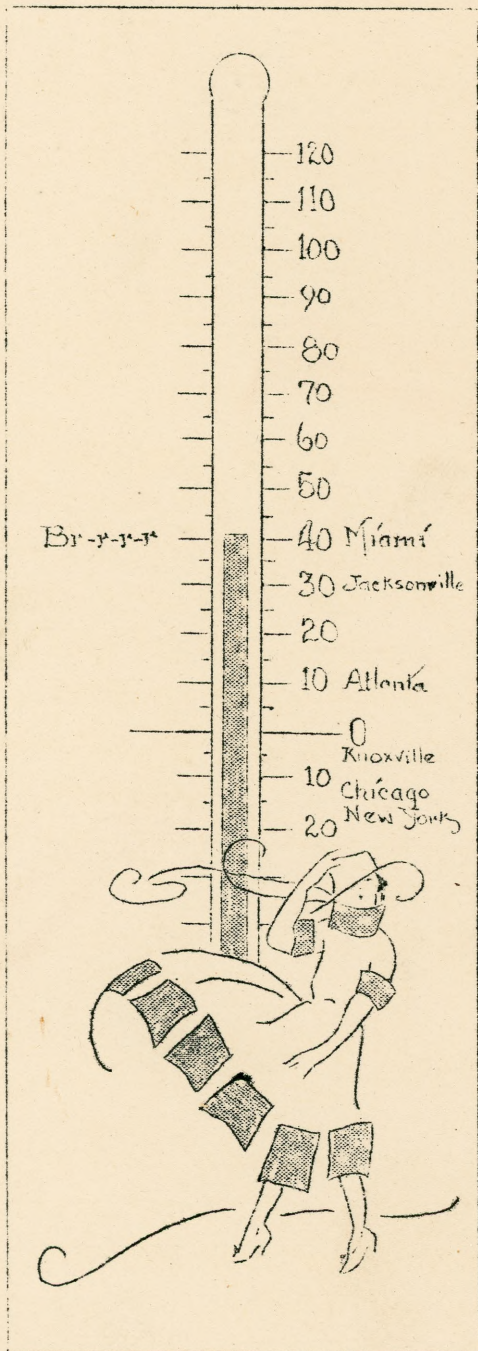

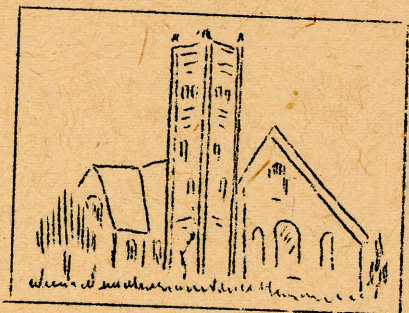

SHALL THE NAME OF THIS COMMUNITY BE CHANGED BY THE PEOPLE?

At the Mass Meeting held last Friday evening in the Town Hall the matter of changing the name of the Town was brought before the people by Mr. Arthur M. Griffing, developer of Biscayne Park Estates. Mr. Griffing pointed out the many annoying difficulties the present name had brought about because of its constant confusion in the minds of people elsewhere with the sub-division of the same name. Mr. Griffing expressed as his opinion that the change in name would be the starting point toward greater progress for the community.

Others who expressed similar opinions were J.B.Eberling, Earl Irons, D.F. Baker, and Arthur H. Wagener.

It was determined by the gathering that the matter be given a thorough discussion throughout the Town and in the pages of the "Bulletin" and that steps be taken to determine the most suitable name. To this end there will be found elsewhere in this issue a coupon on which the individual citizen may express his preference and mail or convey it to the Town Clerk, after which the Council will open these preferences and determine if there is sufficient sentiment for the change to warrant the calling of a special referendum election on the matter.

Mr. Edward C. Dougherty, upon being questioned concerning the legal side of the matter, said that he did not believe it would be necessary to submit the matter to the Legislature, as there appeared to be no Supreme Court ruling to the contrary.

