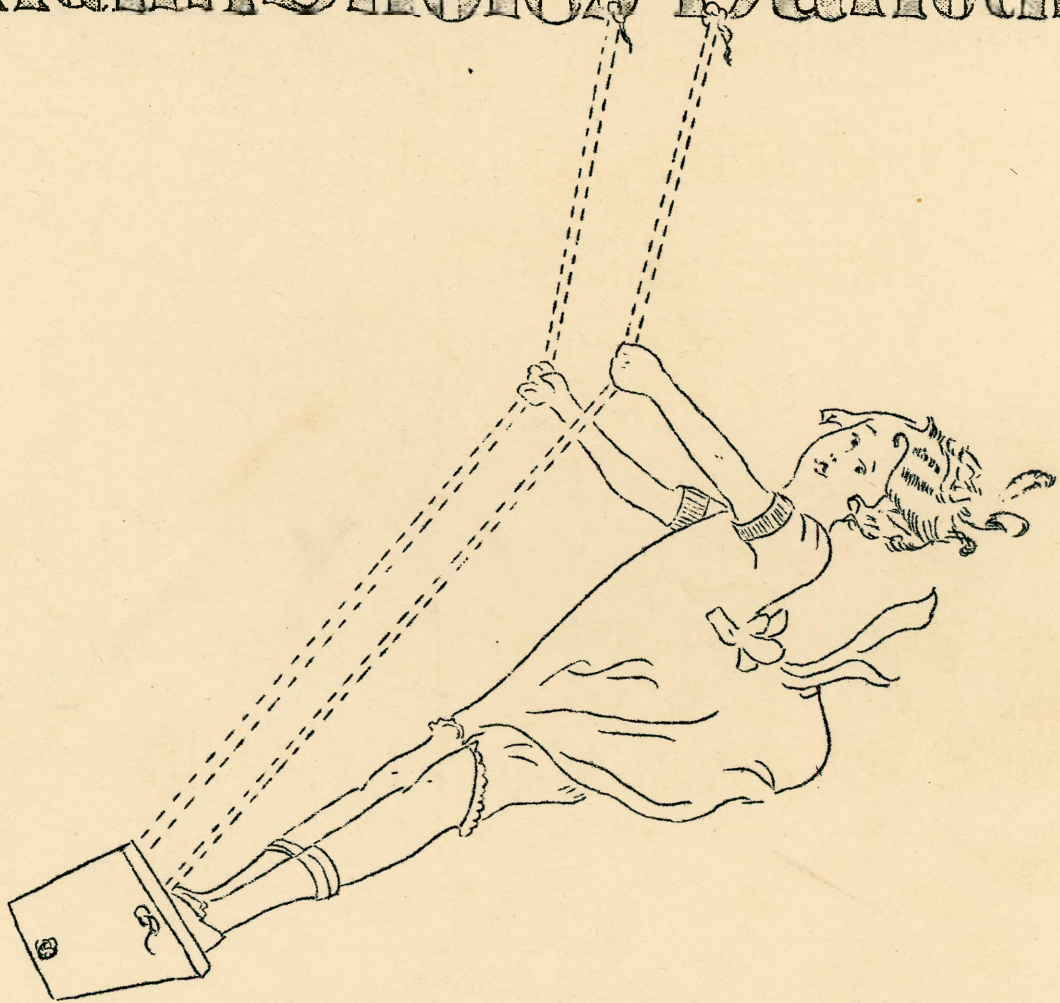

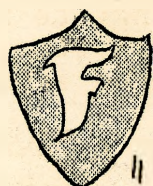

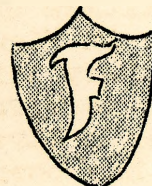

" HARMONY "

In recent months the Town of Miami Shores has found itself enjoying a greater degree of harmony than ever before in its history. The adverse conditions that have reigned in labor and business in the State of Florida in past weeks have tended to draw closer together the entire citizenry of the Town.

The progress being made by the Town in municipal improvements: the miles of new sidewalks, more paved streets, and the magnificent new Town Hall have evoked a boastful pride in the heart of every member of the community, solidifying the "Community Spirit".

Now, the political leaders of the two parties engaged in the campaign of last year have declared an armistice, and upon conferring with each other have found the way of peace and harmony to be mutually the best.

There has never been any need of such strife as characterized the politics of the last election. We have too many things to be proud of here in Miami Shores, too many projects awaiting completion, too many worthy things to be accomplished, to waste effort and friendship in useless rivalry.

