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

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STREET LIGHTING AGREEMENT IMPROVED

Prior to the Special Election on the Electric Light Question there was considerable discussion over Section 6, Article 3 of the 3treet Lighting Agreement. It was said in objection to this clause, that the Street Lighting Agreement would, at the expiration of the five year period, be automatically extended for an additional five years, if the Town should require the Company to install additional street light; within two years prior to the expiration of the five year period providing such additional extensions amounted to twenty percent of the number of street lights served by the Company at the beginning of that two year period.

The Mayor and the Council were successful in their efforts to remove any danger of such an automatic extension by, securing the fellowing letter at the time of granting the Franchise and the execution

of the Street Lighting Agreement:

Honorable Town Council, Town of Miami Shores, Miami Shores, Florida.

Gentlemen:

This letter is in confirmation of our verbal understanding reached at an adjourned regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores, N vember 1st, 1927, at 2:30 P.M., as to the interpretation of Section 6, Article 3 of that certain Street Lighting Agreement entered into concurrently herewith, between you and us.

We interpret this clause to mean that in the event you, as the Consumer under said agreement, exercise your option to cancel said Agreement at the expiration of five (5) years from the date hereof as evided in the first paragraph of Section 6, Article 3 of said agreement that the provisions in the first paragraph of said Section 6 as to be extension of the term of this Agreement in case we are required to install or serve additional street lights at any time, or from time to time within two (2) years prior to the expiration of said Agreement, shall not apply, it being our understanding that such provisions only apply in the event you do not exercise your extion to cancel this agreement at the expiration of five (5) years from November 1st, 1927.

In other words, the first paragraph of said Section 6 as to the extension of the term of said Agreement in case we are required to install or serve additional street lights at any time or from time to time within two (2) years prior to the expiration of said agreement is onlyapplicable during the ninth and tenth year of said agreement, and not applicable during the five (5) year period.

If the foregoing correctly expresses also your interpretation of section 6, Article 3 of said Agreement, kindly so indicate in the space provided below, on a duplicate copy of this Agreement sent you herewith and return same to us for our files.

To the letter is signed the name of Joe Gill, Vice-President of the F.P.& L.Co., Mayor W.P.Brion and Attested by the Town Clerk.

In the month of March 1915, J.W. Wiggins, G.A. Douglass, E.R. Brion, G.D.Fleming, and perhaps one or two others, who were Knights of Pythias, deemed it advisable to organize a Pythian Lodge in Arch Cree After holding several meetings of the citizens of the town, and havin secured twenty-five names on an application for Dispensation it was formally determined to organize. Accordingly, after having sent the apllication to the Grand Lodge of the State, on April 3rd, 1915, a

Dispensation was granted to Booster Lodge Number 132. In due time the Lodge was instituted with the following officers J.W. Wiggins, Past Chancellor; E.C. Patterson, Past Chancellor; W.P. Brion, Past Chancellor; George M. Bennett, Past Chancellor; E.R. Brion, Chancellor Commander; G.A. Douglass, Vice Chancellor; J.W. Wiggins, Prelate; G.D. Fleming, Master of Works; August DeWinkler, Keeper of Records and Seals; A. Slone, Master of Finance; W.P. Douglass, Master of Exhequer; E.C. Patterson, Master at Arms; A.J. DeWinkler, Inner Guard; and C.D.Bolton, Outer Guard.

The new lodge was installed by Bay Biscayne Lodge Number 31, of Miami, Frank Baker, Chancellor Commander, on April 13th, 1915. In honor of this occasion one of the largest chicken dinners ever served in South Florida was given by Booster Lodge to their guests from Bay Bis.

cayne Lodge.

The lodge worked under a dispensation until March 22nd, 1916, when a Charter was granted by the Grand Lodge of the Domain of Florida

The following names may be found upon that charter:

E.R.Brion, J.W.Wiggins, E.C.Patterson, G.D.Fleming, A.Slone, Geo. M. Bennett, W.P.Douglass, A.J.DeWinkler, E.D.V.Burr, D.C.Barber, G.A. Douglass, A. DeWinkler, J.R. Dale, C.D. Bolton, W.P. Brion, and W.M. Bennett. Of this list W.P.Douglass and G.A.Douglass are deceased; seven have transferred to other lodges, and seven remain in the activ membership of the lodge.

