

Basketball Looks To Continue Climb

Both the men's and women's basketball teams look to continue their climb at the Division I level. For the men, Head Coach Bob Weltlich and his squad are looking for their first winning season since becoming Division I in 1987-88. For the women, Cindy Russo and her squad are aiming for its first NCAA Tournament after advancing to the National Invitational Tournament a year ago.

Senior Dwight Stewart headlines the list of players on the men's team. He led the team with an 18.3 scoring average and 6.4 rebounding average last season and is the current holder of 23 school records.

Three other returning starters give Weltlich an experienced and veteran team heading into the '92-93 campaign. Sean Prude (9.5 ppg, 5.2 rpg), Clarence "Bobo" Flournory (7.0 ppg, 4.8 rpg) and Benny Valdes (5.0 ppg, 123 assists) started for most of the year and should all play key roles in the Golden Panthers bid at their first Trans

America Athletic Conference championship.

Michael Joiner and Matt Tchir are returning lettermen, while Keith Greer returns after sitting out the 1991-92 campaign with a knee injury.

Five newcomers could also play key roles in the team's success. Chuck Stuart (Lon Morris (TX) College), Neville Marriott (Gulf Coast CC), Malcolm Nicholas (Miami Senior HS and Palm Beach CC), Damon Wilcox (North Miami Beach HS) and Stefan Young (Fatima College (Trinidad)) all should aid in the team's success.

On the women's side, six returning players give Cindy Russo optimism heading into the coming year. Leading the way is Andrea Nagy, a first-team All-TAAC selection, who was also named to two freshman All-American teams. She set a single season school record with 282 assists.

Albena Branzova returns after leading the team in scoring and finishing second on the team in rebounding a year ago. She averaged 15.8 points and 7.4 rebounds and was named a second-team All-TAAC performer.

Desi Dakova, Shelly Godboldte, Ursula Roach and Katina Curry all return from a year ago, while Julie Auger returns for her junior year after sitting out the 1991-92 year.

Five newcomers could also play prominent roles in the team returning to post-season play. Tatana Pokorna (Prague, Czechoslovakia), Rachel Matakas (Olathe, Kansas), Renee Jacksch (Vienna, Virginia), Karlin Sedlacik (Council Bluffs, Iowa) and Alison Tunnicliff (Ajax, Ontario) round out the lineup.

Matakas was the Kansas Player of the Year, while Sedlacik was named a junior college All-American. Pokorna has played in several European Junior Championships, winning the gold medal in 1988.

WKLG-FM To Air Golden Panther Basketball

WKLG Radio (102.1 FM) will air Golden Panther basketball in 1992-93, Athletic Director Dr. Dick Young announced.

Steve Michael will handle the play-by-play for the third consecutive year. Michael has been in the broadcast business for 17 years and is seen throughout the year on ESPN, SportsChannel and Prime Network broadcasting boatracing, waterskiing and tennis events. The Minnesota native has also broadcast in the past for the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma City University.

WKLG, a fifty thousand watt station located in Key Largo, has a listenership in Monroe, Dade and South Broward Counties.

WKLG will air all 30 regular season contests, beginning with the regular season opener on December 1 against the University of Miami.

"I am extremely pleased to be able to deliver the upcoming season — all 30 games — on the number-one modern country station in Monroe County, with great penetration into Dade and Southern Broward Counties," Young said.

Fall Sports Recap

Cross Country

For the second consecutive year, both the men's and women's cross country teams swept the Trans America Athletic Conference team titles. Head Coach Mike Becker's men's team nosed out Georgia State by eight points, while Sally Carei-Martinez's women's team ran away from the pack by defeating runner-up Georgia State by 37 points.

On the men's side, five runners finished among the top ten to help the Golden Panthers rally for the victory. Georgia State placed three runners among the top four finishers, but Calvin Whitaker led a charge that gave FIU the team title. Whitaker finished in third place, while Joe Maselter (5th), Jimmy Sellers (7th), Scott Pasterski (8th) and Brian Herring (10th) all earned All-Conference honors as well.

