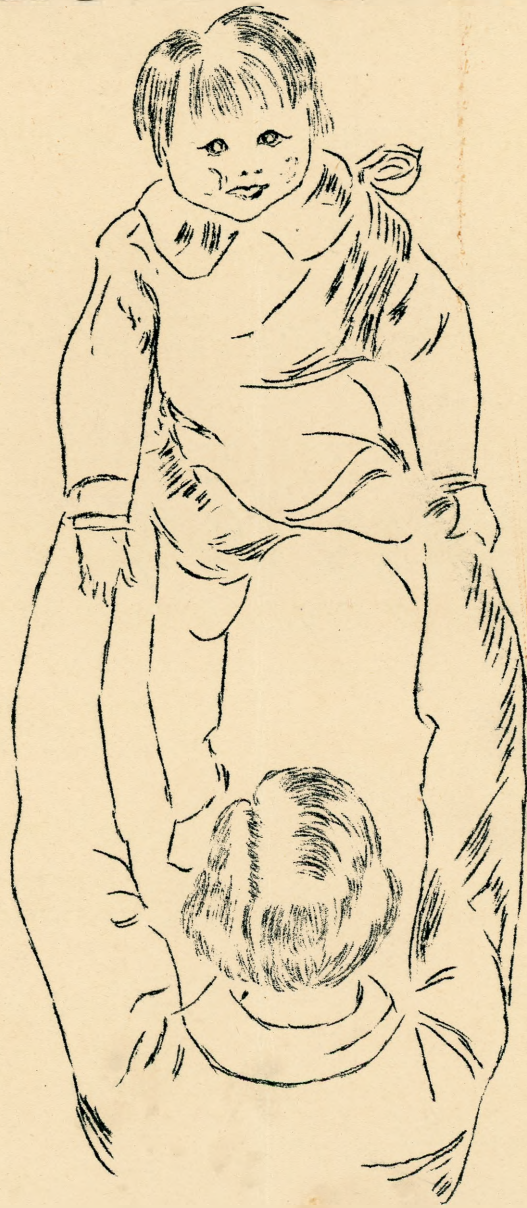
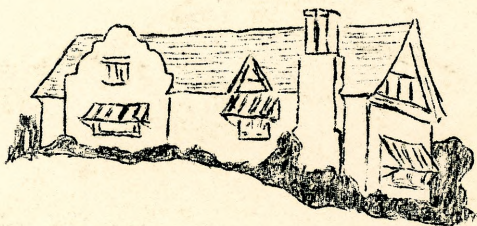

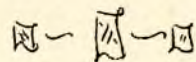

## TWO QUESTIONS

We have no resident doctor, our police and fire departments can only be reached by direct travel to them. We are willing to pay the rates you quote without question. **AND YET WE DO NOT EVEN RECEIVE A PROMISE OF SERVICE!**

If you please, Gentlemen, when can we hear from you?



TO THE DADE COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD:

Several years ago the local school district voted bonds for the erection of the Fulford School and also an addition to our Arch Creek School. The Fulford School was erected, and it was decided to retain the money for the Arch Creek addition until another bond issue could be floated and an additional building be erected here. In due time, some eighteen months ago, this bond issue was voted, and sold at a high figure.

We have several times sent committees to confer with you as to when we could expect the building, and each time we have been put off. We have been exceedingly patient. We were willing to consider the matter of hurricane repairs, which caused you to borrow our funds, as you told our committee; we were willing to concede that you needed to pay teachers with it; but we are now beginning another school year without the slightest promise of a building for our increased needs. We have watched with interest the erection of beautiful buildings elsewhere with money raised after ours; we have seen our children deliberately leave this school to go to some of the others because of lack of equipment here, and kindred reasons, **AND NOW WE ASK YOU, WHEN WILL WE HAVE OUR NEW SCHOOL?**



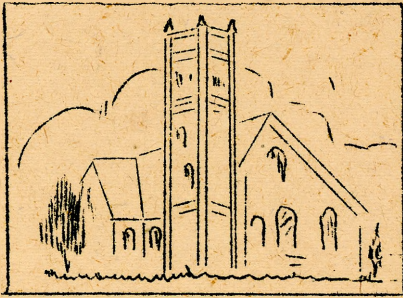

A negro prisoner who recently escaped from the Town Jail was recaptured by Town Marshall MacDonald on last Monday.

