FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Attacking The Weak

It is a common practice of a meat-eating animal in the wild to stalk a herd and attack the straggler. The straggler is usually an animal too young or too old or too sick to keep up with the rest of the herd. Recent information about the missionary groups now very active in America indicates that their practice is very much the same. They attack the Jew (or Christian) who is a straggler, the person, young or old, who is in the midst of a personal crisis and looking for a friend, or the person who is so ignorant about his own faith that he is easily overwhelmed by someone who speaks with conviction.

Some of the groups specializing in conversion (the Moonies and fundamentalist Christian groups) actually have printed instructions for their people who try to convert Jews. I have seen this material. It reads like this: "Tell the Jew that you don't really want to convert him to your religion. Tell him you want to help him become a 'fulfilled Jew.' Help him understand that his Bible talks about the Messiah and that Jesus was that Messiah. He doesn't have to accept the fact that Jesus is God." Later on, the instruction reads, "After he accepts Jesus as the Messiah, you can bring him closer to our faith."

There is a large, well-financed army after you and your children to lead them away from the faith of their ancestors.

The Old Testament, our Bible, does not teach of the coming of Messiah hundreds of years after the prophets speak. The prophets are concerned about a messiah (little "m"), that is to say "an annointed one," that is a coronated king, who will be flesh and blood (not a Son of God), who will reign over the kingdom of Israel or Judea, overthrow the foreign power, and usher in a kingdom of justice and peace. The prophets looked for the imminent coming of such a king. Ideas about a spiritualized Messiah who was the "Son of man" or God comes from the Persian doctrine and belongs to a much later era than the prophets. It is a game to read such a doctrine back into the teaching of the earlier prophets, but it is not scholarly or factual. It is a simple matter for a person who knows the Hebrew Bible to refute every suggestion made that Jesus is prophesied in our Bible. Of course, a person who can't read the Hebrew can be fooled a hundred times.

This is not to say that the Christians are ipso facto wrong in their religious belief. Jesus may be their Messiah, indeed. They have every right to believe in him as such. The point is he is not the messiah spoken about in our Bible because he did not fulfil any of the aspects necessary to his being the messiah. 1) He was never king over Judea (the Romans made sure of this by crucifying him and mocking him in this regard). 2) He did not overthrow the foreign power (the Romans; they conquered him instead), 3) He did not usher in an independent Jewish state. 4) He did not usher in an era of political and economic justice and peace. In other words, none of the aspects of the messiah, as outlined by the earlier Hebrew prophets were fulfilled by Jesus.

Why do I go into this now? There is a new "Temple" on Sunset Drive (1375) in the Gables which has as its purpose the conversion of Jews to Christianity. Their game plan is to say "Believe that Jesus is the Messiah. That's all we want you to do." Their plan is to pose as friends of Israel, to use Hebrew songs, and prayers. They are not a synagogue. Noone I know knows where their "Rabbi" was ordained (degrees like Rabbi and Minister and Reverend can be obtained in many places, but few of them are bona fide institutions). Don't be trapped.
