THE COMING ELECTION

Wednesday will see the close of nominating candidates for the coming General Municipal Election, and then the campaign will settle down in all earnestness for the remaining three weeks of political activity. Candidates are laying their plans, stating their platforms, discussing "issues", and estimating possible votes. The majority of the voters are taking the matter seriously enough, but there are yet over one hundred citizens who should be tremendously interested in the outcome of the election who have not as yet paid their poll tax, and thus qualified for the "divine right of Americans" -- the vote.

No election is unimportant, and this particular one is most certainly one of the most important that will ever face the people of Miami Shores. Our Town is still in its infancy; this is the "formative period" of its life; much that the future will have for us is dependant upon our choice of administrative officers for the present and the next few years.

We want no alibis in the months that follow election based on the failure of all of us to participate in the election - or part of us! IF YOU HAVE NOT PAID YOUR POLL TAX IT IS YOUR DUTY AS A CITIZEN OF THE TOWN, AND YOUR OBLIGATION TO THE FUTURE OF THE COMMUNITY, TO PAY IT BEFORE NINE O'CLOCK TOMORROW NIGHT. LET'S MAKE IT 100%, FOLKS!

OPEN LETTERS

Editor, Miami Shores Bulletin:

I am enclosing to you an excerpt from a letter from Horace J. Byram, Chief of Police of Asbury Park, N.J. which relates to Mr. E.A. Davison's service on the police force of that city. Mr. Davison as you doubtless know is running for Town Marshal of Miami Shores. A part of the letter follows, the rest being of a personal nature:

"Dear Al: I was glad to get your letter a few days ago and to know you are going to run for the office of Chief of Police. I hope you are elected and I know you will make good in that office, and your experience as a police officer while in this city will be of material help to you. Though you were on the force here before myself, I remember what a good officer you made; your record and appearance were excellent. I think the best capture you made was in the case of William Pressure, who had burglarized about ten of the hotels. Of course you had many other important cases and handled them all well, but that one I remember especially. I could go over the books and records and get the dates on the cases which you handled. ----- (Signed) H.L.Byram, Chief of Police "

Mr. Davison is a taxpayer and property owner of Miami Shores, having lived in Biscayne Park for several years, and is well known in the neighborhood for his honesty, integrity, and general ability. Mr. Davison was born in 1879 at Prospect Place, N.J. which is 16 miles south of Trenton. He went through High School at Asbury Park, and later on served in the Department of Public Safety as both officer and later as a detective. It was while he was serving Asbury Park in the capacity of a detective that he made the many captures, among which is the one cited above, where single handed he captured one of the most desperate criminals of that epic in Asbury Park.

Later, having gone into other business in Minneapolis, Minn., he was lured back into the detective work, for which he has always had a great liking, and worked for a private concern, being instrumental in capturing and convicting certain notorious criminals. He is by all means the right type of man for the office of Marshall in our Town; a big hearted fellow, with those qualities which make a successful Marshal.

Miami Shores is indeed fortunate if she can secure the services of such a high type of officer, whose public appearance will

MANY ELABORATE PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR ARMISTICE DAY

From present indications Miami Shores' celebration of Armistice day will outshine any of the other celebrations planned in Greater Miami. The joint committees of the American Legion and the Volunteer Firemen have been working night and day for the past several weeks arranging the many details of this monster event.

The complete program will be announced in the next issue of the "Bulletin", but to give our readers a taste of what is to come we will name a few of the many features of the day: The fire drill will have nearly a dozen fire companies in line with trucks and full equipment, coming from as far distant places as Lake Worth and Homestead. The dedication of the beautiful new Town Hall will be held at eleven o'clock with elaborate services. A great barbecue dinner is to be served at the noon hour, with hundreds of pounds of materials used. The bicycle races under the auspices of the American Amateur Bicycle League will be run in the morning with star riders from several towns in the State present. Prizes for these races include two valuable strap watches, and trophies as well as bicycle equipment. Cups will be given in the Fire drills and the pistol shoot for the police officers from many towns and cities who will be present. In the evening will be the great display of fireworks and the Armistice ball in the auditorium of the new town hall will follow that event.

The committee in charge of the preparations suggests that all the homes and business places be decorated with flags and bunting for the occasion. They hope to have the whole town a riot of flags and decorations. It is also suggested that anyone having more material than needed loan the surplus to the committee at the fire hall.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ELECTION

Despite rainy weather the citizens of Miami Shores turned out in large numbers last Monday to register their desire in relation to the proposed Street Lighting Agreement and Thirty Year Franchise of the Florida Power and Light Company.

149 votes were cast during the day, which is counted an unusually fine number by political authorities.

The Lighting Agreement received 115 favorable votes, while 52 citizens registered negative ballots. The Thirty Year Franchise, however, received only 91 favorable votes to 60 opposed.

Officials of the Light Company expressed themselves as highly gratified at the response of the local people. Administration officials have not as yet made any official statements as to their future course in coming to an agreement with the Company.

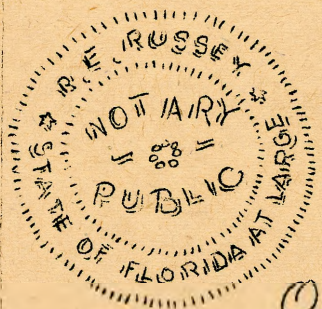
LOCAL SCOUTS TO BE HONORED

INDEPENDENT PARTY ANNOUNCES CANDIDATES


