Interfaith Service Friday, April 15 Baptist-Jewish Dialogue At Beth Am

The annual Dade County Baptist-Jewish Dialogue will take place at Temple Beth Am as part of our regular Friday evening service on April 15, at 8:30 p.m. The Dialogue, which is cosponsored by the Miami Baptist Association and the Anti-Defamation League, has brought the two groups closer together over the years.

In addition to our regular service, Rev. Dr. Conrad Willard, of the Central Baptist Church in downtown Miami, and Rabbi Baumgard will each speak briefly in lieu of a sermon. Dr. Willard has national prominence as one of Christianity's foremost interpreters. The topic will be "How Are We to Re-inspire A Personal Faith."

Dr. Willard is one of the Trustees of Baptist Hospital. He is on the Board of Directors of the Boy Scouts of America and on the Board of Trustees of Stetson University. He is on the Executive Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and is involved in the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce's Downtown Action Committee.

Rabbi Baumgard has been a regional vice president of the Anti-Defamation League and is currently Chairman of the Region's Interfaith Committee. He has represented the Jewish faith in these annual dialogues for many years.

Mr. Shmuel Rabina of Herzlia Pitauch, Israel, will speak at the Brotherhood Breakfast Forum on Sunday morning, April 17, at 9:30 a.m., in the Youth Lounge on the topic "A DAY IN THE LIFE OF AN ISRAELI CITIZEN." Guided Tours Of New Torah Scroll Saturday, April 30

Beth Am recently commissioned a scribe to complete a Torah scroll. We were already in possession of major portions of the scroll, but several sections were either missing or damaged and had to be repladed. Such work is costly, but not exorbitant. It would not have been difficult to find one or two families to sponsor the completion. But rather than search for a few such "angels," we chose to extend the opportunity of completing the Torah to those who have been actively involved in its study!

We had an enthusiastic, positive response from over a hundred individuals who have been active in our adult education programs during the last two years. The sum of these many small gifts has been more than adequate to meet the cost of completion, and now a celebration is in order!

On Saturday afternoon, April 30, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., the new Torah scroll will be on display in the Social Hall, open throughout its entire length, and guided tours will be conducted, all the way from Genesis to Deuteronomy.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



A Moment Of Reverence

I love Passover. I love the togetherness at the Seder, the food, the singing, the sharpening of Jewish purpose, but most of all I love that twilight moment when Passover arrives. The two main services conducted by Beth Am are on the first and last days of Passover (these are the main days as prescribed by Scripture), but we also have a "Minyan" service at six p.m. on the evening on which Passover begins. We describe this as a "Minyan" service to let people know that it is not a "full dress" service. The Rabbi doesn't put on his robe. The organist and cantorial soloist are not there. This is a "one on one" service where the few people who are not too busy preparing for the first Seder come and share the conduct of the service together. It is brief. It is over in twenty minutes.

Usually, we have about ten people at this "Minyan" twilight service. This year, we had three, counting myself. I didn't care. I had a mystical experience. I came early to the service, as I always do. I sat there in the congregation (not on the Altar) enjoying that view of the Sanctuary which is denied me when I sit on the Altar. I was moved by the beauty of our Sanctuary. I don't take it for granted. It is simple, yet warm. I felt comfortable, relaxed.

Sitting there alone, I began to study the inscriptions on the windows. Jeremiah, the Prophet, is represented there: "Behold, the time will come, saith the Lord, when noone will teach anyone else about God and His law, because I will write my law on the heart of each person, and the least of them will know Me." Just thinking about this great soul, Jeremiah, is enough to transport me into the realm of noble ideas.

My eyes turned to the window with Rabbi Hillel's teaching, found in the Talmud: "If I am not for myself, who is for me; if I am for myself alone, what am I; and if not now, when?" How fortunate I am, I thought to myself, to be the heir to a people and to a religious tradition with such a pragmatic approach to the meaningful life. My eyes slowly turned around the room, to the coral rock on the Altar wall composed of fossilized living things, to the Eternal Light which comes from Iraq (ancient Babylon, birthplace of Abraham), to the windows with the teachings of Isaiah, Amos, and Moses. They were all there with me, these great souls, and together we sat hushed waiting for the great event, the liberation from slavery. Was there ever a more dramatic event revealing the God who cares about what happens to the poor and the weak?

My silent meditation was interrupted by the arrival of a young couple. They weren't sure why they had come, but they HAD come. They couldn't believe that I would conduct a service just for them. "I am not conducting this for you," I said to them. "I would have conducted this service just for me. I am fascinated by this moment," I told them. In the twilight before the arrival of Passover, the festival of freedom, I feel more moved emotionally than I do before Rosh Hashanah. Rosh Hashanah is almost too busy, but in the Passover twilight when I am alone in the Sanctuary with the saints of Judaism and with God, I know a joy and a peace that only quietness can give.

After the brief service, I went home to enjoy a marvelous Seder with my extended family. The Seder was the more joyous because of the spiritual momentum I achieved at the "Minyan" service.
