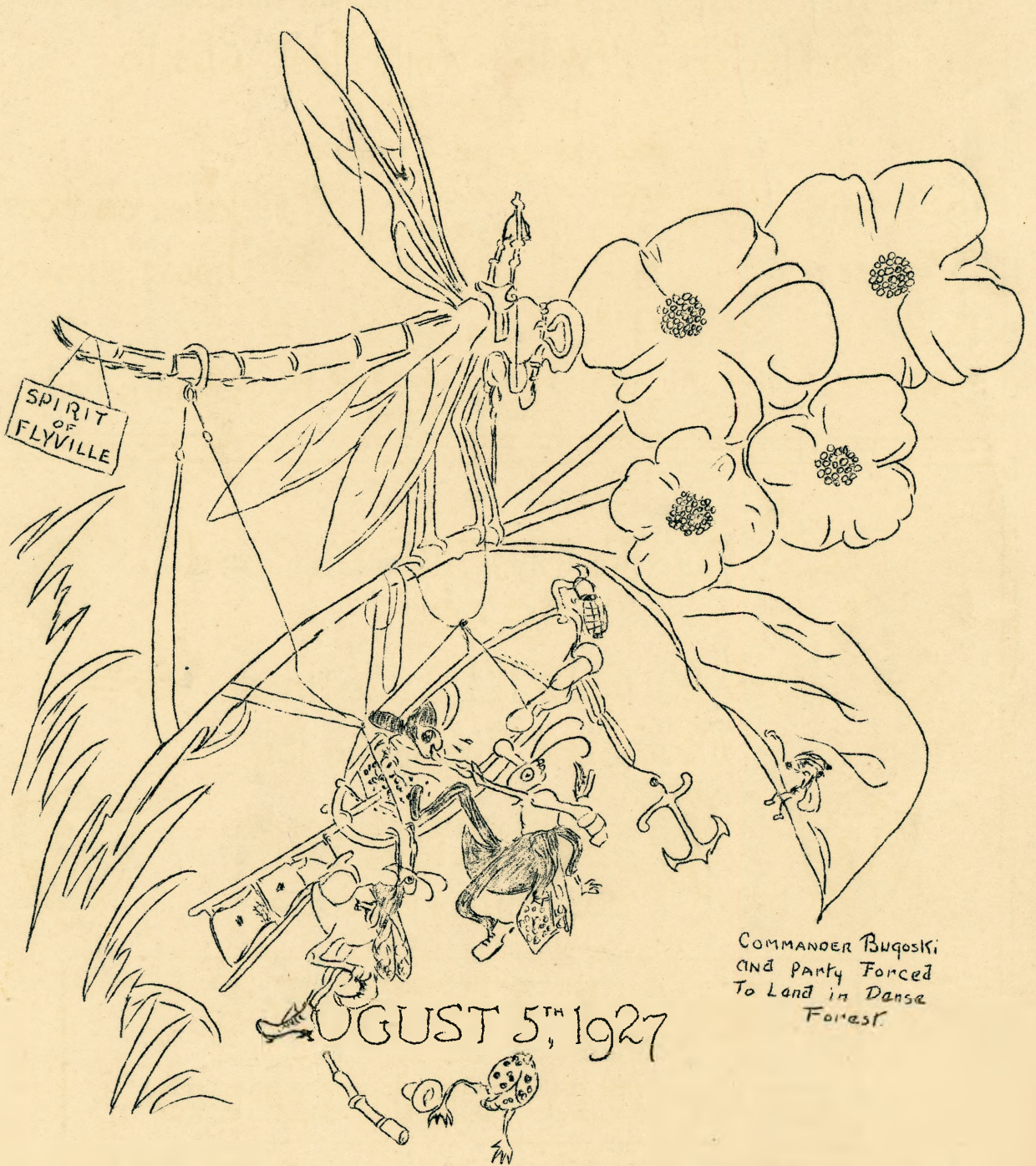
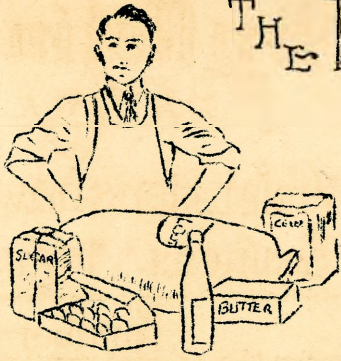

