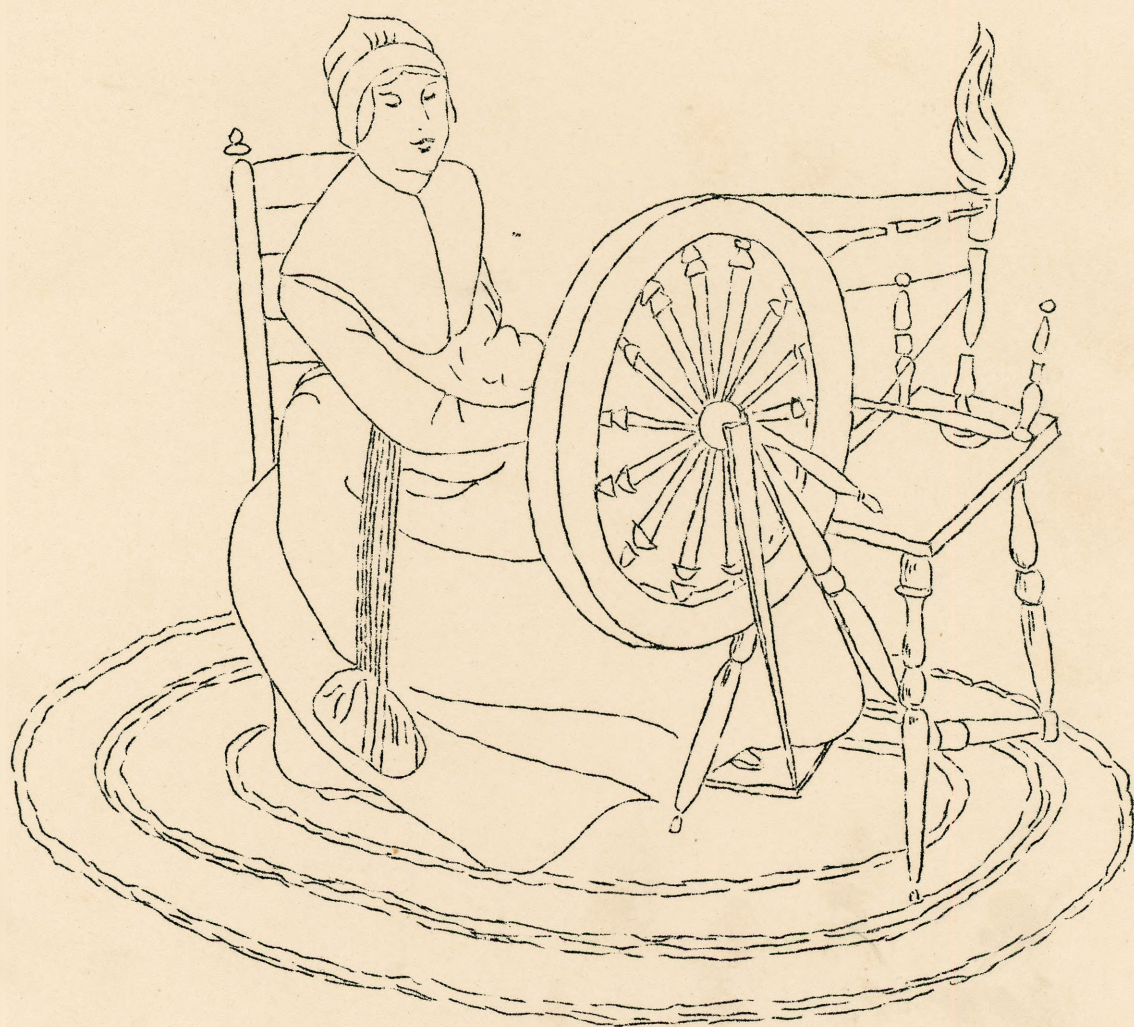

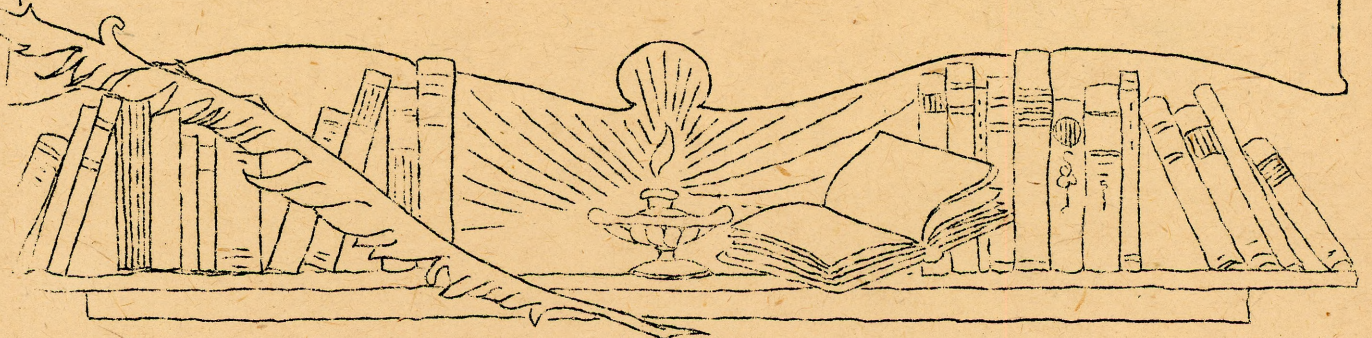

## COMMUNITY THANKSGIVING SERVICE HELD

The new Town Hall was the scene of a great gathering of the people of the community last Sunday evening at a Community Thanksgiving Service. All of the churches of Miami Shores co-operated in the service.

The hall was filled with worshippers, and even standing room was at a premium. Musical numbers were in charge of Mr. Huff, who led the congregational singing during the evening. The Misses Partee played a violin duet of exquisite beauty, and Mrs. Henry Hawthorne sang an arrangement of "God Shall Wipe Away All Tears".

The Rev. C.W. McConnell of the Biscayne Park Methodist Church conducted the service. Dr. J.E. Johnstone of the Baptist Church was the preacher of the evening and held his listeners in the power of his magnificent sermon. The emphasis was laid upon the word IN as used in the text "In all things give thanks". His sermon, delivered in a masterful way, was replete with illustrations from Dr. Johnstone's wide experience thruout the world.

Rev. Henshaw of the Community Church read the scripture and offered prayer. Rev. McConnell pronounced the benediction.

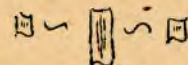

## ELECTION RESULTS

The largest vote in the history of the Town of Miami Shores, with an unusual percentage of eligible electors voting, made Tuesday an active day at the Town Hall. A total of 337 votes were cast out of a possible 367. A careful check by the candidates and workers showed that the other thirty were either detained in their places of business elsewhere in the Miami District, or were in the North.

Interest ran high throughout the week preceding the election, with several well attended meetings filling the evenings and personal calls on the voters of the Town speeding the days. The local post office cancelled more stamps during the week than ever before, altho by no means all of the stamps were purchased at the home post-office.

