EDITORIAL



THE PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS AT HAVANA

One hundred and fifty-one years ago our forefathers cheered the pealing of the Liberty Bell as it announced the birth of a new nation, dedicated to the highest ideals ever incorporated in a single government. Far to the south of the scene of that far reaching event there then existed governments that had been established somewhere back in the shadows of history's beginning. Nations already weary with the weight of years, attempting to wold into one flesh the blood of the Aztec and the Castillian.

Today, that infant nation of a century and a half ago, looms mightily at the Council table of the Pan-American Congress, regarded by many of the off-spring of those ancient nations of Mexico and South America as a protecting father; hated and feared by still others. Twenty nations represented there from south of Florida, yet those twenty bow an attentive ear to the faintest whisper from the twenty-first!

There are some delegates there who would like to openly condemn the United States of America in the sessions of that Congress for its interference in the internal troubles of a South American republic, where to-day our Marines fight hand to hand with the "rebels" who hope to overthrow the government recognized by our government. But, apparently, those few who question our motives are outnumbered by those others who remember the mighty Monroe Doctrine!

As we read from day to day in many of the periodicals of our country the abuse being heaped upon the State Department at Washington for its intervention in Nicaragua, we wonder if the writers have forgotten the text of the Monroe Doctrine, which they must have studied while in school, ---- perhaps they think it is obsolete. It may be that they have failed to read the requests of the only stabalized government Nicaragua has ever known for help from our government.

The United States has become the friend and protector of all these nations "South of the Line", and despite the cries of the scandal seekers and the suspicious minded, we believe it is good for us. The man who lives only for himself, with no thought of help and service to his fellows, destroys his own usefulness. So is it among nations. And the beautiful part of it is, that except for this election fight in Nicaragua, our work among these twenty nations has largely been of helpfulness in Science, Sanitation, Engineering, and Business.

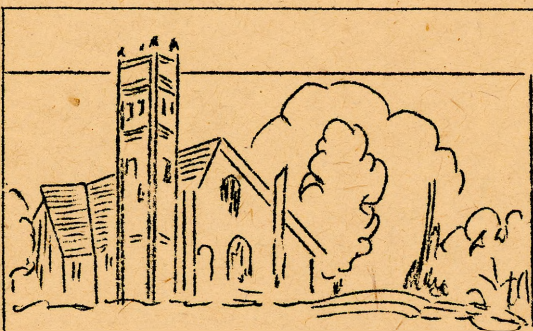

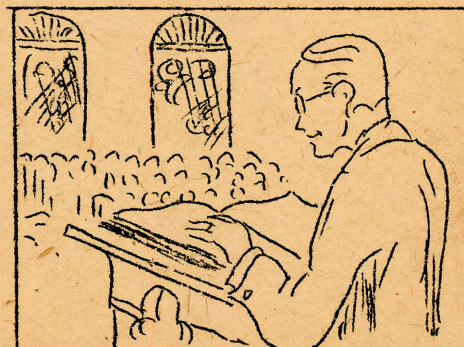

Twenty Scouts were present at the Court and four visitors, reports Lawrence "Lefty" Woods, the troop Scribe.

February 6th to 12th is Anniversary Week of the Boy Scouts of America and will be observed by Troop 42 of Miami Shores in the same manner as other troops all over the United States. The "Bulletin" will devote the greater part of its issue of the week preceding Anniversary week to the Boy Scout movement.

THURSDAY - CITIZENS DAY - Every troop to do Community good turn. Program in which civic officials will participate. (Over)

FRIDAY AND SATURDAY - Plans incomplete. Will have awarding Court of Honor and special big time either Friday or Saturday evening, or Saturday afternoon.

SUNDAY - SCOUT SUNDAY AND PATRIOT'S DAY - Pastors of all Churches are requested to preach special Scout sermons. Troops attend some Church in a body.

Burdine's Department Store have offered their Roof for an exhibit of Scout Craft during the entire week. The various Divisions will present special exhibits, such as Knots and Splices, A miniature of Pine Island Camp, Nature Study, Pioneering, First Aid, Craftsmanship, Fires and Cooking, Camping, and Seamanship and Canoeing. Announcement will be made in a few days of the work that 42 will exhibit.