" THE SPIRIT OF MIAMI SHORES "

Colonel Lindbergh has made famous the phrase used as a name for his tran-atlantic plane, "The Spirit of St. Louis", the other part of the "We" combination that battled the elements to eternal fame.

We cannot help but believe that these two expressions have something to teach all communities, and altho this may not be the proper place to preach a sermon, we are inclined to take them as a text, and talk about them a bit.

Years ago when Arch Creek was "the fourth stop north of Miami on the F.E.C." there was a very well defined and active community spirit. Nowhere in South Florida was there a more intense pride than that of the people of Arch Creek in their quiet little town, made beautiful by shaded roads, and unique by the Natural Bridge.

With the coming of real estate activity and the rapid growth in population we began to look upon our community as a residential suburb of Miami. The majority of us found our interests lay in Miami, and the greater part of our thought and activity was directed southward.

Then came the incorporation of the Town, but the majority of us looked upon it as being a means of modernizing our community, and caring for our mutual needs until Miami should find it convenient to take us over.

The prospect of Miami taking us over is extremely remote at the present; and we have all been paying greater attention to our own community in recent months as a wise and earnest administration has gone about the business of firmly establishing this as a Community of real worth.

Today, we see in the process of erection one of the most beautiful and practical public buildings in South Florida as our Town Hall; our people are taking greater pride in their own properties; we have engaged in an intelligent and comprehensive public improvement program; we see community efforts coming into being: a Boy's Chorus, the first in the State; A Masonic Lodge to help the Knights of Pythias in the spread of fraternalism; A baseball team that has entered the Greater Miami League; and perhaps best of all, an awakening on the part of the Miami people to the fact that the name of Miami Shores is not just that of a real estate development, but that of a community of intelligent, earnest, loyal, patriotic and upright citizens engaged in the pioneer American activity of building a new city.

We are creating here a spirit of Miami Shores that will become a tradition in the years to come. That it may never be a spirit of injustice, intolerance, or selfishness, let us so live, each one of us, that the spirit of our people and community may become a by-word among men --- May the "Spirit of Miami Shores" be worthy of the blessings we have received at the hands of Nature in this glorious land of eternal sunshine and flowers.

EXAMINING COURT OF HONOR HELD

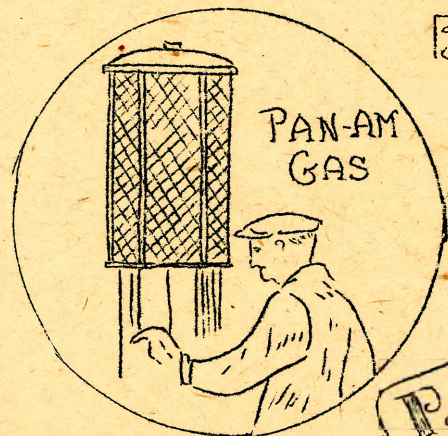

Other members of the Court present were P.S. Young, and Scoutmaster Earl Henshaw. The following boys were reviewed on the Merit Badge subjects named and upon presentation of certificates showing a creditable examination passed before experts, the Scouts were awarded the badges: Joe Davies, Civics and Handicraft; Drew Hamilton, Athletics; Wilbur Dale, Pioneering; Lynn Henshaw, Cycleing. The above named are First Class Scouts. Under a recent ruling of the National Council Second Class Scouts are allowed to pass certain Merit Badge Subjects. Scout Lawrence Woods took advantage of this ruling and passed Handicraft and Carpentry. As there has been no other examining court in the County since the ruling, Scout Woods is the first Second Class Scout in Dade County ever to receive a merit badge.

