Parents, - Face Reality!

Part One

In recent weeks, the tenth graders who meet on Monday nights have had an unusual array of speakers as part of a program on current social problems and the role of the Jew. William Lindsey, a black policeman from Chicago, told the young people that he would never have been able to go to college were it not for Julius Rosenwald, founder of Sears, Roebuck, and his Negro College Fund. Ralph McCartney, a more militant black, told them of the neglect of the poor by affluent Americans, and Burnet Roth, Jewish attorney, spoke to them about Jewish leadership in the Civil Rights movement. After each talk, the young people broke up into smaller groups for discussion. The response of the youngsters was far from uniform. Some of them were deeply involved and resented those other youngsters who treated the topics lightly and made noise while the speakers were talking. Some of them expressed resentment that Mr. Roth spoke about Jewish contributions. Why did he have to talk about Jewish contributions? Some of them blocked out the speakers and day-dreamed. Older students (post-confirmation aides) were thrilled by the speakers. What does all this add up to?--diversity. If I have learned one thing in the many years I have dealt with teenagers, it is this: They do not respond uniformly to a given program.

Do Not Give Up On Your Teenagers

I have also learned not to give up on our teenagers. They may seem hostile, uninterested, and mischievous, in a given situation, but if you hang in there with them, they will ultimately be grateful. They seem to understand deep down that they are in a tumultous time of their lives, and what they need most from adults is tolerance and a patient, but not over-powering, leadership.

I have also learned that most young people have a profound religious inclination. Some of them may seem to be disdainful of any kind of established religion, but they respond with strong feeling to appeals for kindness and togetherness. Young people are definitely influenced by the religiosity of their parents. They are also profoundly influenced by the absence of religiosity on the part of their parents! I know many Jewish children seeking spiritualism in exotic cults because their parents had no spiritual orientation. Young people resent parents who drop them off for services, but do not attend themselves. They interpret this in this fashion, "After you are confirmed, you can be as non-observant and as non-participating as I." Rest assured, your children will go you one better! You teach by what you do, not by what you say.

Most Collegians Believe In God

I note a growing interest of older teenagers (not necessarily confirmands) in a concept of God. This is especially true amongst collegians. Many of them express a sense of deprivation that their parents seemed to have no relation to God or actually pooh-poohed the idea. Many of our Jewish intellectuals are leading their children into a spiritual wilderness, because they are revolting against their grandfather's concept of God. There are other, more personal and more dynamic god-concepts, developed by Hasidism, for example, which are more suitable for our age. The point is that we should not block out the reality of God because we don't like our bubbie's definition of Him, and we shouldn't impede the spiritual development of our children by setting a barren example. Not even the best religious school can undo the negative influence of a scoffing or uncommitted parent. Parents who really want their children to be Jewish cannot escape the responsibility of trying to develop their own spirituality.

In next week's column, we will discuss the first steps in this process.
