

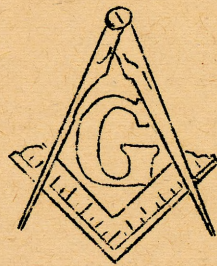

ARGUMENT BEGUN ON TATUM'S SUIT

Preliminary argument was held yesterday afternoon before Circuit Court Judge Paul D. Barnes, upon the Petition brought by Tatum's Ocean Park Company, asking for exclusion of their lands from the corporate limits of the Town of Miami Shores. G.E. McCaskill appeared for the Petitioner, and Edward C. Dougherty for the Town. Upon adjournment, the Court requested both the attorneys to submit briefs on the legal questions raised in the oral argument.

COUNCIL MEETS

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held last Monday evening in the Council Chamber with every member present. The only important item of business appearing before the body being the proposed change in name. The Council decided to sponsor a special Straw Vote on the question, as there was some dissatisfaction over the method used in the Straw Vote held last week. Other members of the Council declared that the vote was not large enough or taken over a long enough period to be representative.

Ballots are available in the Town Clerk's office in the Town Hall, where any registered citizen of the Town may cast one, stating whether or not he favors the change in name, and if so, the name they would prefer to use.

The Council agreed that if the vote was sufficiently in favor of the change they would call a referendum election on the question at the earliest possible moment after the next meeting of the Council (January 23rd). Legal notice of such an election will naturally give sufficient time for the matter to be thoroughly argued throughout the Town and through the columns of the Bulletin to satisfy all.

Elsewhere in this edition may be found letters dealing with the subject, published in the order of their receipt at this office. Citizens are urged to study the matter carefully and then vote their honest conviction on a Straw Ballot at the Town Hall before the 23rd.

OPEN LETTERS

To the Editor of the Miami Shores Bulletin:

May I, through the columns of your paper, answer a letter over the signature of A.M.Griffing, that was circulated through the town alleging that the writer of an article in your last number, and signed "Innocent Bystander", lived in the same house with me, meaning, I suppose, my wife or one of my children. My oldest child is twelve years of age.

He knew this to be untrue as he had ascertained the name of the author before he wrote his letter. Let me assure you that I neither wrote nor inspired the above mentioned letter, though I approve of the sentiment it expressed.

There are several facts which must be borne in mind when a thing as important as changing our Town Name is attempted.

Our Town has been operating now about two years and during the earliest stages we exchanged the old name for the present one for many excellent reasons, and by unanimous consent. This was accomplished after almost endless correspondence with authorities of the U.S.Government in Washington regarding the Post Office, and with the F.E.C. officials in Jacksonville as to the Railroad station name. Then the telegraph followed and we now have the Miami Shores Parent-Teachers Association, the Miami Shores Boy Scout Troop, the Miami Shores American Legion Post, the Miami Shores Masonic Lodge, etc, etc. By means of immense effort and many hours of continuous labor these changes were able to be effected, because we then had a legitimate reason as our incorporation area embraced many sections, whereas these public utilities bore the name of a small local section which had fallen into disuse and could scarcely be said to cover our whole district. A change would now cost at least several thousand dollars as well as bring endless confusion.

Our citizens have only five months ago refused to sanction a change in our name by a smashing majority of five to one and they will undoubtedly repeat this if they are forced into another election.

Remember that the name we have adopted contains that magic word "MIAMI" with its enormous advertising value known the world over. The two great conventions now booked here will put that name on the front page of all papers where English is spoken.

You have heard the droakers lament the difficulties the Miami Shores Company went through. Nearly every company in Florida went through the same kind of trouble but the name apparently has suffered no material harm, because I am reliably informed that two of the largest financial institutions in America are joining hands to get this great constructive program into operation, and please note this:- THEY ARE HOLDING FAST to the name that a few of our citizens WOULD HAVE US DISCARD. Do you think that it is good policy for us to try to discredit the name of Miami Shores just as it seems certain that this great enterprise is about to start up in our midst? Rather than welcoming it, it would look as though we wished to affront, and the undertaking will eventually mean several million dollars in improvement.

The name Biscayne has been suggested for a change and the Proponent says there will be no confusion. Well, we have Biscayne Park, Biscayne Bay, Biscayne Shores Subdivision, Old Biscayne with the Railroad Station, Biscayne Heights, etc., etc, forever. He is right, it would not be confusion, it would be a riot.

