but rather, "How big a margin?" which suggests that at no time was there any doubt as to the ultimate result.

It has cost considerable money to find out the will of the people, but it has been definitely proven that hasty action on the part of any group of officials or individuals in leaving the matter entirely in the hands of the legislature, would have been disastrous. It was indeed the only way to settle so important a question, and we are glad our officials were not too hasty in the matter.

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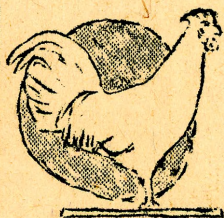
SPECIAL NOTICE

The First meeting will be held at Potts Hall Monday Evening, August 1st. at 7:30 P.M. All eligible boys are urged to attend.

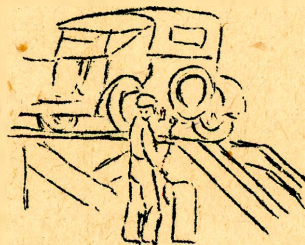


BOOSTER LODGE HOLDS MEETING

Wednesday evening Booster Lodge # 132, Knights of Pythias held an enthusiastic meeting at the Lodge Castle on the old Dixie. Over one hundred members from eight lodges of South Florida were present and participated in the meeting. The rank of Knight was conferred upon a candidate in a most impressive manner. A special feature of the evening's entertainment was the Bay Biscayne Lodge Orchestra, an organization that is undoubtedly one of the best in the state. Its music at intervals thruout the program was heartily applauded. Addresses by visiting members and officers were of an inspirational character, and one and all prophesied a continuation of meetings of this kind thruout the district.

The Order Knights of Pythias maintains Homes for aged Pythians and for widows and orphans. More than 5,000 men, women and children are residents of these homes. Approximately 4,000 acres of tillable land, buildings and equipment presenting an outlay of six million dollars stands as a memorial to Pythian care of the unfortunate. The cost of maintaining these homes and of educating orphans is about \$500,000 annually.

This is a summary of the activity of the Pythian Order read before the lodge Wednesday night by J. Huston Gribble, keeper of records and seal. The report was issued by the Supreme Lodge as an educational bulletin to give members of the order a definite knowledge of the extent of this department of Pythian activity. The homes are located in eighteen states and during July and August hundreds of thousands of Pythians and their families will visit these homes. During August two large homes located in Indiana and Minnesota will be dedicated and a half million dollar unit will be completed at the home in California.

"The care of our aged and orphaned is the outstanding achievement of the Pythian Order", according to Chancellor Commander W.R. Bartley. "Two departments of the Order's activity direct the work in this endeavor. Our homes are shrines of Pythian devotion where the aged finds protection and the child is given the care of home

when a tragedy crosses its pathway. Pythian investment in this welfare work, while but a part of the Order's objective, has assumed proportions of great importance in what is being wrought for human welfare. The other auxiliary devoted to the care of the Pythian family is its Insurance Department which has recently announced free medical examination for all members and their families. The Department maintains a medical staff and a large laboratory for this service. No attempt is made to treat disease, the object being to detect any lurking malady by laboratory tests so that the member or any of his family may go to a physician in time. For a number of years the Department has maintained a laboratory health test for the members of the Department. The extension of this service to all Pythians and their families is in keeping with the development of practical fraternity to the home and family need."

Chancellor Commander W.R. Bartley urged all members of the lodge to take advantage of this personal service offered by the Department by writing to the Home Office for blanks and containers necessary to make the test. He also announced that the Department would celebrate its fiftieth anniversary in August at which time it will have paid to widows and orphans of members more than sixty million dollars.

At the close of the meeting the large number present were invited to the Banquet Hall where refreshments prepared by the Pythian Sisters awaited them.

The local lodge was instituted about twelve years ago under the patronage of Bay Biscayne Lodge of Miami, and had among its charter members the pioneers of Arch Creek, several of whom are still active in the affairs of the lodge. While not the largest lodge of the Pythian Order in this District it is one of the best known for its record of service and activity. Members are optimistic about the future of their organization in this community.

RESOLUTION NO.168

A RESOLUTION, Concerning the canvass of the returns of the Special Referendum Election in the Town of Miami Shores, held on July 26th, 1927.

WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of Florida, did, on the sixth day of June, 1927, approve an Act of the Legislature entitled:

"AN ACT, Changing the name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take Effect upon its Ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town."

and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores did, on the fifteenth day of June, 1927, pass and adopt an Ordinance No. 92 entitled:

"AN ORDINANCE, Providing for a Special Referendum Election to be held July 26th, A.D.1927, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Florida, entitled, 'An Act, Changing the Name of the Town of Miami Shores in Dade County, Florida, to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take Effect upon its Ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town. ' "

and

WHEREAS, Said election was regularly and properly held on the said twenty-sixth day of July, 1927, and returns of said election were made by the duly appointed Inspectors and Clerk of said election

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That the Town Council has this day publicly canvassed the returns of the aforesaid election, which canvass was made solely, exclusively and entirely from the returns of the Inspectors and Clerk heretofore appointed to hold and conduct said election, and this Town Council, acting as a Canvassing Board, has found that upon the question proposed at said election, to-wit:

"Shall the name of the Town of Miami Shores be changed to 'Town of North Miami' "?

117 votes were cast, of which 20 electors voted "YES" upon said question and 97 electors voted "NO" upon said question.

Section 2. That the Town Council, having canvassed said returns, HEREBY DECLARES that a majority of the qualified electors of said Town actually voting at said election voted against the change in name and by said vote, failed to ratify the said Act entitled:

"AN ACT, Changing the name of the Town of Miami

RESOLUTION NO. 168 - CONTINUED

Shores in Dade County, Florida to Town of North Miami, and Providing that this Act shall take Effect upon its Ratification by the Qualified Electors of said Town".

Section 3. The Town Council DOES HEREBY DECLARE, that the name of this Town shall remain "TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES".