On the women's side, the Golden Panthers placed four runners among the top five finishers to easily capture its fourth conference crown in the past five years. Michele Owen finished first and was named the TAAC Runner of the Year, while Joanne Kluss (2nd), Kristen Lawton (3rd), Shar Crader (5th) and Raquel Guzman (10th) earned All-Conference honors as well. Carei-Martinez was named the TAAC Women's Coach of the Year.

Men's Soccer

After finishing the 1991 campaign with a 17-3-3 record and advancing to the NCAA Division I Tournament for the first time, Head Coach Karl Kremser's squad finished the '92 campaign with a 10-9-1 record.

Against a schedule which included six teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament, the Golden Panthers dropped eight one-goal decisions during the season, including contests against nationally-ranked St. Louis, Southern Methodist, Creighton and defending NAIA national champion Lynn.

Kike Ruiz was the team's top weapon during the season as he tallied 34 points, the most by an FIU player in six years. He moved up to fifth on the school's all-time career scoring chart with 74 career points.

Don Gaillard finished his brilliant four-year career in fourth place on the school's all-time career scoring chart with 28 goals and 24 assists for 80 points.

Titto Torrejon, Chris Rue and Matt Melde all scored in double figures and moved into the school's top 25 all-time career scorers. Trent Tokos had his second consecutive solid season on defense.

Freshman Jeff Cassar started much of the year in goal and finished with two solo shutouts and a 1.41 goals against average. Bryan Boes also posted two shutouts in goal and finished with a 1.06 goals against average.

Women's Soccer

Head Coach Everton Edwards' women's squad finished its most successful season in 1992 with a 13-4-1 record and a No. 20 national ranking. The team has now been nationally-ranked at the end of each of the past two years and has posted a 22-8-2 record in that span. This season, the squad recorded a school-record ten-game unbeaten streak.

Catherine Liller continues to pile up the points, as she is the school's all-time leading scorer with 90 career points (34 goals and 22 assists). She tallied 11 goals and nine assists for a team-leading 31 points this season.

Cindy Greenman's 27 points (12 goals and three assists) were the most by a freshman in the eight-year history of the program. Delia DeSilva tallied 11 goals and three assists for 25 points. She moved into third place on the school's all-time scoring chart with 45 career points.

Sue-Moy Chin ranked among the top goalkeepers in the South Region, as she finished with eight shutouts (four solo) and a 1.03 goals against average.

The women posted victories over Arkansas, Tulsa, Vanderbilt and Mercer, all regionally-ranked teams, and tied nationally-ranked Duke.

Volleyball

Head Coach John Trojaniak's squad finished the season with a 13-14 record and a second-place finish in the conference tournament. Despite having to overcome many obstacles following Hurricane Andrew, Trojaniak rallied his troops and had a great turnaround following a 5-20 1991 campaign.

After beginning its practice season in early August, the team missed eight days of practice due to damage from the hurricane. Practice began again just two days prior to the opening tournament of the year in Conway, South Carolina and one of those practices was on a sand court near the school's dormitories.

The team finished that first tournament with a 2-2 record and spent much of the year around the .500 mark. Kiki Okeke and Luciano Louriero led the team most of the year. They had 249 and 229 kills, respectively. Louriero was also the team's top defensive player, while Jennifer Marek led the team for the second straight year with a season-best 785 assists.

Men's and Women's Golf

Both golf teams have shown dramatic turnarounds since the hiring of John Cusano in October, 1991. The women finished no lower than sixth in any fall event, while the men had a best of fourth out of 18 teams in the Embry-Riddle Invitational with an 899 total.

Moira Dunn continues to be the top performer on the women's team. She finished in the top ten in all three events, including runner-up at the Duke Invitational with an even-par 148 total. Maria Mills also turned in a fine fall season with a 78.1 scoring average and a tenth place finish at the Lady Seminole Invitational.

On the men's side, Chris Allen was the top player with a 75.5 scoring average in the fall. Keith Grassing finished second on the team with a 76.7 scoring average, while Ignacio Garcia (77.6), Derrick Cox (79.3) and Scott Brassard (79.3) all, averaged less than 80 strokes per round.

