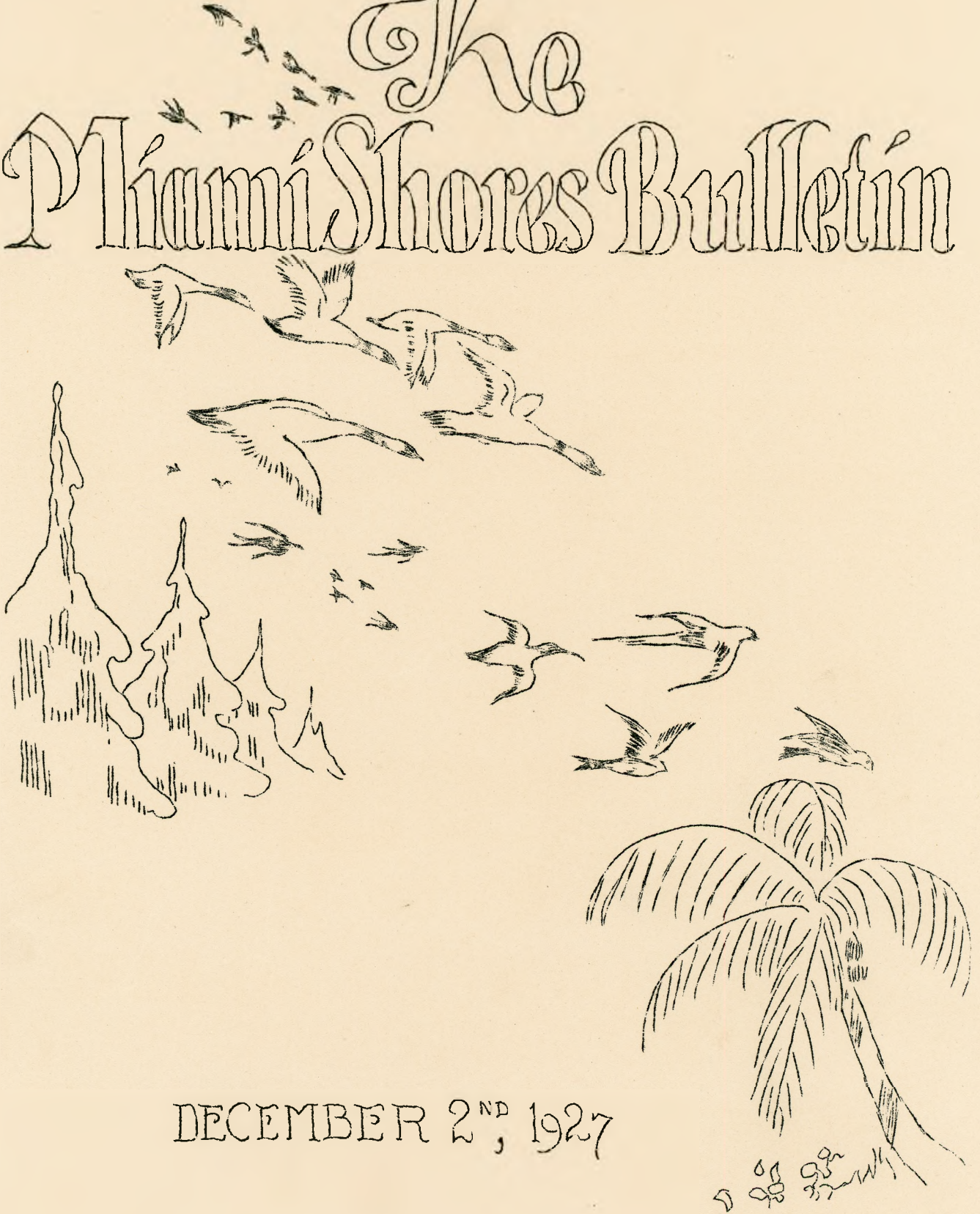

## WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

Election is over and for the time being there are no arguments among us. The universal question is "What's next? Where do we go from here?" What is the next step for the Town and its people, now that the members of the Town administration are chosen for another year?

We have talked to a great many of the Townspeople during the last week and we give below a few of the suggestions that they have made in this regard:

**BEAUTIFICATION.** This was one of the matters emphasized during the election campaign. Removal of the hurricane wreckage, and the planting of shrubs and trees thruout the Town.

**RAPID TRANSIT.** Our Town would be an extremely desirable location for people who are well enough supplied with the world's goods to afford servants if it were possible to transport them here each day from Miami. A rapid transit line would solve this problem. It would also make it possible for the office and store worker who now pays excessive rents in the down town sections of Miami or its residential districts, to live in Miami Shores, where a more wholesome atmosphere exists for family life, and where rents are much lower for superior homes and apartments. Such an increase in population is to be greatly desired.

