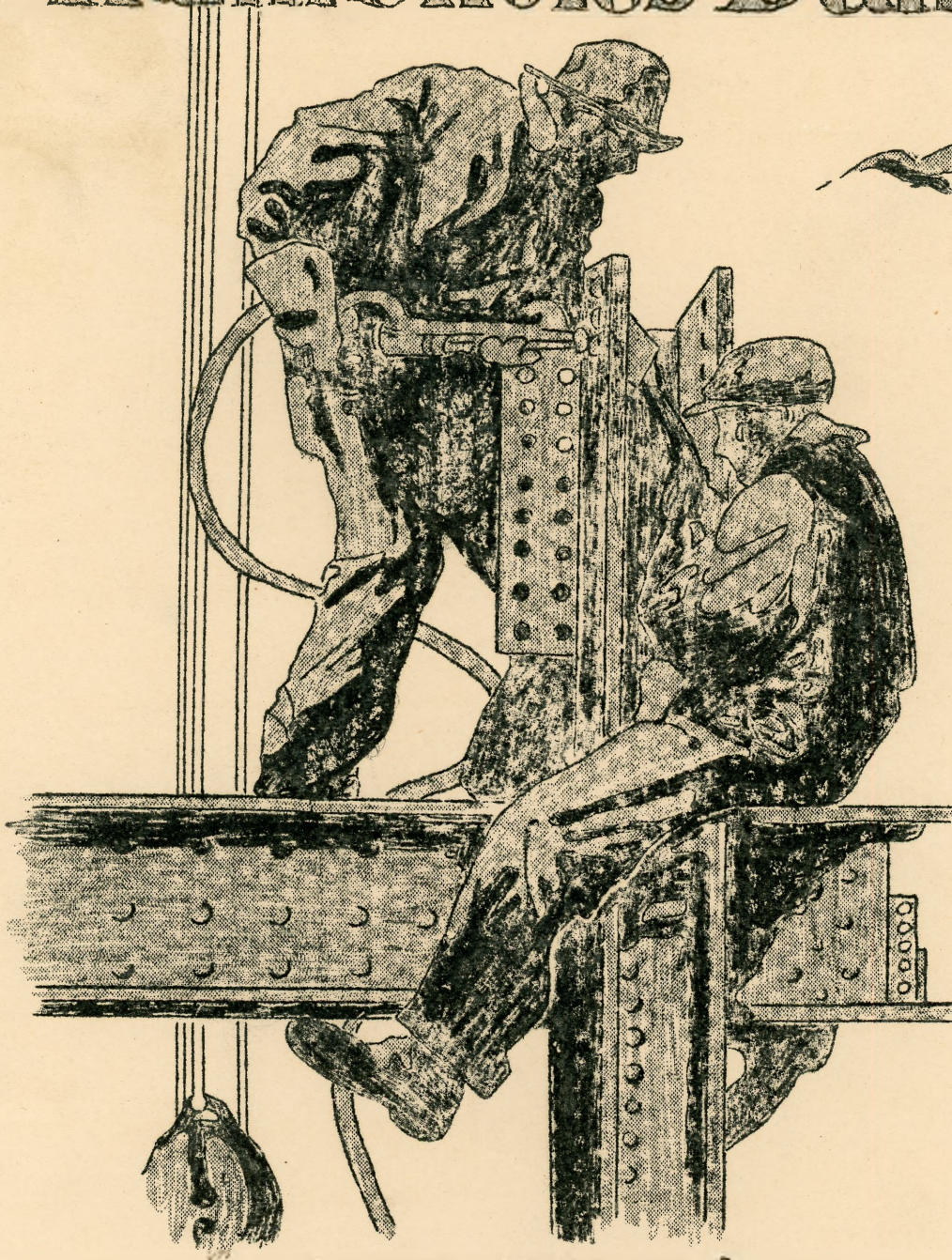

A story is told of an old Italian laborer in the ditches of the City of New York. There radiated from him at all times while wielding his pick and shovel a spirit of cheer that contrasted violently with the sober and often sullen attitude of his fellows. A song on his lips -- a smile in his eyes he labored from morning to night an inspiration to others.

