On Friday evening, April 23rd, at 8:15 in the Temple Sanctuary, a special service of memorial to the victims of the Holocaust will be conducted in observance of the annual Holocaust Martyrs Day.

The service will be highlighted by a special Yizkor in which several of the songs of the Holocaust in Yiddish and Hebrew will be sung by Rabbi Hoffman, and the Choir will also sing a memorial prayer. Rabbi Hoffman will speak on "The Righteous Gentile."

All Jews of this generation are profoundly marked by the experience of the Holocaust, whether they are survivors, or only distantly related to the victims. The purpose of the service is both to fulfill the mitzvah of saying Kaddish for the victims and to gain perspetive for the living.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



GOD AND THE COMMANDMENTS

It is no accident that in our age there is a questioning of the reality of God and an attack on the authority of social standards. The two go together. Passover marks the time when a people, for the first time in human history, stood up on their hind legs and said, "We will not be slaves. We will be free". The story in our Bible also tells us that for the first time in the annals of human endeavor, there appeared a God who said, "The slaves are My people. They are precious to me. I hear their outcry. I feel their pain. I will move to liberate them". The two notions, a God who cares about slaves and a people with the courage to seek their freedom, go together. They are inseparable.

In the incident of the Golden Calf, we learn that many of the ex-slaves interpreted freedom as the right to do whatever you wished (sexual debauchery, et al). Moses sought to teach the people that there is no free society without standards and limitations. Freedom is secure only when there are laws upon which all concerned agree. The Israelites were not really free meaningfully until Moses placed the commandments upon them and they accepted the commandments. The biblical story makes it clear that the people consciously accepted the

limitations on their freedom.

When is a law DIVINE? It is divine when it is absolutely essential to the functioning of the society. In different ages, different rulers have sought to impress the people that essential laws were rooted in the gods. Thus Hammurabi, the great Babylonia ruler said that his god handed down this law: "If a slave escapes to your home and you do not return him to his master, you are guilty of a felony and may be killed". Moses in Canaan said that his God handed down this law: "If a slave escapes to your home and you return him to his master, you are guilty of a felony.". The gods were different, yes, but so were the societies. The Hebrew society was rooted in the search for freedom, so its God spoke out of the context of respect for human dignity.

How do we know what the gods say? We hear them with an ear trained to hear in a certain way. If we are trained to be sensitive one way, we seem to hear God speaking that way, but if we revolt against that old way, we hear God speaking in

another way.

In modern times we do not hear the gods saying anything. Or rather we hear them saying, "Eat, drink, and be merry, because tomorrow you die". Unfortunately, there's nothing new about this message. It's the old message that Romans heard in the decadent days of their society. It's the message that Canaanites heard their gods saying before the Hebrews

cast out those gods.

What do I hear God saying today? I hear the message Moses heard. "There can be no society without caring families. We must revere the aged and the young. We must marry someone who will help us preserve our value system and traditions. We must have children so that our people will not die out. Licentious sex leads to a breakdown of the family". I hear the message the prophets heard. "The rulers must not abuse their power. Ceremonies have value to the extent that they support human need. The poor and the weak are especially loved by God. God demands justice from us, but our justice must be tempered with mercy. Study the past to draw its wisdom from it. Act today with the understanding that what you do determines the kind of world your children will live in. The present is a cross-section of the past and the future.'

There are commandments which are divine. If we violate them, society falls apart, and we are back dancing before the Golden Calf.
