## HOW WILL YOU VOTE?

No, we do not care to know the names of the men you have selected to vote for on next Tuesday; nor do we care to know what party you are particularly partial to, if any. The question we want to ask of every voter in the Town of Miami Shores is: "Are you voting for a man because you dislike another one, despite his qualifications? Are you voting for a man because someone else in his party is a friend of yours, or has announced a platform that appeals to you? Are you voting for a man because of his religion? Are you voting for a man because of the location of his home?"

If you are, you have not deeply considered your obligation as a citizen or the issues at stake in this election. Let us go over the matter a bit, and see if we can find the true issues in the campaign. In another section of this issue you will find a multitude of open letters, representing every party and every angle of thought. On a casual reading you will not get at the matter at all, and will be all the more confused, but if you and I will analyze those letters we will find the real issues. Read them at least twice - three times will be better!

The office of Mayor carries with it no power to "run the town" as some would have us believe. He is the chief executive of the Town, it is true, but with extremely limited powers. He has no legislative powers save that of veto, and then the council can pass any piece of legislation over his veto. He makes no appointments without the concurrence of the Council. He cannot cause any changes in Council procedure. He cannot order them to do certain things. He is a police court judge, and an executive of legislation enacted by the Council. His leadership depends upon his personality, and his ability to show the Council the logic of anything he has in mind for the Town.

The Marshal is the police and fire chief of the Town. He must be a clean, honest, efficient man. He is amenable to the Council and the Mayor of the Town.

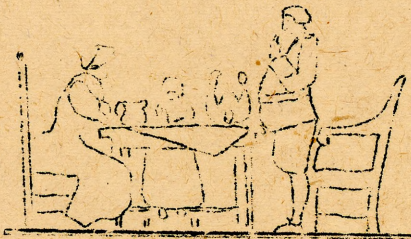
The Town Clerk and Treasurer is the hired bookkeeper of the Town only. He has nothing to do with legislation. He will have an opportunity to represent the Town to visitors at the Town Hall. This same story applies to the Tax Collector. The tax assessor must be HONEST.

THE COUNCIL HAS ALMOST THE ENTIRE WORK OF THE GOVERNMENT ON THEIR SHOULDERS - THEY WILL DETERMINE OUR FUTURE NO MATTER WHO WE ELECT TO THE OTHER OFFICES. HERE IS THE IMPORTANT SPOT ON THE BALLOT.

Friends, let us vote for individuals for specific offices for which they are qualified, and leave parties, personal prejudices and animosities out of this election.

# School Page

The Miami Shores Parent Teachers Association held an Executive Meeting at the School Monday at 3 P.M. The first topic of discussion was play ground equipment. There were varied opinions as to what was most needed and best suited to meet the requirements of the various grades, and it was finally decided to leave the discussion of the entire matter with the present Playgrounds Committee, of which Principal Carl Wagner is chairman, with the assistance of three mothers. Mrs. Wm. Griffiths was appointed to represent the Primary Grades, Mrs. W.L. Lynde the Intermediate, and Mrs. J.E. Marcoux the Junior High. They agreed to hold the first joint meeting the following morning at eight-thirty.

Reduction of the membership from One Dollar to Fifty Cents was discussed. It was deemed advisable to bring the matter before the next regular meeting, the first Wednesday in December. The Board decided to hold the tea and reception to the teachers on Wednesday, the twenty-third, immediately following the program which the pupils of the school are giving on that afternoon. Their entertainment will consist of readings, addresses, monologues, short plays and an operetta. They will charge a small admission fee to help increase the school library fund. On Friday evening the Twenty-fifth at eight o'clock the P.T.A. will sponsor a card party in the Auditorium of the new Town Hall. The Ways and Means Committee of which Mrs. L.H. Browning is chairman has the affair in charge. There will be tables for bridge, Five Hundred, and Michigan. There will be a prize for each table and refreshments will be served. The admission charge will be fifty cents.

A "Courtesy Contest" is in progress at the School. There are fifteen pupil contestants, and the three finals will compete Wednesday at Chapel. Principal Carl Wagner is conducting a language error test from the third grade and up through the Junior High. In the first and second grades he is using the "Detroit Word Recognition Test". The efforts of Mr. Wagner with these methods are meeting with the hearty approval of the mothers.

The Dramatic Club of the Junior High School is putting on two plays Friday the 18th. (To-night) at eight o'clock, entitled, "The Triumph of Pauline" and "The Man Under the Bed". Ten cents is the admission charge for children, and twenty-five cents for adults. The proceeds are to help the Athletic Association towards the raising of a \$300 fund. Candy and pop corn will be sold during the evening, and all of the people of the community are urged to attend.

