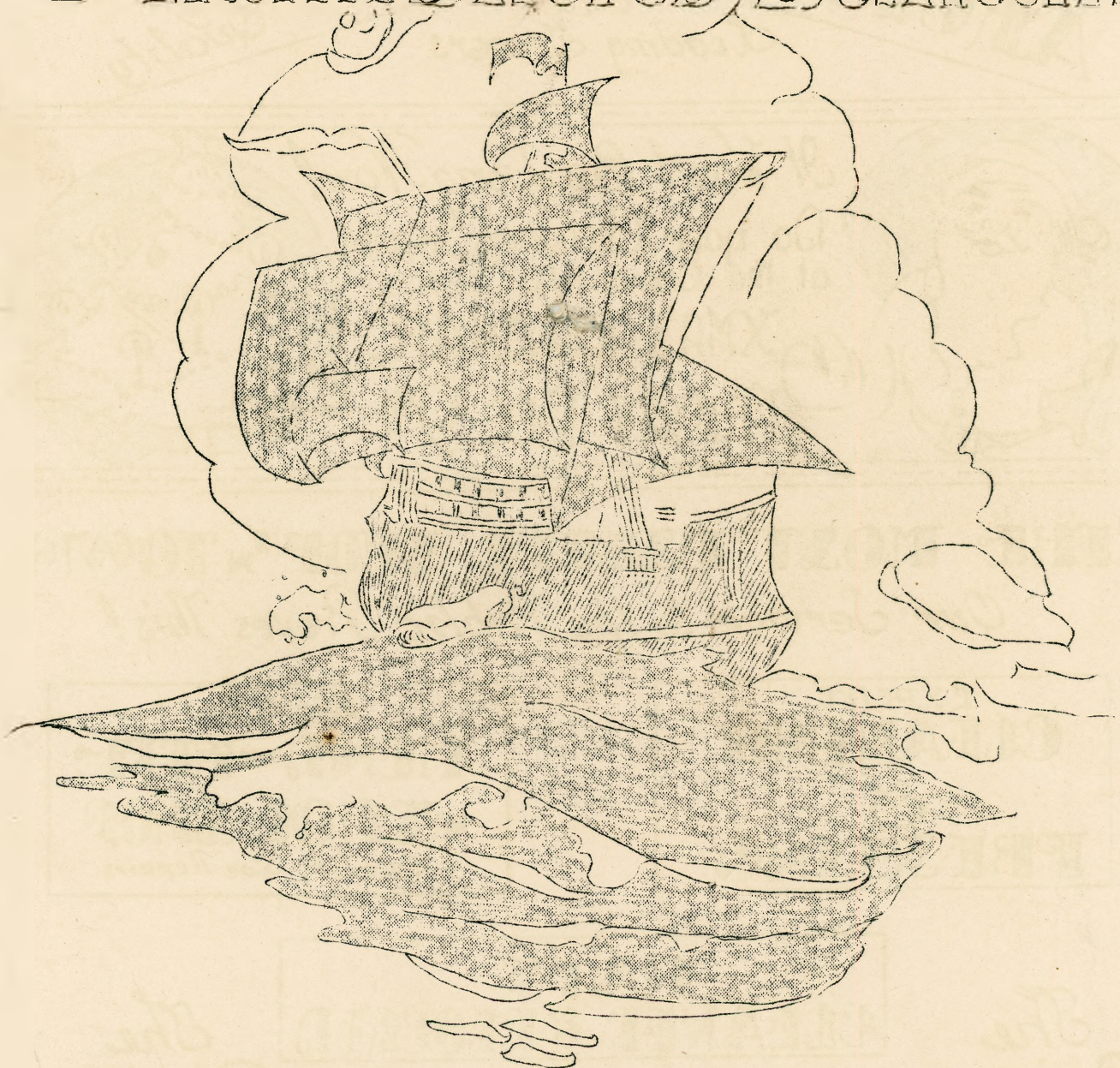

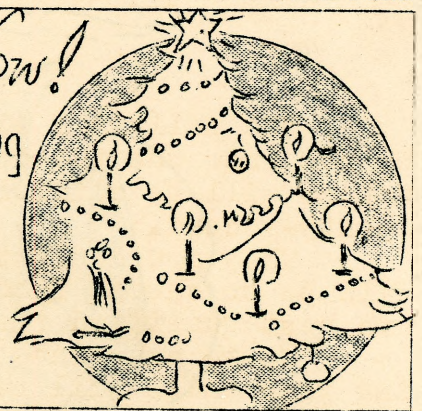

COMMENT

The political situation is growing more interesting each day. We now know who the candidates will be, and approximately how many voters will be eligible to participate in the election on November Twenty-second.