The amount of political propoganda sent thru the mails made a few of the old settlers think the days of the boom had returned, for their post office boxes fairly bulged with letters.

Monday night, preceding the election, saw all three of the parties holding meetings in various places in the Town. The townspeople seemed greatly interested and turned out in large numbers.

The Progressive Party held a meeting on the steps of the new Town Hall, and later adjourned to the Jeffries' meeting in Potts Hall.

The Independent Party held its meeting in the Winnebrenner Building with all of its candidates speaking to a good attendance.

The Harmony Party held its only meeting of the campaign in the Potts Hall, with Lucius Cushman of Miami presiding. The following candidates spoke briefly: J.B.Jeffries for Mayor; E.W.Amidon for Council; W.M.Bennett for Council; A.M.Griffing for Council; John A. Mahood for Tax Collector; and C.A.MacDonald for Marshal. Earle Morgan, unaffiliated candidate for Council also spoke. Homer E. McCrillus, the other Harmony candidate for Council was absent on business in the North. The candidate for Tax Assessor, Lawrence Molten, declined to speak.

Mrs. Henriette Lynott sang two numbers, and Mrs. Henry Hawthorne also sang two numbers. Erdel Mutchler and his band played several

numbers. Rev. Don G. Henshaw gave an address on Good Citizenship.

On election day the polls opened at eight o'clock and the inspectors and clerk were kept busy thruout the day handing out ballots.

The counting of the ballots after the closing of the polls revealed that the voters had not held to party lines in their voting, but had chosen individuals for the various offices on their merits.

