The Problems and Promises Surrounding Soviet Jewery Topic At Breakfast, Sunday, Nov. 16th

Our hearts are stirred and our emotions run high when we read of the treatment meted out to Jews in the Soviet Union. Letters are written, telegrams sent, our government is asked to intervene, and funds are collected to aid those still in the Soviet Union and those few who are permitted to emigrate. And as our protests grow, so does the flow of Jewish emigrants diminish.

Of concern to us, too, is what happens to those who do manage to leave Russia. This concern grows when we perceive the small number who go on to Israel, where they all promised to go, and the ever increasing number who come here and other Western countries.

What should our attitude be? What should we or what can we do? How many become Jews, deserving of our assistance, and how many merely blend into the overall population and forget their Jewish heritage?

To help us consider these problems we have secured the services of Elaine Bloom. As Public Affairs Director of Radio Station WKAT; as a former member of the House of Representatives of the Florida Legislature where she served with great distinction, as a member of the Board of Trustees, F.I.U.; Elaine Bloom brings her vast experience and background to us to help us understand the problems and promises of this interesting dilemma.

New Adult Education Course On Jewish Art Begins

No Jewish Adult Education program would be complete without balancing the study of texts, history and ideas with some study of the great Cultural Arts legacy which Judaism has developed.

Beginning on Tuesday evening, November 18, Rabbi Lewis Bogage, Director of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations Southeast Region, will begin four weeks of study of Jewish Art here for Beth Am members. In addition to a brief survey of the graphic arts within the Jewish tradition—a tradition which put severe limitations on art through the second of the Ten Commandments—Rabbi Bogage will deal with individual artists, Jewish and non-Jewish who have dealt with Jewish themes.

Some of the fascinating questions to be discussed are: How did art survive despite the religious taboo against it? Is Andy Warhol a Jewish artist when he sketches famous Jews? Is Marc Chagall a Christian artist when he paints the Crucifixion? What makes Jewish art Jewish?

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

"I'M GOING TO BURN THESE BOOKS"

A colleague of mine told me a story recently of a young lady being tutored for her Bat Mitzvah ceremony who said to her tutor. "When I become Bat Mitzvah, I'm going to burn all these books." Since the tutor was a very mild mannered young man, much respected and beloved by others, we can assume that the hostility manifested in this outburst was not directed towards the tutor. It was directed to things and persons more closely tied with her life

We find in the Temple that the attitude a child exhibits towards his Jewish studies is a reflection of two things: a) his or her relationship to family members as persons, and b) the quality of Jewish orientation at home. To be sure, not all of our teachers are equally wonderful, and, at times, we do have a problem with a teacher, but when a teacher has a proven record, and when most of his or her students like the teacher, you have to look for other reasons to discover why a child is so poorly motivated.

It is not enough to tell a child, however repeatedly, that he/she should be a good Jew or a learned Jew. A child learns best by what you do, not by what you tell the child. A child learns by the look on your face when you light the Sabbath candles. He learns by the seriousness with which you perform the ritual over the wine on Shabbat. He learns by the way you act when he sits beside you in the synagogue. He learns to rejoice in Judaism as you rejoice in singing the Chanukah songs. he has fun in Judaism as he follows you around the Temple in the Torah parade on Simchat Torah.

A child learns that Bar/Bat Mitzvah is just the first ring on the ladder of Jewish education when he knows you are participating in the Adult Education program. He knows the importance of his own Confirmation when he knows you are studying for your Adult Confirmation.

On the other hand, when the child sees you doing none of these things, HE LEARNS THAT THEY ARE UNIMPORTANT! You teach by what you do and by what you don't do, and nothing that the religious school teacher says will make any difference in changing the atmosphere that YOU are creating day by day.

It is also generally true that when there is a good personal relationship between parent and child, there will also be a good relationship between the child and the teacher. Those in positions of authority (like a Rabbi) discover that they are generally liked by those who related well to their parents and disliked by those who did not relate well to their parents. It is frequently a matter of prejudice, of predisposition.

How unhappy that child who threatens to burn her books must be! But then, we have so many children who treasure their books, those same books. How fortunate they are to come to us from a background which teaches a reverence for books - even for Jewish books.
