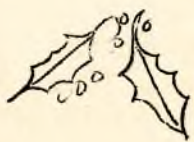

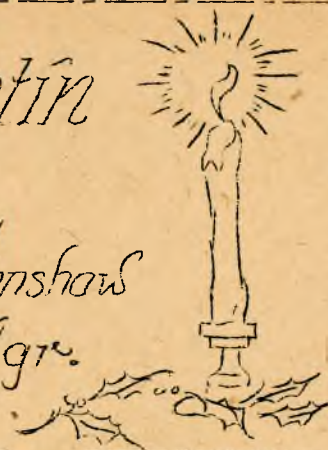

OUR BOYS

In another section of this issue is the annual report of the Scoutmaster of Troop 42, Miami Shores, Boy Scouts of America. It is a report of bare facts and statistics, but behind it is the romance of Scouting and the development of boy life that is as interesting as any novel ever written.

During the month of December, last year, Principal Carl Wagner of the Arch Creek School, arranged a Father and Son Banquet at which gathering the Boy Scout movement was launched at the suggestion of Mr. Phil Young.

In a bewilderingly short time the Troop was a fact - completely manned with Scoutmaster, two Assistant Scoutmasters, and a Troop Committee. Each succeeding meeting became more interesting to the boys, and under careful and trained supervision examinations were passed in the rudiments of Scoutcraft.

Today - one short year from the inception of the troop - we find an organization of some thirty seven Scouts, many of whom have advanced far in Scouting, one having crossed the threshold of the Boy Scouts Promised Land - "Eagle Scout" - and several others ready to pass into that high ranking within the next two months.

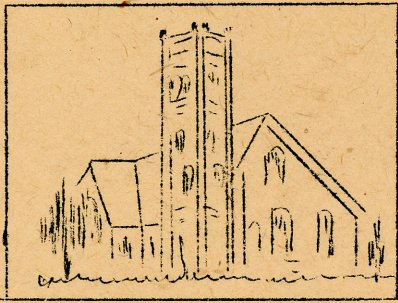
Altho this advancement in the routine of Scout Work has broken all district records the most remarkable part of the whole story lies in the boys themselves. They are the greatest bunch of fellows on the face of the earth, and Miami Shores is mighty proud of them!

A Scout Headquarters building has been made available on the acre of ground loaned to the Troop by the Dade County School Board and will be occupied for the first time on next Thursday evening when the Troop will be re-registered as required by Scout Law for another year, and the new troop committee introduced to the Scouts.

In keeping with the suggestion of the National Commander of the American Legion to all Posts everywhere, the local Legion Post is to sponsor the troop during the coming year. The Town Council sponsored it during its year of infancy, and are now willing that it be placed in the hands of another organization.

The Legion boys are eager to begin their work with the Scouts and predict for them another banner year of activity. The Legion Post together with the Scout Officials will choose a committee from the Post to act as the Troop Committee for the year, the personnel of which will be announced next week.

The Community is proud of its Scouts -- let's all help the Legion to lift them to new heights of achievement during 1928!

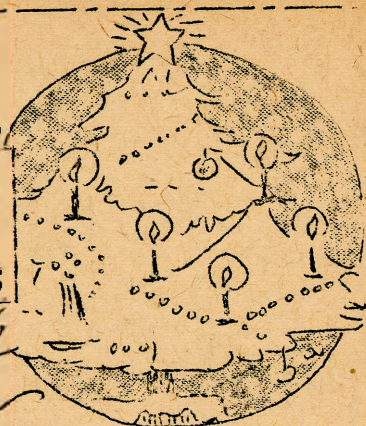

COMMUNITY CONCERT ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED

One of the finest musical treats ever given Miami Shores residents was presented last Saturday evening in the beautiful auditorium of the new Town Hall, when Mrs. Esther Hawthorne and assisting artists rendered a program of rare beauty for the benefit of the Christmas Tree Fund.

The concert was well attended by music lovers from all parts of the Greater Miami district who were enthusiastic in their praise of the splendidly presented program.