As a first step toward a lasting and abiding peace a "harmony" ticket has been created. 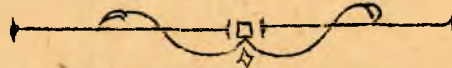

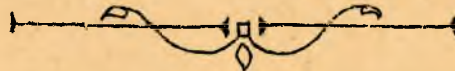

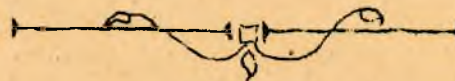

FUSION OF TOWN'S TWO POLITICAL PARTIES ACCOMPLISHED !

Last Friday evening, August fifth, occurred what is probably the most important event in the history of the Town of Miami Shores. At the home of the Hon. W.M. Bennett a meeting was held which resulted in the fusion of the Good Government Party with the Citizen's League into one harmonious body, and the abolition of all factional strife in the Town of Miami Shores.

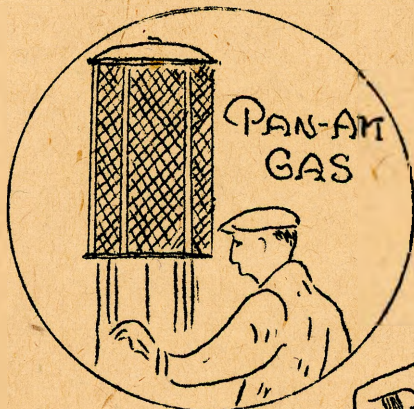
The successful meeting was the culmination of a movement which had its inception some two months ago, and which had been gaining ground steadily ever since. Leading citizens of the Town have continually urged party leaders of both bodies to prevent any repetition this year of the events of October and November, 1926. A factional campaign with its bitter strife, mud-slinging, personal invective and lasting hatreds, was declared to be an evil which should not be tolerated in such a progressive community as ours. The political leaders were finally convinced of the wisdom of such a move, and it was decided to make a real effort to compose the differences existing between the two political parties of the Town -- to bury the hatchet, forget past animosities and work in harmony for the best interests of the municipality.

A meeting was at last arranged for August fifth -- exactly eighteen months from the day on which the Town of Miami Shores began its legal existence. The place selected for this important conference was the home of the Honorable W.M. Bennett, who as candidate for Mayor upon the Citizen's League Ticket, came within six votes of victory last November. Besides the leaders of the Citizen's League, there were present at the Conference the Mayor of the Town, the Ex-Mayor, the members of the Town Council, the Town Attorney, and the Pastor of the Community Church.

After thorough discussion, it was found that every delegate present was in favor of abolishing factionalism; and it was thereupon decided that the two parties should be merged into one harmonious body, pledged to work together for the best interests of the Municipality.

Having agreed upon principles, the next most important question before the convention was the selection of candidates. No difficulty was experienced in agreeing unanimously upon the following:

(Note- Four Councilmen were nominated, as the terms of office of Messrs. Earle Morgan, R.L. Gribble, V. Earl Irons, and Arthur M. Griffing will expire in February. Messrs. Morgan, Gribble and Irons have declined another term on the Council. Mr. Morgan, president of

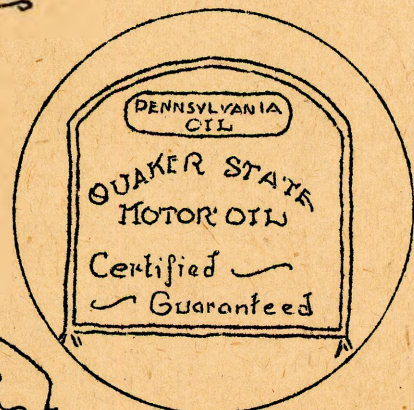

The spirit of good will was very much in evidence throughout the consideration of the candidates, and all past differences were forgotten. For instance, the nomination of H.H.Hawthorne as Town Clerk and Treasurer was moved by his opponent of last year, Edward C. Dougherty.

At the conclusion of the meeting, great satisfaction was expressed at the success of the new movement for progress and harmony, and at the high caliber of all the candidates. A new epoch has begun in the history of the Town of Miami Shores, it was said. It is predicted that for many years there will be no return to the petty bickerings personal animosities which unfortunately played for some time such a considerable part in the life of the Town.

Between the night of the historic meeting and the time the Bulletin goes to press, the news of the progress and harmony movement has spread like wildfire throughout the Town, and everywhere has met with enthusiastic acclaim. The people of Miami Shores had evidently become sick of the factional strife with which this community had so long been afflicted. Allegiance to the new movement and its candidates was pledged by practically all citizens to whom the matter was explained.