Announcement has been made that during the second week in March an official inspection will be made of Troop 42 by the Dade County Scout Leaders. President Chas. Mills of the County Council, Scout Commissioner Bartle, Scout Executive John C. Norsk and members of the Executive Board will make the inspection. All Scouts will be in uniform, and members of the local Troop Committee will be present.

The Scout Headquarters Building on the School grounds is rapidly nearing completion. The Council Ring is in place and the rocks ready to build the hearth. The several patrols are working on their Totem Poles to be placed in the ring. Seats are to be placed in the building, lockers built, and a fireplace built in. Trophies, and souvenirs of many kinds will adorn the walls. It is expected that either during the Anniversary week or at the time of the Inspection in March the Building will be formally dedicated.

Announcement was made at Dade County Headquarters Wednesday that Mr. Charles H. Coe an expert in rope throwing and knot tying and splicing will give an exhibition to Scouts, Saturday, January 21st (tomorrow) at 2 P.M. at the American Legion Arena, in the rear of the Dade County Scout Headquarters, 8th. Street and Biscayne Boulevard. It is expected that there will be a large delegation of Miami Shores Scouts present to see this rope artist do the famous western stunts, and also receive advanced instruction in knot tying and splicing.

DOGS MUST BE INOCULATED

A veterinary will be in attendance at the Town Hall next Tuesday evening, January 24th, at 7:30 P.M. for the purpose of innoculating dogs against hydrophobia. The veterinary's fee is \$2.00

It was announced at the Town Hall by Mayor Brion that the Town Marshal has been instructed to enforce, on the following day, Wednesday, January 25th, the provisions of Ordinance No. 78. Under the provisions of this Ordinance, any person who owns, possesses or harbors a dog within the Town of Miami Shores that has not been so innoculated will be subject to fine or imprisonment. The Ordinance also provides that all dogs not so innoculated shall be impounded and put to death.

It has been rumored that dogs innoculated last year would not need to be innoculated now. This is erroneous, and all dogs must be innoculated at this time, as last year's innoculation will not suffice. This treatment does not last for more than one year.

CHANGE IN NAME STRAW VOTE

So far there seems to have been little interest shown in the straw vote for the guidance of the Council in calling an election on changing the name of the Town. Between fifty and sixty citizens had availed themselves of the privilege of casting a straw ballot up to Wednesday night, it is reported. The majority of the people are doubtless waiting until the last few days in order to hear all of the arguments on both sides of the question before voting their preference.

There seems to be an erroneous impression about Town that those people who sent in coupons at the time of the first straw vote two weeks ago, need not cast their ballots in this straw election. This is a false impression, as the other vote was ruled out, and the present one will alone guide the council in its decision. The same applies to those who signed petitions. IF YOU HAVE NOT CAST A STRAW BALLOT AT THE TOWN HALL SINCE THE LAST COUNCIL MEETING YOU HAVE NOT YET OFFICIALLY VOTED IN THE PRESENT ELECTION.

The ballot will close next Monday evening, and the ballots will be turned over to the Town Council at its regular meeting on that evening. It is supposed that the Council will announce its decision soon after counting the ballots as to whether or not there will be a legal election on the question.