A delightful surprise was given the audience during the Fifth Group, which comprised compositions of Mana-Zucca, when Miss Frances Tarboux, pianiste, discovered Mana-Zucca in the audience and together with Mrs. Hawthorne escorted her to the platform amid great applause. Mana-Zucca graciously consented to play the accompaniment for the next number, her "Fluttering Birds", and played herself straight into the hearts of the people by the superbly rendered accompaniment. As an encore Mrs. Hawthorne chose Mana-Zucca's favorite "My Baby", which she sang with remarkable sweetness and sympathy for the theme. This was easily the high light of the program judged by the applause which followed.

Space does not permit us to mention each of the numbers Mrs. Hawthorne sang, each a triumph in itself, but in our memory of the evening stand out Handle's "Care Selve" sung in Italian, "Romeo and Juliet Waltz Song" by Gounod, her Mana-Zucca numbers, and the closing group of Scandinavian numbers. Mrs. Hawthorne, who is a pupil of Madame Agnes Leist Beebe, Chicago and Miami, was in excellent voice and demonstrated conclusively that she is entitled to a high place in Florida Music circles.

Miss Frances Tarboux, pianiste, is a pupil of Mana-Zucca, and has played for Madame Louise Homer and other famous artists. Her accompaniments were so well executed that they formed a perfect background for Mrs. Hawthorne's beautiful soprano voice. In her solo numbers she displayed the ability that has made her Miami's premier pianiste. She chose a wide variety of compositions for presentation and rendered each with a rare understanding and ability.

Miss Louise Tarboux, sister of Miss Frances, played the obligato for Mrs. Hawthorne's "Spring" by Henschel, in a way that marked her as an accomplished violinist.

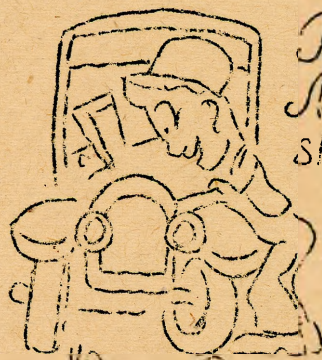
Miami Shores can well be proud of Mrs. Hawthorne, and all who heard her will look forward with eager anticipation to her next public appearance.

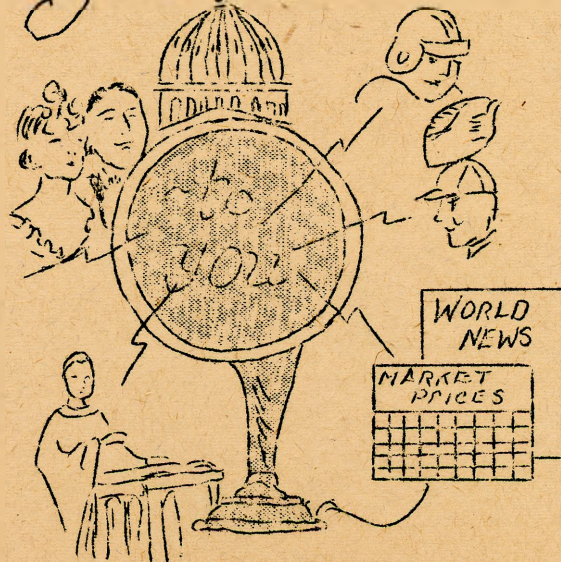

COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION

A general committee has been appointed by Mayor Brion to take charge of the Community Christmas celebration, with Mrs. Vera Lane as chairman, and consisting of Mr. Wagner, Mrs. Earle Morgan, Mrs. J.E. Henshaw and Mrs. Arthur M. Griffing.

Friday evening the 23d. has been selected as the night as it seems to meet with the approval of the greatest number of people, and will not be held on Saturday the 24th as heretofore and elsewhere stated. The school grounds have been chosen for the location. Those who saw the beautiful tableau and tree last year will remember what a splendid setting the school and grounds made.

The Christmas cantata, "The Nativity" will be presented at seven thirty by children of the upper grades under the direction of Mrs. Edgar Lane and Miss Mahoney, teacher of music. The sacred scenes and beautiful carols and chants will appeal to everyone at the Christmas time.