**RECREATION.** With the coming of a senior High School next year to Miami Shores some arrangement should be made for a recreational or Physical Education director for the school. It might be possible to have the same person direct a Community Recreational Program for adults as well, provided the Community Center Property is developed. Much of the charm of Miami Beach and Coral Gables is due to its provision for Recreation for all ages.

**THE LIBRARY.** The Library Committee will soon have its work under way and before Spring we should have the nucleus for a high type Town Library in the Municipal Building, open to all residents and visitors of the Community. This will supplement the work of the School Library in its work among the children, and provide adequate reading for the adults as well.

All of the matters mentioned above by Townspeople will add much to the attractiveness of Miami Shores as a "Home Town" if we all make them come true. When our Town becomes attractive enough to stop visitors, and to call Miami workers, real estate will again move, and with possible industry in the Town someday, permanent prosperity will be assured.

The Town Council last Monday, approved the estimate of Messrs. Huff and Roberts, Town Engineers, showing the amount of \$11,980.35 to be due the Morgan Hill Paving Company for work performed and materials furnished under the contract for the paving of Avenue "D" and Harding Avenue, and directed the Town Treasurer to draw a check to the Morgan Hill Company for that amount.

The report of the Town Engineers on the Municipal Electric Light and Power Plant was presented to the Council Monday night. The report is thirteen pages in length, with an appendix of twenty-three pages, setting forth statistics. It was announced that the report would be kept on file in the office of Mrs. Mary A. Brasher, Town Clerk and would be open to the inspection of any citizen of the Town.

Councilman Gribble introduced an Ordinance prepared by Town Attorney Dougherty, providing for the submission to the voters of the question of establishing a Municipal Electric Light Plant, and the issuance of \$185,000.00 in bonds for that purpose. The Ordinance was referred to a Special Committee consisting of Councilman Snow and

Hamilton, who will report their recommendations to the Council. It was decided that a public hearing on the question of the passage of the Ordinance should be held at the next Council meeting, Monday, September 26th. All citizens and tax-payers are invited to present their views to the Mayor and the Council on this important matter.

A copy of the proposed Ordinance is published elsewhere in this issue of the "Bulletin".

The report of Messrs. Mucklow and Ford and McCall covering their audit of the Town accounts for the fiscal half-year ending August 5th, 1927, was presented to the Council. This report is now on file in the office of the Town Clerk and is open to the inspection of the public.

The Council voted to adopt the practise of a monthly audit as recommended by the Town Treasurer and the auditors.

The appointments of Mr. R.L.Gribble as Director of Public Service and of Mr. J.H.Gribble as Tractor Operator were confirmed by the Town Council.

\* \* \* \* \*

On recommendation of Mayor Brion, the Council authorized the appointment of a Special Committee for the purpose of determining the number, quality and specifications of furniture and equipment for the new Town Hall.

Mayor W.P.Brion, Councilmen J.B.Jeffries and W.F.Hamilton and Mrs. Mary A. Brasher, Town Clerk, were named as members of this committee.

The following recommendation, with respect to the Police Department, was submitted to the Council by Mayor Brion:

" TO THE HONORABLE THE TOWN COUNCIL:

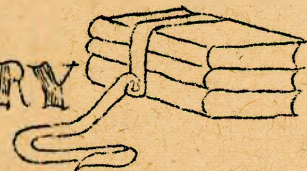
While I am heartily in favor of reducing Municipal expenses to the lowest possible figure, consistent with good government, I would be strongly opposed to any reduction in the salary of the Town Marshal. His salary of \$200 per month is much less than is now being paid for similar work in other cities and towns.

I believe, however, that a substantial saving can be made if the Town Marshal and the Police Officer are furnished motorcycles for the performance of their duties. The cost of gas, oil, and maintenance

and depreciation of a motorcycle would, I am sure, be much less than the \$100 per month now required for the upkeep of an automobile.

The salary of the Police Officer was fixed at \$200 per month, and it was provided that he should maintain an automobile for official use at his own expense. If the above recommendation is followed by your Council, and the Police Officer relieved of his present obligation to maintain an automobile at his own expense, I would suggest that the Council reduce his salary Fifty Dollars (\$50) per month."

The Council acted favorably upon Mayor Brion's recommendation, and authorized the purchase of two Harley-Davidson motorcycles with sidecars. One of these is now in use by Marshal MacDonald.

