Broadway Show Comes To Beth Am Friday Night, February 25, 8:30 P.M.

The Broadway show which has played at Beth Am for several years has been called back by popular demand and will be shown "live" following religious services on Friday, February 25. The show is built around an original narration by Rabbi Baumgard which traces the Jewish contribution to the United States. The musical message is spelled out in songs written by Rodgers and Hammerstein, Irving Berlin, Harold Arlen, Bert Bachrach, and other great Jewish writers. They will be sung by individual members of our choir, most of whom are well known professional singers in the area. Tunes will be sung from such shows as "Fiddler on the Roof," "The Sound of Music," "A Chorus Line," "My Fair Lady," "West Side Story," etc.

SELMA BAUMGARD LEADS CHOIR

Directing the Choir will be Selma Baumgard, who founded the choir in 1956, and, except for three intervening years, has served as its volunteer director ever since.

Selma has attempted to do creative programming at the Temple while using the best of our traditional music at the same time. She has been most successful in assembling outstanding people to sing in our choir as the short biographies listed below will indicate.

ANN AIBEL Bachelor of Arts in Music, Brooklyn College, ten years. 17 years in Temple choir, three years Civic Chorale, singing luncheons and other organizations.

BERNICE ANAPOL Temple choir 18 years, Miami Opera Guild, University of Miami Civic Chorale and has done some personal concert work.

JIM BENNETT University of London graduate; conducted opera in Europe professionally. Organist and choir director of St. Thomas and private teacher for organ and piano. Organist at Beth Am for many years.

ROBERT BREWSTER Chairman Voice Department, University of Miami, Opera, Lieder singer, Wheaton College graduate. Masters from Indiana University; doctorate from Washington University, Fulbright Scholarship in Stuttgart. Personal grant from the German Government to further his studies at Stuttgart.

MERLE HAMM Tenor Soloist for the Ft. Leonard Oratoria Society. Directed men's choir for two years at Key Biscayne Presbyterian Church. Director and organist for St. Christopher's Church By The Sea on Key Biscayne. Presently, activity director for North Shore Nursing Home.

PAULI LEVINE Newest choir member, returned to singing after an absence of singing in the Philadelphia area for many years both in Temples and professionally. Is now a legal

secretary and mother of two.

MARVIS MARTIN 1976 graduate of University of Miami, School of Music. Winner of Miami Beach Drama and Arts League Scholarship award. Soloist with Atlanta Symphony, Columbus, Ohio Symphony, Sarasota Symphony, Brevard Music Center Orchestra, Miami Beach and North Miami Beach Symphony. Member of Beth Am choir for five years.

HARRIET POTLOCK is a Language Arts Coordinator of third grade students in a local school. A graduate of Peabody

Ms. Schapiro is considered by many as one of the outstanding experts on the American Jewish family. The topic under discussion will be THE AMERICAN JEWISH FAMILY-IS IT ALIVE AND WELL AND STILL JEWISH?

YEAR OLDS




Temple Beth Am is planning a half-day pre-school summer play camp for children three years of age. The pre-school camp will function separately from the regular Beth Am summer program, except for special occasions, such as simchas, at which time the entire camp assembles. The program is being designed for the special needs of the pre-school child. The activities will be geared to the developmental level of children in this age group.

A staff is being assembled from our Nursery School for this program, with special expertise in working with pre-school children, and with special training in supervision of this age group. Activities planned will include water safety instruction, arts and crafts, musical games, singing and dancing, and others designed for the young child. Our playground and gymnasium and our well trained staff should result in a happy, rewarding summer experience for your child.

The Beth Am summer play camp starts on Monday, June 20, and runs for eight weeks. You may send your child for either four weeks or eight weeks, as outlined below:

From June 20 to July 15, or from July 18 to August 6, or for the full eight weeks, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. daily.

The Pressure Never Lets Up

During recent days, I have been attending the convention of the NJCRAC (National Jewish Community Relations Advisory Council), as a representative of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (the parent body of Reform congregations). The NJCRAC is composed of a number of Jewish agencies dealing with community relations. Among them are the UAHC, other synagogue bodies, Jewish Federation, and the Jewish Civil Rights Organizations, American Jewish Committee, American Jewish Congress, and the Anti-Defamation League. We considered such problems as the intensified Christian proselytizing of Jews, the increasing Arab propaganda and activity in the U.S., Equal Rights for Women, Soviet Jewry, and U.S. policy in the Middle East.

Attending a conference such as this, one has to be convinced of the amazing role played by Jews in the defense of civil rights in the U.S. In protecting its own rights, the Jews have protected the rights of all minorities in America. The major black civil rights groups, for example, were organized and maintained with tremendous help from the Jewish community.

ARAB PROPAGANDA

What was "new" about this conference is the increasing concern about Arab influence in the U.S. In the college campus, in the churches, and in the media, the Arabs are dispensing enormous sums of money to influence the American mind. Thus far, the Jews are able to compete, but the Arabs are just beginning their pressure.

It is important for every Jew to be able to answer Arab charges against Israel, because his Christian friends will be increasingly exposed to anti-Israel propaganda. It would be wise for you to subscribe to Mid-East Report (\$10 a year), address: 1341 G Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20005.

Prep and Conservatory. Has been music director of Beth Am's Religious School and a member of the choir for eight years.


