Passover Begins Saturday Eve, April 2 Main Services Sunday Morning, April 3

Passover begins on Saturday evening, April 2, at sundown. There will be a brief Minyan service at the Temple at 6 p.m. Home Seders are held on this evening. No Jew should be absent from a Seder on this night. If you don't know how to conduct a Seder, we have typed instructions. Passover Haggadahs, as interpreted by Rabbi Herbert Baumgard, are available at the Temple office to help you in the conduct of the Seder.

Beth Am will observe the holiday with a primary service on Sunday morning, April 3, at 10:00 a.m., in the Sanctuary. Parents and children should attend this service together. Rabbi Baumgard urges all members to observe the first day of Passover (Sunday, April 3) as the major festival that it is. He anticipates that all members of Beth Am will eat matzah to the exclusion of bread for the full holiday (see the Rabbi's column). The holiday concludes after the seventh day, Saturday, April 9, at sundown. A concluding Passover Yiskor Service will be held on April 9 at 11:15 a.m., in the Sanctuary.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Pesach A Most Important Holiday

In spite of the importance western Jewry gives to the High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, Pesach is the most important Jewish holiday down through history.

Pesach is the Jewish spring festival. It begins on the eve of the 14th day of the month of Nisan. Originally, it was a seven day festival and is so observed today in Israel. In Israel and among Reform Jews, the first and seventh days are days of rest. European Jewry and Orthodox Jewry observe the two days at the beginning and the end of the holiday as days of rest because it was difficult to determine when the holiday started and ended.

Pesach originally marked the beginning of the major grain harvest. It is one of the four major harvest holidays. To it, however, has been added a historical significance which makes it supreme among Jewish holidays. Spring is the time of redemption. It is the time when the earth stirs from its winter slumbers, arises from its frozen death, and evidences fertility and life. The pagan peoples interpreted the cycle of agriculture in terms of a god who died in the winter and arose (was redeemed) in the spring. The Christians associated spring with the resurrection of Jesus. The Jews alone give the advent of spring an association with an historic event involving not only God, but an entire people. The "resurrection" is the emergence of a people from bondage; the rebirth is the dedication of a people to the moral code of life.

EXODUS IS BACKGROUND

The Exodus from Egypt is the historic background of Pesach which emphasizes the courage of the Jewish people. The Exodus is the great symbol of man down through the ages whereby he gains courage to revolt against tyranny. The early Americans called George III their Pharaoh and used the biblical story as their authority to revolt.

The Seder ("order" of the meal) is a classic example of progressive education. Food, drink, song, questions and answers are all woven together into a vivid sense-thought experience for the entire family. It is a home holiday, not only a Synagogue holiday. The symbols of the meal include: Matzot, unleavened bread baked by the Hebrews on the run from Egypt; Charoset, mixed fruit salad, symbol of the mortar mixed for bricks by the Jews; Chomets, regular food not to be eaten on Pesach; Afikomen, matzah saved until the end of the meal, usually "stolen" by the youngest child; Haggadah, the story of the Pesach in book form used at the Seder; Elijah's Cup-the prophet Elijah is a sort of patron for children. His coming in legendary sources supposedly would indicate the coming of the Messianic day of peace and good will. Consequently, we pour a glass of wine for Elijah on Pesach and invite him to participate. Green herbs (moror) is the symbol of suffering of people at this time; Parsley is the symbol of spring harvest; Egg is used as a substitute for sacrifice of lamb at this time; Shankbone is the remainder of paschal lamb. Wine is the symbol of the goodness of life, a reminder of God's creative powers, a symbol of hope for all the oppressed.