The "Bulletin" feels that this is a matter for the people to decide in a careful and sane manner, avoiding every influence that will tend to overcome one's better judgement. To that end the pages of the paper are open to a thorough discussion of the question that we may all come to such a decision.

Let everyone who has an idea to present either for or against the change present their argument in subsequent issues of the Bulletin. Below we print a letter from Mr. Griffing:

To the Tax Payers and Electors of the Town of Miami Shores, Greeting:

Pursuant to a Resolution, unanimously adopted at the Mass Meeting in the Town Hall Friday night, the Bulletin will provide in this issue a Coupon which the voters are requested to clip and send to our Town Clerk not later than Monday night, January 9th, answering the question as to whether or not you favor changing the name of the Town, providing a new name, approved by a majority of the electors be selected. You will also write in the New Name of your choice in the space provided for that purpose.

At this Mass Meeting suggestions were made as to prizes to be offered those recommending the most popular name, which at first, seemed impractical, but upon a second thought, we have decided to extend such an opportunity to all who wish to compete for prizes. To every registered voter who recommends the winning New Name will be given prizes of from \$1 to \$3 of rose bushes or other plants, to be selected

from Stock on hand at the Biscayne Park Office or from our catalog. Due bills will be issued to each successful contestant, payable in plants anytime within three months, and will be transferrable to anyone needing trees or plants, in case the holder does not. Each Winning Coupon received at the Town Hall before 6 P.M. FRIDAY (TO-NIGHT) will draw a three dollar prize. Each Winning Coupon received at the Town Hall before 6 P.M. Saturday, will draw a \$2.00 prize, and all other winning coupons received at the Town Hall up to 6 P.M. Monday night, will receive a \$1 prize. The result of this Contest will be announced by Mayor Brion at the Council meeting Monday night.

Place your name and address upon the reverse side of coupon before sending to the Town Clerk.

Voters are requested to send Coupons in sealed envelopes, which will not be opened until the contest closes Monday evening, after which "due bills" made payable to "Bearer" will be mailed by the Town Clerk to each Successful Contestant, together with the return of their original Coupons, thus making a Secret Ballot.

This "Straw Vote" is intended only for the guidance of the Mayor and the Town Council to assist them in determining whether or not a change is desired, and if so, to determine the most popular New Name to be voted upon. Should a change be recommended, the Council will take such action as seems proper, and will call for a legal election to settle the matter.

In offering these prizes, it is not the purpose of Biscayne Park Estates to influence voters in favor of any particular name by this method, but rather to stimulate interest in the subject for the purpose of securing prompt action by the Council, and the prizes will be distributed whether the name "Biscayne" or some other name is adopted.

It is also hoped that the distribution of these prizes will revive interest in HOME BEAUTIFICATION in our Town.

and subdivisions of Miami Shores, it would be sufficient to justify and immediate change. The payment of taxes is so hopelessly tangled, that some owners have paid taxes on lots of similar number in the wrong place, and discovered later that the property they really own and believed they were paying on, has been sold for taxes thus causing excessive costs and an endless amount of trouble. This confusion is brought about largely due to the fact that most of the Miami Shores subdivisions are within the City Limits of Miami and practically none of their developed property lies within the limits of our Town.

With a name that we are proud to advertise to the world, we should re-organize our Chamber of Commerce and take our rightful place among the boosters of Greater Miami, and there is no reason why our vacant buildings should not be filled, and business conditions should be equal if not ahead of other sections, as our location at the FRONT DOOR of the Magic City is the most strategic of any locality and it only remains for us to act wisely and do something practical to help ourselves and our Community.

An erroneous impression has been circulated that Griffing wants a change in name just because he wants to borrow some money. THIS IS BY NO MEANS THE PARAMOUNT NEED FOR A CHANGE, yet it is true that our town, and probably no individual in it, will be able to properly finance their operations, while credit is at such a low ebb. It is a matter of general knowledge that our present Town name had a depressing influence on the sale of our municipal bonds last year, and that further financing will be most difficult under existing conditions, whereas, a New and Distinctive Name, with Individuality, would indicate activity, and should our bonds again be placed on the Open Market, either by individuals or the Town, it is believed that much of the present sales resistance would be removed. We all want industries, and we want our Theatre re-built, and eventually our Churches will need construction loans, to say nothing of the necessity of financial help in the building of new homes, apartments, and hotels, and why should we not seek all these things as well as Coral Gables, Miami Beach, or any other community of Greater Miami?