They are a mighty fine group of men, and the task of the voter will be to choose from a number of good citizens the ones he considers best qualified for the several offices.

There are grave situations ahead of the officers for the coming year which will need to be handled by the highest type of citizenship. Undoubtedly much of the future of Miami Shores will depend upon the manner in which these situations are met and handled by the officials we are about to elect. This calls for an equally high type of citizenship at the ballot box. Let us forget personal friendships and animosities, and think primarily of the welfare of the community as we choose our officials. The voter who casts a "spite" ballot, or one governed by blind personal loyalty to a friend or relative in contrast to his own best judgement is not only working a hardship upon the Town, but also upon himself. We have the candidates with almost equal high personal integrity and manhood, let us then choose those who are best fitted for the offices and who will give us the most efficient administration.

There are many citizens of the Town who have paid their poll taxes, who have not as yet registered themselves as voters in the registration books of the Town. We fear that there are some who think they are properly registered who may not be. It would be well for everyone to call at the Town Clerk's office and make sure. The last day for registration will November 17th. Don't put the matter off, go and REGISTER TODAY.

Elaborate plans are being made for the entertainment of these men, who are the principal officers of the Thirteen Masonic Lodges in Dade and Broward counties.

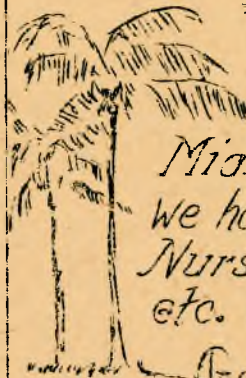

TOWN COUNCIL SIGNS FRANCHISE AND LIGHT AGREEMENT

At a public adjourned meeting of the Town Council held last Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock negotiations were completed with the Florida Power and Light Company, with several concessions being made by that Company in the form of extension of lines to the various parts of the Town not at present served by current. The so-called 30 year Franchise Ordinance carries in it a 5 year cancellation clause that makes it possible for the Town to cancel the entire franchise at the expiration of that time.

The 10 year lighting agreement also carries a 5 year clause, and as one councilman expressed it, "has no strings on it". Within a day after the contract was signed powerful street lights of the bracket type were shining forth on every corner of the Dixie Highway from the Brainage Canal Bridge to the F.E.C. Railway. The lights in other sections of the Town will be installed as rapidly as possible. Location of these is being studied and plans laid. Members of the Council are being congratulated on the successful termination of this dispute.

Political Notes

Wednesday, being the last day for filing of nominating petitions saw a number of last minute candidates enter the field, with the result that political dopsters have had their predictions entirely upset. The race for the office of Mayor was joined by Philip S. Young, well known resident of Eleventh Street, Irons Manor, who is secretary of the Poincianna Corporation, gulf coast developers. Mr. Young has not yet announced his platform. The previously named candidates are J.B. Jeffries of the Harmony Party, and Dana W. Robbins of the Independent Party.

The Town Clerk and Treasurer campaign also has a third entrant. Mr. L.H. Browning of Tenth Terrace has joined H.H. Hawthorne of the Harmony Party and R.B. Russey of the Independents in the race. Mr. Browning is well known in the community as a former employee of the Town in the capacity of Director of Public Welfare and Mosquito Control Director.

Two candidates for the office of Tax Collector were announced as having filed their petitions: Mr. J.A. Mahood the present collector, who represents the Harmony Ticket in the campaign, and Mr. W.E. Graves of Avenue "E", who is the nominee of the Independent Party.

Lawrence C. Molten, recently appointed tax assessor, is the Harmony candidate for that position, while Horace Goodrich, formerly secretary of the Miami City Planning Commission, is the Independent.

Marshal C.A. MacDonald, nominated for re-election by the Harmony Party, will have as his opponent Mr. E.A. Davison, Independent Candidate, formerly of Asbury Park, N.J.

The Town Council race will have eleven candidates, from whom will be chosen four at the coming election. Harmony Party candidates are: W.M. Bennett, pioneer resident of the town; Arthur M. Griffing, developer of Biscayne Park Estates and Kimberly Heights; Homer E. McCrillus of Tenth Terrace; and E.W. Amidon, well known citizen and extensive owner of local property.