All of the children of the Town of Miami Shores and adjoining territory are invited and urged to come to the Community Christmas Tree. Santa Claus, round and jolly, and even Mrs. Claus will be there with stockings filled with goodies for every child.

Everyone in the community has been effected to some extent by the "hard times" and general conditions of depression. It is the desire of the committee, in keeping with the Christmas Spirit, to help in some small way those who have suffered most. It is not in any sense a matter of charity -- just a "Merry Christmas" and a wish for a more prosperous New Year. Only one member of the committee will be given the names of the families who just at this time may appreciate a helping hand. The committee asks that anyone knowing of such families in Miami Shores and adjoining territory will please see Mrs. J.E. Henshaw on Dixieanna Avenue. It is understood that supplies of food, clothing, and so forth will be quietly sent to needy families on or before Christmas Day, and will not be a part of the Christmas Tree Celebration on Friday night. Mrs. Henshaw has already the names of many such in or near the Town of Miami Shores, and urges that parents who can do so send clothing, groceries, or toys as contributions to these Christmas baskets to the school Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week.

The Christmas Tree Celebration is to be understood as a Community proposition - all of the organizations in the community have either endorsed it or approved it, and are contributing to its success in various ways. While we give the youngsters a wonderful time next Friday night, let us not forget the need of giving liberally to help the folks who otherwise would have no Christmas.

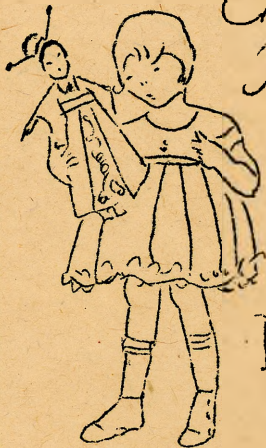

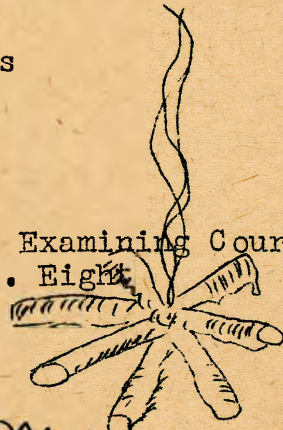

Editor of the Miami Shores Bulletin:

In view of the great interest in Town affairs at the present time, may I suggest that your "Town Government" column publish, so far as possible, notice of matters to be considered at the current Council meetings and also as full a report of the meetings as you conveniently can give, showing the votes of Councilmen on the various propositions?

Interest in public affairs is a healthy sign and the Town officials should be given every aid possible by approval or constructive criticism of proposed measures. As an illustration, it should be of interest to all taxpayers to know that there is a decided possibility --- following a court decision in a Lakeland case --- that the assessing of the total cost of street improvements on the abbutors is unlawful. If so, a considerable portion of the cost, including that of those already built, must be raised by general Town taxation. In our present situation this would be quite a serious matter. Also, pending final decision by the higher courts, no bond houses are buying Florida special assessment street bonds. It follows that any contractor bidding to take these bonds could have no definite information to bid on and would include in his construction cost a liberal item to cover the unknown risk, thus adding to the cost of the work.

If the taxpayers could have known that it was proposed to let a special assessment street job in this town in the near future there would doubtless have been objections raised. TAXPAYER

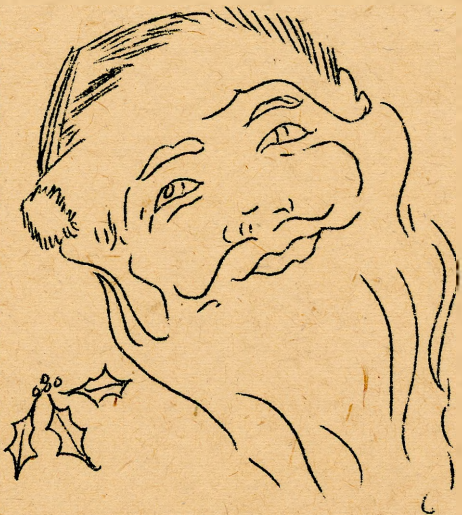

Mrs. Hawthorne's program, varied in scope from the old masters to the present day composers, was certainly a rendition of merit, possessing a soprano voice of wide range, and executing arpeggio passages with both volume and modulation in artistic manner. Mrs. Hawthorne is a protege of Madame Agnes Leist Beebe, an internationally known teacher of voice, and Madame Beebe predicts a wonderful career and future for Mrs. Hawthorne.

