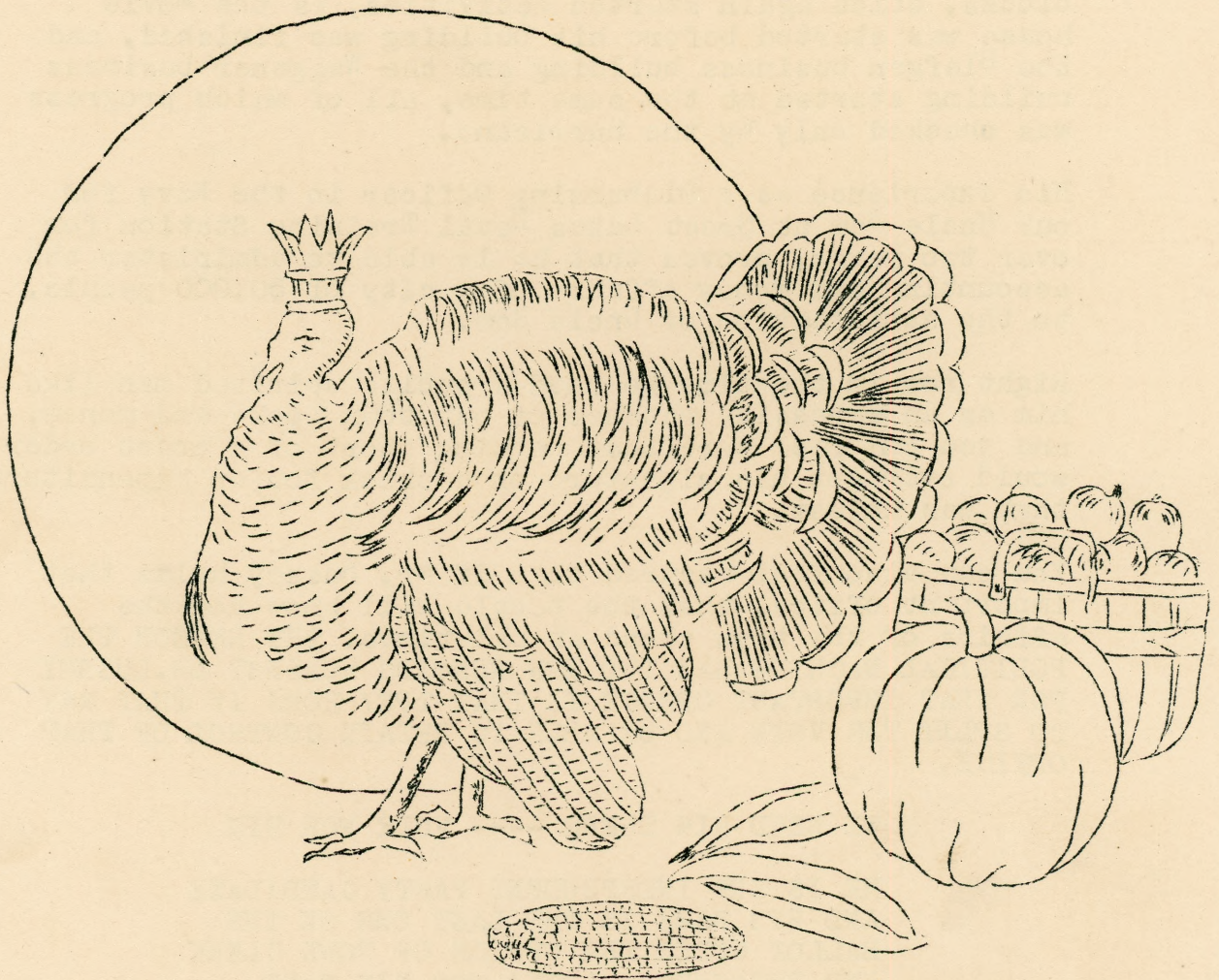

The following regulations with reference to the Municipal Building were promulgated yesterday at the Town Hall by Mayor W.P.Brion:

1. The Town Hall telephones may be used only by the Town officers, upon official business.
2. The Town Hall is for the Municipal Business of the Town; it is not a Club House, and all social calls are prohibited.
3. All organizations wishing to apply for use of the auditorium will see Councilman F.D.Snow, Trustee of the building, who has been authorized to prescribe and enforce rules and regulations for the use of the building. The auditorium shall be left in the same condition in which it was found.
6. The Police Department Quarters cannot be used by any organizations.



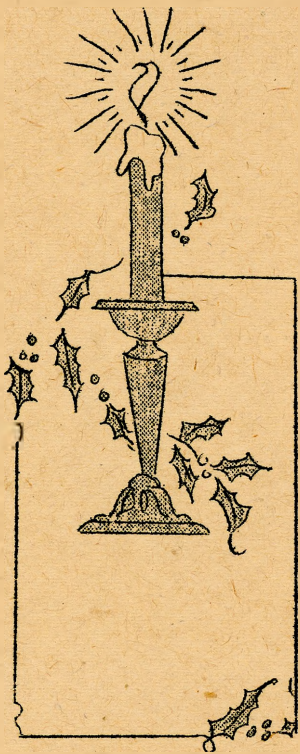

TROOP 42, B.S.A.

Troop 42, Boy Scouts of America, under the leadership of Scoutmaster Earl Henshaw, will leave late this afternoon for Camp Pine Island on the Indian Reservation in the Everglades west of Davie. This will be the third time that the troop has visited the Dade County Scout Camp during 1927, and it is anticipated that this trip, extending over the week end, will be filled with intense activity as have the past camps been.

The Scoutmaster will be assisted by W.P. Shappell and Fritz Chase during the trip in addition to the regular staff of Boy Scout troop officers.

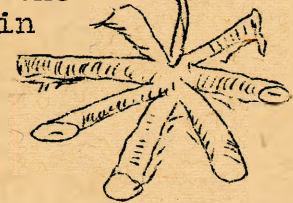
About twenty-five boys will make the trip, or about three-fourths of the troop. While at camp the Scouts expect to hear more of the famous stories of "Uncle Joe" Quick the Camp Custodian, who is a popular figure at every camp fire.

Study classes in the several branches of Scouting will be held and examinations passed on a number of subjects. "Dad" Wiggins, who has accompanied the Troop on all of its expeditions will be in charge of the Mess House, and will also serve as Nature Study instructor.

Camp Pine Island comprises some fifty acres in the heart of the Indian Reservation in the Everglades, and is located on the highest point of land in that particular section of the 'glades. Sixteen buildings, of which the majority are sleeping quarters fitted out with steel cots and mattresses, are placed in street formation on the Camp grounds. Latrines, shower baths, a Mess Hall, a Hospital Building, a Power House, and a Headquarters Building comprise the other equipment of the Camp. A seventy-five foot swimming pool is one of the most popular features of the Camp, and will be the scene of water polo, follow the leader, and many other swimming activities during the Camp.

Several of the Scouts are rapidly completing the necessary tests for Eagle Scout rank, the highest in Scouting, and it will be but a few months until Wilbur Dale will have company in that rank, now held alone in Miami Shores by himself.

Announcement will be made in a few days of the next Examining Court of Honor.
