# UNIQUE S'LICHOT SERVICE AT MIDNIGHT SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 6TH

#### ROSH HASHANAH STARTS WED., SEPT. 10 TWO MORNING SERVICES THURS., SEPT. 11

The High Holidays start early this year, with the start of Rosh Hashanah on Wednesday evening Sept. 10th. Our first service is that Wednesday evening at 6:30 p.m. This is a Family-Adult Service (limited to children who can sit through a full service). At 9:00 p.m. we will have the Adult Service for parents and children over fifteen years of age. Rabbi Baumgard will speak at both services, Rabbi Hoffman will serve as the Cantorial Soloist, Rabbi Weinblatt will co-officiate, and the Adult Choir will sing.

#### ADMISSION CARDS MUST BE PRESENTED

Beth Am admits members only to High Holiday service because of a problem with space. High Holiday admission cards must be shown at the door.

#### NOTE FOR THURSDAY MORNING SERVICES

Cars attempting to enter Temple grounds more than 30 minutes before service time will be turned away by the police. Physically handicapped members will be allowed to be dropped

off and/or park at the Temple at all times.

ADULT AND FAMILY SERVICES IN THE MORNING

On Thursday, Sept. 11th, Rosh Hashanah Day, at 9:30 a.m., there will be two identical services. The Adults only service (children over 15 permitted) will be held in the Sanctuary. Rabbi Baumgard will speak, Rabbi Hoffman will serve as Cantorial Soloist, and the Adult Choir will sing. Simultaneously, starting at 9:30 a.m., there will be a Family-Adult Service in the Gym for adults and children under 15 years of age. This service will be conducted by Rabbi Weinblatt, and he will deliver the sermon. The Gym will be specially decorated for the Holidays. This service will feature a Young People's Choir conducted by Harriet Potlock, and Jackie Berney will serve as Cantorial Soloist.

#### OFF-CAMPUS PARKING AND CAR POOLS

For these morning services, and only for the morning services, off-campus parking will be at the Epiphany Catholic Church, which is located just north of 84th Street on Red Road. Bus service will start at 8:15 a.m. for the morning service and will return to the church parking lot immediately after the conclusion of the service.

#### CHILDREN'S SERVICE

There will be a Children's Service for young people in the Sanctuary at 1:30 p.m. Harriet Potlock will conduct the music and Rabbi Baumgard will speak.

#### AFTERNOON SERVICE

At 3:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 11th, there will be a Family-Adult Service in the Sanctuary. This will be a repeat of the morning service and will feature Rabbi Hoffman as the Cantorial Soloist and the Adult Choir. Rabbi Baumgard and Rabbi Weinblatt will co-officiate, with Rabbi Hoffman delivering the sermon. #### FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

#### WHAT IS ROSH HA-SHANAH?

The New Year as celebrated by all Americans on January 1st is based on an old Roman holiday celebrating the birthday of the god Janus, who was sometimes called Saturn. We have in English the word "saturnalia" which means a prolonged and unrestrained party. It is in this fashion that many Americans tend to celebrate January 1st.

American Jews, like Jews throughout the world, have another New Year holiday known as Rosh Ha-Shanah. This celebration, however, is far from a saturnalia. It is a solemn call to spiritual renewal.

Jewish tradition holds that on the first day of the month of Tishri, as calculated by the ancient calendar, the world was created. On the anniversary of creation, then, we look to the possibilities for new creations. Especially in our personal life, we look for the possibility of "doing things over," of remaking our spiritual self. Judaism teaches that God feeds us with the power to clear the slate and begin anew.

On Rosh Ha-Shanah the Shofar is blown, calling Jews to their tasks under the covenant with God as first made with Abraham. Rosh Ha-Shanah, is, then, the time for recommitting oneself to the covenant.

Light is always one of the central symbols of creation. Jewish families begin the holy day by kindling the "Yom tov" candles at sundown. The blessing over the wine also calls to mind the wonders of creation and the infinite possibilities for change that exist. A special challah, or round loaf, is broken at the initiating holiday meal as a symbol of the bounty which God provides to us, and as a symbol of the continued newness and freshness (round) of the world. Sweet things are eaten to suggest a good year ahead, and Jews greet each other with the greeting, "L'shanah Tovah," an abbreviation for the wish, "May God inscribe you in the book of life for a good year."

Rosh Ha-Shanah is a time for soul searching and for soul reaching. It only begins the "10 Awesome Days" which culminate in Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, when according to our tradition, God forgives those who sincerely repent and who reorient their life in righteous fashion.

#### RITUALS FOR ROSH HASHANAH

The blessing over the **candles** for Rosh Hashanah is: Thanks be to You, Oh Lord, King of the Universe, who urges us to ennoble ourselves with the lighting of the candles for the beginning of the year.

Baruch Ahtah Ahdonai Eloheynu Melech Ha-ohlam, Ahsher Kid'shanu B'mitzvotav V'tzivahnu l'Hadlik Ner shel Yom Tov.

The abbreviated blessing over the wine is: Bahruch Ahtah Ahdonai Eloheynu Melech Ha-ohlam Bo-ray P'ri Ha-Gafen.

We are grateful to You, Oh Lord, Source of all created things, symbolized by this wine

The blessing over **bread** is: Baruch Ahtah Ahdonai Eloheynu Melech Ha-ohlam Ha-motzi Lechem Min Ha-Ahretz (Ahmen)

Thanks be to You, Oh Lord, Who causes the earth to yield its fruit and Who causes the human yeart to yield its fruit of love and understanding.

It is customary for each person present to take a piece of bread (or all eat from one slice that is broken apart) and eat simultaneously. Expressions of family affection and good wishes immediately follow.