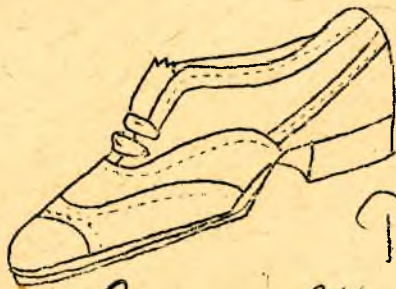
Upon being brought before Judge Brion in Municipal Court, a sentence of sixty days additional imprisonment was imposed.

A check of the number of qualified voters who signed these petitions is being made by Mrs. Brasher.

All three of the above nominees are styled as "Independent" candidates, and predict that in a few days other candidates for the several Town Offices will appear.

It is understood that a well known local contractor was circulating a nominating petition for the office of Mayor on Thursday. If he enters the field he will be the first candidate to oppose the nomination of Mr. J. B. Jeffries, who is the leader of the Harmony ticket.

Mr. L. H. Browning has been solicited by his many friends to enter the race for Town Clerk and Treasurer, but as yet has not announced his candidacy. This would make a three cornered race for the office, the other candidates being R. E. Russey and H. H. Hawthorne, who is the Harmony nominee. The article in last week's Bulletin describing Mr. Hawthorne's qualifications and experience has made him many new friends during the week.

Mr. B. F. Potts, until recently Assistant Marshall, and one of the nominees of the Harmony Ticket for Marshall, announced Thursday that he would not be a candidate for the office in the coming election, as election would require work on a motorcycle. Mr. Potts does not feel that he cares to undertake the work of that type. His many friends will receive the announcement with regret.

This leaves but two candidates in the field for that office, the present Marshall, Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Davison of the Independent Ticket.

It is anticipated that the next two weeks will see several candidates for Town Council announce themselves, and in all probability candidates for several other offices.

Political observers predict an interesting campaign, but all are agreed that there will be no "mud-slinging" to characterize it.

Most everybody by this time has heard the much talked of record "Two Black Crows" and will recall the mention therein of buying pigs at \$4 each in August and selling them in April for \$4 each, and when told that he could not make money that way his answer was, "We found that out!"

My opinion is that our Mayor and Town Councilmen will have a like experience AT OUR EXPENSE, if we permit them to experiment with a Municipal Light Plant.

Let all of us go to the next Council meeting, and then and there express our views and get this idea of a Municipal Light Plant settled.

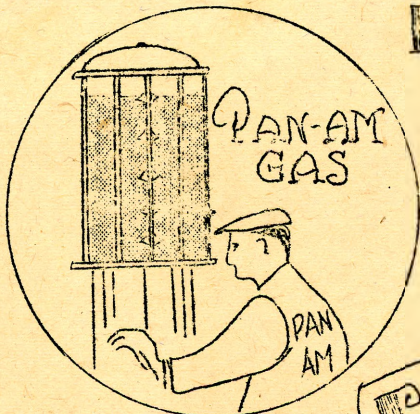

NOTICE OF HEARING ON ELECTRIC LIGHT ORDINANCE

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES :

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held on the third day of October, A.D. 1927, at eight o'clock P.M. in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, Potts Building, Miami Shores, Florida, on the question of the adoption of the following Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE, Declaring it expedient to exercise the authority conferred by Section 1925 of the Revised General Statutes, and determining to issue Electric Light Bonds of the Town of Miami Shores in the amount of \$185,000.00, upon this Ordinance being ratified by the voters; providing for an election for said purpose, and prescribing the date, maturities and interest rate of the bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That it is hereby declared to be expedient for the Town of Miami Shores to exercise the authority conferred by Section 1925 of the Revised General Statutes to construct, establish and maintain a plant for the manufacture and distribution of electricity for furnishing light for municipal use and for the use of such of its inhabitants as may require and pay for same; and the Town Council hereby determines that it is expedient to purchase land and erect thereon a Municipal Electric Light Plant and equip such Plant, and to purchase, erect and install poles and lines for the distribution of electric current.

