Shavuot Comes Monday, May 23 Commandments Received On This Date

Shavuot is the holiday on which we dedicate ourselves to the Ten Commandments which were given to the Jewish people at this season. Beth Am observes the festival with a special service on Monday, May 23, at 10 a.m. This is a recommended public school holiday.

The three main festivals in our calendar are Passover, Sukkot, and Shavuot. Shavuot is commonly called "The Time of the Giving of the Law." At this season, our forefathers accepted the commandments as a contractual responsibility (covenant or bris). Here in Beth Am, graduates of the tenth grade are asked to accept the responsibility of this covenant as part of their confirmation. The confirmation service this Year will not be held until June 5.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



How Have The Jews Survived?

Pharoah afflicted the Hebrews mightily, yet they survived. What was their secret of survival? No doubt, they had a great spiritual reservoir, but they had something else. They had children. The Bible tells us that no matter how much the Egyptians afflicted their slaves, they increased in numbers.

Father Flannery, in his book, "The Anguish of the Jews," documents in a scholarly fashion the killing of five million Jews by the non-Jewish communities of Europe BEFORE Hitler began his carnage. Yet, the Jews of Europe survived these pogroms. They survived because they kept reproducing.

Sociologists who visited the concentration camps of Hitler tell us that even in the camps, Jews were having children. When the Nazis were finally conquered, there were some elderly survivors, but there were young Jews also. These youngsters were able to begin a new life and to help in the rebuilding of Israel and the Jewish community in general.

Are modern young Jews carrying this secret of Jewish survival with them? I don't think so. The last thing many young Jews want today is children. They seem disinclined to reproduce for many reasons: (1) they aren't getting married; (2) if they are married, having children interferes with their life style, with their enjoyment of life; (3) they get married with one foot in the divorce court, so they don't want to have too many children around when the split comes; (4) they learned in college that the world is suffering from overpopulation, so, to be loyal to the survival of mankind, they decide not to aggravate this problem. All of these reasons add up to one thing--the disappearance of the Jewish people. They add up to genocide, only this is a genocide committed by a people upon itself. In short, it is suicide. A Jewish youngster who chooses not to have children strikes a blow against the Jewish people. (Some parents can't have children; that's a different matter entirely).

The statistics are already showing the results of the trend. Jewish population in America is down. We are declining even more rapidly in terms of our percentage of the total population in America (other groups are not so dedicated to the solving of the problem of overpopulation).

What is happening to young Jews with respect to the having of children is the result of the fact that they are part of the American middle class. They demonstrate the thinking and convictions of non-Jews who are part of the middle class. Middle class youngsters go to college and learn (1) they are part of humanity; (2) humanity is suffering from overpopulation, bad marriages, sexual repression, and guilt feelings about obligations to others. They are educated from early childhood to fulfill themselves and to seek their personal happiness. They are not educated about their responsibilities to the family and to their community (to the Jewish people). Our Jewish youngsters, like the heroes of Bellow's novels, are cut adrift from their Jewish background and wander aimlessly in the sea of universalistic confusion. There is only a mock heroism about Bellow's heroes. There is only a mock heroism about so many of our most brilliant and best educated Jewish youngsters.

What to do about it? Do what you can personally every day for Jewish survival. See that you survive as a Jew. Educate your children as to their responsibility towards Jewish survival, including the having of Jewish children. Wear a sign on your chest, as I do, reading "Have a Jewish kid today!"

BAR/BAT MITZVAH REGISTRATION

1) Complete at least three years in the weekend Religious School and the midweek Hebrew School. (At least from the child's tenth through his or her twelfth year).

2) Complete the pre-Bar Mitzvah training with the Rabbis to their satisfaction.

3) In addition, the parents must agree that the child will continue in the weekend school at least through the eighth grade. This will carry the child about two years past Bar/Bat Mitzvah. (THE CHILD MAY NOT DROP OUT.)

4) The emphasis in Beth Am, as a Reform congregation, is on Confirmation, which comes at the end of the tenth grade. We consider the child who drops out of Religious School after Bar/Bat Mitzvah as being seriously deficient in religious training.

5) The best time for the child to register for Hebrew School is at nine years of age. The child learns better at this age and resists less.
