On Sunday, February 4th, Temple Beth Am joins the Florida Philharmonic Guild in presenting a "musical talk", an educational seminar featuring Brian Priestman, Music Director, and Jean-Philippe Collard, guest pianist of the Florida Philharmonic. The seminar will be held at 3:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Admission is free and refreshments will be served.

The musical program will highlight Concert #5 in the Philharmonic Series—with the witty and engaging Mr. Priestman playing and discussing themes from Brahms Symphony No. 4, and Mr. Collard matching him with themes from Gershwin's Concerto in F.

Jean-Philippe Collard, who at the age of 30 has already been compared to such pianistic greats as Sergei Rachmaninoff and Vladimir Horowitz, is currently making a coast-to-coast American tour. Winner of a first prize at the Paris Conservatory by unanimous vote at the early age of 16, Mr. Collard has gone on to achieve a stunning reputation for so young a performer. As one review proclaimed after his 1973 American debut with the San Francisco Symphony, "Collard is quite simply one of the most exciting young pianists to come along."

"A Musical Talk" promises to be a delightful duet between two unusually talented and charming personalities of the music community. Join us in the Sanctuary, Sunday, February 4th, at 3:30 p.m.

RABBI BAUMGARD REAPPOINTED TO EDUCATION COMMISSION SERVES ON NATIONAL BOARD FOR JEWISH EDUCATION

Rabbi Baumgard has been invited to a new three year year on the National Commission for Jewish Education which includes representatives of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis. The Commission is currently preparing a new curriculum for Reform Religious Schools and Rabbi Baumgard chairs the national task force in preparing the curriculum concerning the teaching of holidays and rituals. Sima Lesser, Director of our Day School, is on this task.

aumgard also serves on the Committee on Reform Jewish Practice which is preparing a series of books on recommended practice for Reform Jews. That Committee has just published a "Sabbath Manual", available through the Judaica Shop, and "Gates opf Mitzvah", which will be available to the public soon. The Committee on RJP is part of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Rabbi Baumgard also serves on the Rabbinical Placement Committee of the CCAR which helps congregations in their search for Rabbis.

From the Rabbi's Desk

DO WE NEED RITUALS?

Several years ago, I published a little brochure entitled, "Taking On a New Soul—A Recipe for Young Lovers". Copies were distributed to all member families. (Did you get yours? They are still available). The brochure is something I give to all newly married couples, and I ask them to promise me that they will perform at least one Jewish ritual regularly—the kindling of the Sabbath eve lights. The brochure explains how important this ritual can be, IF the couple chooses to make it important.

A ritual has no more meaning than the performer gives to it. If he brings a great deal to it, if he projects meaning into it, if he accepts the historic meaning associated with it, it can be a dynamic experience in his life. On the other hand, if the performer does the ritual matter of factly, without thinking, if he is ignorant of the historic import of the ritual, if he invests nothing

in it emotionally, it loses its meaning.

I believe that the meaningful performance of certain key rituals is essential to the survival of the Jewish people. They are what bind us to the past, and they are what will hold us together, if we are to be a creative group in the future. Consider now, this one ritual, the kindling of the Sabbath eve lights (Friday night). In the tradition, the mother lit the candles at the dinner table, as the father came home from the synagogue. His was the mitzvah (required religious act) of attending worship. Her mitzvah was to light the candles, but her act was not discussed from his prior or subsequent acts.

When the father saw the gleaming Sabbath candles, lit by his wife, he then sang her a love song. He was **required** to sing "Ashet Chayil Mi Yimzah . . . A woman of valor who can find, for she is worth more than rubies . . . " The tradition required the husband to profess his love for his wife in the glow of the Sabbath

candles. The candles set the mood for love.

Following the song, the father was required to **touch** his children and to bless them. (Remember Fiddler on the Roof ... "May the lord protect and defend you . . .") Especially if he was away all day, it was the more important for him to caress his children and to let them know that he loved them. All of this in the shadow of the gleaming candles.

IN OTHER WORDS, THE LIGHT OF THE SABBATH CANDLES IS THE FIRST IN A SERIES OF ACTIONS DESIGNED TO GIVE THE FAMILY THE BACKDROP FOR THE MUTUAL EXPRESSION OF

LOVE.

The family that lights the candles in this mood is thereby blessed of God.

Now I am not saying that the modern father must go to the synagogue before he comes home on Friday night (what's bad?). Nor am I saying that he must learn and sing the traditional song, "Ashet Chayil"; nor am I saying that he must learn the traditional blessing for the children (all of which are in my little brochure). I am saying that the family that lights the candles TOGETHER with the understanding that this is the LOVE MOMENT, and with the understanding that all irritations of the week are to be absorbed in this love, this family is bound to experience the deeper aspects of Judaism in this sunlight introducing the Sabbath.

Of course, one can light the candles in a perfunctory manner. In many homes (as in my childhood) the father is not even present when the candles are lit. Such mechanical lighting is not what I am talking about. All concerned have to get into this mood. All concerned have to say to themselves, "We are creating something together here, something that is meaningful in the present and which binds all Jews together now and in the past

and future,"

A ritual means no more than you let it mean. It means no more than what you bring to it. Are you cheating yourself by not sharing this mitzvah?