After all, I think we have a mighty good name. It sounds good and it wears well. If you tell a man in Portland, Maine, or in Kalamazoo, Michigan, that your home is in Miami Shores, Florida, he will not ask you if that is a suburb of Jacksonville or over near Sarasota! I am for keeping it as it is.



confuse our proposed kind with the Miami Shores Auction sales that are advertised for next week on the Front Steps of the Court House. We are told this sale next week is to clear Land Titles from thousands of contracts, so that the New Companies who have incorporated in the State of Delaware can hold this land and revoke the old plats so as to turn the land back into acreage, to avoid excess taxation, and then hold the land in an undeveloped condition until "Something Happens" or until Somebody again DOES SOMETHING to create values for them. We are told that the RE-ORGANIZED COMPANIES HAVE A NEW NAME, and it is assumed that this is done to avoid the liabilities and obligations of the old companies.

We are not referring to this change of their corporation name, for the purpose of discrediting the Old Miami Shores Companies, but this same question was discussed in open meeting last Monday night and it is plain to see what a deplorable condition our town is left in, since the public in general cannot differentiate between SUBDIVISION AND TOWN names, the way matters stand now, and we are sure to suffer for the losses of their failures as long as we keep the present Town name.

The Straw Vote taken last week proves to any fair minded person that the thinking people of this Town are eager for a change in name. The tally of Naming Coupons turned in is as follows:

96 favored a change of name, and 4 were against changing the name. Of these 100 Coupons, 60 recommended "BISCAYNE", 25 "BISCAYNE PARK", 7 "BISCAYNE SHORES", 4 "BISCAYNE CITY" and 1 "WANAMASA"

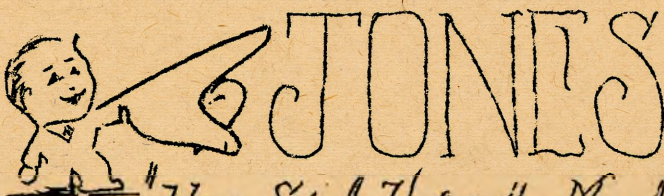
This proves our contention that "BISCAYNE" is the logical name and with the results obtained, in spite of the persistent opposition of certain "OBSTRUCTIONISTS" we feel encouraged over the prospect of yet Boosting our City to the forefront among the Best, in this Greater Miami area.

Those loyal Boosters who voted for a change last week, are naturally disappointed over the failure of the Council to immediately call the official election, and the Public is entitled to a full explanation.

When the Coupons were counted in Closed session of the Council Monday night and the result announced by the Town Clerk, a Certain "OBSTRUCTIONIST" member of our board, refused to accept the majority rule principle and attempted to defeat the whole issue over some technicality. To compromise the matter the Council decided to ask for a second STRAW VOTE, which was later clearly announced in open meeting Monday night.

The real object of this "OBSTRUCTIONIST" movement was to give them two more weeks in which to DEFEAT PROGRESS and stir up dissenstion in our Town.

There may be other names just as good as BISCAYNE, however that name seems to be greatly in the lead. One speaker Monday night scored a good point, when he cited the precedent that prominent cities throughout the World take the name of the Bay upon which they border, as for instance Naples on the Bay of Naples, San Francisco on San Francisco Bay, New York on New York Bay, Mobile on Mobile Bay, Pensacola on Pensacola Bay, Tampa on Tampa Bay, etc, etc., and why not capitalize our City by naming it after our Famous Biscayne Bay? Friends let us all do our duty during this next week and enter the contest in earnest. A LARGE MAJORITY VOTE IS NEEDED TO BRING DECISIVE ACTION, as the ENEMY can always find some TECHNICALITY to cause delay if the voters do not SPEAK WITH A STRONG VOICE.

Do not neglect your duty, thinking that there will be a majority anyway, and that your "YES" vote is not necessary to success. Let's make the Straw Vote as near UNANIMOUS as the first one and then all pull together for PEACE and PROSPERITY.