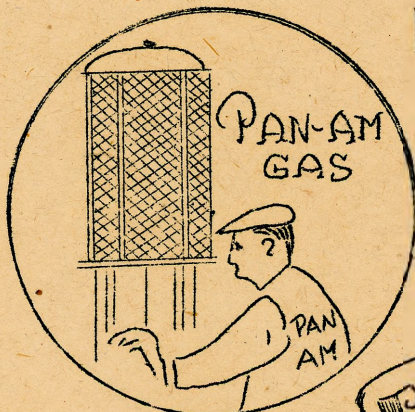

Petitions were presented requesting the paving of 123rd. Terrace being also described as a street between Ninth and Market Streets in Biscayne Center Subdivision. Sidewalks on both sides of this street were also petitioned for. The Council authorized resolutions directing the Town Engineers to prepare plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of this work.

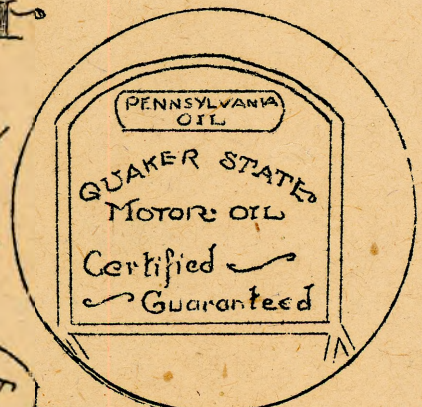

POLITICAL NOTES

A decided lull in political activity has become evident during the past week. This is generally attributed to the absence of Mr. R.E.Russey, who is in Lake City undergoing an operation, and whose return to Miami Shores is not expected for four or five weeks. Mr. Russey, it is said, failed to designate any member of his forces to act as leader during his absence.

Another reason for the decline in political agitation is said to be the virtual abandonment of opposition to Mr. Jeffries' candidacy for Mayor. The reaction to the statement of Mr. Jeffries policies, as published in the Bulletin two weeks ago, has been so favorable that Mr. Russey's followers have, it is said by Harmony leaders, come to the conclusion that it would be useless to name any opposition candidate for the office of Mayor. Several of the leading citizens of the Town who were being considered by the "insurgent" group for a Mayoralty nomination, have, since the Jeffries interview in the Bulletin declared that they were heartily in favor of Jeffries for Mayor, and would not permit their names to be placed in nomination against him.

According to an announcement made before Mr. Russey's departure there will be a meeting of that group on next Monday night in the Winnebrenner Building.

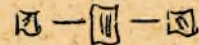

MR. A.M.GRIFFING ANNOUNCES LANDSCAPING CONTEST - \$1,000 IN PRIZES !

Closely following the announcement of the general sentiment of Miami Shores for beautifying homes and lots in our Community in the Bulletin last week, Mr. Arthur M. Griffing, developer of Biscayne Park Estates, announced Monday that he would sponsor a contest to arouse interest in such a program and would offer suitable prizes. The details of the Contest follow, as outlined in the announcement made by Mr. Griffing:

**\$1,000 IN PRIZES FOR MOST BEAUTIFULLY LANDSCAPED HOMES IN BISCAYNE PARK AND VICINITY.** Contestants to be judged on or about February 1st and prizes awarded February 5th, 1928.

Two classes of entrants are solicited, with cash prizes for beautification with perennials and all classes of shrubbery intended as a permanent improvement to the home, including lawns, palms, shade trees, roses and all flowering and foliage plants.

Although annuals are not excluded from home gardens entered for cash prizes, they will not be considered by Judges in the awarding of cash prizes. However, contestants may enter for both cash and trade prizes, and awards for trade prizes will be based entirely on the displays of annual flowers and foliage plants, including lawns.

The quality of lawns is to be considered for certain points by Judges in both classes of prizes, although temporary winter grass will be allowed to compete only for trade prizes along with other annuals.

THOSE ELIGIBLE TO COMPETE:

Any home owner residing in Biscayne Park or elsewhere North or East of Biscayne Canal, West of the Florida East Coast Railway and South of the Natural Bridge Road may compete either for the cash or trade prizes, while persons renting homes within the boundaries mentioned may enter only for trade prizes.

All Judges to be named by Contest Committee, the formation of which will be arranged at an early date.

FIRST CASH PRIZE OF \$50.00 For Best landscaped home with perennial or permanent plants and lawn.

SECOND CASH PRIZE OF 40.00 For second best.

