INTERMARRIAGE

Questions and Answers

ABOUT INTERMARRIAGE WITH JEWS THAN VICE-VERSA. DOESN'T THIS SHOW PREJUDICE ON OUR PART?

Jews have long been among the liberals of the world where human rights are concerned and where the poor are concerned. But Jews have always been conservative where intermarriage is concerned. It is true that the Bible admonishes us to be in the moral vanguard for positive reasons, but it is also true that Jews have been politically liberal for the same reason that they have been conservative where intermarriage is concerned. The reason in both cases—survival.

As an oppressed minority, Jews have had to fight for their rights, and in fighting for their rights, they fought for the rights of all citizens. The first civil rights organization in America was Jewish organized (The American Jewish Committee), and most of the civil rights organizations which are not completely Jewish in origin and operation (Anti Defamation League, American Jewish Congress) were organized with considerable Jewish help (American Civil Liberties Union, Urban League, NAACP) and are maintained with considerable Jewish support.

As a minority religion, however, Jews have had to take a conservative position on intermarriage for the sake of survival. Sociological studies clearly show that where the parents take a "neutral" stand on religion, the children tend to go towards the majority religion, and their children tend to marry a spouse in the majority faith. While the original partners may intend that their children be outside the boundaries of religion, actually social forces sweep them towards the majority religion. In other words, the Jew who marries a non-Jew, with the intent that his children have the choice of Judaism or Christianity or nothing, actually is starting a new Christian family tree. He is, to all intents and purposes, abandoning his religion and the Jewish people.

Jews are conservative with respect to intermarriage because they intuit that a kind of surrender is involved. The Jewish partner involved in the marriage may think only in terms of love for his intended mate, but those around him see a certain sadness in what would otherwise be a wonderful situation. They see the diminution and dilution of the strength of the Jewish people.

KNOW THE FULL WEIGHT OF YOUR DECISION

This is not to say that a person born into Christianity cannot become a Jew and bring his/her strength into our community. This has been done many times. Where the non-Jew converts to Judaism in good faith and commits himself/herself to the having of a Jewish family and home, our community is strengthened by the marriage. But anything short of this weakens our community, and the Jew involved ought to know this and make his/her decision based on this knowledge.

We are not talking now about the worth of an individual. A particular Christian may be a nicer person than a particular Jew. This is not the issue. The issue is Jewish survival. If the Jewish community wants to survive, it cannot afford to be liberal with respect to intermarriage. Christians can afford to be liberal in this regard, because the odds are strongly in their favor that the child of a "neutral" marriage will drift to the side of the majority religion. Christianity has two chances in an intermarriage; one, if the marriage is committed to Christianity; a second, if the marriage is "neutral". Jews have only one chance in an intermarriage and that is - if it is fully committed to Judaism and the Jewish community.