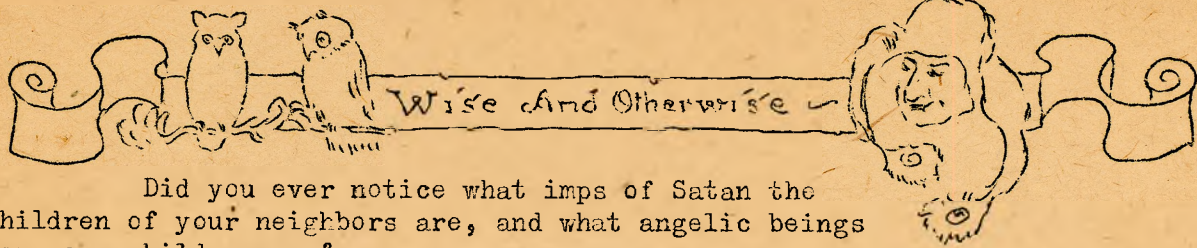

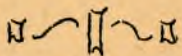

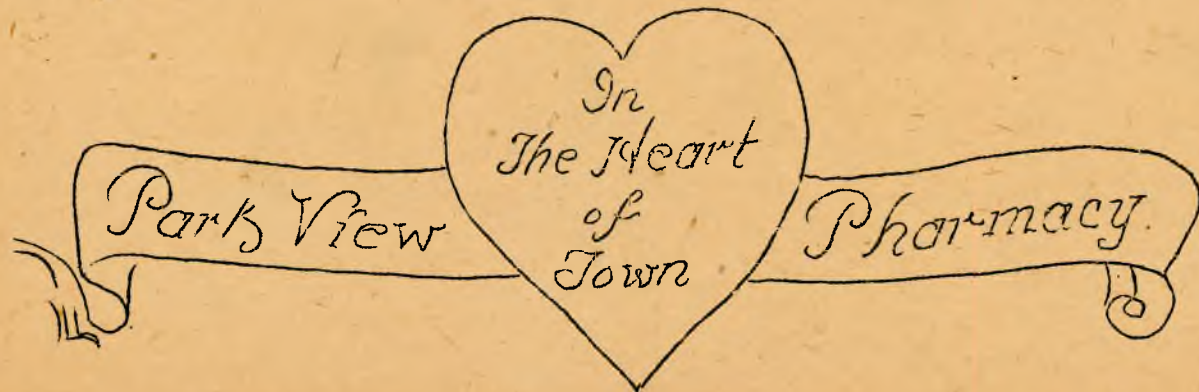

OPEN LETTERS

Editor, Miami Shores Bulletin:

In an editorial of January, 13th, you say, "Let us all grant the other fellow the right to think according to the dictates of his own conscience." On the cover of January 6th, after the question "Shall We Change the Name of Our Town?" is the invitation, "Write the Editor your ideas on this important matter."

I find nothing in any Bulletin to the effect that only those who want the name changed are to express their ideas, therefore I feel free -- to say more.

Why all the bitterness and resentment because anyone dares speak on the opposite side?

It is apparent that there is no organization, clique nor individual among the many who want to keep our Town name that is neither offering bribes, threatening, or intimidating those who are so unfortunate as not to feel free to express themselves openly.

In the last two weeks I have heard many express their ideas on the subject. There were only TWO who were not EAGER to keep the name. Of the two, one was undecided and the other was willing the name should be changed, but NOT to "Biscayne".

It seems undignified to reply, in any way, to a letter so insulting as the one signed Arthur M. Griffing, dated January 17th, and mailed to many voters. It has had the effect of reacting against the writer I am told. The ideas in my January 6th letter to the Bulletin, which he tries to impress you are not original with me, I had heard expressed by many different people. They really are AXIOMS!

I find that the townspeople generally have the impression that to progress we should go on with our wonderful name, which has been widely known for two years, and that to change would be going backward two years.

There seems to be a general feeling of indignation that the people should be put to the trouble of coming out to vote again on a matter they have just settled, or to have another election called.

He insults the intelligence of the whole community when he tries to make them think that the sentence, "A change would cost at least several thousand dollars as well as bringing endless confusion" which appeared in the Bulletin of January 14th was intended to convey the impression that an ELECTION would cost that amount, and states that it would only cost Fifty Dollars. The change would cost thousands of dollars in the making of the necessary changes in names, titles, maps, stations, Post Office, and the resulting confusion.

May I ask who is the obstructionist? The man who is in such a frenzy to take away our name, which is that also of "the most wonderful development ever planned, chiefly on account of location, not excepting Coral Gables" (Mr. Griffing's own sent-

Will it not, instead, soon overshadow all surrounding developments? Is it not true that before subdivisions in that condition can be refinanced they have to go through an auction sale?

Really, I think that my writing again at all is superfluous, but several have asked me to, and then, it is said, "A woman WILL have the last word!" And also I repeat, "Nothing has occurred since the last election to change the minds of the people"

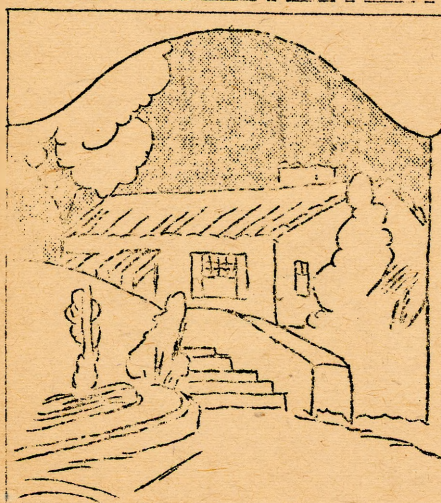
"Buzz, buzz, buzz", sed Mr. Bee.

