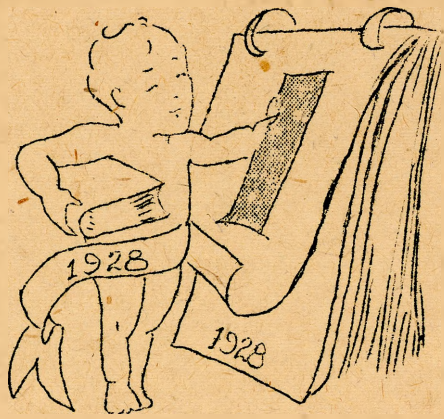

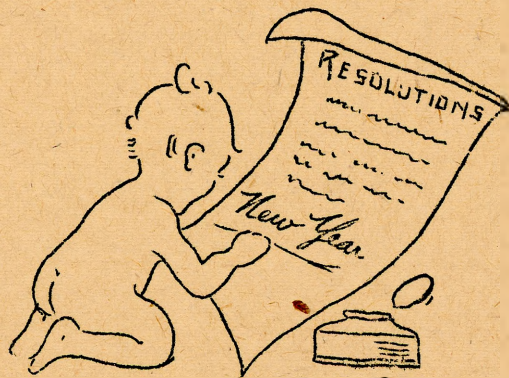
Harry Hulsart, Junior, accompanied by his Uncle, David Conover, returned to Miami Shores Tuesday night after spending five months in New Jersey.

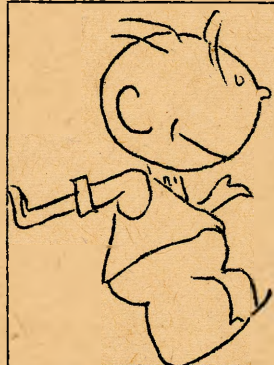

NEWS FROM THE TOWN HALL

The Miami Shores Town Council met in adjourned session last night in the Council Chamber. All members of the Council were present, and in addition a fairly large attendance of townspeople. A large amount of business was transacted by the Council.

APPOINTMENTS MADE

The Council last night confirmed the following appointments which had been made by Mayor W.P. Brion:

W.L. Lynde as Police Officer

R.C. Douglass as Warden of the Jail and Engineer of Fire Truck

T.L. Galusha as Assistant Warden and Engineer.

Mr. Lynde has been acting as night Police Officer for the past two weeks, and Mr. Douglass has been acting as Warden and Engineer. The appointment of Mr. Galusha will relieve the Warden and Engineer of the arduous 24^h duty that he has been engaged on.

THE COUNCIL EQUALIZES TAX ROLL

The Council last evening met as an Equalizing Board, and after considering several complaints finally confirmed, equalized and approved the Assessment Roll. The total assessed valuation of property in the Town, under this Roll, is \$10,574,106.00, according to Lawrence C. Molten, Tax Assessor. After equalizing this Tax Roll the Council established ten mills as the tax rate.

A two percent discount will be allowed for payment in January and one percent discount for payment in February. Credit will be allowed for all taxes heretofore paid to the Town, under the former tax levy which was repealed by the Council. The Council decided that the credit allowed should be six percent greater than the amount actually paid. It was further provided that for tax money so paid during the month of March, 1927; the credit should be seven percent and for payments made during the month of February, 1927, the credit should be eight percent.

SIDEWALK ASSESSMENTS DUE

It was announced yesterday at the Town Hall by Mr. John A. Mahood, Tax Collector, that the first installments of assessments for sidewalk improvements would become delinquent on January 11th, and all property owners were urged to make payment before that time. Eighteen percent of the total assessment must be paid now, according to Mr. Mahood. January 11th is also the delinquent date for Avenue "D" street assessments.

SCHOOL BUILDING APPROVED

The Council approved a motion made by Councilman Irons, that a 28 room school building be erected upon the site adjoining the present school building, according to plans prepared by the Duval County School Board.

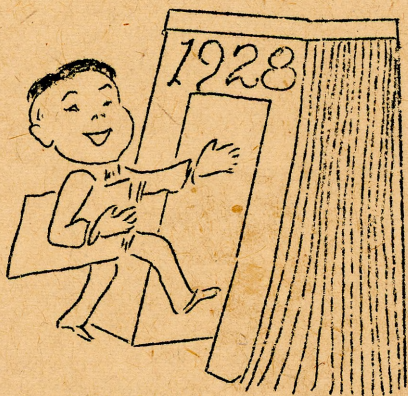
The Catholic contingent was well represented at the midnight mass in Gesu Church in Miami Saturday night.

It was a good Christmas season - and we are all happier than we were a week or two ago - except Jobless Jerry - and we are looking forward to finer and more prosperous years to come.

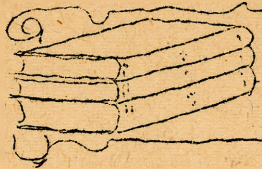