Although BISCAYNE or BISCAYNE CITY are believed to be logical names for our Town, there are others worthy of consideration and we pledge ourselves to support any New Name that is approved by the Majority of the voters in our Town.

In closing we wish to assure everyone that our aim is only to be helpful and that with friendly co-operation, this Town and community will go forward as never before.

### MASS MEETING DISCUSSES SCHOOL

At the mass meeting held in the Town Hall auditorium last Friday evening the first part of the evening was given over to a discussion of the school problem. Mayor Brion opened the meeting, and upon the unanimous vote of the people present Councilman Earl Irons was chosen chairman. After a few preliminary remarks Mr. Irons invited a general discussion of the new school project, and several people spoke at length. Mr. Henry H. Filer, Chairman of the Dade County School Board, being present was invited to speak.

Mr. Filer outlined the difficulties under which the School Board had been laboring since the hurricane of 1926, and gave the people an exact statement of the funds belonging to District Number 4, for the purpose of purchasing sites and erecting buildings. The total amount of bond money in the hands of the school board for this purpose is \$390,000 plus accrued interest, according to Mr. Filer. He made it clear, however, that a large portion of this was raised for specific school sites and buildings, and is therefore not available for a building in Miami Shores.

Between \$170,000 and \$180,000 is available for the new school in the Town of Miami Shores, however, and Mr. Filer stated that the School Board was ready to do with it whatever the people of the Town, or District, wanted. He explained that approximately 20 percent of the amount apportioned for a school is used for the architect's fees and equipment, the equipment naturally being the largest item.

A resolution was passed by a unanimous vote requesting the School Board to build at the earliest possible moment a 28 room school building as suggested in the plans of the architects.

It seemed to be the opinion of the majority of the people present that a Senior High School in addition to the Elementary Grades and the Junior High should be established next year in the new building. The reasons given for this being, that travel to Lemon City or Miami High every day is undesirable, and that people are leaving the Town, others refusing to come here, for the lack of a Senior High.

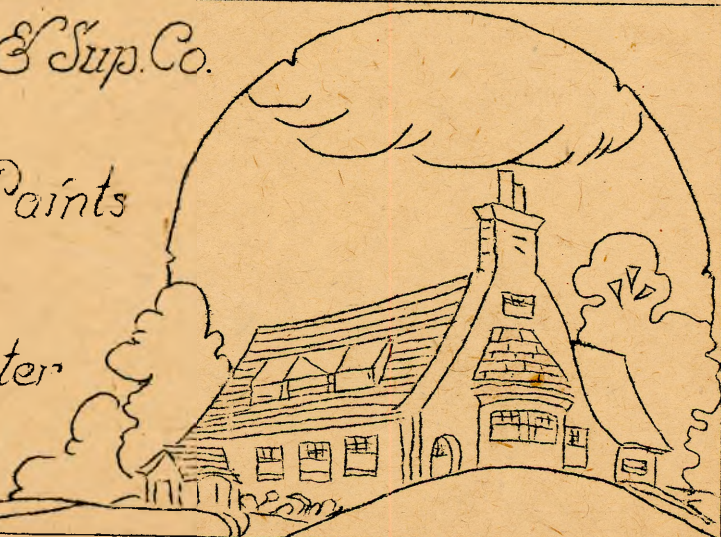
Mr. Filer pointed out the difficulties to be overcome in successfully operating a Senior High School, stating that the cost per pupil in the old Arch Creek High per year at the time of its closing had been between \$150 and \$175, and that Miami High and Lemon City High are able to operate their Senior Departments for approximately \$70 per year per pupil. The difference being in the fact that one teacher in Arch Creek had but ten or twelve pupils to a class while in the downtown schools a teacher was able to care for thirty or more students.

