
There are two openings on the Board of Directors for a two year term to expire in 1983. The following were nominated: Dr. Mark Oren and Ed Waronker.

# On "Masada" and Other Things

THE FILM "MASADA"-Beth Am has ordered the condensed version of the T.V. series on Masada for use in both the Religious School and the Day School. How much of the film was history and how much fiction? Actually, the only thing we have in writing about Masada is a brief reference in the historical work of Josephus, a Romanized Jew. The essential facts, as given by Josephus, tell us that a small group of Zealots, about 900, retreated to Masada and held out for three years against those very Romans who destroyed the Temple in Jerusalem while routing the Judean armies. Quite probably, the Masada enclave of Zealots served as the focal point for all Judeans who wished to fight on against the cruelly efficient Roman war machine, and quite possibly the Zealots in Masada, and/or their allies, harassed the Romans with some success. Josephus tells us of the mass suicide when the Romans were about to capture the gallant defenders.

The film seems to present Eliezar, the Zealot chief, as a taunter of the Romans, and perhaps he was, although the actual scenes in the film were probably constructed for T.V. interest.

The film contrasts the Zealots with the Essenes who had abandoned all hope of defeating the Romans, and indeed despaired of ever building a free and continuing Jewish society. (They didn't marry or have children.) I have seen two of the four episodes, as this goes to press, and I have not heard mention of the Pharisees. The Pharisees were the middle party of the time, representing the majority of the Jews. The Pharisees believed that neither the military (Zealot) nor the escapist (Essene) perspective would save the Judean community. The Pharisees correctly perceived that the Romans were too strong militarily for any kind of successful military effort, witness the defeat in the year 70 of the Common Era and the still worse defeat in 135 C.E. (the Bar Kochba revolt). The Pharisee plan for survival was to keep intact Jewish legal and religious institutions and to out-live the Romans. They concentrated on the intensity of the inner Jewish life. They helped develop the Talmud, the legal code governing every aspect of Jewish life. The Pharisees were the real heroes of this period. They neither cooperated with the Roman government, i.e., accepted public office, nor did they militarily waste Jewish lives. Of course, it is hard to present the Pharisaic Rabbis on T.V. They were not violent enough, but you and I are Jews because of their patience and their learning. It is they who lived by the teaching of the Prophet Zechariah, which is inscribed on our Ark, "'Not by military power, nor by violence, but by my spirit,' saith the Lord.'

LIVING ROOM DIALOGUE—Following the Liberty City riot here in Miami, the National Conference of Christians and Jews held a county-wide meeting on interracial and intercultural relations. The outcome of that meeting, at which this Rabbi was one of the invited speakers, is the setting aside of a day for Living Room Dialogues between all aspects of our population. This day is Sunday, May 3rd, from 2-5 p.m. Of course Sunday is not the best day, but then, what is?

If you believe that it is important for Dade Countians to come together the better to understand one another, you will want to attend one of these dialogues. At last counting, over 200 people were coming from various churches and only five Jews altogether! Are Jews not interested in dialogueing? Please make this sacrifice.
