DO YOU WANT INDUSTRY IN

MIAMI SHORES?

A great deal of interest has been aroused throughout the Town over the prospect of bringing industries to the Town of Miami Shores. It is felt to be an economic necessity for the future of the Town, and all civic leaders are busy canvassing the possibilities.

It is felt that such industries as may use native raw products, or raw products easily obtained from adjacent states, for manufacture into products for Southern use and more especially for export to South and Central America, are the type to be interested.

Miami Shores people have watched with interest the progress being made along these lines by other communities in the Greater Miami area and have eagerly looked forward to some definite and intelligent program of the same nature here. It is pointed out by the leaders that Miami Shores is located ideally for industry. Two railroads traverse the Town; we are situated midway between the port of Miami and the new port Mable at Hollywood; our land is higher than that of other municipalities in the district; we are situated on several of the main arteries of motor travel into the heart of Miami; and we have a well organized progressive municipal government.

Friday night (to-night) December 9th at eight p.m. in the Town Hall will be held a meeting to discuss these matters under the auspices of the Citizens Industrial Exchange, to which every man and woman in the Town of Miami Shores and adjacent communities is invited. There will be several prominent speakers from Miami as well as several from Miami Shores.

It is understood that there will be a frank discussion of all phases of the subject, and that several well known local leaders will present suggested plans for interesting industry in our natural advantages as a manufacturing and residential community.

It is hoped that large landholders will be willing to give the necessary land to locate such plants upon, as this is one of the first requirements. Several owners of property have already stated that they would be happy to do this.

Prominent in the leadership of this movement are Mr. Arthur M. Griffing, pioneer developer of this section, and Mr. Louis Nathan, the developer of Sunkist Grove on Gratigny Boulevard in the western section of Miami Shores.

It is anticipated that the auditorium will be filled to capacity at this important meeting and that it will announce the birth of a new day for Miami Shores.

RESOLUTION NO. 228

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES: That the Council does hereby sponsor a Community Musicale and Christmas Tree Celebration, under the auspices of Mrs. H.H.Hawthorne.

The Town Council, ever ready to foster or sponsor a movement for the benefit of the people of the Town took the above action by a unanimous vote of the Councilmen present at the meeting mentioned, and was heartily endorsed by Mayor W.P.Brion. The understanding was that it would be a movement wherein the funds for the Christmas Party would be obtained by means of the Musicale to be held tomorrow night, and that the municipality would not need to appropriate any of the Town funds for it.

Enthusiasm has evidenced itself and tickets are selling readily for the affair, which is expected to prove on of the most enjoyable of the season's musical treats.

Miami Shores is being watched in this Musicale by civic and musical circles in Miami, where support has also been very generous. Two internationally known musicians will be in the audience to hear the concert.

MIAMI SHORES MASONIC LODGE

Tuesday evening the local Masonic Lodge held its first regular meeting Under Dispensation from Grand Master B.E.Dyson of Jacksonville with a large attendance from the local Masons and out of town members of the fraternity, in its new quarters in the Potts Building.

The following officers of the Lodge were in attendance: Don G. Henshaw, Worshipful Master; L.H.Browning, Senior Warden; Archie W. Ritter, Junior Warden; Elmer E. Prominent among the visitors were Masters and Past Masters of other lodges in the Miami District and from other states. A large group of Masons from Nor-Mi Lodge # 253 of Little River were present.

In the summer of 1926 a number of local Masons determined to request the privilege of creating a Masonic Lodge in Miami Shores, and active work to that end began, only to end when the Hurricane of that year caused a number of the petitioners for such a lodge to leave the community.

Masonic interest revived, however, in April of the present year when over thirty Masons of this community organized the Lambskin Club of Miami Shores as a social organization of members of the fraternity. Early in its career it was determined to carry out the original intention of the year before and apply for a Dispensation for a lodge. The men immediately began to work to that end and Tuesday night was the culmination of the months of preparatory effort.

The lodge has leased three offices in the Potts Building for its year around use as Club rooms and offices, and also the auditorium for its meeting nights. Extensive improvements have been made to put the hall in proper condition and visiting Masons Tuesday were lavish in their compliments on the work already done.