Mr. Filer agreed that if the people of the District wished a Senior High next year that he would see they obtained it, but warned those present that the funds of this district would have to support it, and that if those funds ran out in mid-year the District would have to be content with a half year of school. He also stated that it would be impossible to maintain all departments of a Senior

High in Miami Shores as there would not be enough pupils per subject.

It is the earnest desire of the "Bulletin" to have this matter thoroughly discussed before the final hour for decision has arrived. We most certainly want a Senior High School in Miami Shores to care for northern Dade County. It will guarantee as a larger population, will do away with congestion at Lemon City High to a certain extent, will relieve parents of the worry of transportation, and will be extremely desirable from many angles. At the same time we do not want our school to be closed in the middle of the school term, the pupils left without a school and the teachers without salary --- a three, four or six months school would be a greater detriment than a partially filled building for nine months.

None of us know exactly how many Senior High students there are in the section that would be affected by the creation of such a school here, and that seems to be the logical first step. Then let us learn how they will be divided as to grades or classes and from those two points, aided by a knowledge of the approximate amount of tax funds we will have available in this District, determine whether we can have a fully organized and equipped Senior High School for the regulation nine month year.

The Bulletin will be pleased to publish any statements from either the public or the school board that will help us to come to a common sense conclusion.

Whether we have the Senior High next year or not, we are assured that the new building will be underway. The school board is to call for bids on the 28 room plans and if bids are received within the limit of the appropriation available, amounting to about \$126,000 for construction, the contract will be let and work started as soon as possible. In case the bids are outside the appropriation figure, we are informed, the School Board will notify the trustees of this District and another mass meeting will be called to learn the sentiment of the people on removing the East Wing of the School from the plans and calling for new bids.

The other matters discussed at this meeting will be found reported on other pages of this issue.

# OPEN LETTERS

Editor, Miami Shores Bulletin:

Several of our citizens have asked for my views as to the advisability of changing the name of the town, and for the past couple of weeks I have given the matter considerable thought, and have talked with quite a number of people down in the City as well as here at home and have finally concluded, in my own mind, about as follows:

I am unable to see how the change of the name can do us any harm provided we select a good name and, on the other hand, we have what appears to be very conclusive evidence to the fact that the present name is doing us more or less damage and is detrimental in many ways to our best interests. When our Town was first incorporated and the name "Miami Shores" proposed, I immediately thought of the confusion that might be caused by naming it for a prominent subdivision that is not in our corporate limits, but I dismissed the thought from my mind as an objection when I learned that the City of Miami intended extending its lines to take in the subdivision of Miami Shores, and I anticipated that when taken into the City of Miami, the name it was originally known under would be lost sight of and that ours would be the only section known as "Miami Shores". I now find that I was very much mistaken in expecting such a result and that a great deal of confusion is caused by the subdivision still being well known under the same name as our Town.

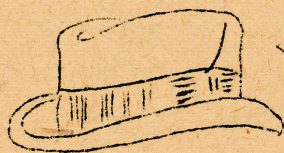
There are many other good reasons for changing the name advanced by our citizens who have carefully analyzed the question and as they are men who have big interests in our town, and are thoroughly and honestly convinced that a change is necessary to our best interests, I have concluded that we should get busy and select a name that will sound as well as the one we have and put the question up to a vote of our citizens as early as possible. I believe, however, that before holding an election, our town attorney should learn from the Postal authorities, the F.E.C.Ry, and the Telegraph Company if they have any serious objections to offer that we should not ignore, and if no objections, how soon they can bring about the necessary changes after we have held the election and decided on a name.

"Have you heard of Miami Shores? It's that nice little municipality or township north of Miami. And it has been said that the Florida Power and Light Co.