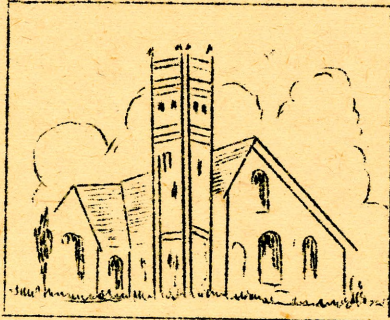

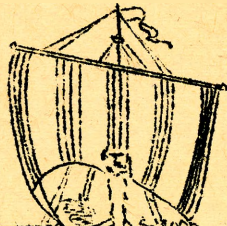

FIRE COMPANY TO CELEBRATE LABOR DAY HERE

Fire Marshall MacDonald announced Thursday that the local Fire Company would sponsor a celebration of Labor Day on Monday afternoon. The first feature of the afternoon will be at two o'clock and will consist of a competitive drill between the two squads of local firemen. After this the picked team of the Company will compete with the Ojus Fire Company for the championship of Northern Dade County. The drill will begin by placing the fire truck in the station, all men at ease at a distance from the truck. At a signal the men leap to their places, drive the truck to the fire hydrant at the Potts Building, connect the hose and turn on the water. Time will be taken from the moment of the first signal until water is obtained at the nozzle. The local boys feel rather sure of winning this event as a new record of One Minute Fourteen Seconds was made by them a few nights ago. The next event will be a water battle between the Ojus and Miami Shores Companies, using the regulation fire hose with five men at each of the nozzles. The closing event of the afternoon will be a ball game at three thirty between the Ojus and Miami Shores teams.

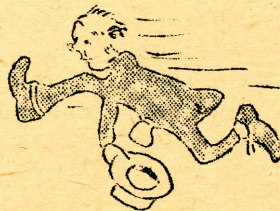

NEW GROCERY STORE OPENED

Announcement was made last night of the opening today of a new grocery and meat market in the building formerly occupied by the Miami Shores Cash Store at Arch Creek. Mr. J.V. Shellhorse, owner of the Cash Store, has removed to the Federal Highway near Lemon City, where he will conduct a retail business in the building formerly occupied by the Triangle Market.

The new store will be known as the Miami Shores Co-Operative Store, and is owned and controlled by the Biscayne Building and Holding Corporation, Inc. It is said that this corporation is now co-operatively owned by the Dairymen of Miami Shores and the section just north of our Community.

The store will be managed by Mr. J.J. Trice, Jr. who stated last night, "We will carry a complete line of fresh merchandise. Groceries and meats will be sold at reasonable prices. Fresh fruits and vegetables will be carried. In other words we will have as up-to-date and complete store and market as may be found in Greater Miami. We most cordially invite the people of Miami Shores to visit us at an early date, and look over our stock of goods. We assure them of courteous and fair treatment, and will be pleased to sell them quality goods at low prices."

Mr. Trice announced that beginning with next week the Miami Shores Co-Operative Store will run an advertisement of week-end specials in the Miami Shores Bulletin.

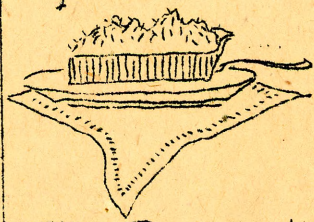

Political Notes

J. B. JEFFRIES

J. B. Jeffries was born in Glidden, Iowa, on August 27th, 1884, and received his early education in the public schools of that Town; later moving to Kansas, and to Omaha, Nebraska. In 1905 attracted by the greatest engineering job in the world's history he went to Panama, first taking a position as stenographer. He remained but a short time in that capacity, however, being quickly promoted from one position to another, and was finally appointed Superintendent of the Department of Labor, Quarters and Subsistence.

He left Panama in 1909 to accept an appointment in Ecuador, South America, with the Guayquil and Quito Railroad. A few months later he was named by the United States Department of Agriculture as the Chief of Maintenance of the Forestry Bureau at San Francisco, Calif.