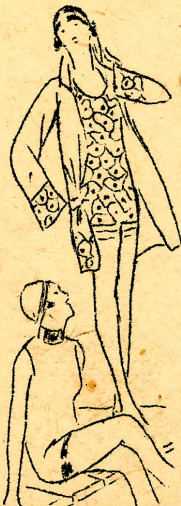

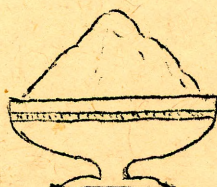

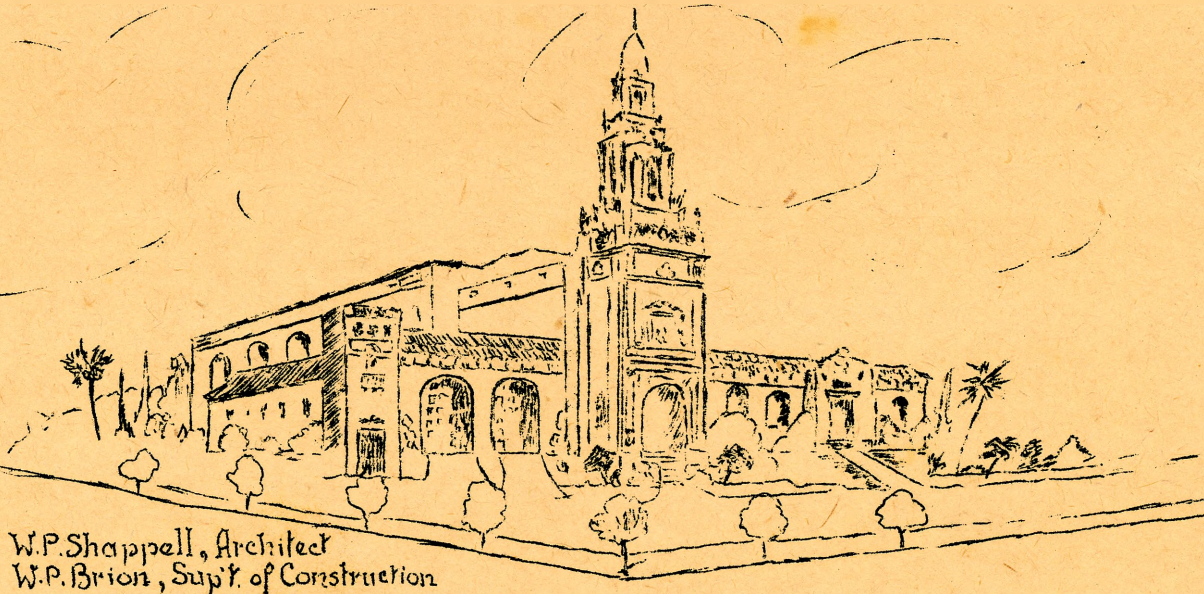

CONSTRUCTION PROCEEDING RAPIDLY ON TOWN HALL

The progress being made on the new Town Hall is entirely satisfactory according to Superintendent Brion, Architect Shappell and Foreman Keen, as well as the citizens who have taken the opportunity to go over the building. Many of the townspeople have availed themselves of the opportunity to observe the work being done and all are well pleased, and feel that Miami Shores will have a Town Building second to none in the South. Architect W.P. Shappell contributes the following report of the work done to the present date:

REPORT ON NEW TOWN HALL

I wish to make a report at this time on the New Town Hall, from a progressive, completion and architectural standpoint.