From the date the dispensation was granted to the present day Booster Lodge has only twice failed to open lodge because of a lack o quorum. During the World War eleven out of the membership of thirtytwo were in the service. Those who remained at home were so active in promoting the interests of our nation that the Supreme Lodge of the

Nation granted Booster Lodge a certificate for war service.

Altho nearly every member of the Lodge has done much to advance the work of Pythianism in this vicinity, four names stand out as having done a little more than their "bit". These are J.W.Wiggins, W.P. Brion, A.E.Bulger and J.H.Gribble. J.W.Wiggins holds the best record for attendance as well, he having missed only one meeting in all of these years, except when called out of the County.

During the last seven years the lodge has grown from a membership of 32 to 151, and ranks as one of the most agressive lodges in

the Southeast Coast section of the State.

No member of the lodge or citizen of the community has ever appealed to the lodge for help without receiving aid or assistance. The spirit of Friendship which the name of Pythias suggests in its relationship to Damon, has always characterized Booster Lodge and its members. This spirit has made its impress upon the community as a whole and our present town is better for the foundation thus laid.

THE TAX SUITS

"There is no cause for alarm over the recent litigation begun by the Tatum's Ocean Beach Park Company and the Normandy Beach Development Company", said Mayor Brion yesterday at the Town Hall.

The validity of the incorporation of the Town has not been ques-

tioned in either of the suits according to Ar. Brion, nor has the general power of the Town to lovy and collect taxes been denied.


The most that the Beach interests can accomplish through the Court proceedings now pending is a few month's delay in the issuance of tax certificates, stated the Mayor. "There is no danger of the Beach property evading or escaping payment of Town taxes of the Town of Miami Shores", he concluded.

INDEPENDENT PARTY ISSUES BULLETIN

The following Bulletin from the Independent Party headquarters

was issued late Thursday:

"Candidates of the Independent Party held another interesting meeting Wednesday evening in the Weinbrenner Building. All reports received indicate that the political situation continues very favorable to the Independent Party. Candidates expressed regret over the tax muddle, but declined to discuss the question of responsibility at this time. No uneasiness is felt over the flood of new candidates who decided at the eleventh hour to enter the field, for it is believed that all voters of the Town who wish a change in adminstration will realize that no change will ever come about if their votes are scattered among all these candidates. It requires united opposition to overcome any administration. For this reason the Independent Party made every effort to present a ticket that all could agree on. The only possible way to secure a change in Town government is for the voters to give the Independent Party united support, without regard to the personal qualifications or the motives of these new candidates, who cannot be elected and whose candidacies are merely an aid to the present administration. " The above statement has attached to it the names of the several candidates of the Independent Party, but owing to the fact above stated that it is the PARTY not the individual to be voted for, and since the "BULLETIN" has published these names a half dozen times before, we are going to leave them off this time.



The Arch Creek School of District Number 4 has a splendid record of achievment through the many years of its existince, it being one of the oldest schools in Dade County.

The present school building was erected a number of years ago, it being preceeded by a frame structure which has been remodeled and now houses the various activities of the Knights of Pythias and the Pythian Sisters. Miami Shores' present Mayor, W.P.Brion, was the contractor who erected the present building and later built the addition te it. The building contains six rooms and an auditorium, and is suplemented by six of the famous "portables" school rooms, which became necessary during the Boom period of Florida's growth. In one of these is located the school library, and in another the school cafeteria, which is maintained by the Parent-Teachers Association.

Some months ago the School District voted approximately Three Hundred Thousand Dollars in bonds for the erection of a new building here, and for the purchase of plots of ground for future schools in other parts of the District. At the present time there is but one oth er school building in the District, located at Fulford about three

miles north of the local building.

Recently the Dade County School Board authorized the completion of the plans for Miami Shores' new building, and work is to start within the next 60 days on the structure. It will consist of 28 rooms and an auditorium, and will be built in the typical Florida-Spanish style of architecture.

It is anticipated that the new building will not only house the Junior High School, but will also have the Senior High School grades for all of the territory North to the Dade County line. These students at present attend either Miami City High or Lemon City High.

The student body now is 210 pupils of the grammar and Junior High grades. The Primary Department has the following faculty member:

who teach the grades listed:

Mrs. Towles, 1st; Miss Hamilton, 2nd and 3rd; Mrs. Jones, 3rd,

4th and-5th; and Mrs. Lott, 5th and 6th.

The Junior High teachers are: Mrs. Edgar Lane, Mrs. David C.