Finally, in 1910, he came to Miami, where he has remained ever since that time. He soon became interested in the Everglades, and for the past fourteen years has devoted practically his entire time and energies to the buying, developing and selling of Everglades lands.

Upon the organization of the District in 1917, he was elected Chairman of the South Florida Conservancy District (then known as the Palm Beach Drainage and Highway District). He has held this position ever since, being re-elected at the expiration of each term. The District includes some three hundred thousand acres on the south shore of Lake Okeechobee. Through more than sixty thousand acres ditches and canals have been built, and eighteen thousand acres are now diked and pumped, the major portion of which is under actual cultivation. A railroad has been constructed, and a main rock road completed to the center of the property. It is estimated that two thousand five hundred cars of produce will be shipped this winter from the main rail road station, Belle Glade.

Upon the organization of the District three or four squatters around the lake shore comprised the entire population of that vast and fertile district. At the present time there are six settlements, with stores, schools and small hotels, and a permanent population of over

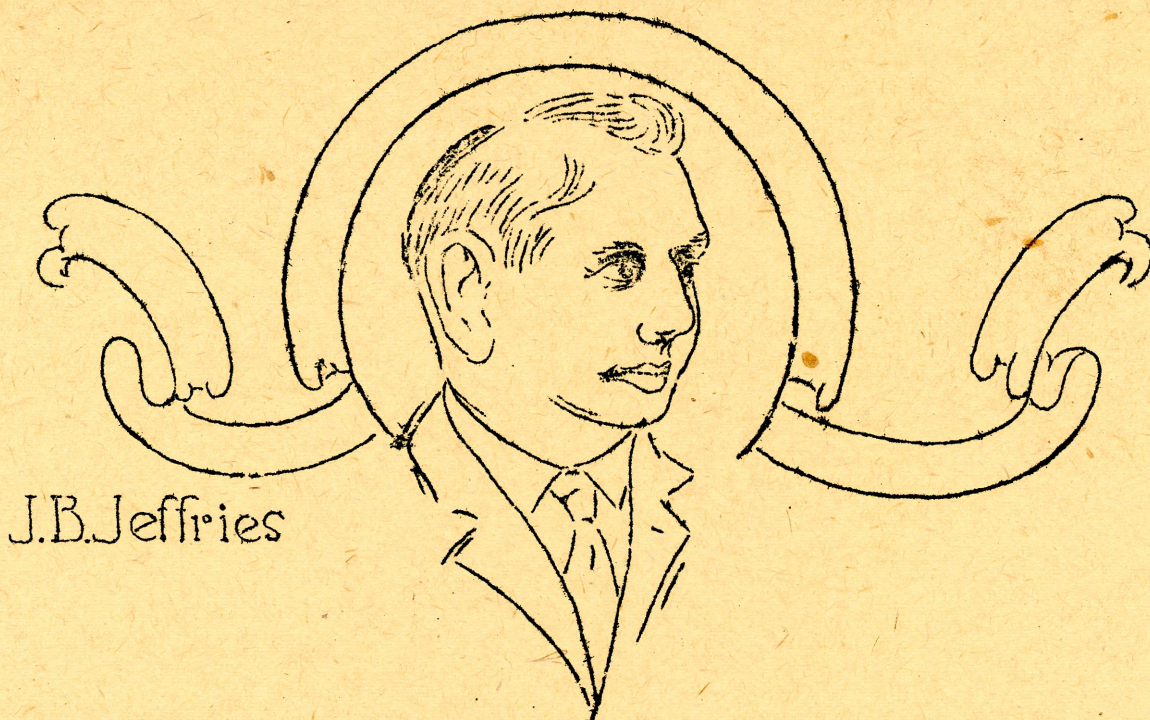

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF J.B.JEFFRIES - CONTINUED



three thousand people. The accomplishments of this district are regarded as noteworthy by all who are familiar with Everglades development work.