The progress on the plumbing is as follows: About eighty per cent (80%) of the roughing in of plumbing is in and complete, of which fifty percent (50%) has been approved to date. Septic tanks were built by local labor and are complete, and with a saving of approximately \$200.00 The plumber who is doing this work can be highly recommended for his workmanship and I know that we are getting our dollar's worth from this contract.

The electrical work is in progress, which includes underground conduit work on the first floor. I also wish to mention that the local men who are employed on this building have shown the proper spirit as to their work and their community. I hope they will continue their fine spirit.

The one-story portions on either side which includes the fire-department on the east side and the jail and police department on the west side, will start being plastered next week. Concrete is being poured in columns, beams, etc, in these portions at the present time.

As can be noticed, the entrance tower is progressing and will be built approximately thirty feet above the present walls. The first floor of the City Administration offices is progressing and partitions are being installed; electrical work following. I wish to state the City Offices will be cool, due to the fact of adequate window openings, transoms, and high ceilings.

The block work is also in progress on the second floor in the Auditorium and Council Chamber and it is hoped that within another week or ten days trusses will be installed and the roof will be completed. This Auditorium will answer any of the purposes that the community might desire to use it for in the future. It has a maple

Floor and plenty of ventilation. The electrical fixtures will be very beautiful and will probably save about a Thousand Dollars by letting the contract to someone in this State.

You no doubt, noticed published in the "Bulletin" in contracts let on the Town Hall, one of which included cast stone work which was purchased for \$240.00 and the previous figures on cast stone were \$3,000. The stone purchased compares exactly with plans and specifications. This saving was due to the fact that the Architect made his plans to include the details of this stone work and same was obtainable from stock.

The contracts let to date have saved us considerable money, as you know cash prices are prevailing factors in the present market.

The super-structure of the building, which includes re-inforced concrete, etc, is poured according to plans and specifications and tests up well.

Any lumber or materials that are not according to the contract shall be removed at the sub-contractor's expense and installed according to plans and specifications and contract.

I wish to take this opportunity to compliment H.A. Keen, Sr., as the general foreman under the supervision of Mayor Brion, on his work and perfect unity with the Architect and has proven very satisfactory in his interest as a tax-payer on this building.

Our neighboring city, Hollywood, as you may know, is now going to build a City Hall and is going to do the construction work with local labor as far as possible. It seems in my mind that we have not made a mistake by doing our work by local day labor, when our neighbors are following in our footsteps. I know it to be a fact, that the men employed on our Town Hall really need the help which we are giving them and they are sincerely appreciative of the same.

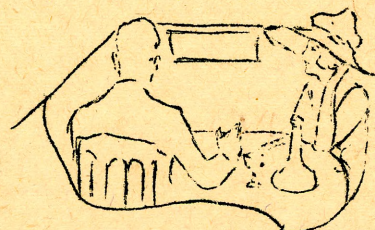
I wish to say in conclusion that when the tourists come this winter we will have a place to entertain them in our new Town Hall and we will be very proud of it when it is completed.

