


B. Emanuel and Mr. Eiliott Schenck.

New and pretentious scenic productions have been furnished for each opera, and the unexcelled ensembles, a well-known feature of this organization, give promise of grand opera performances at the West Eod that will rival any yet shown in America.

It is part of the educational plan of Mr. Savage to bring grand opera in English within the reach of all classes, and hence regular theatre prices will prevail.