The Independent Party announces the following four men: J.H. Bottles of Tenth Street, formerly of Pittsburgh, Penna.; A.T. Burgess, one of the owners of the Arch Creek Bakery; J.W. Duncan, well known citizen and A.H. Wagener, owner of the Wagener Building adjoining the Post Office.

Three unaffiliated candidates have also filed the necessary nominating petitions: Earle Morgan, present president of the Council and well known in civic affairs; W.P. Shappell, the talented architect who designed the Town Hall; and W.L. Lynde, citizen of a number of years in this community.

The campaign manager of the Independent Party issued the following Bulletin Thursday morning:

"Many new faces were in evidence at the meeting of the Independent Candidates last Wednesday evening, and it was one of their largest gatherings. The people have from time to time during the past two months furnished candidates to form this complete ticket composed of residents of Miami Shores, and Wednesday night finding the ticket complete on request of many citizens the Independent candidates were duly made a party to be known as the Independent Party, and the balance of the campaign will be conducted by those same representative citizens for the party.

During the day many rumours were afloat about changes in the political situation but as far as the Independent Party was concerned

affairs progressed as usual and the good substantial organization which they had formed went through the day without change and will go on the ballot as organized. (The personnel of the ticket listed in the campaign bulletin has been given on the preceding page).

It was interesting and pleasing to see a political meeting conducted along constructive lines and ideas brought out that are of interest to the people of the town in place of the usual political talk which some times are made at political meetings, and only tend to mar friendships and cause the public to be disappointed in the candidate."

The Harmony Party issued no bulletin after the filing of the petitions, but leaders of that group expressed themselves as being highly satisfied with the fine group of men running for office. One of the Harmony spokesmen said, "It is indeed gratifying to note that almost without a single exception the men who have announced themselves on the tickets and those who are unaffiliated are men of the highest type, and the Town of Miami Shores will have the opportunity to select its officers from a group of earnest, honest, upright citizens, and not be forced to campaign against unworthy or dishonest candidates. This is entirely in the spirit in which the Harmony Ticket was created."

It is expected that from this time forward each new day will see the campaign waxing warmer. It is the honest wish of the townspeople that all candidates refrain from "personalities" and political tricks, and with the fine type of men represented on the ballot we believe that this will be the case.

BOY SCOUT HUT TO BE BUILT

Earle Morgan, Chairman of the Scout Committee, announced Wednesday that work would start in a few days on the erection of Troop 42's new Scout Hut. Some of the material has been donated through the generosity of the local citizens, and others have volunteered their services in the building of the hut.

The building is to be erected under the supervision of Mr. W.P. Shappell, designer of the Town Hall, and will be approximately 40x40, equipped with lockers for the several patrols, recreation facilities, and one end will contain a huge fireplace for rainy and cold weather. Out-of-doors and one the same wall will be arranged the stone work for the Camp Fire Circle.

It is urged that all citizens who are interested and who will be able to make contributions of money (no matter how small) or labor communicate at once with Earle Morgan, Harding Ave., Miami Shores, or Scoutmaster Earl Henshaw, Eucalyptus Court, Biscayne Park.

MIAMI SHORES TO HAVE LIBRARY

Mayor Brion recommended to the Council last Monday night that they sponsor the creation of a Library Association with the purpose of creation of a Public Library for Miami Shores. His suggestion met with instant and hearty approval and the Council accordingly passed a Resolution calling on the Mayor to appoint a Library Committee of citizens, who are to be the executive leaders of the movement. The Council further resolved to make available the beautiful new auditorium of the Town Hall with its wide wall spaces for this institution.

It understood that a few citizens have been working on this matter for some time and that if advance plans are carried out there will be created in the Town one of the most complete small libraries in the South.

Further information regarding this splendid movement and the names of the committee will be announced in next week's "Bulletin".

Editor, The Bulletin:

I find that I must leave the city to-night on business and have not sufficient time to prepare a letter such as I would like to have published in this week's Bulletin regarding my candidacy for the office of Councilman at the coming local election, but I do want some statement in this week's issue.

Several week's ago, when notified that I had been nominated by the Harmony Ticket, I emphatically declined to run, but my friends in the Harmony party and also other friends who are affiliated with the Independent Party, have been so insistent and have told me that I would be shirking my duty as a citizen by refusing to run, that I finally consented to allow my name to be placed on the ballot.

Therefore, inasmuch as my candidacy is a result of solicitation of friends in both parties, I ask that they exercise their influence with the voters, who have no knowledge as to my qualifications for the office, to see that my candidacy does not suffer as a result of this enforced absence.