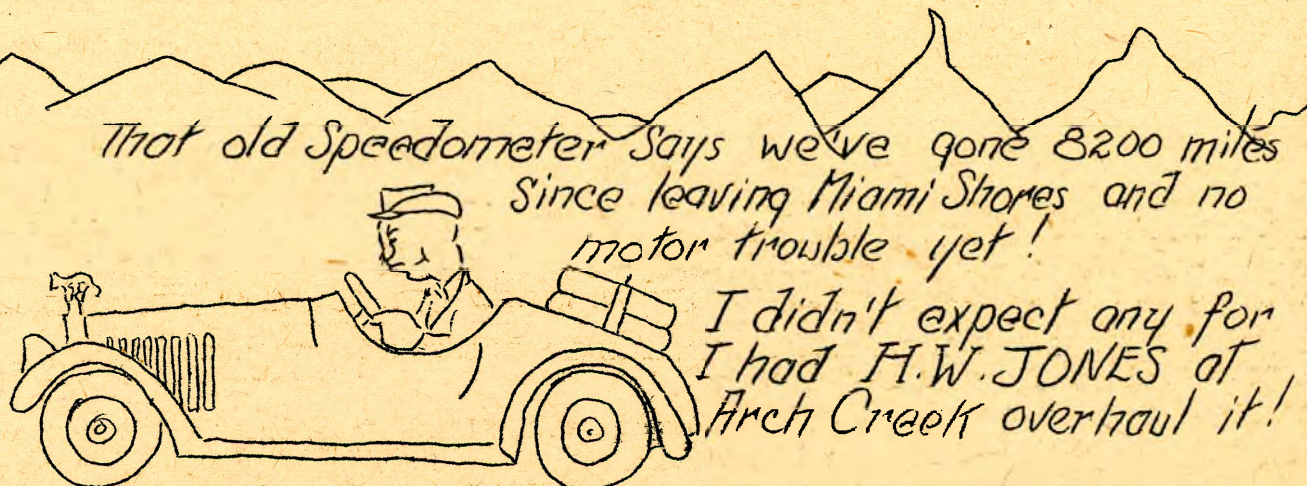

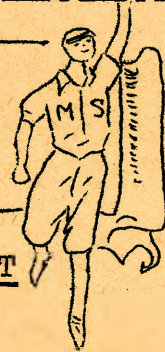

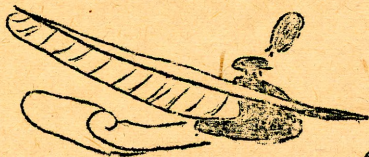
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A LOCAL BOY TO RACE IN STATE BICYCLE CHAMPIONSHIPS

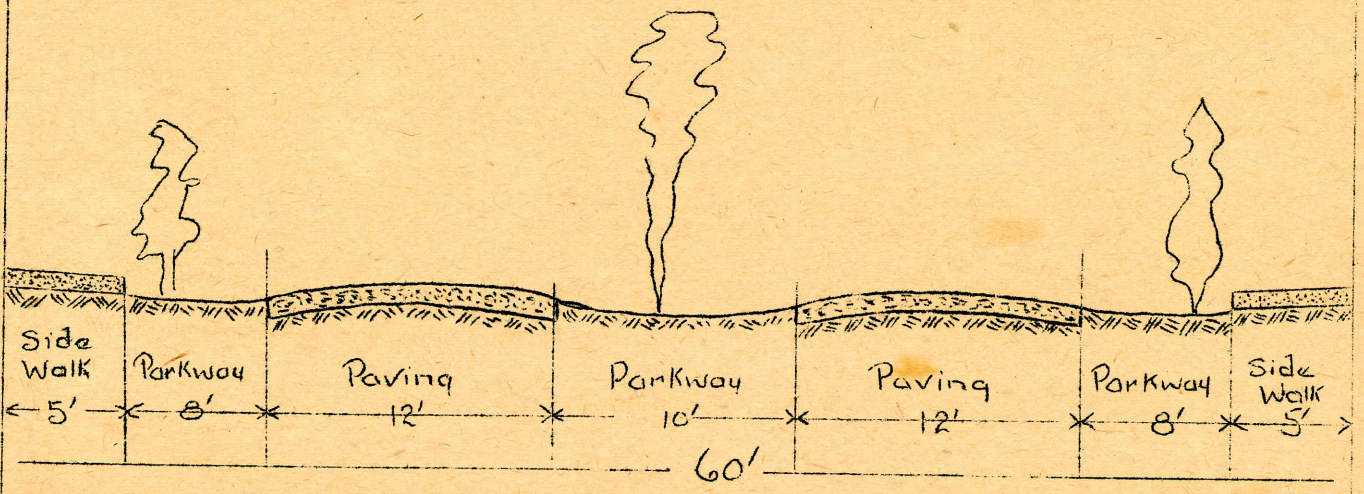