(It is fortunate that at this time of the history of our Town, that a "harmony" movement should be achieved. Opinions of leading citizens will be given from week to week in this paper. - Editor)

OPEN LETTERS

TO THE PEOPLE OF MIAMI SHORES:

Last Friday, August fifth, the Citizen's League and the Good Government Party joined forces in order to work together for the best interests of the Town of Miami Shores.

The leaders of both parties are convinced that a factional campaign, such as that of last November was no credit to the Town, and should not be repeated. Another such struggle could be of no possible benefit to this community, and would probably result in much ill feeling and bitterness. Instead of spending the next three and a half months in mud slinging and other outbursts of factionalism, I am sure the people of Miami Shores would rather work together in harmony for progress and good-will.

At the "Harmony Meeting" the following candidates were nominated by the unanimous vote of delegates from the Citizen's League and from the Good Government Party: J.B. Jeffries for Mayor; E.W. Amidon, H.E. McCrillus, Arthur M. Griffing and myself for Members of the Town Council; H.H. Hawthorne for Town Clerk and Treasurer; C.A. MacDonald or F.B. Potts for Town Marshall; Lawrence C. Molten for Tax Assesor, and John A. Mahood for Tax Collector. I am sure that all these men will meet with the approval of the voters of Miami Shores.

Mr. Jeffries splendid record as Councilman for the past year and a half made him the unanimous choice of the meeting for the highest office in the Town. On November 23d last Mr. Jeffries received a larger number of votes than any other candidate for Councilman. His record since his re-election has been such that it is hard to see how there could be any serious opposition to his election as Mayor.

All of the other candidates named above are of the very highest type, and are well qualified in every way to hold the offices for which they have been nominated. As for myself, I did not wish to run for any Town Office, but all of the delegates insisted upon my nomination as Councilman. I should consider it an honor to serve upon the Council if all of the men named above are also elected.

In conclusion, I wish to urge my loyal supporters of last year to join with me now in this great movement to abolish factionalism,

To The Citizens of Miami Shores:

diagnose and analyze any matter in which our community is interested beyond the ability of the average man, and during his term of office as Councilman during the past two years, no councilman has been more faithful in his attendance at meetings nor more painstaking in his efforts to determine definitely whether the matter under consideration was for the best interests of the Town, than has Mr. Jeffries, and because of the sacrifices he has made in giving to our town the large amount of valuable time and effort, which he has given us without compensation of any kind or without any desire for any favor of any kind has proven him to be a man of such sterling qualities that I regard him as being the best man that could possibly have been selected to act as our Mayor for the coming term, even though we might have had the entire State of Florida to select from.

MUNICIPAL ELECTRICITY

Mr. F.C. Snow, Committeeman on Water and Lighting, presented the following report to the Town Council last Monday:

"TO THE TOWN COUNCIL:

Report is hereby made that your Committee on Water and Lighting has been negotiating with the Florida Power and Light Company for several months, but finds it impossible to come to any basis of agreement with that Company.

Your committee therefore recommends that the council authorize the preparation of preliminary surveys and reports with a view to the establishment of a Municipal Electric Light and Power Plant, combined with water Pumping Plant and Water supply system.

The Town Council then passed a resolution directing the Town Engineers, Messrs. Huff and Roberts, to proceed with the preparation of preliminary surveys and reports embodying estimates of cost, and preliminary plans of a general nature for the construction of a Municipal Electric Light and Power Plant and also for a Water Pumping Plant and Water Distribution System.

The Council last Monday approved the payment of \$26,186.11 to the Morgan Hill Paving Company for sidewalks laid. \$20,809.14 was paid the same Company a month ago, thus making a total paid for sidewalks of \$46,995.25. The Engineer's estimate, upon which the action of the

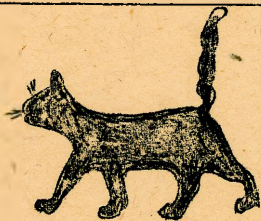

STREET PAVING PETITIONS APPROVED

The Council last Monday approved the street paving petitions and directed the Town Engineers to proceed with the preliminary work. The Council has had this matter under consideration for several months and at the conclusion of the Public Hearing held on June 27th, it was decided to make a thorough investigation for the purpose of learning the wishes of the property owners affected by the proposed improvement. A careful canvas was made and completed last week by means of which it was found that 80% of the resident property owners in town at the present time, are in favor of the street paving. The resident property owners who object to the paving own less than 11% of the total front footage it is said.

The paving of the streets cannot, however, be started until some time in the month of January, according to Mayor Brion.

