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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Jews Who Won't Let Converts Be Jews

Most American Jews come from homes with a steadily diluted Jewishness. A decreasing number of American Jews keep kosher homes. Few children see their parents at prayer in the house. Some children don't even hear a discussion about God or Israel or what it means to be a Jew. Some children are never brought to services by their parents. Some never know the mystery of Shabbat candles or the joy of Chanukah candles. Some don't even attend a Seder. Yet children who come out of this kind of Jewishly sterile home may still have some kind of vague loyalty to Judaism and to the Jewish people. When they get married, their parents may insist that they marry a Jew or that the non-Jew they marry must convert. This column is about the non-Jew that is brought into this kind of assimilated Jewish environment.

Most American Jews learn about Judaism from the Sunday School teacher. Denied exposure to Jewish ritual and holiday observance in their home, and shielded from Jewish emotional and intellectual experience, the young Jew learns children's stories and is spoon-fed Jewish ideas by his teacher. Some American Jews drop out of the religious school educational process at Bar/Bat Mitzvah, having learned almost nothing that will sustain them in a profound way when they are older. Others go on to Confirmation and begin the process of learning something about their faith and people as young adults, but most of these drop out after Confirmation having just begun the adult process of learning about this profound phenomenon called Judaism.

The convert, on the other hand, studies Judaism as an adult. He/she is introduced to the faith at the top level and is encouraged to think and to ask questions. Discussions are held concerning the comparison of Judaism to other faiths. It is not at all unusual for a convert to be enflamed with Judaism. Inspired by what he or she has learned, and viewing Judaism as a truly superior religion, the convert may well be anxious to attend services, to perform rituals, etc. But what is the frequent experience of the convert in this regard? He/she bumps square into the resistance of his/her Jewish spouse who says, in effect, "Now wait a minute. I want you to be Jewish, as I am, but not THAT Jewish!"

Those of us who deal with the conversion class get to meet some wonderful people on their way to becoming Jews. Some of them become our finest Jews. We have learned, however, that we have to overcome not only the prospective convert's experience in another faith, we have also to combat the ignorance, Jewishly speaking, and, yes, the indifference of the Jewish partner.

What this teaches us is that we have placed too much emphasis in America on the child's religious school experience. That experience is important, especially when the child comes from a home with little Jewish flavor, but the school experience cannot do what enthusiastic and dedicated parents can do. It is daily and weekly ritualistic experience, and daily learning in the home that really builds up a Jewishly oriented person.

We know from the positive reaction of almost all of our present converts that Judaism is an exciting and dynamic religious alternative for modern times. We are encouraged by the response of our adult students to our teaching. We hope they will be able to overcome the acquired detachment of the Jew by birth whom they are marrying.

P.S. Our Introduction to Judaism course on Friday evenings (which prospective converts attend) is just an Adult Ed class open to all of our members.

A Camp For Exceptional Teen-Agers

Our national Reform movement sponsors a camp for exceptional teen-agers who want special training in Judaism or the arts. The camp is staffed by Rabbis and artists. Areas of specialization include:

Music, Dance, Theatre, Visual Arts, Songleading, Jewish Studies, Hebrew, Israel, Education.

Kutz Camp is 90 acres of wooded property in Warwick, N.Y. First Semester beginning June 27th is \$775. Second Semester beginning July 22nd is \$755. Eight weeks is \$1,400. Programs in Israel During 1982


With the start of the new year our Temple Office has begun receiving brochures from a variety of organizations and institutions who annually schedule a wide variety of study and/or work programs in Israel. Those of our students and adults who would be interested in information concerning such programs in Israel should contact us for information.

Just received was a very attractive and interesting brochure from the American Zionist Youth Foundation which contains programs for both high school age and college age students. There are touring programs, sport programs, kibbutz programs, leadership training seminars, and even religious programs involving a stay either at a religious kibbutz or at a yeshiva. There are, in addition, special short-term programs for such periods of the year as the mid-winter vacation, and there are at the opposite end of the spectrum, long-term programs such as Sherut La'am which can run anywhere from six months up to a year.
