
Confirmation Time Nears Confirmands Busy Preparing

The first Sunday in June is the date of Confirmation Exercises. The Friday evening before, the confirmands will present an original service which they are now writing. At the exercise itself, the confirmands will present an original cantata with the theme of the Jewish contribution to America. The young people are doing the research in areas like the Jewish contribution to the American Revolution, to American goals and ideals, to Broadway (drama and musicals), to music, to movies and T.V., to the civil rights movement, labor unions, industry, etc. Their narration will be interspersed with songs by American Jews on related themes.

Other young people in the confirmation class are busy preparing huge art columns for display at the service; still others are preparing an interpretative dance. All told, over 100 young people are involved. All of the youngsters have completed the eighth through tenth grade, minimum requirement for confirmation, but most of them have come all the way through the Beth Am school. Rabbi Julian Cook is supervising the confirmation program; all of our Rabbis are involved as well as the full retinue of tenth grade teachers.

The Confirmation Service (Friday, June 4) and Exercise (Sunday, June 6) will be exciting moments in our history, for this is our 20th confirmation class.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The Second Commandment

The Jewish community in America is faced with greater dangers than the Jews of Israel. We are assimilating so rapidly into the general American community that it is entirely possible that American Jewry will go the way of those Israelites taken into captivity by Assyria in 721 B.C.E. It is possible that there will be only a remnant of Jews in America within a few generations. This is the stark reality which most American Jewish spokesmen are afraid to say out loud. What can we do about it?

First of all, we have to face the situation as it exists, without denying the facts. Secondly, we have to determine that we will reverse the current vigorous trend.

The basic fact is that the number of positively oriented Jewish children is fast decreasing. There are many reasons for this decline. First of all, young Jewish women are having fewer children. They are getting married later, and they don't see themselves in the basic role of mother. They see themselves increasingly as candidates for professional occupations primarily and as wives and mothers secondarily and thirdly. In Boston recently, I led a discussion with college students on the need for Jewish children and one young lady said with astonishment (and some resentment), "You seem to be saying that we owe it to the Jewish people to get married and have children." "You bet!" I said. Her statement was a frank one. Many young Jewish ladies are not at all sure they want to get married, much less have children. This means disaster for the continuation of our already minute Jewish community. What has been said here concerning women is all the more true of Jewish young men.

Another important trend in the diminution of the number of children trained warmly and positively to be Jews is the rate of intermarriage. We have said here many times that the Jewish community has gained some outstanding human beings through intermarriage, but, by and large, the children of an intermarriage have a rough time in learning to be Jews. If one of the parents is born of Christian parents and remains outside of Judaism (either as an observing Christian or as a neutral: "I'll let my wife raise the children as Jews"), the children are inevitably confused. It is difficult enough to raise Jewish children in a fully committed Jewish home. It is almost impossible to raise Jewish children in a home with different backgrounds and opinions (the exception is where the partner raised in a Christian home fully commits himself to learning and teaching Judaism). Sociological studies show that where one parent remains outside of the Jewish community, irrespective of the Jewish partner's efforts, 80 percent of the children will become Christians or give up their Judaism.

This last statistic ought to be memorized by every Jewish parent and youngster of a marriageable age. If you don't marry a person committed to Judaism, there is an 80 percent chance that your children, irrespective of what you do for them, will not be loyal to the Jewish community. On the other hand, the same study shows that where the non-Jewish partner sincerely converts to Judaism, the children are generally as positive in their Judaism as the children of Jewish (by birth) partners. The basic question here is the success of the marriage itself. If the marriage is successful, the conversion will hold, and the children will be Jews. If not, the children are up for grabs. The problem is clearly one of commitment. Children do not do well in a divided home. They take the path of least resistance. That path leads to the majority group! The majority group has a leverage, a gravitational pull, the minority doesn't have.

A young person today who marries someone who does not commit himself (herself) sincerely to the Jewish community is making for an end to Judaism and the Jewish community. It is that simple. Parents have to make this fact clear to their

The second commandment which every Jew ought to assume, if he wants Judaism and the Jewish community to continue is, "THOU SHALT MARRY A PERSON WHO IS COMMITTED TO JUDAISM AND THE JEWISH COMMUNITY WHO WILL HELP YOU RAISE JEWISH CHILDREN." Discuss this commandment with your children. Let them know how fully committed you are to it. Then, you might begin to consider how you can regularly enrich their lives Jewishly, so that they can share your commitment in a world which is pulling them away from us.