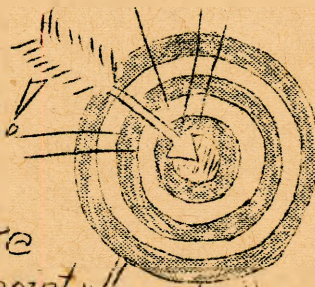

And its hard to part forever with the old swimmin'-hole."

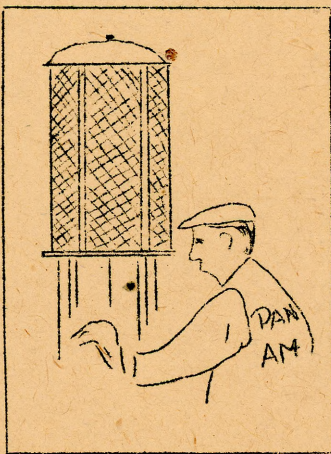
The cold snap brought rejoicing to a few at least! The youngsters all seemed to be glad of the extra days of vacation.

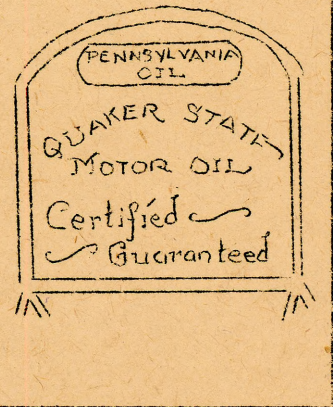

### THE LIBRARY

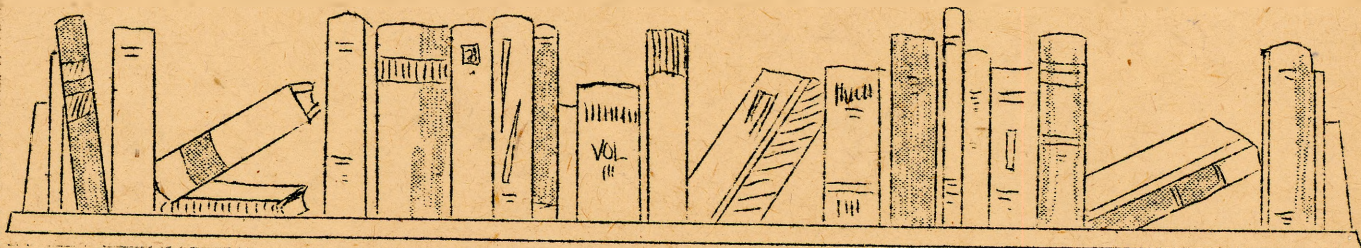

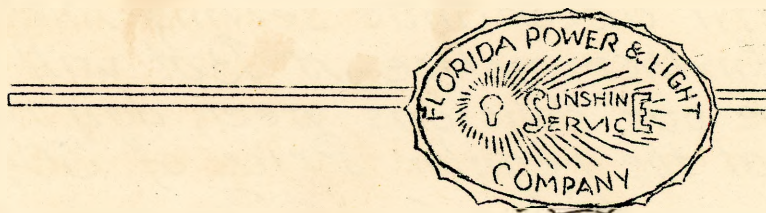

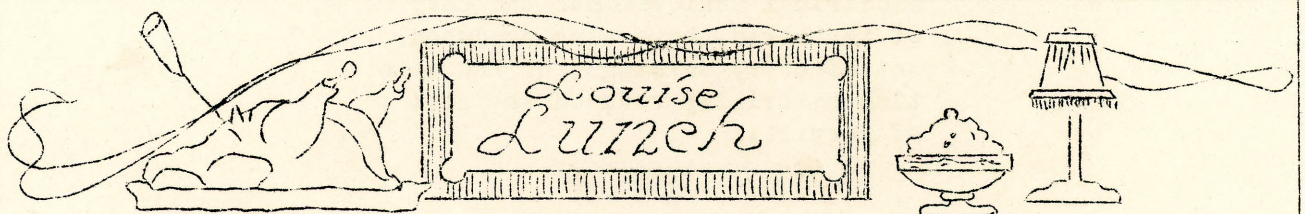