Mr. Jeffries was one of the original organizers of the Miami Shores Company and the Shoreland Company, and was in charge of the Sales Department during the entire campaign. The Sales Departments of these companies are said to have made a better record than any other in the State of Florida. In volume of sales made in a given period, it is said that a new world's record was set by this sales force.

Mr. Jeffries was married to Miss Lillian Scullen in Panama in 1908. He is a Methodist in religious profession.

Yesterday Mr. Jeffries was approached by a reporter of the Miami Shores "BULLETIN" and asked for a statement as to his policies if elected Mayor of Miami Shores.

"In the first place", he began, "I wish to emphasize the importance of the home life of the Town. We believe that Miami Shores is one of the most attractive homesites in Florida -- beautiful, well located, and easy of access. Under the capable Mayorships of Messrs. Baker and Brion the Town has been kept clean, making it an ideal place for a home in which to raise a family. We must continue along the same lines in this respect, keeping it clean, a place where home loving people will be glad to live and raise their families. This is of the greatest importance."

"The next in order of importance", he continued, "is the furtherance of our improvement program as rapidly as financing will permit. In all sections of the Town where there is sufficient population to justify it, sidewalks should be laid and streets paved, providing of course, a substantial majority of the property owners approve."

"Furthermore", he said, "the landscaping and beautification policy inaugurated by Mr. Griffing should be carried on by the Town, and extended to all sections. The public highways and parks should be kept mowed and free from weeds and debris, so as to present at all times an attractive appearance."

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH - CONT'D.

"The Town Engineers, the Mayor, and the Council are now engaged in the preparation of plans for a complete waterworks system. I believe it to be a matter of highest importance, and that the work should be carried on with the utmost possible speed, and the building of the pumping plant and the distribution system should be rushed to completion. The present water systems in the Town, under private ownership, are utterly inadequate to take care of even our present needs.

"An adequate system for the Town in the matter of electricity is of equal importance. Rates must be fixed in fairness to the home owner, as well as to enable manufacturers to locate in our Town. Fair power rates will go a long way in enabling us to bring factories here, thus making our community self-sustaining.

"With fair rates for electric current", continued Mr. Jeffries "the comprehensive street lighting program, upon which the Town Council has long been working, can be carried out at a great saving to the tax payers. I am not in favor of committing the Town to the payment of exorbitant rates for thirty years.

"I believe that during the coming year a determined effort should be made to obtain the extension of street car service from Buena Vista to our Town.

"In line with the general retrenchment of all progressive cities and firms in the State, I believe that salaries should be reduced to a figure as low as is consistent with good government. Such reduction is justified by the lower scale of living expenses now current.

"I believe", Mr. Jeffries further stated, "that the policy long adopted by some Cities and Counties, of carrying on extensive public improvements only during boom times or eras of prosperity, and of shutting down completely on such work during periods of depression, is contrary to the recognized principles of political econ-

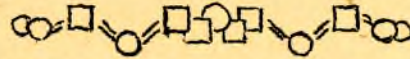

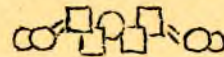

-omy, and that such false doctrines should not be accepted in such a progressive community as ours. On the contrary, I believe that a dull period, such as we are now undergoing, is the very time for proceeding full speed with needed improvements, for two reasons: First, with current market rates for labor and material at a low figure, the improvement can be completed at a much smaller cost, resulting in great saving to the tax-payer, and secondly, employment is thereby given to citizens of the Town at a time when most urgently needed. While I would be firmly opposed, and would not under any circumstances tolerate, the burdening of tax payers for any unnecessary public works merely in order to provide employment, I am firmly convinced that if certain improvement is necessary, it should be carried out at a time when the municipality may obtain labor with the greatest benefit to the Town, as well as to the workers who live there.