Orth, Mr. Holton, and Principal Wagner.

Under the leadership of Principal Wagner sight reading tests have become a popular part of the school curriculum, and together with the Wilson language error test, has repeatedly shown that the local teachers are accomplishing excellent results in these branches

The Junior High students have several clubs, one of the most popular being the Journalism Club, founded by Professor Lane at the opening of the present school year. The Club has student officers and is under the supervision of a member of the faculty. From week to week the school news is prepared by assignment among the members of this organization and is printed in the "Bulletin". The following contributions were received this week:

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
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Doy Scouls

During the month of December last year, the local school faculty under the leadership of Princips Wagner, sponsored a Father and Son Banquet at the Arch Creek School. Every seat was taken, and every father and every son ate the well prepared dinner with a heartiness that revealed the eternal boy in man! Dr. R.N. Merrill made the address of the evening, and at the close of his inspiring speech, the toastmaster, Mr. Earle Morgan, called on a number of parents for

short addresses. Spontaneously there arose a demand in those sppeches for a troop of Scouts in Miami Shores, Mr. Philip S. Young striking the keynote, and a number of others joining in. Mr. Earl Henshaw, who had been the Scoutmaster of old Arch Creek Troop # 1 some years previously, was called upon and outlined not only the possibilities of Scouting in Miami Shores, but also the difficulties to be overcome. In a comparatively few days the Town Council agreed to sponsor the new troop, and a troop committee was formed with the following members: Earle Morgan, Chairman, W.A. Riddle, P.S. Young and Homer E. McCrillus. Mr. Earle Henshaw was named the Scoutmaster, and Robert Woods and Don Henshaw, Assistant Scoutmasters.

At a meeting held some three or four weeks after the organization of the Troop, which had been numbered by the Dade County Council Number 42, Scout Executive Norsk of Miami presented the Troop Charter to Mayor W.P.Brion, who in turn delivered it to the Troop. At this time the boys demonstrated their progress in Scouting and earned high

praise from the visiting Scout authorities.

Probably no troop in the history of South Florida Scouting has made such rapid advance as Troop 42. Less than a year old the troop

is today near the top rating in efficiency and advancement.

Last week Friday found the troop in full force at the Central School Auditorium in Miami for the Fall Awarding Court of Honor, at which time Scout Wilbur Dale of Troop 42 received the highest award in Scouting the Eagle Badge. In addition to Dale's splendid record there are no less than three other Scouts who will attain that rank early in 1928.

Under the vigorous leadership of the Troop Committee, augmented during the year by the addition of Prof. Edgar Lane and W.F. Hamil-



ton, plans were made for the erection of a Scout Hut on a one acre tract of land loaned by the Dade County School Board. The building will contain approximately 900 feet of floor space, and will be completely equipped to care for every present need of the Troop. One of the feat ures will be a great stone fireplace at one end of the Hut to be used on rainy and cold evenings. Outside will be a typical Scout Council Ring with open air fireplace for evening pow-wows.

The troop is in a presperous financial condition, having all of its bills paid in full, and a substantial balance in the treasury. It has paid its annual assessment for the support of Camp Pine Island on The Indian Reservation in the Everglades, and twice the troop has made se of the Camp for week end camping expeditions. Camp Pine Island is quipped with 16 large sleeping huts; mess hall and kitchen for 100 ocys; headquarters building; hospital hut; latrines, showers, and a

75 foot swimming pool.

The Troop at present consists of the following Scouts: Scoutmaster, Earl J. Henshaw; Assistant Scoutmaster, George Rexford and Don Henshaw; Junior Assistant Scoutmaster, Eagle Scout Dale. The Senior Patrol Leader is Joe Davies and George Rexford acts as Scribe.

The Scout Committee is considering plans for another such benquet as gave birth to the Scouting idea a year ago. To-morrow night, Saturday, the monthly Examining Court of Honor of the Live Oak District, will meet in the Auditorium of the New Town Hall, with Deputy Scout Commissioner D.G. Henshaw presiding. At this time the Scouts of Lemon City. Little River and Miami Shores will be examined in the reveral branches of Scouting and a number of Scouts will be reviewed in their examinations for merit badges. The officials of the Troop, nd the Scouts are urging everyone to attend as it is a public funcion. Those who have never attended a Court of Honor will have a revlation as to the ability and enthusiasm of the local Scouts.