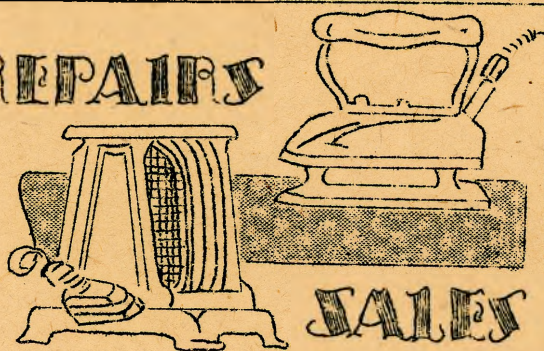

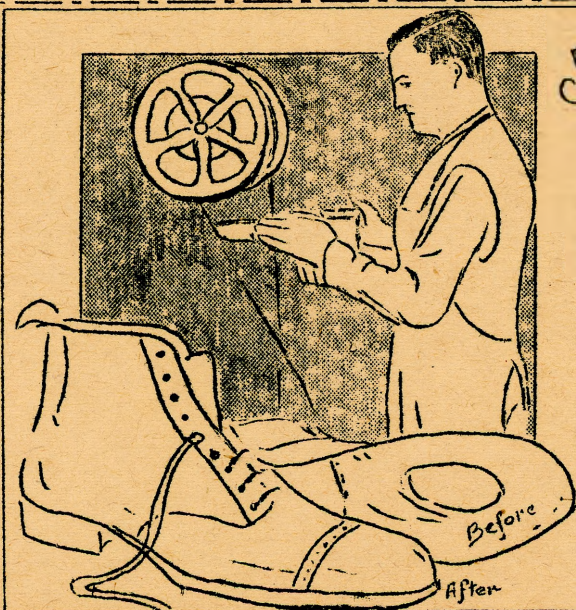

POTTS RESIGNS - BENNETT APPOINTED

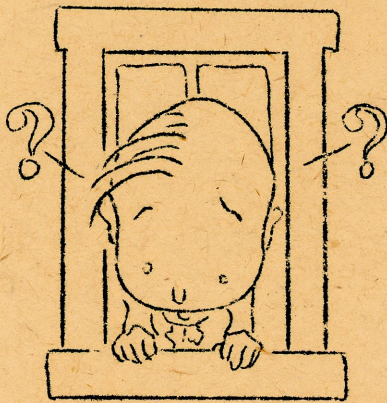
The following resignation was tendered to Mayor Brion yesterday To the Honorable Mayor, Town of Miami Shores, Fla.

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R. REXFORD WINS FIRST PRIZE

Robbie Rexford, after several weeks of earnest effort landed the first prize in the Bird Study Contest last week. His paper follows:

"The name of the bird illustrated in last week's Bulletin is Red Winged Blackbird. Its Latin name is 'Agelaius Phoeniceus' (Linnaeus). The bird goes by other names, which are, Red-winged Satorling, Red-shouldered Blackbird, Swamp Blackbird, Marsh Blackbird, Red-winged Oriole, and the Red Wing. The bird's length is 8 1/2 inches. The male bird is black with red shoulders. The female is dusky above and whitish below with streaks of dusky. Their bill is shorter than their head. Their song sounds like a harsh cackle; a pleasing liquid song 'conkerr -ee' given with much bowing and spreading of the wings and tail.

"They make their nest in bushes in swamps or around the edges of ponds, frequently on the ground or on hummocks in wet pastures. They make their nest of woven grasses and rushes and they are usually shaped and suspended from the rim when built in bushes. They lay from 3 to 6, but usually, 5 eggs which are bluish white, scrawled chiefly around the large end with black.

"They range from East of the Rockies, breeding North to Manitoba and New Brunswick. In winter in the Southern part of the United States. There is also a Bahaman Redwing (bryanti) and a Florida Redwing (floridanus)."



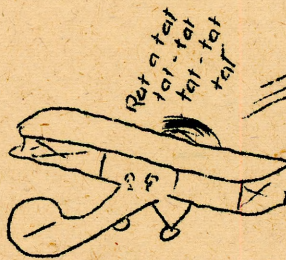

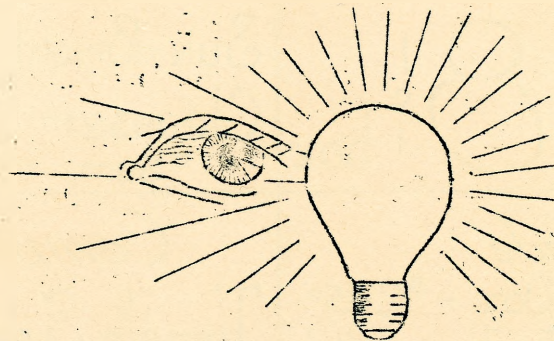
