Speaker for this discussion will be Brenda Shapiro, executive director of the American Jewish Committee, Fla. Mrs. Shapiro is a consultant to the Board of Public Instruction on Family Life Education, has been a member of the faculty of the Univ. of Miami, a wellknown teacher and lecturer on Jewish Family Life. Taxes And Charitable Donations

Many of you will make your major contributions to charity in the approaching weeks of the year.

(1) The first basic rule is to act now to make your 1979 contributions cost you as little as possible after taxes.

(2) The second basic rule is to live with the understanding that only part of any charitable contribution you make comes out of your own pocket. The Federal Government in effect, shares the cost of every contribution.

(3) Individuals may make charitable contributions up to

50% of their adjusted gross income.

Contributions are deductible only if actually paid during the taxable year.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Meditation & Relaxation

[Part three]

We have been talking for these last few weeks about diffferent ways of "meditating." We have pointed out that there are no secrets in this art. Jews and non-Jews have known of them and used them for thousands of years. A "swami" may use a mantra, a Hasidic mystic may use a specific Jewish prayer or something visual like the Torah, a pschologist may simply suggest that you "think of something that relaxes you and makes you feel good all over." Meditation has its good effects. It is not a cure-all.

There are many ways to relax. Some people relax by going to the seashore to watch the waves going in and out. Others may relax by running, swimming, playing tennis or racket-ball. Many people who run a great deal tell you that after a certain point they are "out of this world", their mind is clear, the worries evaporate. This is not magic, either. I get into the same state when I swim a great deal. The point is that excercise is truly helpful for us pent-up moderns. It's good for the body, good for the mind and for the soul. But it's no cure-all.

Some people use sex the way the meditators and the exercisers use their particular release. They diligently pursue diverse sexual relationships as if nirvana is to be found at the end of an orgasm. It may, indeed, be found for a fleeting few seconds, and then the search must begin again with even more desperate energy. The sex-centered lifestyle seems to bring less continuing satisfaction to its devotees than does meditation or exercise.

On the whole, I find that people who are involved in music or in the other arts are happier than people who pursue meditation and exercise with single-minded devotion. A musician is involved in so many things at once. He exercises his body as he fixes his being on the flow of the music. He participates, so to speak, in both mind and body.

The yogi vs. the Prophet

While Judaism has its mystics, its special stress is not on contemplation but on religious action. The oriental religious view has produced the yogi. Judaism has produced the activist prophet. Judaism teaches that the greatest virtue is not inward saintliness but ethical action. The whole point of praying and learning, Judaism instructs, is to motivate the person to join in with the community in its efforts to fashion a life of meaning. For the yogi, the ideal physical representation is the figure of a silent and motionless contemplator. For the Jew, the ideal physical representation is that of the loving person engaged in a group dance, celebrating the joy of togetherness.

The meditators are after inward peace, that is an important goal, but how much broader are the goals of sharing and helping and lifting up. Most systems of meditation, fashioned after the oriental, speak about the goal as being union with the divine, becoming one with the divine, becoming part of that non-being, that nexus of non-feeling, which is God. In Judaism, we speak of "becoming like God, of moving towards God, of taking into ourselves the qualities we associate with God...but the God we seek to relate with is not the passionless oriental God. He is, on the contrary, a feeling God, a God who loves and lives, a God who cares. He is the God who takes sides and stands with the poor and the outcast. To take sides, one must ultimately emerge out of the meditative period and become a combatant in the arena which is our world. In the end, it is the Jewish idea of God which is different, and this difference shapes every aspect of our religion to make it different from all the petty systems of our time devoted to more limited, self-serving goals.

I have written this series on meditation and relaxation not to suggest to those of you who use any of the popular formal disciplines that what you are doing is wrong. On the con-

The fiscal year of the Temple begins July 1 and ends June 30. Fair Share dues for the forthcoming year become due on July 1.

- 1. Registration forms for membership and Religious Schools will not be offered to members until all past due accounts are paid.
- 2. Not less than one-half of the dues is due on July 1. All balances are due by December 31.
- 3. Registration fees for Religious and Hebrew Schools are due at the time of registration.
- Registration for nursery-kindergarten, day school, or summer camp will be honored for those members of the Temple who are current in their dues and fees.
- 5. Capital fund pledges are due on July 1 of the year for which you are registering.

"And when ye reap the harvest of your land, thou shalt not wholly reap the corner of thy field, neither shalt thou gather the gleaning of thy harvest. And thou shalt not glean thy vineyard; thou shalt leave them for the poor and for the stranger -- I am the LORD your God.

Ed and Edith Weinstein, (he is the president of our Contemporaries of Temple Beth Am), picked up on this, brought it to Delores Hagins of the Dept. of Human Resources of Dade County, who got quite excited about its possibilities. They are always looking for ways to help the indigent elderly. (Last year, the Contemporaries collected \$23,000.00 worth of food stamps which were passed on to this department and then distributed to the aforementioned).

Now, the Weinsteins, as representatives of the Contemporaries, have spearheaded a new project which can involve many people, and help to feed Dade County's hungry and

The GLEANERS are those people who go into the fields after the crops are harvested, and pick up what the growers leave behind. This can be considerable in most cases. Then what is picked will be distributed to those in need. We will work hand in hand with the Dept. of Human Resources.

What we need now are volunteers, both to pick, but even more important, who can offer vehicles when needed (vans, station wagons----anything with a large capacity). BAFTY is already forming a volunteer corps of pickers.