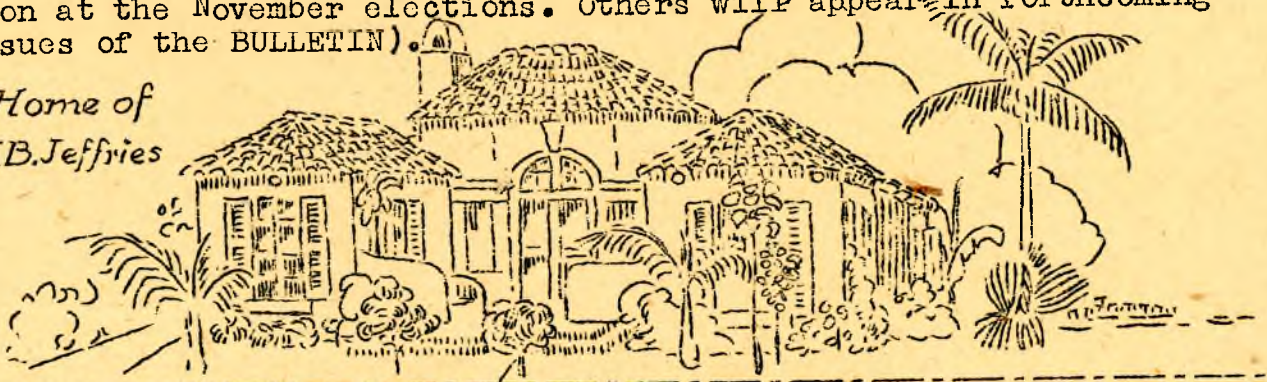
"I do not believe, however, that any improvement should be undertaken which will create any undue burden upon the tax payers. The bonded indebtedness of the Town should not be increased to an amount which may at any time in the future lead to a possibility of a default in the payment of either interest or principal maturing. The financial condition of the Town should always be kept up to the high plane on which it now stands. I would be unalterably opposed to any expenditures not warranted by the financial condition of the Town.

"In conclusion", said Mr. Jeffries, "you may say to your readers that during my year and a half on the Town Council, I have tried at all times to be fair to everyone, and if I should again be honored by your vote, I shall represent all the people of the Town impartially and shall use my best efforts for the upbuilding of the municipality"

BOY SCOUT NEWS - BIRD STUDY CONTEST - FIELD MEET TO BE HELD

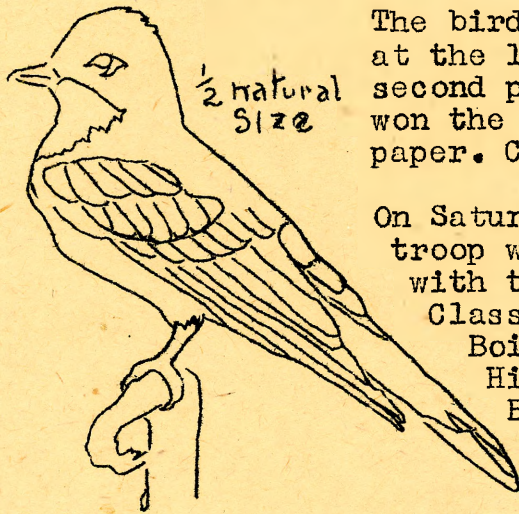
Last week's prize winner in the bird study contest was Senior Patrol Leader Joe Davies. Rev. Crist, who judges these contests, gave Joe a very high rating, and termed his essay as excellent.

"The bird shown in last week's Bulletin is a Meadow Lark. The Latin name is Sturnella Magna. This bird is found in the west as well as the south and east.

The nest is always on the ground, in tall grass or clumps of weeds. The nest itself is of grass. There are usually a few tall stems of grass overhanging the nest for shade, and to hide it from any but a close observer. The eggs are laid once or twice a year and are white or yellowish with light brown spots. Three or four eggs are laid at a time. The meadow lark is a very bright colored bird, but is pretty never-the-less. It's breast is a very bright yellow. There is a "V" shaped mark on its neck which is black. This mark is placed at the base of its throat and is about one half inch wide. It's back is light brown with darker spots all over the back and wings. It's head is marked with several dark brown stripes running lengthwise. The bill is very dark brown and is quite long.

It's eyes are jet black but ringed in red. The fact that this bird does not fly much accounts for its short and stubby tail. It eats grass-hoppers and other insects as well as the seeds of weeds. This shows the meadow lark's usefulness to man.
