Adult Education Programs Gain Momentum

Unusually large enrollments have marked the start of this fall's schedule of Adult Education programs, beginning with Rabbi Baumgard's series on **Modern Jewish Mystics** which drew over fifty people and continuing with Lenore Kipper's **Hebrew From Scratch** which overflowed the classroom with more than thirty students.

Rabbi Hoffman's morning class in Bible began on September 30th at 10:00 A.M. and will continue until the winter break every Tuesday morning. Because of the length of this series, it is almost never too late for students to enroll. Seniors who can travel more comfortably during the day than at night are especially invited to enroll. This class has begun studying the book of Leviticus.

The Book of Genesis is the subject of Rabbi Holfman's other Bible Class which began on October 8th and will run through October 29th at 8:00 P.M. in Room 24.

On Tuesday, October 21st Rabbi Stuart Weinblatt begins his course entitled **Turning Points in Jewish History**. The goal of the course is to explain the techniques for survival which our people have successfully used in severe crisis situations in the past which threatened the life of Jews and Judaism. Are there any lessons from the past which can give guidance in our own concern with the health and continuity of the Jewish People.

Lenore Kipper continues her very popular Hebrew language instruction for those who will have finished her first course by beginning another four week series called simply **More Hebrew** on Thursday evening October 23rd and continuing on Thursdays at 8:00 P.M.

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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

THE JOY OF BEING A JEW

We talk so much of the difficulty of being a Jew that sometimes we forget that Judaism and the Jewish people have their wonderful side. I had a Christian friend at our Simchat Torah service on Wednesday night, October 1st, and when the service was over, he exclaimed, "I wouldn't have believed it if I weren't a part of it. Imagine a parade in a House of God and everyone singing and having a party!" The hundreds of people who came to this service marched around the Sanctuary and through the social hall, waving flags, singing popular holiday songs, and carrying Torahs. Everyone present handled the Torah and became a part of it. If you have never attended our Simchat Torah service, you have really missed something. Children of all ages

One of the most enjoyable experiences of the year for me and for many Jews is the break-fast after the fasting on Yom Kippur. Of course, if one does not fast, the break-fast is not fun. It's just another meal. I understand that not everyone is able to fast for 24 hours. Some can refrain from food but not from water. Some can abstain from lunch but not from a tid-bit at breakfast. My own feeling is that everyone should do the best he can. You may well find that your capacity to fast will increase each year, once you try to get the hang of it. At any rate, the break-fast will be pleasurable in direct ratio to the degree of fasting. How unfortunate for those Jews who can't have this wonderful experience. (Of course, the fasting takes on meaning precisely because it is tied to the exalted theme of cour services.)

Kindling the Chanukah lights is always a festive occasion in our home. Our family not only kindles the lights and sings the songs, but we have our own special dance which we choreographed for ourselves. The dance is especially delightful for youngsters, but you'd be surprised how the grandparents love it. (If you don't know the songs, the Temple can supply the words and refer you to the music). Add delicious latkes to the lights and the singing and the dancing, and you get one orgy.

The Passover Seder is a fun opportunity that only the unimaginative can avoid. At our Seder, everyone present reads a passage and all join in the singing (If you don't have such a Seder at home, join us at the Temple on the second Seder night). The trouble with the Seder is - it can be too much fun - too much food. But this is a night when we join ourselves to our enslaved ancestors and experience with them the sweet taste of freedom. There is so much "food" for thought at the Seder. Ah, but you don't enjoy the taste of freedom unless you REALLY share the bitter taste of slavery! The Seder gives us a chance to live in history and to be grateful for the present—if you know how to take advantage of it.

No accounting of Jewish joys should omit the Sabbath experience, for this really is the most important of all. Those Jewish homes which are most invested in the essence of Judaism never fail to kindle the sabbath lights, enjoy the Sabbath meal with family and friends, and sing the Sabbath songs. Candle-lighting time is the love-moment, the time for expressions of love and forgiveness, the time for a family to draw together. Once each week for this kind of open expression is not too much. Indeed, it is much needed in our hectic society. Friday night is the time for homecoming-to family and to God.

It's fun to be a Jew - if you know how to have fun.

Pilgrimage to Jerusalem in November