To the Editor of the Miami Shores Bulletin:

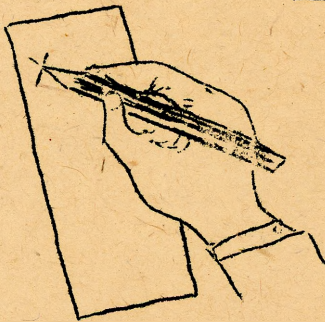
The letter of Mr. D.F. Baker in your issue of November 11th has released me, I believe, from any obligation to withhold from the public of the Town of Miami Shores a frank statement in regard to what has been, to me, the only unpleasant incident connected with the recent campaign and about which I have been questioned repeatedly. Fortunately I can do this without raising any question as to Mr. Baker's veracity, for a careful reading of his letter shows that while he seems to deny that he has "attempted to persuade candidates to announce themselves", he actually does not do so at all. He "emphatically denies" that he has promised to support them after they do announce themselves. This is quite another matter and we may readily accept Mr. Baker's statement in regard to it. He was one of the promoters of the "Harmony" ticket and very effusively endorsed it at the time. It goes without saying that he would do nothing to injure its chances at the polls.

The facts as to the incident mentioned above are as follows. On the day previous to the last day for filing nominations for Town offices I received an invitation - if that is the proper term - to attend a "conference" with Messrs. Baker and Riddle of the Baker-Riddle Co. in an office down town in Miami. As to what was to be discussed at this meeting I have only indirect information and it is of no consequence whatever. Therefore I will only say that these gentlemen apparently thought they had sufficient control over the "Harmony" ticket to bring about the withdrawal of certain candidates. Of course I do not think for a minute that they had any such power. They also had the effrontery to assume that they could acquire, in some way, the same influence over the Independent Party Ticket. That was a mistake on their part.

I declined to go to this "conference" or to have anything to do with such a proposition. I saw Mr. Russey and requested him to go to Miami and so advise these gentlemen. Mr. Russey did this in the presence of Mr. Baker, Mr. Riddle and Mr. Young.

As everyone knows, there was great activity in filing nominating petitions the following day. Third candidates were put in the field against Mr. Russey and myself as well as a number of new names for councilmen. As to these candidates I wish to make my position clear. They certainly have as much right to run for office as has any one. They may be very well qualified for the offices. Some of them may have no connection with the facts related above. They may be influenced by the best of motives, but whether they are or not, the result of their candidacies is the same - aid to the "Harmony" ticket.

the cause for Riddle's recent scurrilous attack upon me. I faultly refused to follow his wishes in a matter of considerable importance to the people of this Town. I knew and realized at the time that I was thereby incurring Riddle's bitter and lasting hatred, but I was not then, and am not now, nor have I ever been, under obligation to Riddle or to any other politician.

I am not a candidate for any office, either elective or appointive, but I am proud to remain a citizen of the Town of Miami Shores, and as a private citizen I shall continue to work in whatever small way I may be able, for the highest interests of the people of this Town. Miami Shores has twice, by large majorities, honored me with elective office, and I shall never fail to appreciate the confidence thus reposed in me by the people.

As to Riddle's charge that I am a past master of politics, and that I distribute "corral dust", I can best answer as did Mark Twain, when, on returning from a long voyage, he was shown newspaper headlines announcing that he had died. "The reports are grossly exaggerated", he said.

I do not profess to be able to control, "swing", or "deliver" any vote other than my own, but on the eve of this important election I feel that I would not be doing my full duty to the people who have twice honored me, if I did not sound a note of warning against the insidious menace of Riddleism, whose tentacles are even now stretching towards the Town Hall.

During the remaining few days of this campaign, Riddle may be expected to be particularly active, in a desperate endeavor to cause one or more of the winning candidates to feel under some obligation to him, for in this way he hopes to gain control of the Town Government for the coming year. He dares not run for the office of Councilman himself, or for any other office, for he well knows that no candidate would receive fewer votes than he. Nevertheless he still has the audacity to believe that he can manipulate things so cleverly that the officers elected next Tuesday by the people of Miami Shores will be subject to his domination, and will carry out his orders. But I believe I know the people of this Town well enough to be sure that they will not elect to public office any candidate who is in any way, directly or indirectly, tainted with Riddleism. No community as progressive as this will ever submit to boss rule.

I do not mean, however, by this letter to cast any reflections upon any candidate who may be so unfortunate as to be the unwilling recipient of an unsought last-minute Riddle endorsement.

Editor, Miami Shores Bulletin and Citizens of Miami Shores:

We take this opportunity to call to the attention of our fellow citizens a few facts with reference to the candidacy for re-election to the office of Councilman, of Mr. Earle Morgan.

Mr. Morgan has been a resident and citizen of our community for nearly nine years. He is a graduate of Harvard University, having received the degree of Bachelor of Science in civil engineering in the class of 1909.

Shortly after graduation he was appointed to a position in the U.S.Engineering Forces and served on the Panama Canal. Upon returning to the States he engaged in the contracting and building business and has been exceptionally successful in this field, having established an enviable reputation for keen business acumen.

Mr. Morgan served as an army officer in the World War and holds at the present time a commission as captain in the U.S. Officers Reserve Corps. He is a 32nd degree Mason, a member of Mahi Temple Shrine of Miami, Booster Lodge Knights of Pythias of Miami Shores, and is a charter member and member of the executive committee of the Miami Shores American Legion Post No. 67. He is a leader in the Boy Scout work and Chairman of the Council of the Live Oak Division, and has always taken an active part in school work. As a civic leader, Mr.Morgan has no superior in this community.