Section 2. That Electric Light Bonds of the Town of Miami Shores will be issued, pursuant to Section 1928 of the Revised General Statutes, in the amount of One hundred eighty-five thousand dollars, (\$185,000.00), said bonds to be dated January 1st, 1928, to be numbered from one (1) to one hundred eighty-five (185) inclusive, and to mature serially as follows:- \$10,000.00 shall mature on January 1st of each year from 1931 to 1943 inclusive, and \$11,000.00 shall mature on January 1st of each year from 1944 to 1948 inclusive, said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of seven percent (7%) per annum, which interest shall be payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July each year, and both principal and interest shall be made payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness, said bonds to be registerable as to principal.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect after it shall have been passed by a two-thirds (2/3rds) vote of the members of the Town Council at a meeting duly called and held for that purpose, and received the approval of the Mayor, and thereafter have been ratified by a majority of the voters of the Town of Miami Shores voting thereon at the annual municipal election to be held on the 22nd day of November, 1927, and the result of such vote duly declared by the Clerk of the said Town, and recorded in the Minutes of the Town.

Section 4. At said election, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors who are owners of real estate and who shall have paid the taxes thereon for the year when such taxes were last due, and who shall be freeholders in the limits of the incorporated Town of Miami Shores, Florida, the following question :-



LEGAL NOTICE OF HEARING ON AN ORDINANCE AND CONTENTS OF THE ORDINANCE

"Shall the Town of Miami Shores purchase land and erect thereon a Municipal Electric Light Plant and equip said Plant, and purchase, erect, and install poles and lines for the distribution of electric current, and issue bonds in the amount of \$185,000.00 for said purposes, as provided in Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_, duly passed by the Town Council on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of September, A.D.1927? "

Section 5. The Registration Books of the Town of Miami Shores shall be open from 8:30 A.M. until 5:30 P.M. each day at the Town Hall from the first day of October, 1927 to and including the nineteenth day of November, 1927.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall be published once each week for four weeks preceding said election in "The Miami Herald", a newspaper of general circulation published in Dade County, Florida, and also in "The Miami Shores Bulletin".