The triangular race for Mayor between J.B. Jeffries of the Harmony Party, Dana W. Robbins of the Independent Party, and Philip S. Young of the Progressive Party was won by Mr. Jeffries with a vote of 194; Robbins was second with 93, and Young received 47.

The contest for position of Town Clerk and Treasurer, also a three cornered race, was won by H.H. Hawthorne with 188 votes; Hawthorne was the Harmony Party candidate. R.E. Russey, choice of the Independent Party and its secretary received 116 votes, while L.H. Browning, Progressive Party candidate received 28.

The race for Tax Assessor was the closest of the election. 45 votes separating the two nominees. Horace Goodrich of the Independent Party received 187 votes to win, while Lawrence C. Molten of the Harmony Party and present Assessor received 142.

John A. Mahood, present tax collector, and Harmony candidate was re-elected over W.E. Graves, Independent Candidate by a vote of 223 to 106.

In the race for Marshal the present incumbent, C.A. MacDonald, Harmony candidate, received 216 votes, while E.A. Davison, Independent candidate polled 117.

The eleven candidates for the four council vacancies were all found to be popular. J.H. Bettles, Independent Candidate and also endorsed by the Progressive Party was high man with 151 votes. Arthur

M. Griffing, present councilman, nominated by the Harmony Party, was second with a vote of 150. Earle Morgan, present President of the Council and the storm center of the election, was third with a vote of 148. W.M. Bennett of the Harmony Party won over his running mate of the same ticket, E.W. Amidon by one vote. Bennett received 137, Amidon 136. W.L. Lynde received 118 votes. Lynde was unaffiliated. A.T. Burgess, Independent, received 99; A.H. Wagener, Independent, 89; J.W. Duncan, Independent, 78; W.P. Shappell, unaffiliated, 70 and H.E. McGrillus, Harmony candidate, received 53.

The election of Mr. Jeffries to the Mayoralty will create a vacancy on the council, as he had one more year of his term. The Mayor will in due time recommend the name of his successor, and the Council will elect.

Some bitterness characterized the last few days of the election, but as we go to press all of the candidates seem to have reconciled themselves to the decision of the voters,

At the close of the evening a ceremony was held at the famous "Six Highway Point". An improvised casket was lowered into the big pit dug for the Armistice Day Barbecue, and a funeral oration was delivered by "Dad" Wiggins, in which he scored dirty politics, and announced that the burial ceremony was for the purpose of eternally burying such politics in this Town. It was made clear, it is said, that the ceremonial was not intended as a rap at either of the parties or any of the candidates who were defeated, but was meant only to celebrate the defeat of those not connected with any party, who in the closing days of the campaign attempted to influence the decision of the voters with personal letters, and a travesty on religion.

It is reported that after the ceremonial a parade was held thru several streets of the Town.

The editor of the Bulletin has received letters from several mothers of the Town demanding that publicity be given the attempt on the part of some unworthy citizen to get a number of the younger men and boys of the community drunk after the election was over. We take it that they succeeded to a certain extent from the evidence submitted by the mothers. We have been unable to obtain the names of the offenders, but wish to state most emphatically that whoever was to blame in this matter should be properly punished. Leaders of the three parties disclaim any knowledge of the affair, reporting that it was done by citizens who were not connected in any way with these parties.

It is deplorable that such a thing should have happened, as the Town has during the past year established an excellent record in this regard. We sincerely hope the offenders will be punished.

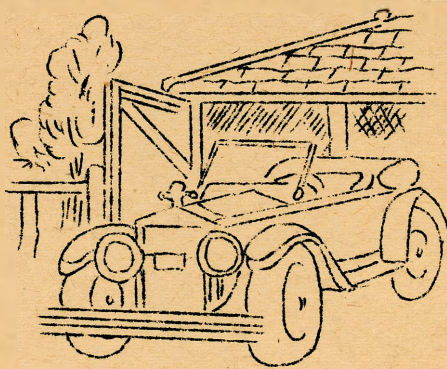

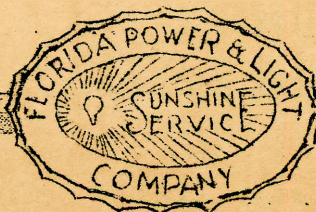
