Selma Rappaport, a member of Temple Beth Am for over fifteen years, will be honored on Friday evening, April 10th, at 8:30 p.m., as the recipient of the Harry Gunther Service Award. The Gunther Award is named after a deceased member of Temple Beth Am who was one of our founding fathers and who served as an officer of the Temple and on the Board of Directors for over fifteen years.

Selma and her husband Lenny joined Beth Am in 1967 and quickly became entwined into Temple activities. Selma's list of activities are many - she taught Nursery School at Beth Am for two years; served as Chairman of our Kiddush Committee: was Vice President of the Religious School Committee, was Sisterhood President for two years, a member of the School Board of Beth Am for over ten years, a member of Beth Am's Board of Directors, and Co-Chairman of Beth Am's Contemporaries.

Her other activities include volunteer for the Sunrise School for the Retarded for four years, a Pink Lady at Baptist Hospital, a Cub Scout Leader, Corresponding Secretary for the Lorber Chapter of the National Asthma Center, and served as Editor for District 13 of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods.

To top off all of the above, Selma has raised two sons and a daughter, all of who have been Bar/Bat Mitzvah and Confirmed at Beth Am. We congratulate this outstanding Beth Amite for service beyond the call of duty.

THE PASSOVER STORY

(Passover begins the night of April 18th)

Passover is one of the three original Jewish Holidays. Thousands of years ago it was the New Year Festival. It is natural to think that the year begins with the rebirth of vegetation in the Springtime. Passover is thus the season of hope. But the distinctive character of Judaism is that it tied together the symbol of nature and of human history. Passover also marks the time when the ancient Hebrews were given their freedom from the Egyptian slave-masters. Thus the Hebrews joined together the themes of mankind's struggle for a world of meaning and the

Consider, for example, the interweaving of the symbols of

nature and of history in the Holiday.

struggle of nature to be born again.

1. The parsley, (karpas) is the symbol of Springtime.

2. The **Matzoh** is the symbol of the historic Exodus, made in haste before the baked dough could rise.

3. The **Charoseth**, made of nuts and raisins, reminds us at once of the sweetness of Springtime and of the mortar used by our forefathers to make bricks for the Egyptians.

4. The **egg** (bayzah) is a symbol of the birth of Springtime and it is also used as the symbol of the offering in the Temple.

5. The **roasted shank bone** (z'to-ah) represents the Paschal lamb which was eaten hurriedly as our forefathers hastened to leave Egypt.

6. The **salt water** represents the tears of bitterness shed by the Hebrews.

7. The **bitter herbs**, (maror) represent the bitterness of the bondage of our fathers.

8. The **Hillel sandwich** made by including a little bitter herbs with some of the sweet charoseth is to teach us that life consists of both good and bad, and if we are to survive we must be prepared to accept both.

9. Finally the **Seder** itself is designed to remind us that we must recount the history of the past constantly so that we might become personally identified with our history. Through this biographical approach to history, it is hoped that we will each

become fighters for freedom in our day.

10. Cup of Elijah - Like no other prophet, Elijah figured in Jewish folklore as the friend of the common people. Legend has it that before the Messiah comes, Elijah will return to announce the good news. Thus by pouring a coup of wine for Elijah we express the hope that the Messianic Day of peace and justice will come immediately.

11. The **Afikomen** is a piece of matzoh which is hidden at the beginning of the Seder. It is eaten at the conclusion of the Seder as a dessert. Usually, the young people are encouraged to find the hidden Afikomen and are given a present for their discovery.

Beth Am has a modern Seder booklet (Haggadah). You can purchase it at our cost.

There WILL be Hebrew School on April 13th and 15th.
There will be NO Hebrew School on Monday, April 20th, but there WILL be Hebrew School on Wednesday, April 22nd.

Classes then proceed normally. The 10th grade (Confirmation class continues through June 1st, and Confirmation takes place on Sunday, June 7th.

Religious School classes end on May 17th. Hebrew School continues through May 20th.