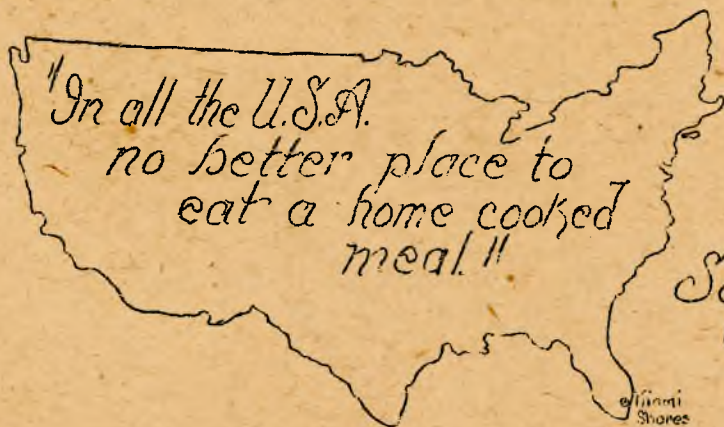

THE POETRY CONTEST

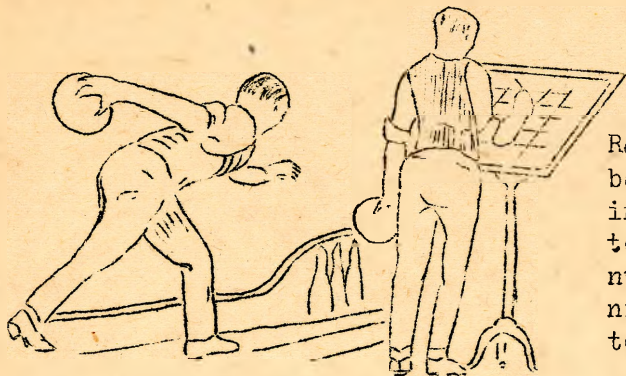

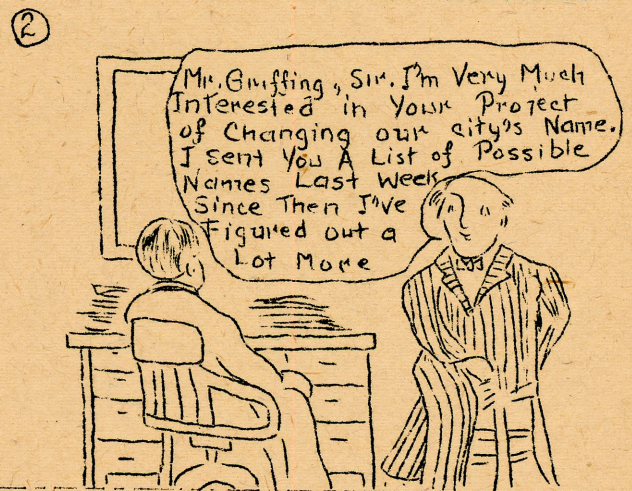
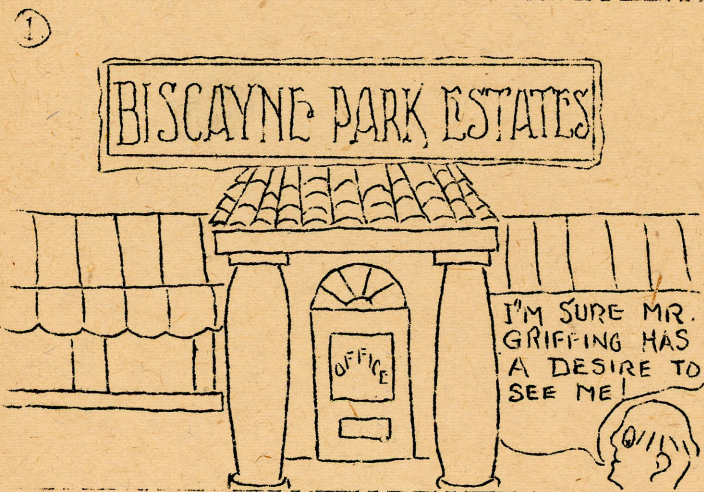
