## IMPORTED EMPLOYEES AT HIALEAH CAUSE MANY RUMORS OF TROUBLE

RUMORS that members of the Dade County Race Track Employees' Association and members of the Citizens Unemployed League are planning to march in a body upon the Hialeah race track Saturday to protest against the wholesale importation of workers, could not be verified today. A joint meeting of both organizations is scheduled for 8 p. m. Friday night.

General dissention was directed at the race track management Thursday when it was found that practically all employees on the "tote" board had been imported from Maryland together with a large number of other attendants and mutuel employees. Claim that a number of negro attendants were from out of town and that a trainer's license had been granted to a negro, created additional rumors.

Dissention is also said to have been

## FOURTEEN YEAR OLD BRIDE SAYS SHE WAS TOO YOUNG BUT DIDN'T KNOW IT

AFTER eight years of married life, Mrs. Bertha Mae Halstead, mother of two children, has definitely decided that a 14-year-old girl is too young to get married.

Mrs. Halstead, in suit for divorce from Harry Halstead, says she was married in Fort Lauderdale in 1924 and was only 14 years old at the time. Harry was 19 when the ceremony took place. Harry told her he didn't love her any more and was in love with another girl. The alleged confession, she asserts, was made about three years ago while she was sick in bed and she thought he was only joking and paid no attention to him. She says his actions and coldness during the last three years have convinced her that he meant it and she is seeking her freedom and custody of their two children. Mrs. Halstead also says she was too young to get married, but didn't realize it until it was too late.

## FORCED TO EAT IN RESTAURANTS: HE SAYS HIS HEALTH WAS RUINED

A CHARGE that she interfered with his undertaking business by cursing and abusing him in front of mourners at funerals, is made by B. Solomon, negro undertaker, in suit for divorce from Capitola Solomon.

Solomon says Capitola made herself obnoxious in more ways than one. He charges her with assaulting his employees and threatening them with a knife and seems especially perturbed because he alleges she "spit" in one employee's face while th latter was engaged in the pleasant task of preparing a corpse for burial. Solomon says his health has been injured because she refused to cook for him and forced him to eat in restaurants. She also refused to wash his clothes, he declares, and invariably used vile and abusive language in her tirades. Solomon is Miami's leading negro undertaker. He asks for custody of Beausey, a minor son.

## WIFE LAID DOWN POTATO BARRAGE AND TRIED TO STAB HIM SAYS HE

WHENEVER she became angry she proceeded to bounce a few potatoes off his head, asserts G. W. Fornell in his freedom suit from Hulda Fornell. According to Fornell's recitation of the story of his married life, it appears to have been a stormy one.

He says Hulda attacked him with a knife upon one occasion and executed a flank movement by falling back upon the old reliable spuds to lay down a withering barrage. Upon another occasion he says she had him tossed into the hoosegow upon a false disorderly conduct charge and when he went to her in West Roxbury, Mass., to affect a reconciliation, he says she climbed all over him abused him in a public park. He charges that she is still lingering in Massachusetts, which has all of the earmarks of desertion, and makes desertion the principal plank in his platform for self control. Incidental to other statements, Fornell says he was found not guilty on the disorderly conduct charge.

## WHAT IS TECHNOCRACY

What is technocracy? The question is on every lip, yet very few are sufficiently informed to answer it.

Technocracy is a word derived from the Greek and means, simply, government by skill and science. Technocracy is the brain child of a group of scientists and is only an economic theory which may eventually become practical.

Technocrats assert that the present unemployment situation has been brought about through wholesale introduction of high-speed machinery to replace human labor and that unemployment can only increase as science continues to contribute more and more machinery, a fact which cannot be denied. The theory of technocracy does not propose to scrap this machinery, nor to curtail introduction of more machinery. It proposes to reduce the working hours and working days to a minimum; change the currency system to a basis whereby each worker receives compensation in proportion to production and whereby he spends all of his earnings to maintain steady production throughout the year.

A complete working plan for technocracy has not been worked out by the scientists and it is extremely doubtful that even the brilliant minded scientists could possibly evolve a complete plan in 50 years. The average citizen can readily understand that modern high-speed machinery has brought about the unemployment situation and need not be a scientist to realize that reduction of working hours is a practical solution, but beyond that neither the scientists nor average citizens can hope to evolve a practical plan which will prove satisfactory to capital and labor alike. Boiled down to a few words, technocracy is plain old socialism with a shot of ethyl, and not to be taken too seriously—yet.

## WORLD'S RECORD

A WORLD'S record for speed in severing martial knots was established in circuit court Friday when a final decree of divorce was in the hands of Mrs. Cecile Lake within 30 minutes after she had filed a divorce suit against Orrie B. Lake.

Mrs. Lake, who says she was married in 1908, filed the suit at exactly 9 o'clock through her attorney, George Wood. She charged her husband with desertion. Lake filed an immediate answer and Fred Paradise was appointed master in chancery. At 9:20 the testimony had been taken and returned to Judge Worth Trammell, who immediately signed the final decree. The decree, master's report and all other papers were recorded in the circuit court clerk's office before 10 o'clock to establish the new record.

**AIR MEET COST TEN THOUSAND.** A deficit of more than \$10,000 remains for the city to shoulder from the recently completed air-meet. Many tax payers will raise up on their hind legs and squawk and declare public funds have been squandered.