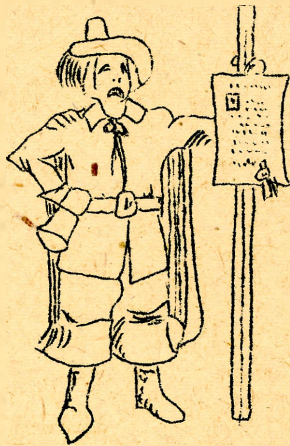

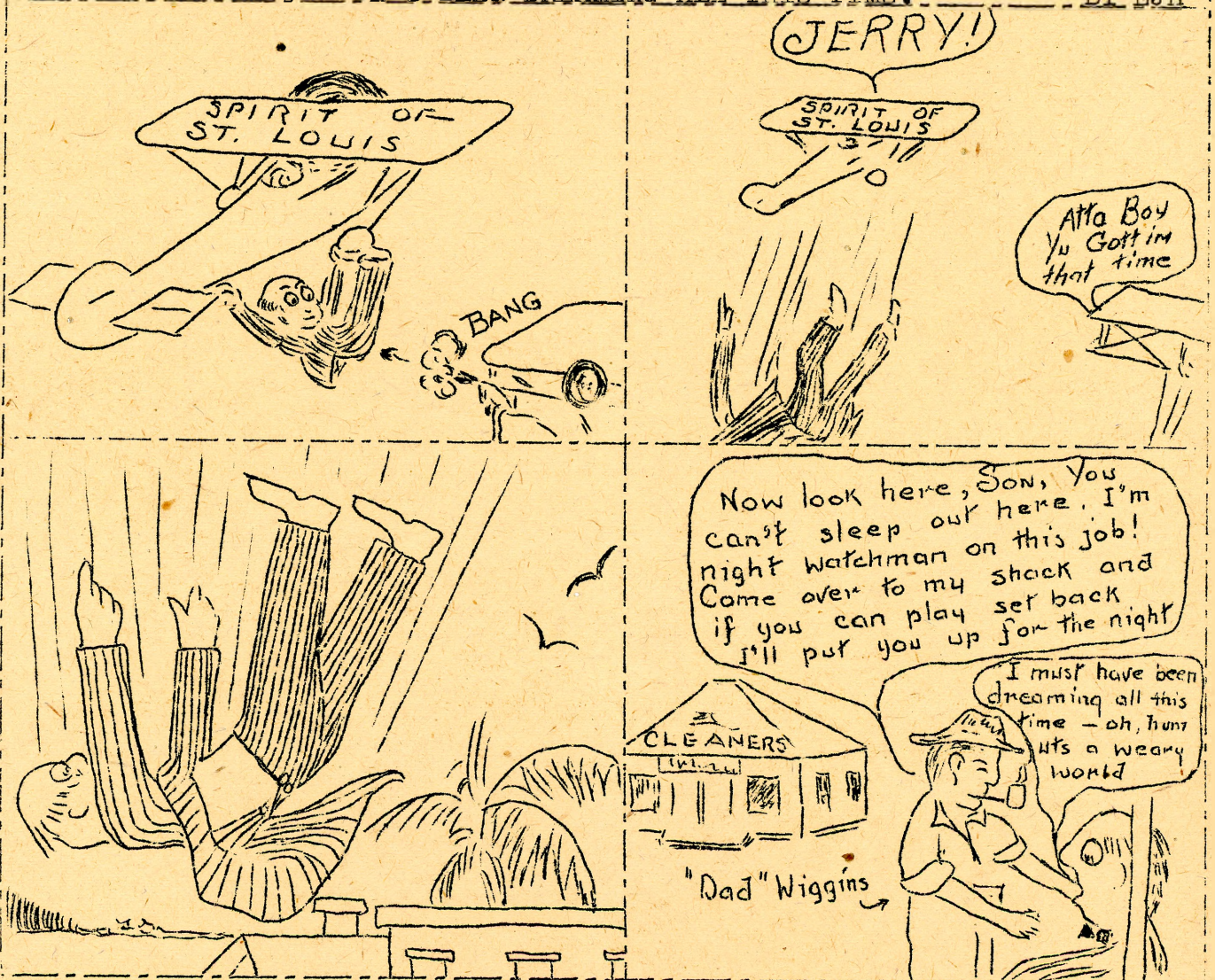
COMING EVENTS

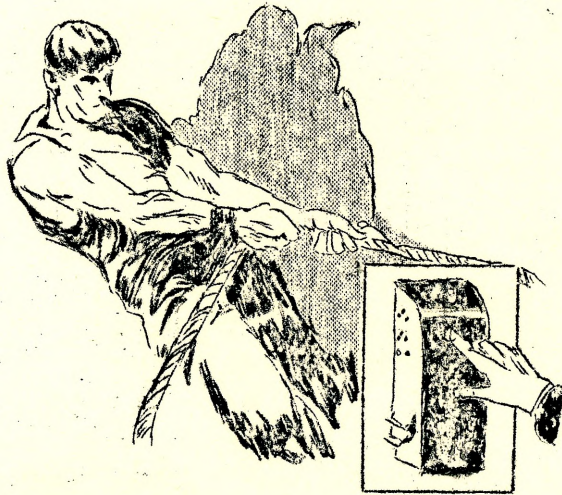

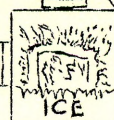
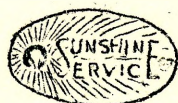
