Members are sending in registrations for schools and Temple membership at this time. All Temple members who are current with their dues and fees should have received membership applications for the coming year.

BUDGET INCREASE PEGGED AT 10%

Our budget forecasts a ten percent increase in costs for the coming year. Members are urged to increase their Fair Share dues contribution by at least ten percent to help defray our increased costs.

We have many new and exciting programs scheduled for next year. It would be counterproductive to curtail our program at a time when so many in our community have so many spiritual needs. We need your support to provide the many innovative and meaningful activities that you and your family are entitled to.

REGISTER EARLY FOR SCHOOLS

Parents are reminded that space is reserved in Religious School on a FIRST-COME, FIRST-SERVE BASIS. If you want to send your child on any specific day, it is imperative that you send in your registration forms now.

The fiscal season at Beth Am is July 1 to June 30. Registration for the 1976-77 year is being accepted now. If you want your children to be placed on Saturday or Sunday morning, you must register before these classes are filled. Registration will be on a first-come, first-serve basis. In order to register, each family must:

1. Pay all back dues and capital fund pledges.

2. Pay one-half of its Fair Share dues for 1976-77 plus its current capital fund pledge installment.

3. Registration fees for Religious and Hebrew school,

which includes all books and supplies.

Members are reminded that they do not officially register their children just by filling out the forms received in the mail. Registration forms must be accompanied with the payment of one-half dues, registration fees, and capital pledges.

HEBREW SCHOOL REGISTRATION

Please note that the Hebrew School schedule for the 1976-77 year will be much different from the preceding year.

Because of changes in junior high school scheduling, we will have two different class arrangements. Schedule I will take place on Mondays and Wednesdays, and Schedule II will take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Schedules I and II will cover the same curriculum.

All classes will meet in the afternoon. Class times are 3:45 p.m. for the early session and 4:45 p.m. for the later session.

The B'nai Mitzvah Club Aleph

This club will begin in the next school term (Fall, 1976) and will prepare a maximum of ten boys and ten girls (or 20 children) for a special joint B'nai Mitzvah ceremony, to be held on Friday evening, March 31, 1978.

The requirements will be the same as for Bar Mitzvah--three years minimum in the Hebrew and Religious Schools. The club will meet as a unit beginning this fall and will have social as well as religious activities.

The young people will be asked to pledge that they will continue after Bar Mitzvah to Confirmation, and fulfill all necessary requirements through the tenth grade. They do not have to continue in the club. Their ceremony will be different from the regular Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony in that the young people will conduct the entire service, in English, Hebrew, sermon, and program.

Registration for Aleph (Hebrew for No. 1) is currently open. Students will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis. Any young person who otherwise fulfills the requirements, and who will be 13 any time before March 31, 1978, or within six weeks thereafter, is eligible for this club. Students already registered for a prior Bar Mitzvah date and service must officially release that date. This club is being organized for students of average ability or better. Students requiring special attention or private tutoring cannot be admitted. Contact Joan Schwartzman at the Temple office, 667-5587, to register.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY Are We 'The Chosen People?'

Our Bible makes it clear that our fathers considered themselves to have been chosen by God as His special people (Ahm S'gulah). For hundreds of years, Jews who inherited the tradition of Abraham have been puzzled by the concept of "Choseness." If God "chose" the Jews, why, then, have the Jews suffered? The question reveals a misunderstanding of the subtleties of the doctrine of choseness.

When Abraham was chosen by his God, it was an era when all the surrounding peoples considered that they, too, were chosen by their particular chief god. The concept of choseness includes, as its corollary, the notion that the people also chose. They each chose a god whom they wished to follow, even as the god "chose" them. Each people entered into a covenant or contract with a particular god. The difference between the Hebrews and their contemporaries was not that the Jews were chosen and the other peoples were not. The difference was in the god with which each people chose to ally itself in contract.

To covenant with a god meant to follow his laws. The significance of the Hebraic covenant with their God was the unmatched excellence of the laws associated with Him. Since these laws were on a much higher ethical level than the laws associated with Baal or Moloch or the other "gods." The particular choice that the Hebrews made resulted in an extra burden for them. The other side of "Choseness" was commitment, partnership.

Only the unlearned Jew has interpreted "Choseness" to mean that the Jew would get special rewards. The prophet Amos dramatically pointed out (8th century B.C.E.) that since God was the Father of all peoples, "Choseness" for the Jew meant only that as His first child, the Jew would be required to perform in more exemplary fashion.

In the end, then, the question, "Are the Jews the chosen people?" can only be answered by the Jews of each generation-for themselves. We are chosen if we assumed the covenant of following the laws associated with our God. We demonstrate our choseness by our actions. We are chosen to be the special representative of God, if we are in the vanguard of those who mediate His qualities to the world about us.

There is a special obligation involved in this inherited doctrine of choseness. If we do not admit to its validity in the present, then we are betraying generations of Jews who lived and died to make it true. Can it have been true for our fathers, but not for us? Alas, if it is not true for us, also, then, it was not true for them, either. Can we make a lie of four thousand years of noble history? I trust not.
