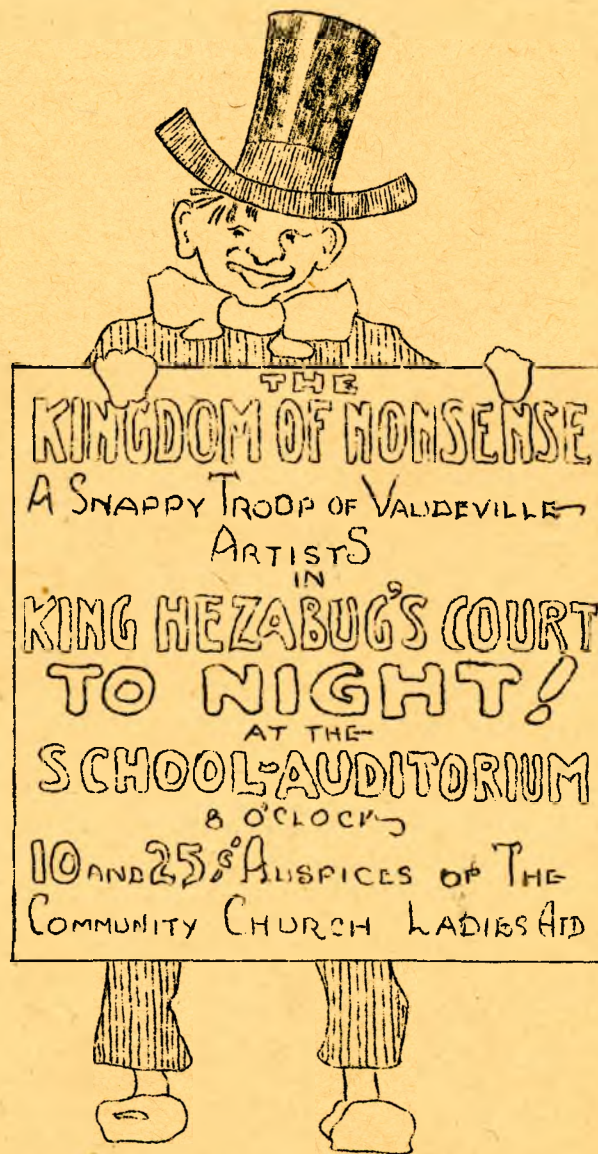

WE'VE PLAYED LONG ENOUGH NOW

On February the Fifth our 1928 administration went into office, and a week later the first effort was made to fill the vacancy caused by the election of Councilman Jeffries to the office of Mayor. For five weeks the Council, the Mayor, and all able bodied citizens of the Town have attempted to fill that vacancy.....but it is still there!

The laws of the Town of Miami Shores state that when such a vacancy exists it is the duty of the Mayor to recommend a person to the Council to fill the vacancy, and it then becomes the duty of the Council to either ratify the appointment or reject it.

The Council vote was split evenly on the ratification of the appointment recommended by the Mayor -- -- and promptly got itself into a very embarrassing position by voting to transact no other business until a successor to Mr. Jeffries was chosen.

It has now become necessary to break that voted agreement, and still we have no Councilman! One member of the body has found it necessary to go away on business for a time, and we have five members of our legislative group in Town.

It has been suggested by the Council that we hold an election on the matter, but we held an election last November and put into office a Mayor and Council to take care of these matters --- WHY ASK US TO DO YOUR WORK?

It is folly to state that our officers can't get together on such a matter, and do what is best for the present and future of Miami Shores! Of course they can. They are all good citizens, and all of the men so far suggested to fill the vacancy are good men -- LET'S QUIT PLAYING AND GET DOWN TO BUSINESS, NOW!

A sub-committee in charge of this work visited the local Lodge of Masons Tuesday evening, and conferred with the members and officers regarding the formation of a Beautification Committee in Miami Shores.

It is expected that the next week will see this committee organized and full details of the contest will be published in the Bulletin as soon as available.

