# Do You Have To Leave Home To Love The World?

"Why do I have to be a Jew?" the young lady said, "It's time for something new and better." The young lady was obviously well educated and she had had the benefit of exposure to some of the more exciting kinds of "new" therapies. She was clearly a fine person with a high sense of values. It was also clear that she wanted to separate herself from her family and her people. She and some of her non-Jewish friends were all agreed. Christianity and Judaism belonged to the past. It was time for the universal faith.


I asked the young lady why she could not follow the lead of the Hebrew prophets and affirm universalism, even while she remained a Jew. "Why do you have to cease to be yourself in order to love mankind?" I asked her. "Why do you have to turn your back on your family in order to love others?" Many young people today cannot understand the logic of this question. For some reason, they are convinced that they must cut all their ties to the past in order to create a brave, new world.

It is interesting to me, as I study the history of Christianity, that the fathers of the Church from the fourth century on found it necessary to cut themselves off from their Jewish past. For centuries thereafter, there was a progressive denying of the motherhood of Judaism and the isolation of the New Testament as something standing by itself. In recent decades, Christians have been forced to reclaim the Old Testament and their Jewish heritage, for it is precisely the Hebrew Bible which is most geared for this scientific and universalistic age.

Some of the young Jews, who despise their heritage without even knowing what it is, come back to the Jewish people when their panaceas evaporate. Still others are victims of the new groups which they join and half create. It is important for us to know that the conditions of our society are such that a young person is under constant pressure to cut himself loose from his family and his past. This is all the more true of young people who go to college and get caught in the crucible of "the new world." In the college cauldron, many young Jews join esoteric groups that offer "new" solutions (some of these new groups are thousands of years old). Other young Jews become their own guru and initiate off-shoots of these exotic (because they are different) groups.

As I have indicated, one primary reason for this deviationist tendency is that this is the spirit of the age. Sirens call and our young people are trained to answer, not to resist. A second important reason that our young people are not able to resist the call to leave their spiritual home is that they are abysmally ignorant of the content of Judaism. They may not be more ignorant than you and I when we were their age, but you and I were not pulled away as they are. As their parents, you must know more about Judaism than your parents. You can't give them as little as your parents gave you. You must give a great deal more! One of the things you have to teach them, through the Jewish sources, is that you can be a universalist (as were Jeremiah, Isaiah, etc.) and still be true to your own tradition, your own loved ones.

Indeed, the true test of one's ability to love is the adjustments one is willing to make for the sake of those close at hand. It is easier to love mankind than to love those near to you. That's why it's always easier to cut ties and run away in pursuit of "ideal" goals.