The highlight of the year came in the Embry-Riddle Tournament, when Ignacio Garcia made a rare double-eagle two on a par-five hole, knocking a six-iron into the hole from 200 yards away.

A Financial Update

Not unlike most areas of the university, the state budget crisis has hit the department of intercollegiate athletics hard. Cost increases exceeding \$750,000 have been imposed on the athletic budget over the last two years, while revenue has increased approximately \$300,000 over the same period of time.

Cost cutting initiatives have been extensive as a result of the new

expenses. Areas affected most noticeably include team scholarships, travel and equipment allocations, while administrative support areas such as marketing, promotions, sports information and overall staffing have experienced a "tightening of the belt" as well.

Because of these non-controllable cost increases it has become particularly important to concentrate on the areas of marketing and promotions, ticket and concession sales together with private sector fundraising.

The activities of the Golden Panther Club are more important today than ever before. I hope all members will commit to an all out effort to maintain the forward momentum of the FIU Athletic program through increased membership and overall financial support.

NCAA Rules Designed For Benefit of Student-Athletes

As the 1990's are well underway, the NCAA's latest rules have been implemented for the betterment of student-athletes and their progress toward their lifelong careers.

Many of the newest rules are designed so student-athletes can devote more time toward their classroom work and toward receiving their degrees. Some of the new rules are as follows:

A student-athlete entering his/her third year must have successfully completed twenty-five percent towards his/her degree requirements. This is a program designed so student-athletes will graduate in a period of five years. Student-athletes then must have completed fifty-percent of their work towards their degrees after three years and seventy-five percent after four years.

Student-athletes must pass seventy-five percent of their required twenty-four minimum hours each year during the fall and spring semesters. A student-athlete may only use six hours of summer school towards his/her eligibility.

Student-athletes must have taken and passed the SAT and it must be on file at the university, before that student-athlete may take an official recruiting visit to that school. This is designed to insure that schools are recruiting qualified student-athletes.

Playing and practice times have been cut down beginning with the 1992-93 school year. Teams may only use twenty hours per week towards practices or games, with a maximum of four hours per day. Teams may practice only six days in any seven day period. This is designed to provide a balance between a student-athlete's academic life and athletic life.

Athletics Recovering From Hurricane Andrew

Just as Hurricane Andrew affected most everybody in South Dade and many surrounding areas, the Golden Panthers Athletic Department felt the brunt of 160 mile per hour winds as well. Damage to the athletic facilities reached into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, possibly as much as one million dollars.

Golden Panther Arena received the most damage. The main gym's floor, along with an auxiliary gymnasium, both were severely damaged from water which poured in through an open roof, which had been blown off from the destructive winds. Classrooms and carpeting were also heavily damaged.

Outside the Arena, fences at the Tennis Center and Baseball Complex were heavily damaged as well. The batting cages and backstop both had to be repaired before fall practice could begin. Head Baseball Coach Danny Price delayed fall practice so the proper repairs could be made.

For six weeks, the entire athletic department was housed in a trailer outside the Arena, while workcrews put it back together.

In the meantime, coaches began wondering how this would affect their seasons. The women's volleyball team

seemed the most affected. The team went eight days without practicing and had only two practices prior to their opening tournament. One of those practices was on a sand court near the school's dormitories. Splitting four matches in the opening tournament seemed pretty monumental.

Following the hurricane, both the men's and women's soccer teams came to practice already in uniform (since there were no locker rooms), used the arena parking lot as a training room and altered practices slightly so as to not run out of water, which came on a very limited basis.

Once basketball season rolled around, both the men's and women's teams practiced in a smaller auxiliary gym, which had been repaired by the November 1st practice season. The teams used high school and junior college gymnasiums for scrimmages.

Amazingly, the arena was repaired in time for basketball season, the baseball complex was repaired in time for fall practice and a great many thanks go to those who worked so hard to help life get back to normal as quickly as possible in the athletic department.