POLITICAL BARBECUE TO BE HELD MAY 24TH

The Booster Lodge of Knights of Pythias of Miami Shores has announced that they will again hold a Political Barbecue preceding the Democratic Primaries this year.

For the past fifteen years this lodge has held such a barbecue a week or two before the primaries on Presidential Election Year. It has come to be one of the historical institutions of Dade County and will be larger and better than ever before, according to the Committee in charge, headed by W.P. Brion.

It is the custom of all of the candidates for office in Dade County to attend the Barbecue and speak to the assembled populace. An attendance of 2,500 is expected from all parts of the County.

"Dad" Wiggins, Florida's premier Barbecue Chef is to again be in charge of the preparation of the 1,500 pounds of meat, and will also act as Master of Ceremonies during the speaking.

The tentative date for this affair has been set on May the 24th., a week or two after the qualification of candidates and ten days before the election itself.

Enlarged interest in the affair is occasioned by the announcement that one or more of the candidates for Governor will be present and speak, and that various candidates for the Democratic National Convention at Houston, Texas, have also indicated that they would attend.

The ceremonies of the day begin early in the morning and continue throughout the afternoon. Every one from Homestead and Florida City to the Broward County line will be extended an invitation to be present.

HAWTHORNE ACTING AS DEPUTY SUPERVISOR

Town Clerk Henry Hawthorne has been appointed a deputy supervisor of registration for Dade County and will have the necessary registration books at his office in the Town Hall beginning Monday, March the 12th.

All citizens of this community are urged to register early for the primaries to be held on June the 5th. This will be one of the most important elections held in many years and a record vote is expected.

So far only a few candidates have announced themselves for the several offices in this District, but a large number are known to have the Political Bee buzzing about and it is expected that the next ten days or two weeks will see an unusual number of candidates announce.

Offices to be voted on in this district are Commissioner; Justice of the Peace, and Constable, in addition to the County offices.

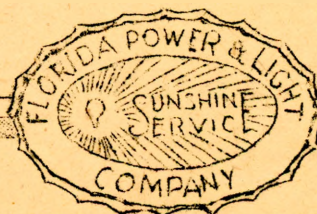

BOY SCOUT NEWS

The Dade County Council "Scout Bulletin" for March 7th makes the following announcement of the growth of the movement in this county:

"February 29th marks the passing of the 1100 mark of registered Scouts in Dade County. 1128 Scouts divided into 44 Troops, the highest record yet attained by this Council."

The Dade County Fair begins the week of March 12th. As in previous years the services of Boy Scouts are needed. A tent will be erected equipped for emergencies; Scouts will be on hand each afternoon and evening for the entire week. It is the intention of the Fair officials to use Scouts as ushers in the monster demonstration of "The Fall of Troy". In addition to this there will be many minor tasks about the Fair for the Scouts who report for duty. The Live Oak Division of which Troop 42 is a part if assigned for duty on Tuesday, March 13th.

All scouts who can conveniently do so, are requested to be on the Fair Grounds as many afternoons and evenings as possible. They will report to the Deputy Commissioner in charge of the headquarters tent for assignment to duty.

The American Legion will have charge of the soft drink concession at the "Fall of Troy" spectacle. They need about 60 boys to work with them. All local scouts who are interested in obtaining employment in this work are to report to P.H. Gillespie between 1 and 5 P.M. Saturday at the City Employment Bureau in the American Legion Building at 8th St. and Biscayne Boulevard. Scouts will not be allowed to wear the uniform on this work as they will be receiving pay for it. All Scouts, however, who report for duty at the fair grounds for volunteer work will be required to wear the uniform.

The examining Court of Honor for the Live Oak Division met at the Town Hall last Saturday night, with a good attendance of officers, Scouts and visitors.

Thurlow Chase, Henry Shaeffer and Robbie Rexford were given the First Class rank.

