Chanukah Festival Here On December 14th Rabbi Weinblatt To Be Installed

Our annual Chanukah Festival will take place at the Friday evening service of December 14th. As part of the observance of Chanukah, which begins that evening, Rabbi Stuart Weinblatt will be officially installed as an Associate Rabbi of Beth Am.

Chanukah marks the anniversary of the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem in 186 B.C.E. after the Syrian conquerers had been driven out, and the music and events associated with our service will be integrated into that theme. Beautiful but rarely heard music of Chanukah will be sung by the choir from the altar. Those who have heard the Choir in this kind of concert from the altar have noted that the music seems all the more dramatic.

Rabbi Weinblatt has been serving with us since September and a brief ceremony will be the vehicle for his investiture as a Rabbi of the congregation. Rabbi Baumgard will speak.

The annual Candlelight Service will be held the following Friday, December 21st, featuring the young people's choir led by Harriet Potlock. This service will start at 8:30 p.m.

FROM THE RABBIS STUDY



The Art Of Meditation

The Bible tells us that when Rebekkah first saw Isaac, he was "meditating in the field at eventide". From this she learned that Isaac was a serious minded person and the kind of man she would like to marry. In commenting on Isaac's "meditation", the Rabbis said that he was involved in the traditional evening prayer.

The last time I visited Israel, just a few years ago, I went into the synagogue which is underground, just to the left of the ''Western Wall''. There were several ''minyanim'', or prayer groups, operating in this rather large area, but I went to the furthest corner of the area, and there I observed a scene that moved me deeply. A single ''hasid'' was sitting down and praying all by himself. He swayed rhythmically from side to side, almost as if he were a dancer, while his head moved in a more pronounced way, as if to emphasize certain parts of his prayers. This hasid was not just saying his prayers. He was PRAYING ''with every limb of his body'', as the hasidic tradition teaches. He was reaching for God with every fiber of his being.

Certain sects associated with the oriental religions have claimed the allegiance of many Americans who are fascinated with the processes and results of "meditation". This oriental process is designed to take one's mind off of mundane things so that one can attain that peace which is associated with the divine. The "divine", according to the oriental guru, is "non-being". It is associated with the absence of passion and desire. There can be no question but that this kind of meditation can help certain people (not all) to escape from some of the pressures of modern life.

The guru who advocates this kind of meditation usually gives his devotees a ''mantra'', a word or phrase from the Indian texts which the devotee then uses as a device for hypnotizing himself into a kind of quietude. I have spoken to hypnotists and to psychologists who are able to achieve similar results with clients by using other devices than a ''mantra''. It is clear that the mantra is not the important thing in the process, although some devotees begin to associate strange powers to the mantra itself. All of these procedures involve a kind of self-hypnosis which can be valuable to give us moments of rest and relaxation. It ought to be stated that it helps when the process is controlled, at least at the beginning, by a well-trained helper, be he the guru, the hypnotist, or in some cases, the psychologist.

In the past, Jews have not needed the technique of selfhypnosis, because they obtained their peace of mind and soul from the prayer book and the prayer service. One has only to observe a Jew truly involved in the prayers, like the hasid encountered in Israel, to note how completely consuming and helpful the traditional prayers can be. Many modern liberated Jews, however, find it more difficult to get involved in the traditional prayers, so they have the need to resort to devices not associated with Judaism. They look not to the Rabbi as their teacher but to the guru or the hypnotist. Psychological help in the hands of a person truly qualified is really of another dimension and allied to the perspective derived from Judaism.


Rabbis, down through the ages, have had to study the new philosophies and trends of the time in which they lived in order to be able to cope with the challenges they presented to Judaism. So we modern Rabbis have had to bone up on our yoga and even on hypnotism (amongst other things). We are able to recognize the good that is in each of these procedures. (It is hardly fair to group psychology, which is a profound science, with yoga, and hypnotism which cover more limited fields.) Nonetheless, we say with the assurance and conviction born of intense study that meditation which does not urge the meditator to reach out to the broader community and to serve the group and mankind is merely another form

of ego satisfaction. The individual, Judaism insists, is most at peace not when he sits alone impervious to the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune, but when he reaches out to touch others and becomes involved in creating shalom for others as well as for himself.

The thrust of the Jewish religious service has two goals, quietude for the individual and shalom (harmony) for society as a whole. The dynamic for these goals is derived from a God who cares. The oriental god says, 'learn to do nothing'. The God of Israel proclaims, 'justice, justice, you shall pursue''. There is a difference between the god of inaction and the God of social action.