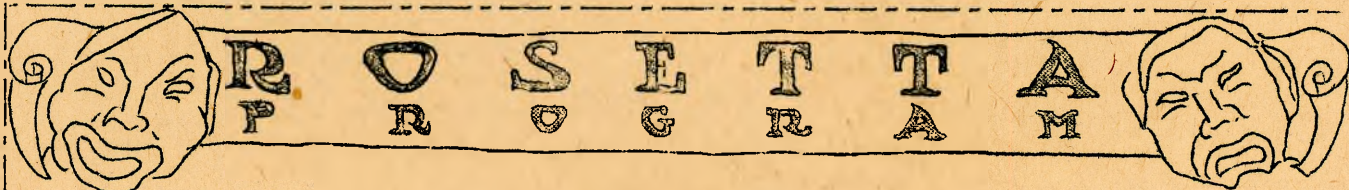
SERIES OF ROBBERIES AROUSE TOWNSPEOPLE

"THE TOAD"

A frog is an amphibian, which means that they breathe through gills and live in water in their early stage, and live on land and breathe through lungs and the skin in the adult stage. The Toad is to be found entirely on the land, and unlike his aquatic brother the frog, who has a smooth mottled skin of green and white, the toad has a rough "wart like" skin of dark brown hue.

His method of locomotion is by means of long jumps. In the north they hibernate during the winter. A long sticky tongue makes it possible for them to easily capture insects and flies.

In size he is about two inches high and four to six long."



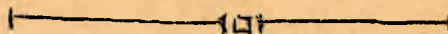
BIRD CONTEST BEGINS

N O T I C ETO THE RESIDENTS OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:


On July 1st, the Town of Miami Shores started free garbage collection service. The success or failure of this service depends entirely upon the residents.

The following rules are to be followed so that this service will be successful.

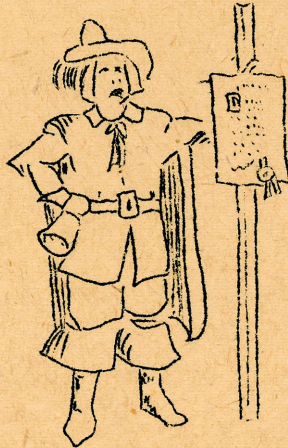
1. Every household must have a receptacle for the collection of garbage. This must be water-tight and fitted with a cover.
2. Garbage containers must be placed in a convenient location so that collectors can reach them easily.
3. All GARBAGE placed in containers must FIRST be DRAINED of all SURPLUS WATER, - then wrapped and tied before being placed in containers. This will do away with disagreeable odors, and also will not attract flies.
4. Tin cans and like refuse should be placed in a box or barrel close by the garbage container so that collectors can remove all refuse at one trip.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 50 OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES PROHIBITS THE BURNING OF GARBAGE, ETC. WITHIN THE TOWN LIMITS.

Let everyone co-operate in this matter and make our Garbage Collection Service a real service to the citizens of our Town.

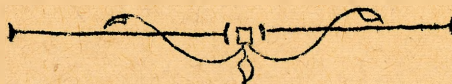

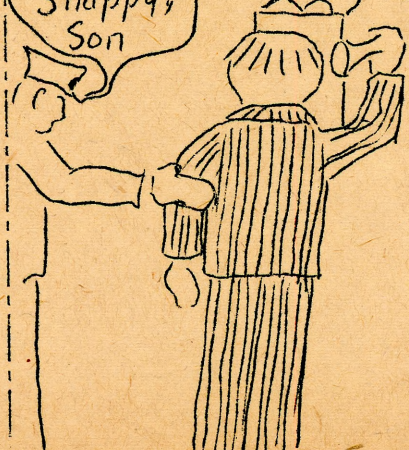

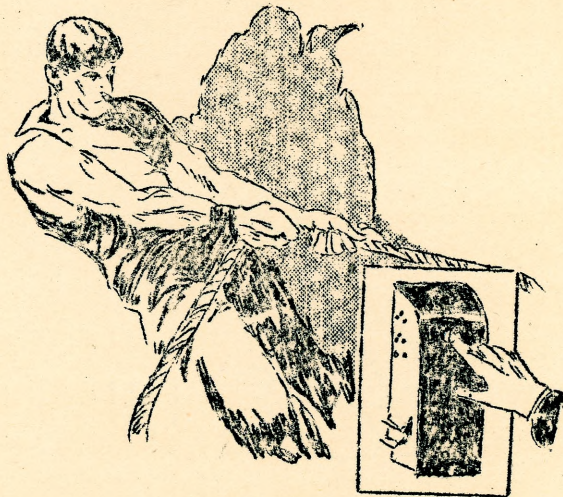