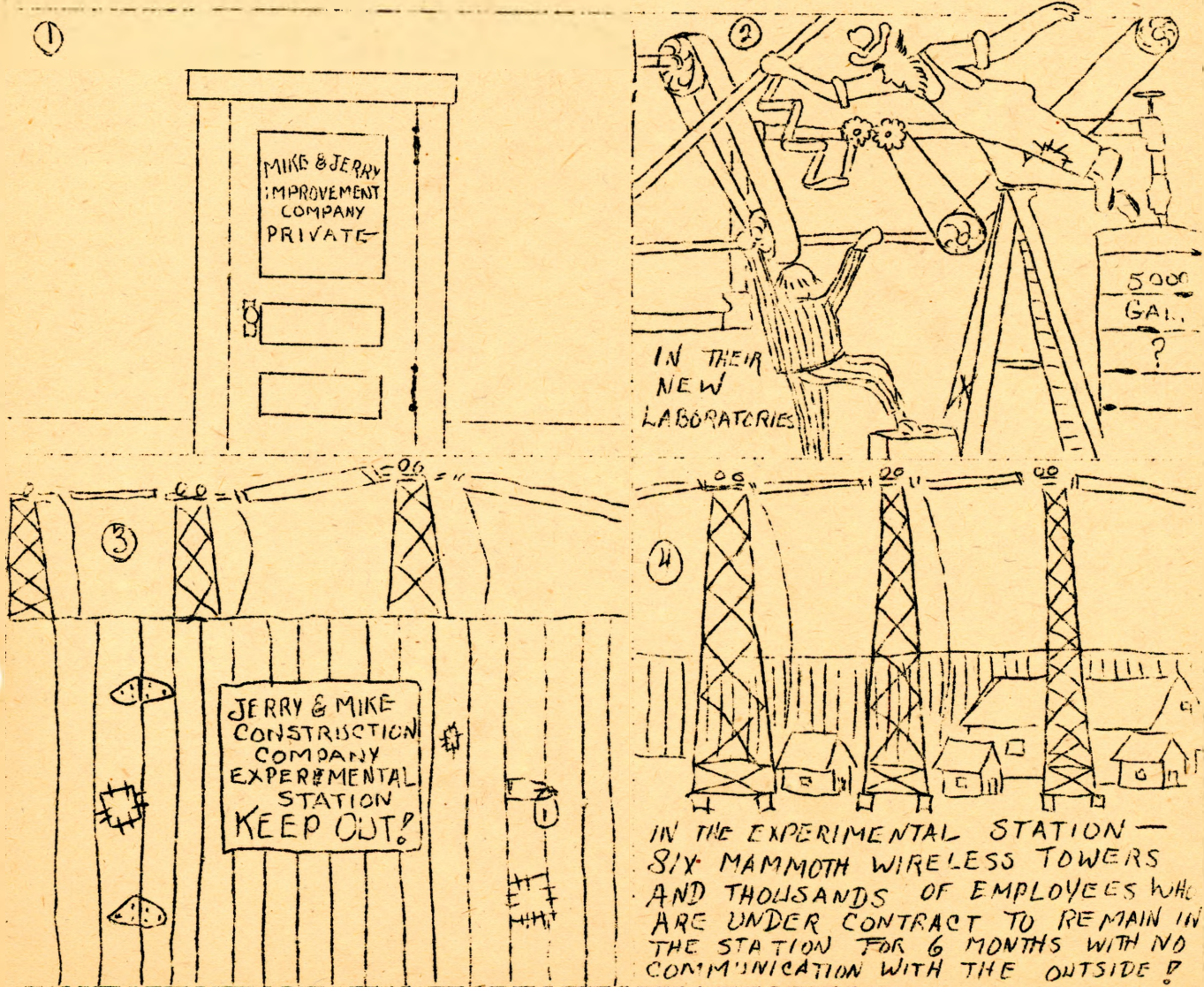