Every citizen who is registered, or who is eligible to register is requested to cast their votes as early as possible, and in no event later than January 23rd, the date of the next Council meeting. Voters must personally deposit their votes in the Ballot Box in the Town Hall, and may do so any day up to and including January 23rd, and each voter is requested to write upon the ballot the NEW NAME of their choice. The Town Clerk, or some other person in charge at the Town Hall will furnish you the ballots.

All persons eligible to vote who are not registered, may register and vote on this question at the same time and at the same place. It costs nothing to register. You can pay your poll tax now, or later, and this can also be paid at the Town Hall.

This STRAW VOTE is called for the purpose of determining whether or not an official election shall be called, and also to ascertain the name of your choice. Do not overlook writing the NEW NAME of YOUR CHOICE ON THE BALLOT before you drop it in the box.

DOGS TO BE LICENSED AND VACCINATED

Attention is again called by the Town officials to the ordinance passed in December 1926 by the Town Council, requiring all dogs to be licensed, and also providing that all dogs in the Town be innoculated to prevent an outbreak of hydrophobia.

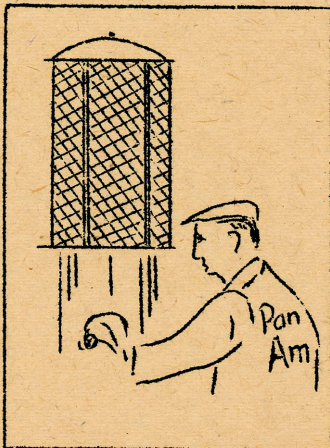
Dr. Knowles is to be at the Town Hall next Monday and Tuesday evenings, January 16th and 17th for the purpose of innoculating the dogs. The charge for this is \$2.00.

John A. Mahood, Collector of Taxes, announces that brass tags, suitable for fastening to a dog's collar, will be issued bearing the date of the innoculation. The Ordinance provides that all dogs in the Town must wear such a tag.

After a reasonable period as provided by the Ordinance, the Town Marshal will be required to impound all stray dogs, or dogs without tags, and if they are not redeemed by the owners within five days, to destroy them.

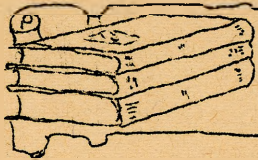
PAY YOUR 1927 POLL TAX NOW!

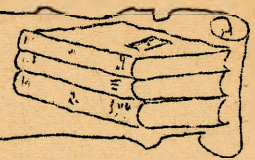

ORDINANCE NO. 78

AN ORDINANCE, Requiring that all dogs in the Town of Miami Shores shall be licensed, and that all dogs shall be innoculated against hydrophobia.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI SHORES:

Section 1. That no person shall own, possess or harbor a dog within the Town of Miami Shores without first procuring a license therefor at the Town Hall, and no such license shall be granted until a veterinary's certificate has been produced, showing that such dog has been innoculated against hydrophobia.

Section 2. Licenses shall be issued in the form of metallic plates numbered serially, and no person shall allow any dog which he owns, possesses or harbors to be or remain out of doors unless such license plate or tag shall be securely fastened to the collar which the dog shall wear.

Section 3. If any person shall violate any provision of this Ordinance he shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or imprisoned not more than thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 4. The Town Marshal shall, after the fifteenth day of January each year, impound all dogs at large within the Town which shall be found without license plates or tags for the current year, and such dogs shall, if not redeemed within five (5) days from the date of impounding, be put to death.

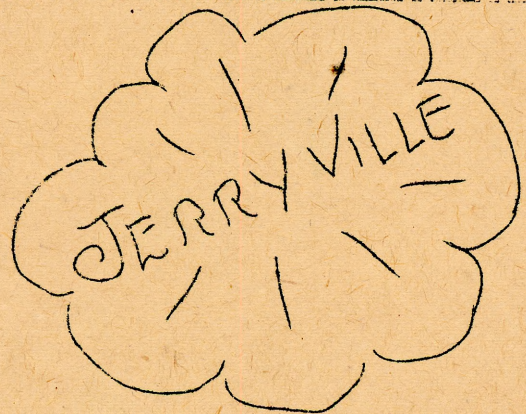

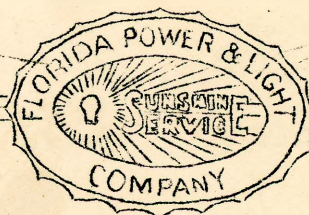