Miami Shores is to be congratulated in having an artist like Mrs. Hawthorne as a resident, she is truly the Jenny Lind of Miami Shores, and deserves much credit and the gratitude of the entire community for her untiring effort in securing the services of the above named talented artists. Mrs. Hawthorne's time and labor were furnished gratis, and she secured by subscription the necessary funds to defray all the expenses of the entire program, including the famous Fleetwood Orchestra, which rendered special numbers of dance music immediately after the concert program, to which the younger set as well as some of the older citizens tripped the light fantastic toe in terpsichore, your humble servant included.

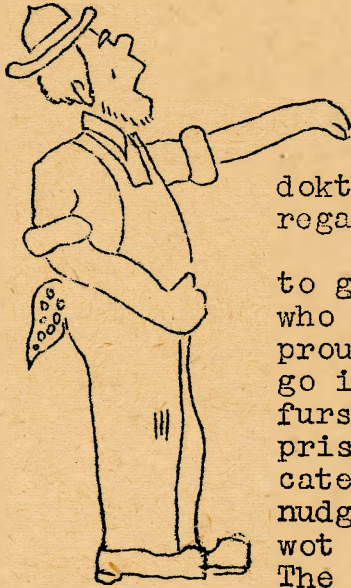

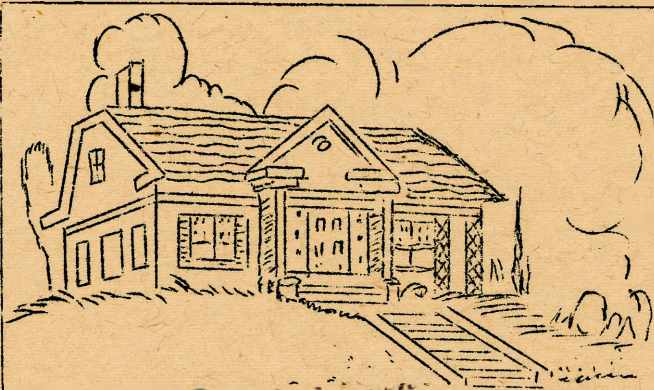
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Editor of the Bulletin:

As one of the oldest residents of Miami Shores community I feel a great pride in my home town and its interests. Having put up some of the first houses here, I have in five years seen it grow into a beautiful suburb of many fine homes. I have watched with intense interest our improvements as we have progressed in making this to my mind at least, the most attractive suburb of Miami. The boulevarded streets bordered by broad walks, put in within the last few months, our new City Hall, and other improvements have made us more than a collection of homes, have made us a real little city. We now have our homes and streets lighted electrically, the latter efficiently policed and with our fine fire protection service feel carefree security.

Returning from the city a few days ago I observed workmen connecting up the sections of the telephone cable which is to give us connection in that way with the rest of the world. Becoming interested I learned a few facts by inquiry, as follows:

This work is nearly completed, so that phone service can be installed almost immediately, especially on streets where cable is carried. On side streets where one or more poles would have to be installed would require two or three weeks longer in the order of the applications.

These lines will be single or private business lines, and party lines serving two or four patrons per line respectively, cost being in proportion to the class of service. The area of service is from 54th Street north and from the bay to 37th Avenue, N.W. with unlimited calls. This new phone service makes us feel as though we are quite on the map, as we can talk with the rest of the world without having to walk farther than the instrument.

In the course of my inquiry I learned that a number of the people who signed up for telephone service have since canceled their orders, even to such an extent that I cannot see how the company is going to meet cost of installation and service on present patronage. I am further informed that several of the the citizens who made themselves most prominent by demanding the service last Spring, and who signed contracts for it, have now refused to pay the necessary fees! This is not fair or just.
