## WHAT PRICE JUSTICE?

A week ago tonight two men were driving a high speed boat thru the waters of Biscayne Bay, their craft was empty, and they were hurrying to put the boat up for the night that they might return to their homes and families.

Two United States Customs officials concealed behind bushes or shrubbery on the shore ordered them to stop, and it is alleged that before the craft had reached the shore or had a real chance to stop the officials began to fire. The boat was riddled with bullets, one of the occupants was wounded, and the other killed.

The following day the body of Harry S. Booth was found in the waters of the bay, a bullet wound in his head, from which was extracted a bullet that was found to be of the same caliber as that of the guns of the Customs Officials.

Monday afternoon at two o'clock Justice of the Peace Val Cleary of Miami Beach held a preliminary hearing on the case of the two men who had not reported their shooting affair until after they were accused of murder by an eye witness. They each told their story of how "they thought" they saw liquor in the boat, and first thought they shot in the air to frighten the occupants, and then decided that they had shot into the boat to disable it. They contended that the body of Booth could not have drifted to the place where it was found in such a short time, and declared their innocence of murder. Val Cleary evidently believed there was room for doubt and held the men for the Federal Courts.

At the same hour the editor of the "Bulletin" was conducting the funeral service of the victim in the presence of a group of the man's friends - and his wife and two babies. Penniless, with hardly a friend in the world, and another baby to be born in the morning - she asked us this question, "What will I do, where will I go, what will become of my babies?"

It might have been well to have held the hearing immediately after the funeral and compelled the representatives of our government who had shot first and investigated afterward, to have attended that funeral before giving their testimony.

No one in America is more desirous of seeing the Prohibition Laws become a part of the conduct of American people than the editor, but when our representatives, yours and mine, for we are the government, consider themselves beyond the law in the course of their enforcement duties, it is time for us to have a thorough house cleaning in that Department of our Government.

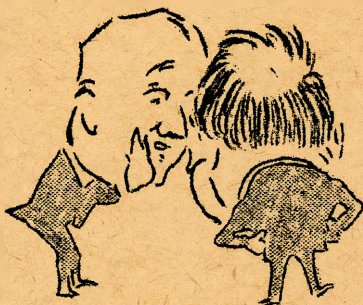
## BOOKS ARE AUDITED

Mucklow and Ford and McCall specialize in municipal accounting and are said to have practised accounting longer than any other firm in the State of Florida.

An audit of the Town books will be made each three months as long as substantial expenditures of Town funds are being made.

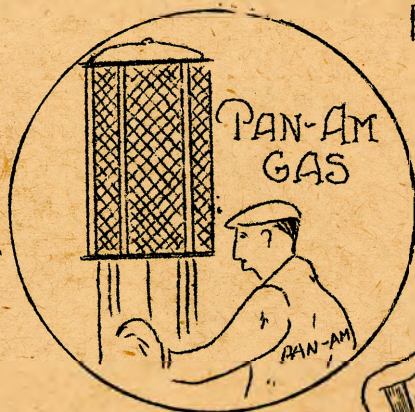

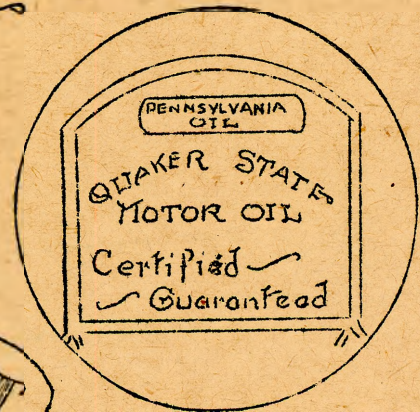

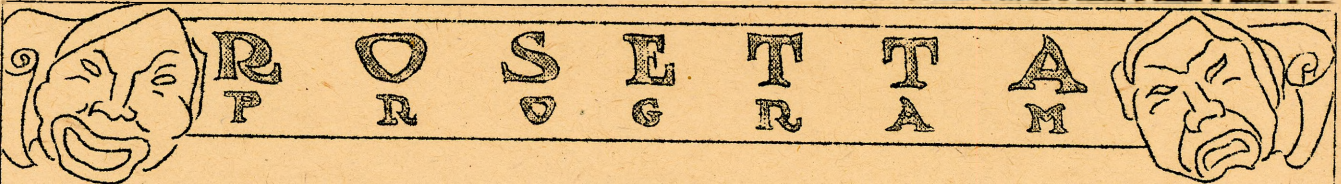

## POLITICAL NEWS

The political announcements in last week's Bulletin have been the subject of much discussion throughout the Town. Practically all of the talk appears to be favorable to the Progressive Party. The consensus of opinion appears to be that the harmony meeting of August fifth was a great step forward, and that the party leaders of both sides are to be congratulated upon their decision to put the welfare of the Town above any private or partisan advantage which they might gain through a political campaign such as that of last year.