It is anticipated that the work of renovation will be completed within a few weeks and the necessary lodge fixtures installed.

The officers and members of the new lodge extend a most cordial invitation to all Master Masons in this vicinity to attend the meetings of Miami Shores Lodge, U.D., on Tuesday of each week.

It is stated that the Miami Lodges are assisting Miami Shores in its early work in many ways. The local degree team has been privileged to exemplify the several degrees before the Miami Lodges and have been highly complimented on their work.

FLORENCE GILBERT HANSCOM COMING
TO MIAMI SHORES

Florence Gilbert Hanscom, nationally known Lyceum and Chautauqua entertainer has been secured for an evening's program in the Miami Shores High School auditorium on next Tuesday evening at eight o'clock.

Florence Gilbert Hanscom achieved her greatest fame during and after the war in the camps of the American Army, Navy and Marine Corps, as an entertainer of the type of Elsie Janis. Her record in this work is almost without parallel for success among the service boys.

After completing her work for the United States government she was besieged with offers to enter Lyceum and Chautauqua work, and for the last several years she has toured United States and Canada as a headliner on these platforms.

Lyceum managers point out that she never gives a program that is not followed up by a popular demand for her return the following year, so that she now finds herself booked over much the same course each year. This is one of the most pleasant things in an artists life but it also puts an unusual demand upon their talent, as it is quite necessary to vary the program. Mrs. Hanscom is unusually able in this respect as she never gives the same program twice, thus her popularity grows greater from year to year.

The leaders of the Community Church learned that in the course of her itinerary through Florida this winter Mrs. Hanscom had one or two nights to spare and immediately booked her for this program.

Mrs. Hanscom's last appearance in South Florida was some two years ago when she gave a program at the White Temple in Miami, at which time the great seating capacity of the Church was entirely sold out, and numbers turned away. The Miami Herald the following morning hailed her program as being one of the finest ever given in Miami.

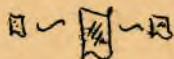
Her program before the Miami Shores audience will be one of great variety. Mrs. Hanscom is an unusually talented play reader and will probably read one or more plays from current Broadway successes.

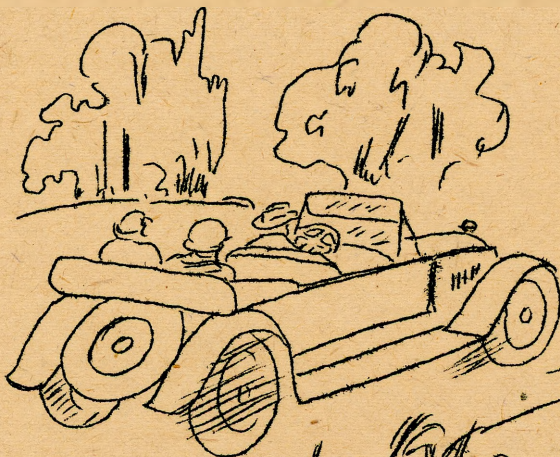

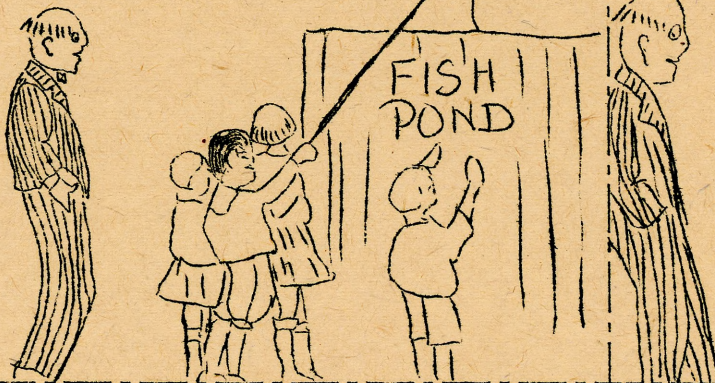

Capital and management thus devote their best talents to the interests of the public. This is public ownership at its best.

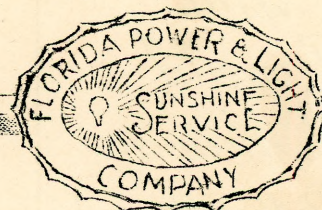