He was the man who took the most active part in the original incorporation of this town. As Chairman of the Committee on Incorporation, it was he who did the greater part of the work in preparing the original notices, determining the proposed boundaries of the Town, arranging for the incorporation meeting, insuring that a sufficient number of qualified electors were present, and taking care of the innumerable other important details connected with the birth of the municipality. That he did this work well no one can deny. In spite of the fact that the Town Government has had many powerful enemies, both within and without the corporate limits, no attack has ever been made upon the legality of the Town's incorporation, though hostile interests have repeatedly made every effort to discover some flaw upon which the attack might be based. If, Mr. Morgan while acting as Chairman of the incorporation meeting, had made any mistake in the conduct of that meeting, the Town of Miami Shores would have been dissolved by Court decree, as has been done with so many alleged Towns. Had his work not been perfect, we would have been without police and fire protection. There would be no Town Hall and no sidewalks; no fire truck and no fire wells. Times have been hard this summer, but how much harder they would have been had it not been for the stimulus afforded by the necessary municipal improvements recently completed! The community would have died of stagnation, and many of our best citizens would have been forced, through economic pressure, to leave our Town. Had Mr. Morgan's work not been perfect, our taxes would have been several times higher than now, for the City of Miami would have gobbled us up and we would be in the unfortunate predicament of our neighbors just



South of Eighth Street -- who pay to the city of Miami three times as much taxes as are assessed by this Town on similar property, and yet these luckless Miamians receive nothing whatever for their money in the way of municipal improvements or service. But Mr. Morgan made no mistakes in the founding of the municipal corporation, and the structure reared by him, and others, has remained unassailable, so thoroughly was the preliminary work accomplished and the foundation built.

Mr. Morgan, as President of the Council, has given the same careful attention to the preparation of the Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Council, with the result that these municipal laws are regarded by other Towns and by authorities on such matters as being model legislation.

Mr. Morgan, as Chairman of the Special Charter Committee, was largely responsible for the preparation of the Special Charter for the Town, which received the highest praise on the part of the people of Miami Shores who have read it, as well as by leading national authorities on the subject. The failure of the Florida Legislature to enact this Charter was solely due to the great political power of the Beach interests who blocked its passage in the Senate.

Mr. Morgan, as Committeeman on Finance, has given every expenditure of municipal funds the most careful scrutiny, and has acted as a veritable Watchdog of the Treasury. made at the end of the first fiscal year, on February 5th, at the end of the next half year, on August 5th, and since that time (while large expenditures were being made) an audit has been completed at the end of each month. Certified reports of these audits were furnished each member of the Town Council, and copies were kept on file at all times at the Town Hall, and all citizens and tax payers invited to familiarize themselves with the contents. Thus all citizens have been kept fully and completely informed as to the financial condition of the Town at all times. If any person in the Town of Miami Shores is not fully acquainted with the exact status of the Town's finances, it is simply because he is not interested sufficiently in the subject to take the trouble to look over the Auditors' Reports.

Mr. Morgan inaugurated and insisted upon a continuance of the policy of requiring every expenditure of money, no matter how large or small, to be read and considered in open Council meeting, so that every citizen of the Town might have an opportunity to raise and present to the Council any objection to any expenditure, before its approval by the Council.

Mr. Morgan has carried out a policy of free and open discussion of all municipal affairs in Council meetings. No citizen of the Town has ever been denied the privilege of speaking at length in open Council meeting on any subject in any way related to the operations of the Town Government. No matter how late the hour, or how much business remained to be transacted, Mr. Morgan steadfastly refused to permit any curtailment of discussion of public affairs, and every matter presented to the Council by citizens was given the most careful consideration.

Mr. Morgan has on many occasions kept the Council in session until midnight, fighting on some point that would be of advantage to the people of the Town of Miami Shores, and save money for the taxpayers.

The Town of Miami Shores is indeed fortunate in being able to secure such a man as Mr. Morgan to devote his time to municipal affairs on the Town Council.

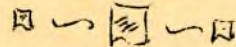

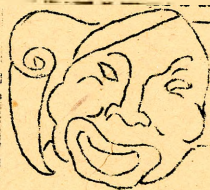

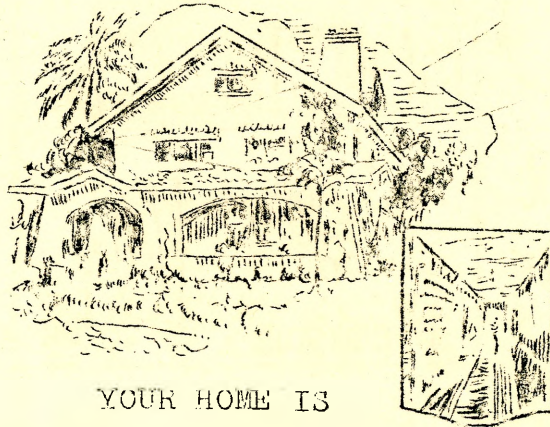