The nomination of J.B. Jeffries for Mayor has, in particular, met with the approval of the people. A citizen and resident of Dade County for sixteen years, a record of accomplishment in problems of sidewalk and road construction, water supply and other large projects, eighteen months of tireless and unselfish service upon the Town Council -- all these factors combined to make Mr. Jeffries the outstanding candidate for the highest office in the Town.

Students of statistics point out that in spite of the strong campaign waged against him, Mr. Jeffries last November received one hundred and seventy - seven out of a possible two hundred and eighty votes -- more than sixty three percent of the total. According to all indications, Mr. Jeffries' popularity has greatly increased since last election, and it is predicted that his majority will be much greater this Fall.

It is admitted that there are a few citizens who are **not** in sympathy with the fusion of the two parties. These are said to be of four classes: First, those who are candidates for office, and whose candidacies were not endorsed by the fusion meeting; Second, those who feel slighted at not having received an invitation to attend the meeting of August fifth; Third, there are several citizens who believe that a continuance of the old two-party system would have been more desirable than the merger of the two parties; Fourth, there are other people who honestly and sincerely disapprove of the candidacy of one or more of the men nominated on August the fifth.

Citizens who have declared their opposition to the Progressive Movement or its candidates are said to compose but a very small percentage of the registered voters of the Town, and it is believed that their number will diminish steadily as the time of the election approaches, backers of the ticket declare.

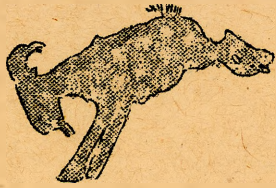

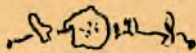
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#### TOWN IMPROVEMENTS PROGRESSING

# The Boy Scout's Campfire

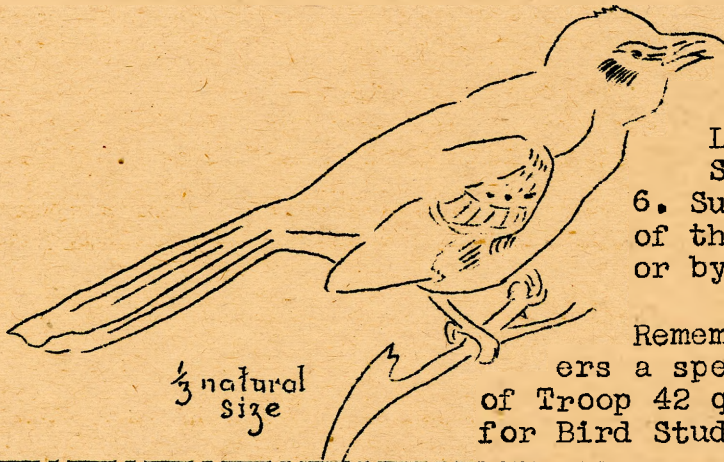
Scouts Eugene Hundley and Phil Nix won the Cash Prize for last week's bird study. Their essay follows:

"The bird in the last issue of the Bulletin is a Loggerhead - Shrike, or commonly known as the Butcher Bird. Its Latin name is *Lanius ludovicianus* (Linnaeus). It is a very common bird and one of the most beneficial birds in Florida, despite the fact that it sometimes destroys and eats small birds, but it overbalances this harm by eating lizards and insects. They lay eggs from February 15th. to May 15th. and rear two or three broods of young in a season. Five to seven eggs are a full setting. The egg is a greyish white, spotted and blotched with light brown and olive."

## CHANGE IN RULES THIS WEEK, SCOUTS!

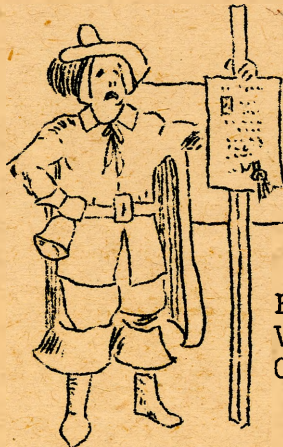

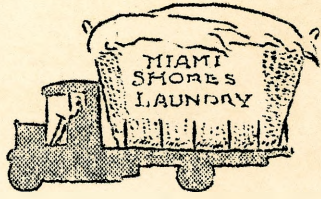
